CONSTITUTION.

SECTION 1. This Association shall be known as the SUWANNEE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

SEC. 2. This Association shall be composed of messengers elected by the several churches connected with the Association, each church being entitled to two messengers, and an additional messenger for every twenty-five members, or fractional part thereof over fifty, and such members shall be received by the Association.

SEC. 3. This Association shall, at its annual meeting, elect from its members, by ballot, a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall serve for one year.

SEC. 4. The object of this Association shall be: First, to promote unity and brotherly love among the churches; second, to promote Gospel discipline; third, to encourage the universal spread of the Gospel and practical religion throughout our bounds and elsewhere.

SEC. 5. A Missionary Committee shall be appointed by the Moderator at each annual meeting of the body, subject to the approval of the Association, whose duty it shall be to diligently inquire into the destitution within our bounds, make contracts with ministers of this Association, or other Associations in correspondence with this, for ministerial labors to supply these destitutions, and report the result of their labors for the approval of the Association.

SEC. 6. This Association shall invite correspondence and visiting brethren to seats when in session, who shall be entitled to the privilege of aiding the Association with their counsel, and this Association may also withdraw from any church that may be in disorder, when the same cannot be restored.

SEC. 7. The annual meeting of this Association shall begin on Thursday before the third Sunday in October, and by appointment there shall be an Introductory Sermon preached the first day, and on the Sabbath a collection taken up for missionary purposes.

SEC. 8. This Association shall not lord it over God's heritage, nor infringe upon any of the internal rights of the churches, but shall only act as an advisory body.

SEC. 9. This Constitution may be amended only by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present, provided the amendment be reduced to writing.

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

1. We believe in one only true and living God—the Father, Son and Holy Ghost; and that these three are one.
2. We believe that the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the work of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.
3. We believe in election according to the fore-knowledge of God, through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth.
4. We believe that the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared unto all men, and that nothing prevents the salvation of the vilest sinner on earth but his own voluntary rejection of that grace.
5. We believe in the depravity of the human heart, and that the natural state of man is such that he cannot prepare himself for divine favor without the assisting grace of God enabling him to act according to the good pleasure of His divine will.
6. We believe in justification by faith, which gives peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ.
7. We believe that the Gospel of Christ is the means of divine appointment to bring sinners to repentance and faith in Jesus Christ, and therefore should be preached to all.
8. We believe that all those who are regenerated by the Spirit of God are made heirs of God and joint heirs with our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, and that they are kept by the power of God, through faith, unto eternal salvation; and that not one of them will be lost.
9. We believe that baptism is the immersion of the whole body in water; that the only proper subjects are described in the preceding articles, and the only proper administrators are those who have been regularly ordained by a church of Christ by the imposition of hands of a presbytery.
10. We believe that the Lord's Supper was instituted by our Lord Jesus Christ to be commemorated by His followers, and that none but baptized believers have a Scriptural right to partake thereof.
11. We believe that the washing of the feet, according to the example recorded in the thirteenth chapter of John's Gospel, is a duty enjoined by the Lord Jesus Christ upon His followers, and should be observed immediately after the Lord's Supper, but in no case shall this article be so construed as to make it a test of fellowship.
12. We believe in a general resurrection of the righteous and the wicked, and that the wicked shall go away into everlasting punishment, but the righteous into life eternal.
13. We believe that infants and idiots are saved through the merits of our Lord Jesus Christ.

RULES OF DECORUM.

ARTICLE 1. At the first meeting of each annual session of the Association, the Moderator of the previous session shall call the messengers to order, and after singing and prayer he shall declare the Association ready for business, the first item being the election of a Moderator and Clerk, after the messengers have enrolled their names. In case of the absence of the Moderator the messengers present shall elect a Moderator pro tem., who shall proceed as aforesaid.

ART. 2. Each meeting of the Association shall be opened with singing and prayer.

ART. 3. The Moderator shall preserve order and decide all questions in debate, subject to an appeal to the body; and, when speaking on any subject, shall call some member to the chair, and in case of a tie may give the casting vote.

ART. 4. All committees shall be appointed by the Moderator, subject to vote of the body.

ART. 5. The Clerk shall keep a careful record of the proceedings of each meeting, and in the absence of the Moderator shall call the Association to order and preside until a Moderator pro tem. is elected.

ART. 6. No business shall be transacted without a quorum, which shall consist of a majority of the registered members.

ART. 7. All members wishing to speak shall arise and respectfully address the Moderator, confine themselves strictly to the subject, and no unkind allusions shall be made while speaking.

ART. 8. No motion shall be debated until seconded, nor voted upon until stated by the Moderator or read by the Clerk.

ART. 9. When a question is under debate no motion shall be received except to adjourn, lay on the table, amend, indefinitely postpone, refer to a committee or otherwise call for the previous question.

ART. 10. Any member voting in the majority may move a reconsideration at any time during the session.

ART. 11. The Rules of Decorum may be amended at any annual session of the Association by a majority vote of the members present.

MINUTES.

CLAYLAND BAPTIST CHURCH,
October 12, 1905.

The Suwannee Baptist Association met this day in its Thirty-fourth Annual Session, with the above named church. Rev. J. S. Parker preaching the Introductory sermon from Judges, 7th chapter, 7th verse, concluded by Rev. I. J. Clemens. After which it was decided to dismiss until 2 o'clock P. M.

In the temporary absence of the Moderator, the Clerk called the Association to order, and, upon motion, Rev. C. A. Ridley was made Moderator pro tem. until the return of the Moderator.

Upon motion of Rev. C. A. Ridley the routine of business was dispensed with and Miss Spalding was introduced by Rev. C. A. Ridley, and entertained the Association for more than an hour lecturing upon Missions and the part that the sisters should take in church work. Every one was benefitted by her talk and will in all probability work with new zeal in the "Master's Cause."

Bro. J. R. Newlan and Robert R. Brown were re-elected as Moderator and Clerk respectively for the ensuing year, and Bro. W. N. McLeod was elected as Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Revs. J. T. Farnell and I. R. Clements, of the Middle Florida Association, accepted an invitation to seats with us.

It was agreed to adjourn at 4 o'clock P. M., and meet at 9 o'clock A. M. Upon motion, Association adjourned to meet tomorrow at 9 o'clock.

EVENING SERVICE.

Upon motion of Rev. C. A. Ridley, it was agreed that where all the delegates from any church failed to arrive that the delegates present have the right to select the requisite number of delegates their church is entitled to, from among the visiting members of their church.

The following query was read by the clerk: "Has the church any Bible authority for disciplining a member for non-attendance at Saturday conference?" Spoken on by Revs. C. A. Ridley, S. J. McLeod, W. H. Horn, T. J. Euans and I. R. Clements.

The following resolution, furnished by Philadelphia church, was taken up, to wit: Resolved that this Association advise the particular churches to pass some restriction as to the life of a Letter of Dismissal. Upon motion of Rev. C. A. Ridley, the churches are advised to limit Letters of Dismissal to six months.

Upon suggestion of Rev. C. A. Ridley, the Moderator ordered a collection taken up to help pay expenses of Bro. S. P. Mays, our member of the State Missionary Committee.

Preaching Committee report that Rev. T. J. Euans will preach at 11 o'clock and Rev. T. J. Farnell at 4 o'clock.

NOON SERVICE.

Rev. T. J. Euans preached a very interesting sermon to an attentive audience. Discourse from 2d, 3d, 4th and 5th verses of the 23d chapter of Psalms. Prayer by Rev. C. A. Ridley.

Association met at appointed hour. Choir singing, "I want to be a worker for the Lord." Prayer by Rev. S. J. McLeod. Call

The following query was read by the clerk: "Have we any scriptural right to exclude a member for failing to fellowship an other?" Discussion estopped, and Moderator advises that a majority rules in all cases except touching fellowship, and that must be a unit.

REPORT ON MISSIONS.

Committee on Missions report as follows:

Dear Brethren:

The fields were never whiter unto the harvest than they are today, and the call for men and means never came to people with a clearer ring than it comes to us today. Our missionary record as an Association is a burning shame. It only took three lines for the Mission Committee of last year to render its report, and by leaving out the work of three or four churches, your present Committee could give an accurate account of the past year's work with only two words, "NOTHING DONE."

It is our judgment that the pastors are, for the most part, responsible for this state of affairs. Churches are not apt to go where the pastor does not lead, and a man who is afraid to tell his people their duty, and to insist on their doing it, is not worthy the name of a minister of Jesus Christ, and his position makes him a wilful sinner before God and men.

It has been an experience that churches will respond to the call of their pastor, when he lays before them God's will and their duty; but so long as we are content to draw our two or three dollars per month as salary, and say nothing of the great work of saving the lost in all lands, of course the churches will do nothing. We appeal to the pastors to preach missions, to talk missions, and to live the life of a missionary. If you will do this, it will materially change the face of things for another year.

We recommend that the Executive Committee put a missionary in the field, and call on the churches to contribute to his support.

To the Suwannee Association:

In consequence of this, our ministers are greatly crippled in their usefulness, and the churches are suffering for want of pastoral care. If our brethren wish to obey the Lord, we beg them to study the teachings of His word upon this subject. We refer to the following Scriptures: Jesus says, "The laborer is worthy of his hire." Luke 10; 1 Cor. 9-4; 2 Cor. 11-12-13 verses, and many others.

In our opinion, there is nothing more clearly taught in the Bible than that the churches should support their pastors, and the minister that does not teach his people their duty in this respect is not faithful as a pastor, and is doing the church a great injury.

We recommend that the older people manifest a greater interest in this part of the church work. It is not a service for women and children. It is a service for all to come together and study the word of God. And if you stay at home and send your boy, it will not be long before he will be large enough to stay at home or go elsewhere, while you sit wondering why he doesn't any longer go to Sunday School. He is simply imitating his father.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

We, your Committee on Temperance, beg leave to make the following report: We believe that the use of intoxicating drinks blights more lives, more homes, more churches, and actuates more crime, imposes more expense on our government, and retards the progress of Christian labor more than all other influences combined.
