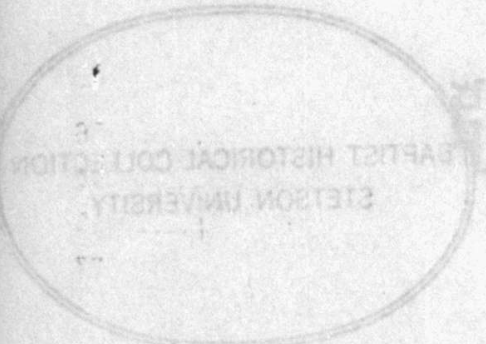

CONSTITUTION

of the NEW RIVER BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE I — NAME

The Association shall be known as the New River Missionary Baptist Association and shall be composed of accredited messengers who are members of constituted churches. An accredited messenger shall be one who has been duly elected by his church as a messenger or alternate. All pastors of the churches in the Association shall be enrolled as messengers but only those holding membership in constituted churches of the Association shall be eligible for office.

ARTICLE II — MESSENGERS

Each church in this Association shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members in excess of fifty members. All Churches are expected to send with their messengers letters to the Association containing account of their state on regular form used by the State Convention and the Association with all questions answered and remarks where necessary. These letters should be forwarded to the Clerk two weeks in advance of the annual meeting when possible. The churches proportionate amount to the Association Budget should accompany the Annual Letter whenever possible. The Association Year shall be from October 1st to September 30th.

ARTICLE III — CHURCHES

Section 1. Baptist churches desiring admission into this body shall notify the Executive Committee at least one month prior to the Annual Meeting of the Association and shall petition by letter and messengers to the Association. On giving satisfactory evidence of their being sound in faith and the Gospel, and correct in practice, and in harmony with the work of the Association, may be received by a vote of the Association at the annual meeting and the Moderator be authorized to extend the right hand of fellowship in behalf of the Association.

SECTION 2. The Association acknowledges the independence of the individual churches and that no authority or jurisdiction is to be exercised over them by this Association and therefore disclaims all power of making laws for them under any pretext whatsoever, but deems it its duty to exclude any church that may be considered unworthy of fellowship. No church shall be excluded however without a thorough investigation by the executive Committee and vote of the Association at the Annual Meeting.

SECTION 3. When a church shall neglect to make a communication to the Association for at least two years, it shall be considered as having withdrawn and shall be dropped by vote from the minutes unless the Executive Committee recommends its continuance for one year. Any church wishing to sever its connection with this body may be allowed to do so upon an application duly made to the Association while in session, and a letter granted hereon.

ARTICLE IV — REGULATIONS

The Association shall hold its sessions annually at such time and place as the Association may elect and while in session will be governed by Roberts Rules of Order. The Executive Committee, however shall be authorized to make such changes in either time or place of meeting as may be found to be expedient.

ARTICLE V — DUTIES OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The Officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Vice Moderator and Clerk-Treasurer, each of whom shall be chosen by separate ballot. These officers shall be elected at the opening session of the Annual Meeting and take office at the close of the meeting. The Moderator and Vice Moderator cannot serve more than two years in succession.

SECTION 2. Duties of the Officers: [a] The Moderator shall preside over all meetings of the Association throughout the year. He shall also act as Chairman of the Executive Committee. During the year he shall seek to promote the harmony of the individual churches and moderate with unbiased leadership whenever invited. In general his duties will be those of any President of an Assembly. Prior to the Association meeting he shall appoint the Committee on Committees, the Budget Committee, and any other committee on authority of the Executive Committee that shall expedite the work of the Association.

[b] The Vice Moderator's duties will be those ascribed to him by the Moderator and to serve in the capacity of the Moderator during his absence from any meeting or at any time requested. If during the term of service the Moderator should move from the Association or his service to the Association be lost, the Vice-Moderator shall assume the place of the Moderator.

[c] The Clerk-Treasurer shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of all Association meetings including a separate record of the Executive Committee. It shall be his duty to prepare and distribute the minutes of the Annual Meeting, to keep a file of the minutes yearly and to co-operate both with the State Convention and the Moderator and churches. He shall also receive all funds from the churches and from any meetings, or any other source, and disburse same according to the budget, and or, by direction of the Executive Committee. He shall also keep a record of all funds received and disbursed and report to the Executive Committee at each meeting and to the Annual Meeting of the Association. A complete record of his term of office and all previous records received by him shall be turned over to his successor in office at the close of the Annual Meeting.

ARTICLE VI — DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1. [a] The Committee on Committees shall appoint a Nominations Committee, a Time, Place and Preacher Committee and a Resolutions Committee and these to report at the Annual Association Meeting. [b] The Nominations Committee shall nominate the Sunday School Superintendent; the Training Union Director; President of Woman's Missionary Union; President of Brotherhood; Director of Music-Superintendent of Evangelism at the June Executive Committee meeting.

[c] The Time, Place and Preacher Committee shall nominate the time and place for next Annual Meeting and the Preachers to bring the Annual Sermons and their alternates.

[d] The Resolutions Committee shall receive all resolutions to be brought to the Annual Meeting and shall bring as a recommendation any resolutions to be acted on at the meeting and all other resolutions shall be brought for consideration. [e] The Program Committee shall be composed of the Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Pastor of the host churches and any others advisable to assist in preparing the program.

[f] The Budget Committee shall prepare the budget of the Association including all expenditures of all departments of the work and recommended apportionment to each church and submit same to the Association at its Annual Meeting for approval.

Section 2. The Executive Committee: The Executive Committee of the Association shall be composed of: [a] The officers of the Association, [b] All Pastors of churches members of the Association, and [c] Heads of all departments elected by the Association, and [d] one layman elected by each church in the Association. The Duties of the Executive Committee shall be those ascribed by the Association and it shall conduct all business of the Association between Annual Meetings. The Committee shall organize itself into special committees at any time it is necessary to expedite the work of the Association and is authorized to fill all vacancies which may occur during the Associational year. The Committee shall meet at least quarterly and a quorum for business shall be 6 members.

ARTICLE VII — AMENDMENTS

This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote provided that notice of such change shall have been given to the Executive Committee not later than the last Executive Committee meeting previous to the Association meeting and notice of such change be given to the Association on the first day of such meeting.

BY-LAWS

1. An Association Missions Committee to be composed of 5 members with one member elected each year to serve a 5 year period or until removal from the Association membership or residency or dismissal for non-attendance at 3 meetings during a year. When a vacancy occurs it shall be filled at the annual meeting for the length of the unexpired term. The members of this committee shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Association. Associational meeting and Executive Committee during the year.

The duties of the committee shall be to work in cooperation with other Missions Committees of the District and to report to the Annual Associational meeting and Executive Committee during the year.

We had our regular Brotherhood meetings each quarter during the year with an average of 14 men present. The final meeting was a barbeque supper at Bayless Highway with 34 present. 8 churches in the association reported Brotherhoods. New River Church will organize a Brotherhood October 20. One Brotherhood reported sending two R. A.'s to the Third National R. A. Congress in Washington, D. C.

Bro. W. H. Williams is leader of the Brotherhood work in the State Prison.

3:55 —Music Report — Jimmy V. Crosby.

The year 1964 should be a very significant one for Baptists in America. This is the third "Jubilee" year. It should be a year when every Baptist member and church endeavors to reach its maximum for God in celebration for his goodness during the years of organized Baptist life in America. In order to reach every church and to inspire and lead it to maximum service, the associational music ministry organization stands as a key to whether or not all of these churches will have the benefits of participation in this "Jubilee" year. To this end many things are planned in which each church may participate such as hymn sings, schools of training, carol sings and general promotion of better music.

This past year the associational music ministry organization showed 43 out of 47 associations held. Associational Festivals, 255 churches participated in the festivals with 602 choral groups, totaling 12,544 choir members—207 hymn players—50 song leaders—1 instrumental ensemble with a total of 7 participants. Our Associational Festival was held at Raiford Baptist Church on January 20, 1963. We are planning to have a festival during January 1964.

There will be 11 State Music Festivals in 1964. The 1963 report of the State Festivals is as follows: There were 322 choral groups with 7,229 members—146 hymn players—31 song leaders—1 instrumental ensemble with 8 participants. A grand total of individuals participating in the State Festivals was 7,414. There were 153 churches participating and 505 certificates of award issued. The festivals for 1964 will be held on a state level on:

March 6-7, 1964 Cedar Hills Baptist Church, Jacksonville, Fla.

We plan to encourage our churches to participate in the nearest festival. In order to participate in the State Festival it will be necessary for every church to participate first in an Associational Festival.

Harmony Bay Youth Camps were held at the West Florida Baptist Assembly Grounds in Panama City again this year. The limited capacity of 120 select Intermediates and Young People for each camp enjoyed superb music leadership from the best faculty available. These were held in August. During 1964 these camps will be held as follows August 3-9 will be the camp for first time Intermediates only. August 10-16 will be the camp for Intermediates who have attended before and all Young People ages 17-24. Each church in our association may send 5 Intermediates to the first camp and 5 Young People or second time Intermediates to the second camp. These camps are designed to train our best and most talented young people in our churches. Let us send one or more next year.

Two southwide music conferences were held during 1963. Approximately 500 from Florida attended along with more than 3,000 others throughout the south at Ridgecrest the week of June 27-July 3. More than 1200 attended Music Week in Glorieta New Mexico with 20 of them from Florida. Glorieta Music Conference was held July 11-17. Dates for 1964 are: Ridgecrest—June 25-July 1; Glorieta—July 16-22.

The New River Associational W. M. U. has gained special recognition by reaching 5 out of its 6 goals.

The Association has 24 organizations with 416 members. We held 4 quarterly meetings with an average attendance of 41.

At New River we have organized a new W. M. S. A. film library, for use in the different organizations has been established. Our By-laws have been revised and adopted. We have increased our gifts to foreign, home and state missions and have increased in the number of mission books read and taught. We helped celebrate the 75th Anniversary of the W. M. U.

Other accomplishments in youth organizations were Y. W. A. and House Parties, Day Camp for 8 year olds, and Picnic for G. A.'s. We have had a Prayer Retreat, representatives at the State W. M. U. Convention, and at Ridgecrest.

This report was adopted.

4:15 —Report — Baptist Bible Institute — Dr. James Southerland

A typical student at Baptist Bible Institute would be 32, married, with two or three children, and would have a background as a deacon or other lay leader in a Baptist Church.

We have assembled a highly trained, experienced faculty to train this mature student. Classes, chapel exercises, and Field Guidance classes led by denominational leaders from both state and SBC agencies, combine in a deliberate effort to produce graduates who not only can lead the churches, but also who will lead them along paths of denominational loyalty.

Courses parallel those leading to the B. D. in our seminaries. We require three years, or 100 semester hours of satisfactory work, for graduation in pastoral training, sacred music, or religious education. Enrollment for the first semester was 191, a record. Total unduplicating enrollment for both semesters last year was 225.

A new classroom building should be ready for use by 1964; the administration building should be in use by next June.

Our budget was \$189,609.05 for 1962-63. Money received last year came from the Cooperative Program, Florida Baptists, \$92,643.17; State Mission Offering, Florida, \$8,400; gifts designed through and by churches, directly or through the State Convention office, \$24,211.50; personal gifts, rentals, tuition fees, book sales, and otherwise, made up the difference.

The recent building and endowment campaign brought cash and pledges for \$175,000.

Further needs include a new cafeteria, and housing both for dormitory students and for student families. We shall have to meet these needs before long.

Several colleges will accept up to two years college credit on Bible major for the three years work done in the Institute.

An anonymous friend has promised \$5,000 if the Institute will match it with \$20,000 for a student loan fund. The Trustees are raising our share, expecting to complete the job by December 31, of this year.

CONCLUSIONS: Southern Baptists profit from this vital home mission effort of Florida Baptists. And Florida Baptist churches profit by having good men drawn into the state to attend the Institute, most of whom remain in the general area as pastors or other staff workers.

We thank you for your love and support. We promise to continue, as far as we are able, to merit your continuing cooperation, and to work with you as fellow-laborers for the King.

Our Children's Home continues to render distinct services to the needy families of our state. Assistance was given to 436 children during the year. There were 190 in the Home at Lakeland and Miami. There were 52 on Mother's Aid and four in foster home care. Caseworkers had 740 interviews with children and 439 with parents and relatives. They made 31 visits to those receiving Mother's Aid and 15 visits to the homes of those who had been discharged.

Mother's Aid is one of the most satisfactory and successful methods of child care. Under this plan the children remain at home with their mother who is given financial assistance. A Caseworker visits the home at least once each quarter during the year and counsels with the mother and the children.

This type of assistance is dependent upon the cooperation of the parent with the policies of the Home, which require that the children attend and become a part of the local church and its services. They also must attend school when possible.

Some children need more personal attention than is available in group living. These are placed in foster homes that will give them Christian training. All foster homes and children in their care are supervised by workers from Lakeland or the Miami branch.

The children under supervision last year were principally from homes broken by illness, a lack of strength of the parent to carry the responsibility of family life, inability to provide competent support for the family, desertion, and divorce. When rehabilitation can be achieved or the parents become well enough to assume family responsibility they are reunited and supervised as long as the workers think necessary.

The Women's organizations, Missionary Circles, Sunday School classes, and Training Unions provide some help by giving spending money, clothing, and other personal needs of the children. This is an excellent way to foster and maintain an interest between the members of our churches and the Home. Interest in a child is as important to those who are giving as to the child himself, it teaches him that others are interested in him and want to help him. Children learn best by personal relationship with Christian adults, and those who give to help him are enriched more than the child.

SPECIAL DEATH BENEFIT ADDED TO SOUTHERN BAPTIST PROTECTION PLAN

The Southern Baptist Protection Plan now provides a special death benefit for all members, both ministers and denominational workers, under 40 years of age. It covers both natural and accidental death.

If the member dies a natural death before age 40, the benefit provides a cash settlement to the member's widow or estate equal to the average salary on which dues were paid. If he dies because of an accident, the cash settlement will be double the average salary.

There is no added cost for this special death benefit, which is in addition to the regular retirement, widow and disability benefits of the Protection Plan.

The benefit is easy to figure. Suppose a member dies at age 32 of natural causes, and the average salary on which he had paid dues in the Protection Plan was \$3,550. His widow or estate would get a cash settlement of \$3,550, plus the regular benefits. If he is killed accidentally, his widow or estate would receive twice the amount, \$7,100 plus regular benefits.

BENEFITS PAID

More than \$41 million have been paid in relief and annuity benefits by the Annuity Board since its beginning in 1918. Last year these benefits totaled more than \$3 million, and were paid to more than 4,500 ministers and denominational workers or their families, who were members of a retirement plan, and to approximately 750 on the relief rolls.

MEMBERSHIP IN RETIREMENT PLAN

As of April 1, 1963, there were 15,964, or 49%, of the total churches in Southern Baptist Convention participating in the Annuity Board's retirement program for their pastors. Out of a total of 212 educational institutions, hospitals, children's homes and homes for the aged, 121 are enrolled in an Annuity Board retirement plan with their employees. Total membership in all the Board's retirement plans is approximately 25,000.

FIELD REPRESENTATIVES

The Annuity Board field representative for Florida is Phil Maxwell. He promotes the Board's retirement plans, trying to enlist all those pastors, churches and denominational employees who are not enrolled in the program in Florida. He also conducts a program of education, helping those who are in the plans to know more about the provisions they have for the future, and advising them if they should seek additional protection through a supplemental plan with the Board.

Rev. Maxwell is available to speak to a group in the church or association, or for personal conferences about any phase of the Annuity Board's work. His address is: 1105 Sarasota Drive, Tallahassee.

The Florida Baptist Foundation, an agency of the Florida Baptist Convention concerned with the support of all causes fostered and/or supported by the Convention, has had another great year of service. During the first nine months of the year, every agency and institution supported by the Convention has been named in wills prepared by the Foundation. In the years to come, money received from these wills will greatly help all these institutions.

The Foundation is concerned with assisting men and women in preparing wills favoring Baptist causes, setting up trust funds, and establishing endowments. At this time annuity contracts are not written by the Foundation, but are referred to the Home Mission Board, the Foreign Mission Board, or the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. It is hoped that in the near future it will be possible to enter this field.

The audit of September 30, 1962 shows \$792,204.83 held by the Foundation, compared to \$730,012.21 held at the same time the previous year. None of this money is owned by the Foundation, but is held as specified by the trust or will covering the particular fund. No part of these funds can be spent except as specified in the agreement.

Partial settlement of one large estate has been received, and final settlement is expected soon. The part received by Baptist causes will amount to more than \$80,000.00.

Professional guidance is available to the Foundation in the field of investments. The Trust Department of the Florida National Bank, Jacksonville, makes suggestions as to investments, which are voted on by the Investment Committee of the Foundation before investments are made. Remarkable progress has been made in the investment field, and earnings are considered good.

The Foundation operates under the direction of fifteen of the best qualified and finest Baptist laymen, and one pastor. These trustees meet annually to receive reports from committees, and determine general policies. An Executive Committee is elected from the trustees, and serves in operational matters. These trustees serve without compensation, and pay their own expenses in connection with all meetings.

Your Secretary expresses appreciation to the Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Florida Baptist Convention, and to all convention employees for their helpful cooperation. He also expresses his appreciation for opportunities to discuss the work of the Foundation in various associational meetings. He has worked with the Sunday School Department, the Training Union Department, the Brotherhood Department, the Woman's Missionary Union, and in Schools of Missions this year in getting across the message of the place of the Foundation in Baptist life.

Help is given in writing wills and establishing trusts. Calls come every week from every part of the state in this connection. Again during the first

nine months of the associational year, wills amounting to far more than a million dollars for Baptist causes have been prepared.

The Cooperative Program is the fundamental, effective, indispensable channel for the support of missions at home and around the world. It is the basic finance program of Southern Baptists, and demands the continual support of all Southern Baptist churches. Through it, we achieve the purposes of our denomination, and make it possible for every gift, regardless of size to go to the support of all our common endeavors.

In support of the Cooperative Program, the Stewardship Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention has developed three programs that will continue to be of immeasurable value to our churches.

The Forward Program of Church Finance, now called the Forward Program of Christian Stewardship, is the oldest program, and has served well the churches that have chosen to use it through the years.

Last year the Forward Program of Christian Stewardship was joined by a new stewardship development program primarily for churches with up to three hundred members, called Growth in Christian Stewardship. These two programs aid churches in developing giving congregations. More and more churches are finding that when a person gives of his possessions, he will give more of himself to the service of God.

Early in 1964, a third program entitled, "Year-Round Stewardship Development," will be available for churches to use in keeping Christian stewardship before the people all through the year.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

We recommend:

1. That our churches focus attention upon world missions by observing October as Cooperative Program Month. Through this means, we want our churches to use Wednesday prayer service as an opportunity to pray for world missions needs.
2. That every church put the Cooperative Program in the church budget on the percentage plan.
3. That the 2 Plus Plan be used, by which a church gives at least 2% more of the total church budget to missions through the Cooperative Program.
4. That churches select the stewardship program best fitting its needs, and use that program for its promotional plan. The plans available are: Forward Program of Christian Stewardship and Growth in Christian Stewardship.

 3. An afternoon Bible Class meets each Sunday in "O" building. This class is conducted by laymen from the First Baptist Church of Lawtey.
 4. The Baptist Brotherhood meets on the third Monday of each month in the main unit. This work is sponsored by our Associational Brotherhood.
 5. A Baptist Worship Service on the third Sunday of each month. This work is carried on by the Pastor of the First Baptist Church of Raiford.
- Inmates at the prison who make professions of faith and desire to be Baptist are baptized into the membership of the First Baptist Church at Raiford. Presently fifty-five such men are on the membership roll of the First Baptist Church of Raiford.

The newly elected committee composed of the Pastor of the First Baptist Church of Raiford, the Associational Brotherhood representative, and the Associational Moderator, will do their best to coordinate the work of Baptist and to strengthen the various programs of activity in the institution.

This is the tenth annual report of this Field Secretary, of work done in this Missions District. It would be well-nigh impossible to make an accurate report of all the work done by any one person in this kind of Religious Program, but as best we may be able to recount at rest some of the work, this is the best that can be done.

In this Work, time has been spent in attending general meetings such as the Florida Baptist Convention; the Florida Baptist Evangelistic Conference; six days in attending the Annual Meetings of three Associations, scores of other associational meetings; serving in three different Schools of Missions for one week each, and conducting three revival meetings for eight days. Teaching two study courses for five nights each.

Results; 28 professions of faith, 18 additions by letter and statement for a total of 46 additions to different churches, and 4 "Decisions for Special Service", and a total of 1,741 "Commitments for Stewardship" in the churches. It was the privilege of the Field Secretary to administer the Ordinance of Baptism to eight candidates for one church.

16 days of the year spent in Putnam Memorial Hospital (11 days), and at home recovering from illness, 24 days in revivals, 14 days in vacation and the other 311 days spent on the field at work. Traveled 28,841 miles, visited 136 churches and 47 missions, delivered 120 sermons, conducted 16 prayer meetings, assisted in 11 Ordinations, made 28 soul-winning visits, 140 other religious visits, gave out 1,265 tracts, was in conference with individuals 207 times and with groups or committees 87 times for a total of 294 conferences.

The Work is with three associations, the Black Creek, New River and the Saint Johns River, with a total of 84 churches and 34 missions. During the past year we organized and got under way 21 new missions. One new church was constituted. We only have 7 churches sponsoring one or more missions.

In the Black Creek Association 3 churches with a total of 413 members did not make a contribution to our "World Missions Program" through the Cooperative Program. In the New River Association 3 churches with a total of 469 members did not contribute to "World Missions", and in the Saint Johns River Association, 7 churches with a total membership of 740 members did not contribute to World Missions. This means that 1,622 church members in our Missions District had no part in our "World Missions Program" during the past twelve months. Just think of it, 13 churches. What a power those churches could have been, all working together for Christ. Will this Association please grant a few words of suggestion?

1. Will this Association please recommend to each member-church THAT a Missions Committee be selected and elected by each respective church say, about three consecrated, active Christian People who are interested in local missions. Notify your Field Secretary of the names of your Committee and let him meet with them in the study of their local mission program.

2. Will this Association please recommend to each member-church THAT a Co-operative Program Committee be elected by each respective church for the soul purpose of promoting the cause of missions, at Home and Abroad, through our own churches. Just suppose that 1,622 church-members who had no part in any of our mission causes last year, had been tithers; with a weekly income of \$10 each. Their tithe would have amounted to \$1,622.00 per week for a grand total of \$84,344.00 MORE FOR WORLD MISSIONS THIS PAST YEAR than was given from the Missions District. God cannot be pleased when this many of HIS PEOPLE are Missing the Mark by such a great margin. HE just cannot be pleased.

3. Will this Association please recommend to each member-church THAT a Church Budget Be Adopted by each respective church for the coming year and that we give some consideration to what GOD would like for us to do, instead of thinking always of "What we would like to have done?" It is sinful for churches to be led by minority groups of stingy people, who like to "Make believe" that they do NOT believe in churches having financial programs such as "Church Budgets". Christ has been gone Home almost

two-thousand-years. It is HIS Church. Not ours. He said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive." HE commanded His Followers. Why should His Church have to listen to anyone who desires to disagree with HIM?

4. Will this Association please recommend to each member-church THAT the Doctrines of the New Testament Be Re-Studied and that each church be requested to make it's Program and Practice to conform to the Doctrines of the New Testament? AGAIN, Christ said, "MY CHURCH" . . . Mt. 16:18. It is STILL His Church. He has relinquished his claim to NO-ONE, at any time. Let us lead the way for our Member-Churches to "GO ALL THE WAY" in their practices of the Doctrines of the ENTIRE BIBLE. No preacher has any right to attempt to lead any church away from the "Heritages of it's Denomination," nor does any Layman, for that matter. When WE come back to the Doctrines of the BIBLE, a lot of our troubles will be ended.

The report was adopted and the recommendations were accepted.

During the past year 30 of our number have been taken from our midst. We recommend that a page in our Minutes be dedicated to them and that this Association stand for a prayer in memory of our honored dead. The Clerk read the names of each one who was taken by death this year.

9:05 —This Association adjourned to meet again in October, 1964.

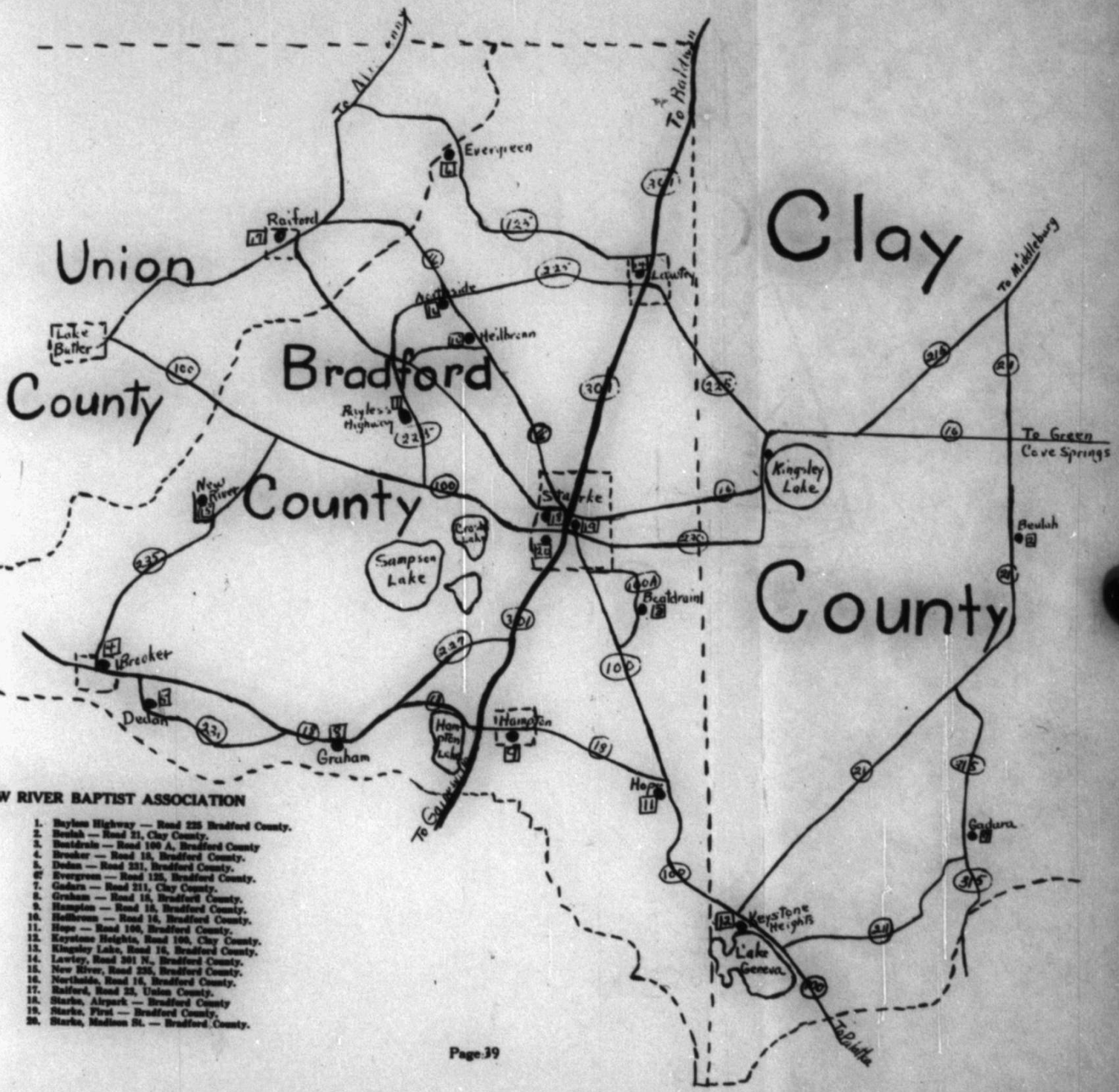
