MINUTES.

LIVE OAK, FLA., Oct 12, 1899.

The Suwannee Baptist Association met this morning in its twenty-eighth annual session at 10 o'clock with the Live Oak Baptist Church. The former Moderator not being present, on motion of Elder B. M. Bean, Elder R. W. Phillips was made Moderator pro tem.

The choir then sang that soul-stirring hymn, "Rock of Ages," and Elder W. C. Lee led in prayer.

The hour having arrived for noon services, the Association adjourned until 2 p. m.

The Introductory Sermon was preached by Elder J. F. Tatum, from Acts 2:1.

First Day - Afternoon Session.

At 2 p. m. the Association reassembled and was called to order by Elder B. D. Harrell, the former Moderator.

Rev. G. T. Leitner, of Leesburg, led in prayer.

The call for messengers was renewed, and Bro. S. A. Jimerson, from Rosemary, responded without credentials from his church. On motion he was received.

By motion, Bro. James H. Hodges was excused.

The Association then proceeded to a permanent organization by electing by ballot Bro. W. S. Hodge Moderator.

On motion, the rules were waived and Bro. C. I. Mills was elected Secretary and Bro. G. H. Dorman Treasurer by acclamation.

The invitation to visiting ministers and brethren to seats with us was accepted by Rev. G. T. Leitner, of Leesburg, Rev. J. C. Porter, of Ocala, and Rev. R. F. Hacker, from the Florida Association.

On motion of Elder B. M. Bean, it was agreed to meet at 9 a. m., adjourn at 12 m.; meet at 2 p. m., adjourn at will, and meet at 7:30 at night for preaching.

Call for correspondence. No response.

The Committee on Preaching made the following report:

Rev. J. C. Porter to preach tonight at 7:30, Rev. B. D. Harrell to conclude tomorrow at 11 a. m., Rev. G. T. Leitner, alternate Rev. R. F. Hacker.

The following resolution, presented by Elder Bean, was adopted:

It shall be the duty of the Clerk of this Association to make a note in the minutes of all amounts contributed by each church during the year, under the head of "amounts paid out during the year," and the duty of the Finance Committee to report only the amounts passing through its hands.

On motion of Bro. W. B. Collins, the body adjourned until 9 a. m. tomorrow, with prayer by Rev. J. C. Porter.

Night Services.

At 7:30 p. m. a large congregation assembled, and after a few minutes, song service Rev. J. C. Porter took the stand and preached an interesting sermon from Romans 1:16, after which a collection of \$10.12 was taken up and turned over to Brother Porter for the relief of aged ministers.

Second Day Morning Session.

The Association met pursuant to adjournment at 9 a. m., and was opened by the Moderator reading morning lesson and Rev. B. D. Harrell leading in prayer.

Minutes of yesterday's proceedings read by Secretary, corrected and approved.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE

We, your Committee on Temperance, beg leave to report. We believe the use of intoxicants, in a mild form, has been the great curse of the church. Few churches would allow a habitual drunkard to hold membership with them, but the one who takes an occasional dram is left to pursue his pernicious habit without reproof, while the modest dram drinker is the one whose example is leading the youth around him to drunkard's graves.

We believe the only safe way for our churches to act in the premises is to have no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness, and the demands of the church upon its members should be, "Touch not, taste not, handle not the unclean thing." And further, we believe that no church should tolerate as a member any person who signs a petition for license to sell intoxicating liquors. Respectfully submitted.

Brethren, let us urge every church in this Association to organize at once a Sunday School, if they have not already, and run it year in and year out. Our Master whom we profess to follow set us the example, for His Word teaches that, as was His custom, He went in the synagogue to teach on the Sabbath day.
