## CONSTITUTION of the NEW RIVER BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

### ARTICLE I — NAME

The Association shall be known as the New River Missionary Baptist Association and shall be composed of accredited messengers who are members of constituted churches. An accredited messenger shall be one who has been duly elected by his church as a messenger or alternate. All pastors of the churches in the Association shall be enrolled as messengers but only those holding membership in constituted churches of the Association shall be eligible for office.

### ARTICLE II — MESSENGERS

Each church in this Association shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members in excess of fifty members. All Churches are expected to send with their messengers letters to the Association containing account of their state on regular form used by the State Convention and the Association with all questions answered and remarks where necessary. These letters should be forwarded to the Clerk two weeks in advance of the annual meeting when possible. The churches proportionate amount to the Association Budget should accompany the Annual Letter whenever possible. The Association Year shall be from October 1st to September 30th.

### ARTICLE III — CHURCHES

Section 1. Baptist churches desiring admission into this body shall notify the Executive Committee at least one month prior to the Annual Meeting of the Association and shall petition by letter and messengers to the Association. On giving satisfactory evidence of their being sound in faith and the Gospel, and correct in practice, and in harmony with the work of the Association, may be received by a vote of the Association at the annual meeting and the Moderator be authorized to extend the right hand of fellowship in behalf of the Association.

Section 2. The Association acknowledges the independence of the individual churches and that no authority or jurisdiction is to be exercised over them by this Association and therefore disclaims all power of making laws for them under any pretext whatsoever, but deems it its duty to exclude any church that may be considered unworthy of fellowship. No church shall be excluded however without a thorough investigation by the executive Committee and vote of the Association at the Annual Meeting.

Section 3. When a church shall neglect to make a communication to the Association for at least two years, it shall be considered as having withdrawn and shall be dropped by vote from the minutes unless the Executive Committee recommends its continuance for one year. Any church wishing to sever its connection with this body may be allowed to do so upon an application duly made to the Association while in session, and a letter granted hereon.

### ARTICLE IV — REGULATIONS

The Association shall hold its sessions annually at such time and place as the Association may elect and while in session will be governed by Roberts Rules of Order. The Executive Committee, however shall be authorized to make such changes in either time or place of meeting as may be found to be expedient.

**ARTICLE V — DUTIES OF OFFICERS**

Section 1. The Officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Vice Moderator and Clerk-Treasurer, each of whom shall be chosen by separate ballot. These officers shall be elected at the opening session of the Annual Meeting and take office at the close of the meeting. The Moderator and Vice Moderator cannot serve more than two years in succession.

Section 2. Duties of the Officers: (a) The Moderator shall preside over all meetings of the Association throughout the year. He shall also act as Chairman of the Executive Committee. During the year he shall seek to promote the harmony of the individual churches and moderate with unbiased leadership whenever invited. In general his duties will be those of any President of an Assembly. Prior to the Association meeting he shall appoint the Committee on Committees, the Budget Committee, and any other committee on authority of the Executive Committee that shall expedite the work of the Association.

(b) The Vice Moderator's duties will be those ascribed to him by the Moderator and to serve in the capacity of the Moderator during his absence from any meeting or at any time requested. If during the term of service the Moderator should move from the Association or his service to the Association be lost, the Vice-Moderator shall assume the place of the Moderator.

(c) The Clerk-Treasurer shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of all Association meetings including a separate record of the Executive Committee. It shall be his duty to prepare and distribute the minutes of the Annual Meeting, to keep a file of the minutes yearly and to co-operate both with the State Convention and the Moderator and churches. He shall also receive all funds from the churches and from any meetings, or any other source, and disburse same according to the budget, and or, by direction of the Executive Committee. He shall also keep a record of all funds received and disbursed and report to the Executive Committee at each meeting and to the Annual Meeting of the Association. A complete record of his term of office and all previous records received by him shall be turned over to his successor in office at the close of the Annual Meeting.

**ARTICLE VI — DUTIES OF COMMITTEES**

Section 1. (a) The Committee on Committees shall appoint a Nominations Committee, a Time, Place and Preacher Committee and a Resolutions Committee and these to report at the Annual Association Meeting. (b) The Nominations Committee shall nominate the Sunday School Superintendent; the Training Union Director; President of Woman's Missionary Union; President of Brotherhood; Director of Music; Superintendent of Evangelism at the June Executive Committee meeting. (c) The Time, Place and Preacher Committee shall nominate the time and place for the next Annual Meeting and the Preachers to bring the Annual Sermons and their alternates. (d) The Resolutions Committee shall receive all resolutions to be brought to the Annual meeting and shall bring as a recommendation any resolutions to be acted on at the meeting and all other resolutions shall be brought for consideration. (e) The Program Committee shall be composed of the Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Pastor of the host churches and any others advisable to assist in preparing the program. (f) The Budget Committee shall prepare the budget of the Association including all expenditures of all departments of the work and recommended apportionment to each church and submit same to the Association at its Annual Meeting for approval.

Section 2. The Executive Committee: The Executive Committee of the Association shall be composed of: (a) The officers of the Association, (b) All Pastors of churches members of the Association, and (c) Heads of all departments elected by the Association, and (d) one layman elected by each church in the Association. The Duties of the Executive Committee shall be those ascribed by the Association and it shall conduct all business of the Association between Annual Meetings. The Committee shall organize itself into special committees at any time it is necessary to expedite the work of the Association and is authorized to fill all vacancies which may occur during the Associational year. The Committee shall meet at least quarterly and a quorum for business shall be 6 members.

**ARTICLE VII — AMENDMENTS**

This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote provided that notice of such change shall have been given to the Executive Committee not later than the last Executive Committee meeting previous to the Association meeting and notice of such change be given to the Association on the first day of such meeting.

**BY-LAWS**

1. An Association Missions Committee to be composed of 5 members with one member elected each year to serve a 5 year period or until removal from the Association membership or residency or dismissal for non-attendance at 3 meetings during a year. When a vacancy occurs it shall be filled at the annual meeting for the length of the unexpired term. The members of this committee shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Association.

The duties of the committee shall be to work in cooperation with other Missions Committees of the District and to report to the Annual Associational meeting and Executive Committee during the year.

MONDAY, OCTOBER 12, 1964 — AFTERNOON SESSION

3:30 — Moderator Joe H. McCullough called the 92nd Annual Meeting of the New River Baptist Association to order for the purpose of transacting the necessary business. Nolan chairman of Deacons of the Madison Street Church welcomed members and friends of the New River Association.

3:45 — Organization — All messengers of the various churches were seated to carry on the business of the New River Baptist Association. The program was presented and adopted with any necessary changes. Bro. McCullough presented the Committees on Committees. Bro. Norman presented the report of the Nominating Committee:

New pastors, Rev. Paul Travis, A. L. Fewox, and Felder Rowan were introduced.

The state team composed of C. E. Peterson, C. M. Coalson, Ray Reynolds, Allison Bank, were introduced.

3:55 — Report, District Missions—Rev. Marvin V. Stedham.

This Missions District is comprised of four associations; Black Creek, New River, Saint Johns River and Santa Fe River, covering approximately eight counties. We have 118 churches and 50 missions reported. To know the population of the area would be startling.

Days spent on the field 339. Miles traveled 26,193. Churches visited 159. Mission visits 29. Sermons and addresses 126. Prayer meetings conducted 25. Assisted in ordination services 5. Revival meetings conducted 5. Soul-winning visits 136. Other religious visits 183. Bible and Scriptures given 6. Newsletters printed and mailed 2,964. Personal conferences 434. Group and Committee conferences 84, for a total of 518 Conferences.

Results: Additions by baptism 21, by letter 14 for a total of 35 additions. Decisions for special service 15. Rededications for Scriptural Stewardship living 516, Tithers cards signed 44. There were seven new missions started during the past year.

The Writer spent 10 days in hospital for major surgery, and 10 days at home convalescing. Attended Florida Baptist State Convention, Conference on Evangelism and Workshop and School of the Prophets, Panama City.

The State Mission Board requests that each association elect one member from its Mission Committee, (Not more than two), to serve on the District Missions Committee. This would replace the present District Missions Committee of 20 members, thus making the meetings much more easily attended by this smaller number of members.

It is a high privilege to have the Santa Fe River Association back in this Missions District again, and I am sure that we all extend them a hearty welcome.

During the past year the following associations had the number of churches indicated NOT contributing to our World Mission Program: Santa Fe River TWO CHURCHES, Black Creek FOUR CHURCHES, New River FOUR CHURCHES, and St. Johns River EIGHT CHURCHES. This gives a total of EIGHTEEN CHURCHES not cooperating in World Missions Gifts.

WHY NOT correct this mistake early, say, by January 1st, 1965? It would be very easy. Each church could send in an amount; ANY AMOUNT. ALL FOUR ASSOCIATIONS COULD BE ON THE HONOR ROLL in just three short months. Thank you.

With grateful appreciation for the wonderful cooperation of all the good in this Missions District, and praying for the best year yet.

#### NEW "LIFE BENEFIT PLAN" IS OFFERED TO CHURCH AND DENOMINATIONAL EMPLOYEES

Every pastor, church and denominational employee is eligible for the new group term Life Benefit Plan being offered by the Annuity Board, regardless of whether they are a member of one of the Board's retirement plans. The Board is currently in a campaign to enlist the 3,000 members needed to put the Life Benefit plan into effect, and hopes to have it in operation by October 1 of this year.

**COST IS LOW**—The new Plan provides low cost life protection to members while in active service, during disability or in actual age retirement. Cost is only 1% of the annual salary basis, with minimum basis of participation set at \$4,000 and maximum at \$12,000. Minimum payments will be \$3.34 a month and maximum payments, \$10.00. Car expense, housing and utility allowances, may be added to the cash salary to allow the member to pay on a larger amount. All participation is on even thousands, and the cost remains the same every year unless the member's salary increases and he wants to increase payments accordingly.

**BENEFITS ARE LARGE**—The widow or beneficiary of a member 45 or under will receive 2½ times his salary basis of participation in the event of his death. Thus the widow of a man 44 years of age who was paying on a \$12,000 salary basis would receive \$30,000. If death was accidental her benefit would be twice this, or \$60,000. After the member passes 45, benefits are scaled downward by 1/10th of a percent each year as he gets older. At age 65, the member who joined during the first year of eligibility and paid at least 10 years continuously prior to retirement will have a paid up benefit of \$1,000, or an amount equal to total contributions, if less than \$1,000. In case of total and presumably permanent disability, the members payments are waived, but his coverage continues.

#### MEMBERSHIP IN RETIREMENT PLANS

As of May 1, 1964, there were 16,251, or 50% of the total churches in the Southern Baptist Convention participating in the Annuity Board's retirement program with their pastors. Out of 174 educational institutions, hospitals, children's homes, homes for the aged and other south-wide agencies, 118 are enrolled in an Annuity Board plan with their employees. Total membership in the Board's retirement plans is approximately 25,000.

#### BENEFITS PAID

More than \$43½ million have been paid in relief and annuity benefits by the Annuity Board since its beginning in 1918. Last year these benefits were more than \$3½ million, and were paid to ministers and denominational workers or their families who were members of a retirement plan, and to those on the relief rolls.

#### ANNUITY SECRETARY

Phil Maxwell is the Annuity Secretary for Florida. He conducts a program of promotion and education regarding all phases of the Annuity Board's protection ministry. He seeks first to enlist those pastors and church and denominational employees who are not in a retirement plan with the Board. Secondly, he helps those who are in the plans to know more about the financial provisions they are entitled to, and advises them in seeking additional protection through the Board's supplemental plans.

#### 4:55 —Christian Education—Larramore.

It has been well said that Christian Education means "Education with a plus!" This means that the content and process are presented and interpreted in the light of the Christian Religion. Not only is it concerned with the physical, mental and social development of the young, but is vitally concerned with their spiritual development. Huge sums of money invested in our institutions of higher learning can be justified only in light of the contributions they make to this development and in the service they render the Kingdom of God and Baptists.

Southern Baptists now operates 73 schools: 6 seminaries and a joint operation with National Baptists of another seminary, 37 senior colleges, 17 junior colleges, 7 academies, and 5 Bible schools. Only 3 of the colleges old enough to be accredited lack full recognition.

Qualified teachers for the schools continue to be a major problem. The sciences, English, and economics are areas critically short of Ph.D.'s while there is a great oversupply of teachers of religion.

That the ratio of total Baptist students to those enrolled in Baptist Colleges is widening is not necessarily discouraging. Baptists can never hope to educate all the Baptist students in Baptist schools at the present rate of support for the schools. The fact remains that the great majority of the leaders in the denomination will continue to be supplied by Baptists schools and seminaries. The colleges are giving careful attention to their recruitment program since they are generally unable to take all qualified applicants.

**ENROLLMENT AND SUPPORT**—Enrollments of students have reached a record high for 1963-64 of 83,589 students compared to 80,987 in 1962-63.

Graduates from 73 schools from September, 1962, to August, 1963, totaled 11,083 compared to 10,922 the preceding year.

State conventions and the Southern Baptist Convention increased gifts to the schools from \$15,514,770 to \$16,863,416, according to the reports from the schools. Gifts from the conventions for operations amounted to \$11,027,128 and for capital projects \$5,836,288.

In addition, the schools received \$15,888,961 in other gifts, grants, and donations. The total assets of Southern Baptist educational institutions are now \$416,207,080 of which \$102,091,461 is for endowment.

#### FLORIDA BAPTIST EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS

1. Stetson University, the oldest university in Florida, is located at Deland. During the 1963-64 term, there were 1,820 students enrolled (including Stetson Law School at St. Petersburg). 526 of these were Baptists, 129 students were committed to some church-related vocation; 43 were Ministerial students, 16 Missions volunteers, 42 are studying to be Ministers of Education and 28 to be Ministers of Music.

2. Baptist Bible Institute at Graceville offers special training for students in church-related vocations for students who do not qualify for college training. The total enrolment for the 1963-64 session was 232. These came from 18 states, and one foreign country. 169 of these are students for the Ministry, 39 students preparing to be Ministers of Education, and 11 to be Ministers of Music.

3. At the meeting in Jacksonville last year, the convention voted first approval on the establishing of a junior college. The Education Commission was instructed to seek offers of land and money, and to come to the 1964 convention with a recommendation as to location. There must be a second vote of approval by the convention before this becomes official.

4. Florida Baptists are now engaged in a great campaign for funds for Christian Education. The Ford Foundation has awarded Stetson a \$1,500,000 grant provided we match it 2 for 1 — that is if we raise \$3,000,000 they will give us \$1,500,000 for Stetson. At last year's convention, Florida Baptists voted to attempt to raise \$1,500,000 for Stetson and \$500,000 for Baptist Bible Institute. The trustees of Stetson will raise \$1,500,000 which will give us the \$3,000,000 for Stetson to match the Ford grant. All Florida Baptist Churches are urged to give \$2 per resident member each year for three years.

Baptists believe in Christian education. We know that we must have the very best leadership for our churches, institutions and denomination in the years to come. Let us strengthen our institutions, guide our Baptist young people to attend our Baptist schools, and undergird the administrations, faculties and student bodies with the spirit of love and constant prayer.

THERE ARE SOME ENCOURAGING SIGNS. Although our peril is great, our spiritual resources to combat and overcome moral erosion are unlimited. The liquor-gambling-obscenity profiteers are operating under a tighter binding of the barbed-wire strangulation of their own self-destruction. Greed begets greed, and if one simple word correctly describes these merchants of misery (whether it be the grocery, newspaper, TV, radio, wholesaler, trucker, can maker, or joint operator) GREED is that word. They fear the day when God's people will use the sword of the Lord as it could and should be used.

THE FEELING OF HOPELESS FRUSTRATION in the face of the vast power of the liquor-gambling profiteers which has kept many Christians from making any real effort, is being replaced by a genuine righteous indignation which will eventually lead to an explosion of holy wrath. We will then recognize and accept our own responsibility, as individuals and as churches, to CLEAN UP THE SITUATION IN OUR OWN COMMUNITIES, TO TEAR DOWN THE SIGNS, TAKE OUT THE TAVERNS, CLOSE THE GAMBLING TRAPS, AND STOP THE FLOW OF FILTH THAT MOTIVATES HUMAN HURT AND SPIRITUAL DEATH. We cannot solve all our problems by ourselves. We cannot end all evil. But we can do our part.

#### NOW—CHRISTIAN ACTION—FOR EVERY CHRISTIAN, EVERY CHURCH

1. TELL THOSE IN AUTHORITY, local-state-national, that you want action NOW, both administrative and legislative, to accomplish at least the following:

- Remove all beer, wine and whiskey sales from grocery stores, drug stores, filling stations and other family retail shopping outlets.
- Eliminate the flood of TV, Radio, Billboard, Newspaper and other advertising and promotion of all alcoholic, gambling or obscene products or outlets.
- Take positive action to eliminate gambling from the American environment.
- Eliminate the flood of pornographic indecency being thrust upon our youth.

2. LET THE PEOPLE KNOW where you stand, and where your church stands on these critical moral issues.

#### WHAT IS UNITED CHRISTIAN ACTION, INC?

A state-wide inter-church service organization, since 1945 serving the churches of 12 evangelical denominations in Florida, directed by a Board of Directors and Advisory Councils composed of 250 pastors and lay leaders, for the purpose of providing service and information to assist sponsoring churches in offering Christian solutions to the critically urgent problems being produced by alcoholic beverages, gambling, and indecency in Florida.

The program is three fold—EDUCATION, LEGISLATION and REHABILITATION. Through carefully researched and documented leaflets, books, films and a monthly 8 page publication ALERT, we provide information and training to all interested teachers, students, pastors, and laymen without charge. In addition to the legislative goals already suggested, we seek to secure protection for churches, schools and communities. Understanding and help for those already addicted, round out our program.

UNITED CHRISTIAN ACTION is supported entirely from the gifts of concerned churches and individuals. Florida Baptists have consistently provided strong support and encouragement to the program. Every local church which shares in the annual STATE MISSIONS OFFERING is helping provide life-line support to this cause, for UCA will receive 16 per cent of the offering, plus 5 per cent of the total given over the goal. In 1963, this amounted to \$9,468.06. In addition nearly 200 local churches provide additional support through budgeted or special gifts on a monthly or annual basis. From these individual churches in 1963, a total of \$18,698.14 was received. To further demonstrate Baptists' solidarity in this area of concern, the State Mission Board, made a special emergency appropriation to pay most of the cost of defending UCA against a law suit by gambling interests seeking to intimidate the church-

es into silence. Thanks to courageous churchmen of many denominations, we defeated the gamblers in an election and in the courts.

We gratefully acknowledge the concern, support, and active leadership given to this cause by Dr. John Maguire and all members of the professional staff of the Florida Baptist Convention, the dynamic leadership of Dr. Edgar R. Cooper, president of UCA, and a large host of the pastors and laymen who serve on the Board of Directors, or who share in activities in their own communities to make possible the program and services rendered by this interchurch Christian Action organization.

In this day when the average citizen seems in danger of drowning in a sea of propaganda under waves of misinformation, it becomes more important than ever that Baptists have information which is correct, from sources which are trustworthy.

To be uninformed is bad, to be misinformed is worse. The work of the churches is often greatly handicapped both by lack of information and by misinformation among the membership. Today's average Baptist is provided some kind of information all right, but too many times the information comes from sources which are critical of and frequently openly opposed to our Baptist work. Too often it comes from sources which are not trustworthy.

This makes it more incumbent than ever upon our leadership to see that our people are properly informed. Only thus can we better stabilize and hold our present constituency and sanely expect to expand our following.

Thus the wide use of our own Southern Baptist publications—ably edited, attractively printed and reasonably priced—is more imperative than ever. Here our own people are given sound doctrine, accurate information and proven promotional plans.

The circulation of Southern Baptist publications continues to grow. For example, the reports show that during the past year the Sunday School Board produced and sent to users in 50 states and numerous foreign countries 86,126,772 copies of its periodicals, 1,697,954 copies of new books, 3,800,863 reprints of old books, 67,149,640 church bulletins and more than 13,000,000 free tracts. All the other boards, agencies and auxiliaries of the Southern Baptist Convention have their own specialized publications of which the distribution is also increasing.

The Baptist state papers, of which there are 28, reported to the Southern Baptist Convention in Atlantic City this year a total circulation per issue of 1,521,953 copies as of January 1, 1964. While this is still an increase over the previous year, the rate of increase has slowed down perceptibly.

Our own state paper, the FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS, has also experienced this slowdown in the rate of growth. As of August 1, 1964, the paper is going to 65,643 subscribers each week. The church budget plan is being used by 753 churches for at least a part of their membership, while 135 churches have clubs of subscribers. The numbers of churches sending the paper to every resident family is slowly but surely increasing, although there are still 460 churches affiliated with the Florida Baptist Convention which are making no effort to keep their members informed through the use of their very own Baptist state paper.

Churches which now send the WITNESS to only a portion of their membership are urged to increase their subscription lists to include every resident family, and churches which do not now have the WITNESS in

the church budget to prayerfully and promptly consider sending the paper to all resident families.

In spite of the fact that most other papers have had to raise their subscription prices in recent years, the FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS is still offering the paper through the church budget plan at the low price of \$1.20 per year, only 10c per month per family by the convenient monthly plan for the church's subscription list.

Full use of the BAPTIST WITNESS will result in a better informed, more interested, better enlisted, more generous, better cooperating, more missionary membership in any Florida Baptist church.

Missions depend on the reaction of the individual Christian to the responsibility he has been given in the Bible. God made some pronouncements in the Old Testament, and Jesus built on these in the New Testament. One of the fundamental pronouncements of the Old Testament had to do with possessions. The tithe, or one tenth of all a man had, was required of him. It is the same today. God has made it very clear that everyone is expected to tithe.

For a good many years now, we have been using the slogan "Every Baptist a Tither," but this is somewhat general. Even though every Baptist tithing is our goal, we are not moving too rapidly toward its accomplishment. In Florida, according to best reports, we have 16.3 per cent of our Baptist church members tithing. This adds up to 89,538 people. This is a very small number when we think of the 543,676 church members in our state.

At the May 8 meeting of the State Board of Missions, a goal was approved to seek to add 50,000 new tithers to this number during the period April 1, 1965 to March 31, 1966. This will be in cooperation with Southern Baptist efforts to add 2,000,000 new tithers during this same period. This represents a 10 per cent increase in tithers for Florida Baptists.

The increasing demands of a waiting world make our attention to these matters urgent. There are lost people everywhere and they must be ministered to. The response of churches in the New River Association to this tithing campaign is important. We are suggesting a goal of 10 per cent based on the church membership listed in the 1963 Florida Baptist Annual. This would be 390 for the association.

Music Report—James V. Crosby.

The objective of the Church Music Department of the Florida Baptist Convention is to assist churches and associations in establishing, conducting, enlarging and improving the music program in the churches. This program includes assisting the church in performing its functions of worship, proclamation, education and ministry; play music; teaching music and hymnody and the providing and interpreting information regarding the work of the church and the denomination.

The year 1965 is the year that we are going to promote WORSHIP. The associational music ministry is the key to the promotion of this program. We hope that every Association will work to promote the training of people in the churches to read sing, play and teach music for the glory of God. To this end many things are planned in which each church may participate such as music festivals, hymn sings, schools of training, music work shops, carol sings and general promotion of better music.

There are some 400 churches in music training out of approximately 1500 churches in the state during 1963-64. These are churches who have recognized their musical needs and have endeavored to inform themselves. The Associational organization and the church music department of the Florida Baptist Convention stand ready to assist every church with its music training needs. Special application forms for workers may be secured from the Church Music Department of the Florida Baptist Convention, 1230 Hendricks Ave., Jacksonville 7, Florida.

This past year the associational music ministry organization showed 42 out of 47 associations held Associational Festivals. 260 churches participated in the festivals with 617 choral groups, totaling 12,865 choir members—159 hymn players—36 song leaders—6 instrumental ensembles with a total of 39 participants. (OUR Associational Festival was held at Bayless Highway on January 19, 1964. We are planning to have a festival during January 1965.)

There will be 11 State Music Festivals in 1965. The 1964 report of the State Festivals is as follows: There were 283 choral groups with 6,376 members—86 hymn players—14 song leaders—2 instrumental ensembles with 12 participants. A grand total of individuals participating in the State Festivals was 6,488. There were 162 churches participating and 385 certificates of award issued. The festivals for 1965 will be held on a state level as follows:

February 12-13, 1965	College Park Baptist Church, Orlando, Florida. First Baptist Church, Sarasota, Florida.

February 26-27, 1965	Ancient City Baptist Church, St. Augustine, Fla. First Baptist Church, Sebring, Florida.
March 5-6, 1965	Northwest Baptist Church, Miami, Florida. First Baptist Church, Madison, Florida.

We plan to encourage our churches to participate in the nearest festival. In order to participate in the State Festival it will be necessary for every church to participate first in an Associational Festival.

We had 3 choral clinics in 1964 with a total attendance of 860 and 44 churches represented.

Florida was fourth in the Southern Baptist Convention in reporting through the church letter to the Association 1963. There were 945 churches out of 1510 reporting music ministries with an enrollment of 55,963. This is an increase over 1962 of 43 churches reporting and a difference in enrollment of 2334. Every church is urged to realize that if it has adults and children, which uses music in its worship services and in the organizations and which elects a music director and has regular rehearsals it has a Music Ministry.

Harmony Bay Youth Music Camps were held at the West Florida Baptist Assembly Grounds in Panama City again this year. The limited capacity of 120 select Intermediates and Young People for each camp enjoyed superb music leadership from the best faculty available. These were held in August. During 1965 these camps will be held as follows: August 2-8 will be the camp for first time Intermediates only. August 9-15 will be the camp for Intermediates who have attended before and all Young People ages 17-24. Each church in our association may send 5 Intermediates to the first camp and 5 Young People or second time Intermediates to the second camp. These camps are designed to train our best and most talented young people in our churches.

Two southwide music conferences were held during 1964. Approximately 500 from Florida attended along with more than 3,000 others throughout the south at Ridgecrest the week of June 25—July 1. More than 1200 attended Music Week at Glorieta July 16-22. Dates for 1965 are: Ridgecrest—July 1-7; Glorieta—July 15-21, 1965.

The associational music organization and the State Music Department wish to thank each church and its music leaders for a very fine year and wish for you another good year for "MORE AND BETTER MUSIC AND BETTER MUSICIANS, SINGING WITH GRACE IN THEIR HEARTS TO THE LORD."

4:45 —Hospital Report—O. L. Jarvis.

There are only two Baptist Hospitals of the Southern Baptist Convention, and we are indeed fortunate to have one of them here in Florida. The other one is located in New Orleans, Louisiana.

The goal of Baptist Memorial Hospital is simple, "to provide the best possible care at the least possible cost in an atmosphere of Christian love and understanding."

There are, however, those who have to call on Baptist Hospital for aid when they cannot themselves pay for this help. These are the ones who are helped through our Charity Work program. Although the hospital is miles away from us in Starke, it is nearer than to some. Our concern should be for those who need our help whether forty or four hundred miles away.

The method we use to provide this help is through the Mothers' Day offering for Charity Work. Each association has a goal which should certainly be the minimum for our gifts to this work. Our association has a goal of 25c per resident member for each church. We urge each church in our association to participate in this offering on Mothers Day 1965.

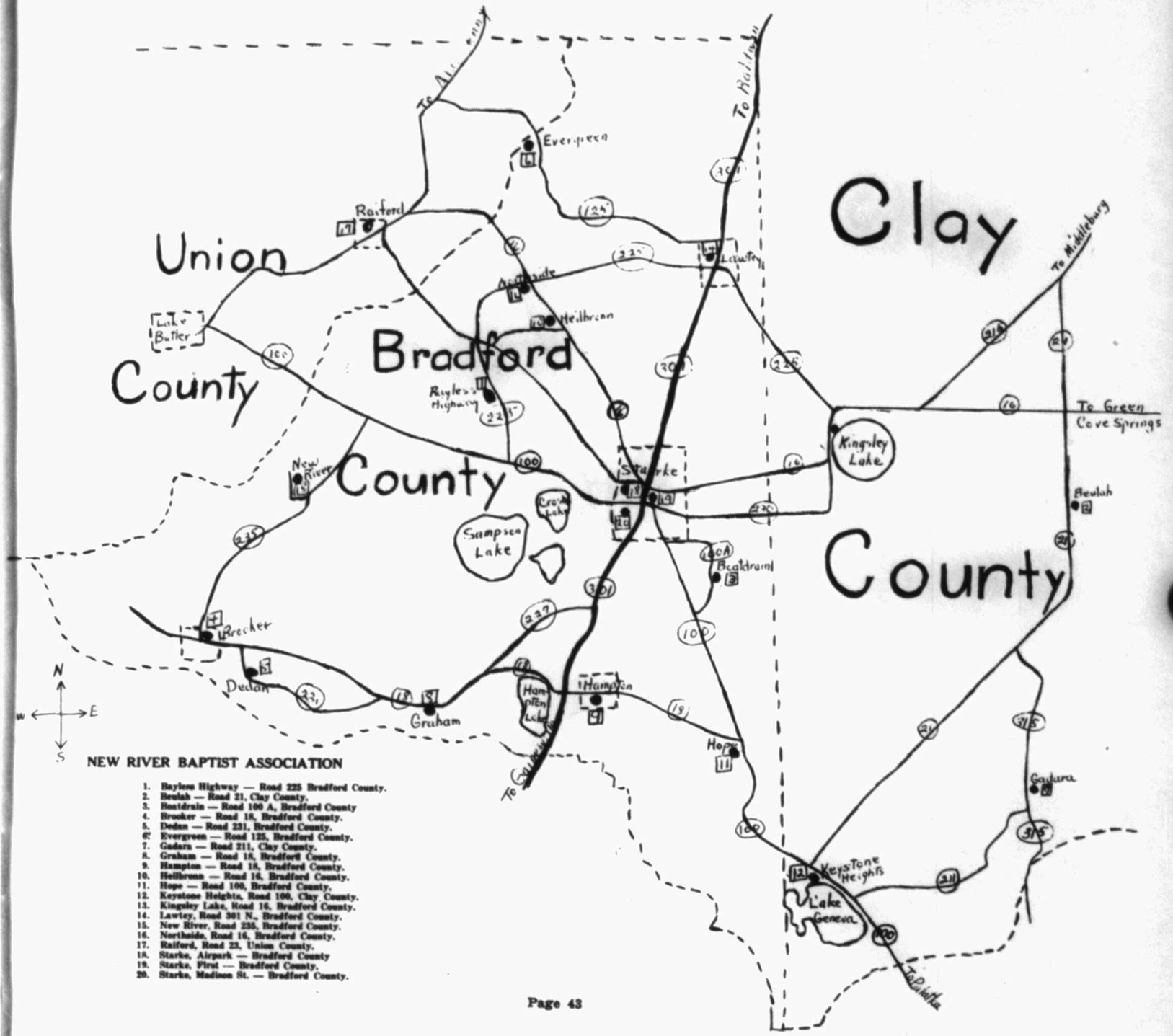
