ARTICLES OF FAITH

- (1) That they constitute a consensus of opinion of some Baptist body, large or small, for the general instruction and guidance of our own people and others concerning those articles of the Christian faith which are most surely among us. They are not intended to add anything to the simple conditions of salvation in the New Testament, viz: repentance toward God and faith in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord.
- (2) That we do not regard them as complete statements of our faith, having any quality of finality or infalibility. As in the past so in the future Baptist should hold themselves free to revise their statements of faith as may seem to them wise and expedient at any time.
- (3) That any group of Baptist, large or small, have the inherent right to draw up for themselves and publish to the world a confession of their faith whenever they may think it advisable to do so.
- (4) That the sole authority for the faith and practice among Baptist is the Scripture of the old and New Testaments. Confessions are only guides in interpretations, having no authority over the conscience.
- (5) That they are statements of religious convictions, drawn from the Scriptures, and are not to be used to hamper freedom of thought or investigation in other realms of life.

THE SCRIPTURES

(1) We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its author, salvation for its end and truth, without any mixture of error, for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us; and therefore is and will remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds and religious opinions should be tried.

GOD

2. There is one and only one living God, an intelligent, spiritual and personal Being, the Creator, Preserver and Ruler of the universe, infinite in holiness and all other perfections, to whom we owe the highest love, reverence and obedience. He is revealed to us as Father, Son and Holy Spirit, each with distinct personal attributes, but without division of nature, essence of being.

THE FALL OF MAN

3. Man was created by the special act of God, as recorded in Genesis. "So God created man in His own image, in the image of God created he Him; male and female created He them." (Gen. 1:27) "And the Lord God formed man of the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and the man became a living roul." (Gen. 2:7) He was created in a state of holiness under the law of his maker, but through temptations of Satan he transgressed the command of God and fell from his original holiness and righteousness; whereby his posterity inherit a nature corrupt and in bondage to sin, and under condemnation, and as soon as they are capable of moral action, become actual transgressors.

THE WAY OF SALVATION

4. The salvation of the sinners is wholly of grace, through the mediatorial office of the Son of God, who by the Holy Spirit was born of the Virgin Mary and took upon his our nature yet without sin; honored the divine law by his personal obedience, and made atonement for our sins by his death. Being risen from the dead, he is now enthroned in heaven, and, uniting in his person the tenderest sympathies with the divine perfections, he is in every way qualified to be a compassionate and all-sufficient Saviour.

JUSTIFICATION

5. Justification of God's gracious and full acquittal upon principles of righteousness of all sinners who believe in Christ. This blessing is bestowed, not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done, but through the redemption that is in and through Jesus Christ. It brings us into a state of most blessed leace and favor with God, and secures every other needed blessing.

THE FREENESS OF SALVATION

6. The blessings of salvation are made free to all by the Gospel. It is the duty of all to accept them by penititent and obedient faith. Nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner except his own voluntary refusal to accept Jesus Christ as teacher. Saviour and Lord.

REGENERATION

7. Regeneration or the new birth is a change of heart wrought by the Holy Spirit, whereby we become partakers of the love and practice of righteousness. It is a work of God's free grace conditioned upon faith in Christ and made manifest by the fruit which we bring forth to the glory of God.

REPENTANCE AND FAITH

8. We believe that repentance and faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable graces, wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God; whereby being duly convinced of our guilt, danger, and helplesenes, and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession, and supplication for mercy; at the same time heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ as our Prophet; Priest and King, and relying on him alone as the only and all-sufficient Saviour.

GOD'S PURPOSE OF GRACE

9. Election is the gracious purpose of God, according to which he regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners. It is perfectly consistent with the free agency of men, and comprehends all the means in connection with the end. It is a most glorious display of God's sovereign goodness, and is infinitely wise, holy and unchangeable. It excludes boasting and promotes humility. It encourages the use of means in the highest degree.

SANCTIFICATION

10. Sanctification is the process by which the regenerate gradually attain the moral and spiritual perfection through the

presence and power of the Holy Spirit dwelling in their hearts. it continues throughout the early life, and is accomplished by the use of all the ordinary means of grace, and particularly by the word of God.

PERSEVERANCE

11. All real believers endure to the end. Their continuance in well-doing is the mark which distinguishes them from mere trofessors. A special Providence cares for them; and they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

A GOSPEL CHURCH

12. A church of Christ is a congregation of baptized be-Levers, associated by covenant in the faith and fellowship of the gospel; observing the ordinances of Christ, governed by his law, and exercising the gifts, rights and privileges invested in them by his word, and seeking to extend the Gospel to the ends of the carth. Its scriptural officers are bishops or elders and deacons.

BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER

13. Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer in water in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. The act is a symbol of our faith in a crucified, buried and risen Saviour. It is prerequisite to the privileges of a church relation and to the Lord's Supper, in which the members of the church, by the use of the bread and wine, commemorate the dying love of Christ.

THE RIGHTEOUS AND THE WICKED

There is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and the wicked. Those only who are justified through the name of the Lord Jesus Christ and sanctified by the Holy Spirit are truly righteous in his sight. Those who continue in the impenitence and unbelief are in his sight wicked and are under condemnation. This distinction between the righteous and the wicked holds in and after death, and will be made manifest at the judgment when final and everlasting awards are made to all men.

THE RESURRECTION

16. The scriptures clearly teach that Jesus rose from the dead. His grave was emptied of its contents. He appeared to the disciples after his resurrection in many convincing manifestations. He now exists in his glorified body at God's right hand. There will be a resurrection of the righteous and the wicked. The bodies of the righteous will conform to the glorious spiritual body of Jesus.

THE RETURN OF THE LORD

17. The New Testament teaches in many places the visible and personal return of Jesus to this earth. "This same Jesus which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as ye have seen him go into heaven.' The time of his coming is not revealed. "Of that day and hour knoweth no one, no, not even the angels in heaven, but my Father only." (Matt. 24:36.) It is the duty of all believers to live in readiness for h's coming and by diligence in good works to make manifest to all men the reality and power of their hope in Christ,

RELIGIOUS LIBERTY

18. God alone is Lord of the conscience, and he has left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men which are contrary to his word or not contained in it. Church and state should be separate. The state owes the church protection and full treedom in the pursuit of its spiritual ends. In providing for such freedom no ecclesiastical group or denomination should be favored by the state more than others. Civil government being ordained of God, it is the duty of Christians to render loyal obedience thereto in all things not contrary to the revealed will of God. The church should not resort to the civil power to carry on its work. The Gospel of Christ contemplates spir.tual means alone for the pursuit of its end. The state has no right to impose penalties for religious or inions of any kind. The state has no right to impose taxes for the support of any form of religion. A free church in a free State is the Christian ideal, and this im-; lies the right of free and unhindered access to God on the part of all men, and the right to form and propogate opinions in the sphere of religion without interference by civil power.

PEACE AND WAR

19. It is the duty of Christians to seek peace with all men on principles of righteousness. In accordance with the spirit and teaching: of Christ they should do all in their power to put an end to war.

The true remedy for the war spirit is the pure gospel of our Lord. The supreme need of the world is the acceptance of his teachings in all the affairs of men and nations, and the practical application of his law of leve.

We urge Christian people throughout the world to pray for the reign of the Prince of Peace, and to oppose everything likely to provoke war.

EDUCATION

20. Christianity is the religion of enlightenment and intelligence. In Jesus Christ are hidden all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge. All sound learning is therefore a part of our Christian heritage. The new birth opens all human faculties and creates a thirst for knowledge. An adequate system of schools is necessary to a complete spiritual program for Christ's people. The cause of education in the Kingdom of Christ is co-ordinate with the cause of missions and general benevolence, and should receive along with these the liberal support of the churches.

SOCIAL SERVICE

21. Every Christian is under obligation to seek to make the will of Christ regent in his own life and in human society; to oppose in the spirit of Christ every form of greed, selfishness and vice; to provide for the orphaned, the aged, the helpless, and the sick; seek to bring industry, government and society as a whole under the sway of principles of righteousness, truth and brotherly love; to promote these ends Christians should be ready to work with all men of good will in any good cause, always being careful to act in the spirit of love without compromising their loyalty to Christ and his truth. All means and methods used in this social service for the amelioration of society and the establishment of righteousness among men must finally depend on the regeneration of the individual by the saving grace of God in Christ Jesus.

CO-OPERATION

22. Christ's people should, as occasion requires, organize such associations and conventions as may best secure co-operation for the great objects of the Kingdom of God. Such organizations have no authority over each other or over the churches. They are voluntary and advisory bodies designed to elicit, combine and direct the energies of our people in the most effective manner. Individual members of New Testament churches should co-operate with each other, and the churches themselves should co-operate with each other in carrying forward the missionary, educational and benevolent program for the extension of Christ's Kingdom. Christian unity in the New Testament sense is spiritual harmony and voluntary cooperation for common ends by various groups of Christ's people. It is permissable and desirable as between the various Christian denominations, when the end to be attained is itself justified, and when such co-operation involves no violation of conscience or compromise of loyalty to Christ in His word as revealed in the New Testament.

EVANGELISM AND MISSIONS

23. It is the duty of every Christian man and woman, and the duty of every church of Christ, to seek to extend the gospel to the ends of the earth. The new birth of man's spirit by God's Holy Spirit means the birth of love for others. Missionary efforts on the part of all rests thus upon a spiritual necessity of the regenerate life. It is the duty of every child of God to seek constantly to win the lost to Christ by personal effort and by all other methods sanctioned by the Gospel of Christ.

STEWARDSHIP

24. God is the source of all blessings, temporal and spiritual; and all that we have and are we owe to him. We have a spiritual debtorship to the whole world, a holy trusteeship in the Gospel, and a binding stewardship in our possession. We are therefore under obligation to serve him with our time, talents and material possessions; and should recognize all these as entructed to us to use for the glory of God and helping others. Christians should cheerfully, regularly, systematically, proportionately, and liberally contribute of their means to advancing the Redeemer's cause on earth.

THE KINCDOM

25 The kingdom of God is the reign of God in the heart and life of the individual in every human relationship, and in every form and institution of organized human society. The chief means for promoting the Kingdom of God on earth are preaching the Gospel of Christ, and teaching the principles of righteousness contained therein. The kingdom of God will be complete when every thought and will of man shall be brought into captivity to the will of Christ. And it is the duty of all Christ's people to pray and labor continually that his Kingdom may come and his will be done on earth as it is done in heaven.

Since matters of science have no proper place in a religious confession of faith, and since it is desirable that our attitude toward science be clearly understood, your committee deems it proper to submit the following statement on the relation between science and religion, adorted in 1923 by this Convention at Kansas City, and request that it be published in the minutes of the Convention.

SCIENCE AND RELIGION

- 1. We recognize the greatness and value of the service which modern science is rendering to the cause of truth is uncovering the facts of the natural world. We believe that loyalty to a fact is common ground of genuine science and the Christian religion. We have no interest or desire in covering up any fact in any realm of research. But we do protest against certain unwarranted procedure on the part of some so-called scientists. First, in making discoveries, or alleged discoveries, in physical nature, a convenient weapon of attack upon the facts of religion; second, using particular sciences, such as esychology, biology, geology and various others, as if they necessarily contained knowledge pertaining to the realm of Christian religion, setting aside the supernatural; third, teaching as facts what are mere hypothesis. The evolution doctrine has long been a working hypothesis of science, and will probably continue to be, because of its apparent simplicity in explaining the universe. But its best exponents freely admit that the cause of the origin of species have not been traced, nor has any proof been forthcoming that man is not the direct creation of God as recorded in Genesis. We protest against the imposition of this theory upon the minds of our children in denominational, or public schools, as if it were a definite and established truth of science. We insist that this and all other theories be dealt with in a truly scientific way, that is, in careful conformity to established facts.
- 2. We record against our unwavering adherence to the supernatural elements in the Christian religion. The Bible is God's revelation of himself through men moved by the Holy Spirit, and is our sufficient, certain authoritative guide in religion. Jesus Christ was born of the Virgin Mary, through the power of the Holy Spirit. He was the divine and eternal Son of God. He wrought miracles, healing the sick, casting out demons, raising the dead. He died as the vicarious, atoning Saviour of the world, and was buried. He arose again from the dead. The tomb was emptied of its contents. In his risen body he appeared many times to his disciples. He ascended to the right hand of the Father. He will come again in person, the same Jesus who ascended from the Mount of Olives.

3. We believe that the adherence to the above truths and facts is a necessary condition of service for teachers in our Baptist schools. These facts of Christianity in no way conflict with any fact in science. We do not sit in judgment upon the scientific views of teachers in science. We grant them the same freedom of research in their realm that we claim for ourselves in the religious realm. But we do insist upon a positive content of faith in accordance with the proceeding statement as a qualification for acceptable service in the Baptist schools. The supreme issue today is between naturalism and super-naturalism. We stand unalterably for the supernatural in Christianity. Teachers in our schools should be careful to free themselves from suspicion or disloyalty on the point. In the present period of agitation and unrest they are obligated to make their position clear. We pledge our support to all schools and teachers who are thus loyal to the facts of Christianity as revealed in the scriptures.

CONSTITUTION

- Article 1. This organization shall be known as the SUWAN-NEE MISSIONARY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.
 - Article 2. The specific object of this Association shall be:
- a To unite the influence and pious intelligence of the Bapt'sts within it and thereby facility te their union and co-operation.
- b To form and encourage plans for the revival of experimental and practical religion and the spread of the Gospel within the bounds of this Association elsewhere.
 - c To aid weak churches in our bounds.
- d To encourage and aid education of our pious young men who may be called by the spirit and approved by their respective churches for work in the Gospel ministry.
 - e To promote pious and useful education among all Baptists.
 - f To care for the needy orphans among us.
- g To aid in any work whose object is the saving and uplifting of humanity.
- Article 3. This Association shall be composed of messengers from its several churches on the following basis: Three messengers from each church and one additional messenger for each twenty-five members or majority part thereof in excess of fifty members, and one messenger each from the auxiliary bodies of the church.
- Article 4. The messengers shall present to the Association letters certifying their appointment and giving also the statistics of the church and auxiliaries for the current year.
- Article 5. Whenever the messengers appointed by the church shall fail to attend or the number is not equal to the representation allowed by the constitution, the Association, at its discretion, may accord seats to other members from said church.
- Article 6. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer, who shall be elected annually by ballot and a majority vote, but the Association may, by a unanimous vote, instruct someone to cast the ballot for the body as a whole.

Article 7. The duties of the Moderator shall be to preside, keep order and appoint all committees not otherwise provided for.

The Clerk shall keep the records of the Association, supervising the printing and distribution of the minutes, and keep a regular file of the published proceedings of the Association, and deliver same to his successor in office.

The Treasurer shall keep a correct account of all money received and disbursed by him, paying out the same only on the order of the Association or the Executive Committee, and report in full the transactions of his office at each annual session of the Association.

- Article 8. The business of this Association shall be transacted ad interim by an Executive Committee. The officers of this Association plus one member to be recommended by Nomination Committee and approved by the Association shall compose the Executive Committee.
- Article 9. The annual meeting of this Association shall begin on Thursday before the third Sunday in October and requesting all churches which hold regular services on the third Sunday and Saturday before giving their pastors their October meeting in each year, in order that the pastor may attend the Association and remain there through Sunday, and by appointment there shall be preached an introductory sermon on the first day.
- Article 10. Newly organized churches may be admitted into the Association by petitionary letters presented by messengers during the season of the Association; accompanied by a certificate of the presbytery as to their orthodox and proper organization.
- Article 11. This Association shall be advisory only in matters of controversy between members of any of the churches, but reserves itself the right to withdraw fellowship from any church which it deems disorderly or hereodox, and concedes to its constituent churches the right to sever their connection from this body whenever they shall apply for letters of dismissal from the Association.
- Article 12 The Moderator shall, at each session, appoint chairman of committees to report at the next session on the following subjects: The Co-operation Program, State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions. Charitable Education, Sunday School and Young People's Work, Woman's Work, the Florida Baptist Children's Home, Periodicals, Temperance, Present Day Evils, Obituaries, and any other subjects the Association may deem proper.
- Article 13. All messengers, officers and members of the Executive Committee shall be members of some of the churches composing this body.
- Article 14. When any church neglects to send up statistics to the annual meeting, the Clerk shall insert the last report of total membership in the column containing the statistics.

RULES OF DECORUM

1. At the first meeting of each annual session of the Association, the Moderator of the previous session shall call the messen-

gers to order and after singing and praying he shall declare the Association ready for business, the first item being the election of a Moderator and a Clerk, after the messengers have enrolled their names. In case of the absence of the Moderator, the messengers present shall elect a Moderator pro tem., who shall proceed as aforesaid.

- 2. Each meeting shall be opened and closed with singing and praying.
- 3. The moderator shall preserve order and decide all questions in debate, subject to an appeal to the body, and when speaking on any subject shall call some member to the chair, and in case of a tie may give the deciding vote.
- 4. All committees shall be appointed by the Moderator, subject to the vote of the body.
- 5. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of each meeting, and in the absence of the Moderator shall call the Association to order and preside until a Moderator pro tem. is elected.
- No business shall be transacted without a quorum, which shall consist of a majority of the registered members.
- 7. All members wishing to speak will rise and respectfully address the Moderator; confine themselves strictly to the subject, and no unkind allusions shall be made while speaking.
- 8. No motion shall be debated until seconded, nor voted upon until stated by the Moderator or read by the Clerk.
- 9. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received except to adjourn, lay on table, amend, indefinitely postpone, refer to a committee or otherwise call a previous question.
- 10. Any member in the majority may move a reconsideration to any time during the session.
- 11. The Rules of Decorum may be amended at any annual session of the Association, by a majority vote of the members present.

12. Reject on State Missions read by J. G. Wood as follows:

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

Just 60 years ago the Suwannee Baptist Association was organized. Ten years later, just 50 years ago, the State Mission Board was inaugurated. During these 50 years the splendid organization, that we now have, has been built up. The Board has helped to build hundreds of our churches throughout the state. It has also helped to pay the salaries of many of our weak churches. This board, through the labors of our mission pastors, has led thousands of souls to Christ.

It will be interesting to note some of the things that this board did last year.

During the year our board as isted in the support of 52 missionary pastors and evangelists, who preached at 76 different churches and mission stations. They received for this work a total of \$9,974.40. They reported, amongst other results accomplished, 914 members added to their churches by baptism, letters and statement, and \$2,494.60 collected for missions, while they raised on their fields of labor \$7,181.01 for church building and repairs.

Through the student loan fund, of this board, 19 students were assisted in the extent of \$1,725.00. All of these students are preparing for the ministry or mission work.

The Baptist Building received \$3,935.91 from our State Mission Board.

Our Sunday School and B, Y. P. U. department received from the board \$9,379.13. This department spent \$14,379.13, however \$5,000 of this was forwarded by the Sunday School Board of Nash-ville.

We recommend that our W. M. S.'s observe the week of prayer for State Missions.

We also recommend that, where it is possible to do so, that our Sunday Schools take a special offering for State Missions.

13. Report on Foreign Missions read by R. E. Hatch as follows:

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

We, your committee on Foreign Missions, beg to make the following report:

The Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention was organized in 1845. Its headquarters are located at Richmond, Va.

We are grateful to God for His manifest blessings upon the work Southern Baptists are carrying on in the Regions Beyond.

On the foreign field there are 1,407 churches with a membership of 161.059. The contributions amounted to \$472,820.12.

This board reports the largest number of baptisms it has ever been able to report in any one year, 14,415. Rumania again leads in the number of baptisms, 5,500. Italy reports a larger number of baptisms than in any previous year, 396.

The mission schools have been crowded with students and large numbers were turned away. In spite of the closing of two hospitals, the others had a record year in treating the ill and stricken people. The nine hospitals treated 73,784 patients compared to the 85,431 patients treated in our 24 hospitals here in the Southland, most of the treatments being on the charity basis. The five publishing houses on foreign fields could not meet the demands for literature.

The rresent rersonnel of our mission workers consists of 444 foreign missionaries, of which 79 are at home on furlough, and 2052 native missionaries who are operating in fourteen different countries. Fifty-eight missionaries have returned to the field during the year. Sixteen have retired and six died.

The debt of the Foreign Mission Board January 1, 1928, was \$1,145,000. On January 1, 1931, it was \$945,366, a net reduction of \$200,000. The reduction would have been far greater but for the slump in receipts of \$265,000 in 1929. When it became apparent that there would be a serious loss in the receipts for 1930, the Board curtailed its expenditures \$51,000 from the amount appropriated for the year. In making the appropriations for 1931 the Board reduced the appropriations \$280,000 below the amount appropriated in 1930, a reduction of 20 per cent.

We feel constrained to call attention to another debt. We spend so much time worrying over the bank indebtedness of the

Board that we overlook this other debt which presses persistently for payment every day. This is the debt to be paid before all others. Perhaps the reason why we are having so much trouble paying the debt in the banks is because we have defaulted so badly in paying this preferred debt. The surest guarantee of payment of our bank indebtedness would be the payment of this primary debt.

This is the debt to the nations which Paul confesses in the First Chapter of Romans when he says: ,

"I am an debtor both to Greek and to Barbarians, both to the wise and to the foolish. So, as much as in me is, I am ready to Freach the gospel to you also that are in Rome. For I am not ashamed of the gospel; for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth; to the Jew first and also to the Greek."

If Southern Baptists will pay fully this debt to the nations, the banks will be paid overnight, and the cause of Christ in all the world will be set forward without delay.

When the apostles that were in Jerusalem heard that Samaria had received the word of God, they sent unto them Peter and John. That is, they sent more missionaries unto them. The time of ready response is the hest time for pressing forward. Our work abroad is succeeding like it did in the apostle days. Can the same be said of our actions here at home? Does this good news from afar stir us to send more missionaries and reap yet larger harvests? It does not look much like it when our failure to support our Foreign Mission Board properly is forcing it to wonder whether it must not only withhold but withdraw missionaries from the white harvest fields:

Once more we repeat the Foreign Mission Board cannot sustain its work abroad as it is at present laid out, upon the amount of money Southern Baptists are providing. We shall be compelled to draw in the lines unless our income is greatly increased.

The total number of missionaries responsible for carrying on the work in all our fields is 444. Our information is that each individual missionary receives a salary of \$800.00 per year, thus making the salary of a man and wife, \$1600.00.

Each child under ten years of age receives an allowance of \$100.00 per year, and each child from ten to twenty-one, an allowance of \$150.00 per year.

Viewing the whole situation as it appears, with a depression on our people, we, your committee on Foreign Missions respectfully recommend:

- 1st. That the Suwannee Baptist Association go on record as favoring a cut of at least $10\,\%$ in all salaries—connected—with Foreign Missions, in keeping with the economic spirit of the times.
- 2nd. That the laymen and pastors of our Association keep before the members of their respective churches the pressing needs of our Foreign Mission Board.
- 3rd. That each church represented here in this association re-dedicate itself to the task of carrying out this great command

of our Savior: "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature."

- 19. Report on Florida Baptist Children's Home read by W. M. Hogans as follows:

REPORT ON FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

Your Committee respectfully presents the following report on the Florida Baptist Children's Home at Arcadia, Florida. This is the State Home under the direction of the State Convention therefore it claims our first consideration and help.

The Superintendent's report to the Convention showed there were 188 children being supported. Since the Convention the Board of Trustees have adopted a policy of necessary retrenchment reducing every expense possible to meet the conditions prevailing. They doubled the work of the Helpers and retained only those necessary to conduct the work in an efficient way. They reduced salaries where it was possible and the number of children cared for has been reduced from 188 to 169. Several of the larger boys have gone out to support themselves and several are planning to leave as soon as places can be found offering a support.

The work of reduction in numbers have been carefully guarded so that the least possible sacrifice to the child could be made. No children are being received where any other arrangements can be made to find them a home and support. Though the Board has been forced to reduce the activities of the work, the same efficiency of the past is being maintained. The daily life is happy, the religious life of the Home among the children is gratifying, and the educational work is satisfactory. Reports coming to the Home from children out in the world indicates that our children are up to the average in making good in the Christian Business world.

The children help support themselves, they do all the home work, laundry, cooking, sewing, dairy and garden trucking. The 260 acre farm land has been placed at the use of the Board, but other than cutting the wood supply for the home and clearing up some land there has not been money available to do the necessary fencing and other things required to open up a farm. We still have our dairy cows on the city property and do our trucking on the city land, and will be forced to this limited farm operation until we get the money for larger operations as it requires every cent received to buy food supplies for the children.

The county has leased our school building and our children are in school at home, but the county pays the teachers and furnishes books through the sixth grade. This arrangement has saved the home a considerable amount and gives us the county school efficiency. The Arcadia Business College has very kindly opened its doors to our older girls and is at the present time giving seven (7) girls Business Training. Just as fast as these girls are trained and trepared they are secured a position where they can support themselves.

With all departments of our work, the Home is feeling the effects of the depression, and we have not been in a position to give children every thing they really need. There has been self denial practiced by the children in the home, but with help in food supplies and money from all of our Churches from now until the close of the year, our work for the Orphan Children will not suffer.

Your Committee recommends that this Association endorse the Convention plan, of each Sunday School giving one Sunday's collection to the support of our home at Arcadia, and urge all Sunday Schools not following this plan to do so at once.

In order to render immediate aid to the home, your Committee recommends that we take a voluntury contribution now in our Association for the relief of the Home.

Since three fourths of our knowledge comes through the eye how important it is that our reading should be inspiring. The battle

of good morals is largely a contest between the forces of good and evil in furnishing something to read. If we as parents would read more of our Baptist literature and less other story books our children would likewise do that. It is not good to feed our bodies on unnutritious food, then why feed our souls on the same diet. So we must have a strong menu for our souls. Why not feed it on Bartist literature such as Pilgrim: Progress, World Comrades, Royal Scrvice and many other books of the best quality. The Flor da Baptist Witness is the best of all our Baptist papers. It keeps our people well informed as to the needs and progress of our work and to build up the spiritual life of the largest number of readers.

The Bible is the foundation of our Christian civilization and will remain the book of books.

Let each household take stock and serve the right menu, to our storved souls.

23. Report on Sunday School and B. Y. P. U. read by Miss Lorena Harrell as follows:

REPCRT ON SUNDAY SCHOOL AND B. Y. P. U.

We, your Committee on Sunday School and B. Y. P. U., desire to offer the following reports to the Suwannee Association:

While we note with pleasure the progress being made in this grand and important work in most of our churches, we are pained to report the fact that so many of our churches report no Sunday Echool at all.

Of the twenty-nine (29) churches of the association, 13 report Sunday Schools, with an enrollment of 967 pupils. 70 of these 967 pupils were baptized this year. 5 of these schools are graded, 35 teachers in the schools hold Norma! Diplomas.

This Association has a total curollment of 2,570 members and we find that only 37 17-257% of them are engaged in Sunday School work.

The Sunday School is the teaching service of the church, and is therefore of as much importance as any other service of the church. To neglect it is suicidal, since it is our base of supply.

We recommend that the older people manifest a greater interest in this part of the church work. It is not a service for women and children alone but a service for ALL to come together and study the word of God, and is the place to instruct children to become God-fearing, God honoring men and women.

Let us bewilling to let God use us for His honor and glory and for the advancement of His Kingdom.

B. Y. P. U. Work

In this Association we have 5 B. Y. P. U.'s, 4 senior unions; 3 intermediate unions; 4 junior unions. A total of 11. 3 of these unions report standard. Number enrolled in senior unions 89, number enrolled in intermediate unions 23, number enrolled in junior unions 45, a total of 157.

What is a B. Y. P. U.? It is a Baptist Church at work in and among its young people.

- B. Y. P. U. is not an organization separate from the Church, but the Church at work training and developing young Church members for more efficient service in the Master's work. The B. Y. P. U. work is practical, thus carries out the five-fold object of the B. Y. P. U. which is as follows:
 - 1. Deepen the spiritual life of the young people.
 - 2. Training in all forms of Church activities.
 - 3. Edification in Scriptural Knowledgs.
 - 4. Instruction in Baptist doctrine and History.
 - 5. Enlistment in all forms of Missionary endeavor

Your Committee would prayerfully suggest that each and every pastor in our Association, each and every Church in the Association give the B. Y. P. U. their sincere consideration and generous aid. The young people need the encouragement of the adults in the Church and we pray that our pastors and Churches will help the great work.

24. Report on Education read by Julian Robinson as follows:

REPORT ON EDUCATION

Your committee on Christian Education begs leave to submit the following report:

It has been said by authentic statisticians that a six-year old child is worth, in material value to the state, \$6,000.00. If this be true, then we can well believe that the education of our youth is the greatest outstanding industry of this, or any other age. In order that we may gather a concrete idea of the immensity of this industry, let us consider the fact that there are about 5000 children of school age within the bounds of our association. These represent the enormous sum of \$30,000,000.00 in material value, a sum not equaled by the combined values of all other industries within our association.

So much for the material side. Now, let us consider the spiritual value of a child. Can any statistician compute in earthly terms the value of the spiritual part of the child? No, there is no mathematical process by which the soul of a child may be weighed and evaluated. The only instance so far as is known that the soul of man was ever evaluated was when Christ said, "For what is a man

rofited, if he shall gain the whole world and lose his own soul? Or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul."

Christian education is the training of the body, mind and soul of the child in a way that greatly enhances his value as a citizen. Christian education is the difference between the man who curses and the man who prays; the difference between the tottering drunkard and the consecrated Sunday School teacher; the difference between the burglar who is potentially a murderer and the Minister whose life has been dedicated to the service of humanity: the difference between the man who is a consistent lawbreaker and the man who is an upright and God-fearing citizen. Therefore it behooves us to be more and more concerned about the Christian education of our youth. We should make every effort possibe to see that our public school teachers should be firm believers in the tenets of the Christain Religion. And after our children have finished in the public schools, they should be sent to higher institutions where they might have the advantages of Christian instructors, who instead of undermining and destroying the Christian ideals begun in the home life of the child, will on the other hand, by his consecrated life and high ideals, strengthen and confirm the Christian belief of the child.

Just such an institution can be found within our own state at DeLand, our own Stetson University, sponsored and supported by our State Baptist Convention. No finer and more noble Christian influence can be found in any institution of higher learning than at Stetson University under the able leadership of our beloved Dr. Lincoln Hulley.

COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

The Cooperative Program is the plan by which Southern Baptists work together in promoting and supporting the cause of Christ. The objects included in the Cooperative Program are: State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Christian Education, Ministerial Relief, Orphanages, and Hospitals. Through these various lines of work Baptists are ministering to the physical, mental, and spiritual needs of mankind at home and around the world.

In the Cooperative Program, proper emphasis is placed upon each and every phase of the denominational work. No cause is neglected, and no cause is stressed to the disadvantage of other causes. Through the Cooperative Program a unified appeal is made for the support of all denominational causes. This is advisable for several reasons.

- Each cause receives its just part of the money given by our people.
- 2. It makes the Every Member Canvass easy, requiring the taking of only one pledge for the whole program.
- It simplifies the bookkeeping task of the treasurer of the church.
- 4. It enables every member of a church to have his appropriate part in supporting all the work of his denomination within the state, in the south and throughout the world.

Through the Cooperative Program the Southern Baptists are doing a great work. They are supporting nineteen orphan homes, twenty-nine hospitals. The most of the work of which is on charitable bases. Our old ministers, schools, and colleges along with the rest of our great work must be taken care of. We have had a terrible slump in our contributions for 1930. The amount contributed for all purposes in 1929 was \$39,337,148.98. Our contributions for 1930 were 37,489,021.28 which constitute a loss over the previous year of \$1,848,127.70. Our baptisms for 1930 show an increase over the previous year of 22,948. The foreign fields reporting the greatest number of baptisms in any one year. With all our work expanding naturally requires more finance to support it. Therefore your committee recommends:

1st. That the members of our churches study every phase of our denominational work; every Baptist should be posted on all the great causes being fostered by his denomination. He should always be a subscriber to the Baptist Witness and Home and Foreign Fields.

2nd. That every church in the association adopt the budget system of finances and every member canvass for pledges should be earnestly made.

3rd. That the churches which do not adopt the budget system, make a liberal offering each and every quarter at least to the Cooperative Program.

It earnestly hoped through the efforts which shall be put forth in the simultaneous Every Member Canvass November 29 to December 6th., the Florida Baptists during 1932 will be able to increase their gifts to the work. The great problem ahead of us at this time is the enlistment of a larger number of our people in the regular support of our churches and the denomination. We call upon our people everywhere to cooperate with our Board more heartily and enthuiastically in its efforts to help our churches into a larger support of our Kingdom entergises.
