

ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. OF THE SCRIPTURES

We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men Divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its Author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture of error for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us; and therefore is, and shall remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and opinions should be tried.

2. OF THE TRUE GOD

We believe that there is One, and only One living and true God, an Infinite, intelligent Spirit, Whose Name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of Heaven and Earth; inexpressibly glorious in Holmess, and worthy of all possible honor, confidence and love; that in the Unity of the Godhead there are Three Persons, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost; equal in every Divine Perfection, and executing distinct but harmonious Offices in the great work of Redemption.

3. OF THE FALL OF MAN

We believe that Man was created in holiness, under the law of His Maker; but by voluntary transgression fell from that holy and happy state; in consequence of which all Mankind are now sinners, not by constraint but choice; being by nature utterly void of that holiness required by the law of God, positively inclined to evil; and therefore under just condemnation to eternal ruin, without defense or excuse.

4. OF THE WAY OF SALVATION

We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of Grace; through the Mediatorial office of the Son of God; Who by the appointment of the Father, freely took upon Him our nature, yet without our sin; honored the Divine law by His Personal obedience, and by His death made a full Atonement for our sins; that having risen from the dead, He is now enthroned in heaven; and uniting in His wonderful Person the tenderest sympathies with Divine Perfections, He is every way qualified to be a suitable, a compassionate, and all-sufficient Saviour.

5. OF JUSTIFICATION

We believe that the great Gospel blessing which Christ secures to such as believe in Him is Justification; that Justification includes the pardon of sin, and the promise of eternal life on principles of lighteousness; that it is bestowed, not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Faith in the Redeemer's Blood; by virtue of which faith His perfect righteousness is freely imputed to us of God; that it brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every other blessing needful for time and eternity.

6. OF THE FREENESS OF SALVATION

We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all by the Gospel; that it is the immediate duty of all to accept them by a cordial penitent and obedient faith; and that nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner on earth, but his own inherent depravity and voluntary rejection of the Gospel; which involves him in an aggravated condemnation.

7. OF GRACE IN REGENERATION

We believe that in order to be saved, sinners must be regenerated, or born again; that regeneration consists in giving a holy disposition to the mind; that it is effected in a manner above our comprehension by the power of the Holy Spirit, in connection with Divine truth, so as to secure our voluntary obedience to the Gospel; and that its proper evidence appears in the holy fruits of repentance, and faith, and newness of life.

8. OF REPENTANCE AND FAITH

We believe that Repentance and Faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable Graces, wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God; whereby being deeply convinced of our guilt, danger and helplessness, and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession, and supplication for mercy; at the same time heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ as our Prophet, Priest and King, and relying on Him alone as the Only and All-sufficient Saviour.

9. OF GOD'S PURPOSE OF GRACE

We believe that Election is the Eternal purpose of God, according to which He graciously regenerates, sanctifies, and saves sinners; that being perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, it comprehends all the means in connection with the end; that it is a most glorious display of God's Sovereign Goodness, being Infinitely free, wise, holy and unchangeable; that it utterly excludes boasting, and promotes humility, love, prayer, praise, trust in God, and active imitation of His free mercy; that it encourages the use of means in the highest degree; that it may be ascertained by its effects in all who truly believe the Gospel; that it is the foundation of Christian assurance; and that to ascertain it with regard to ourselves demands and deserves the utmost diligence.

10. OF SANCTIFICATION

We believe that Sanctification is the process by which, according to the Will of God, we are made partakers of His Holiness; that it is a progressive work; that it is begun in regeneration; and that it is carried on in the hearts of believers by the presence and power of the Holy Spirit, the Sealer and Comforter, in the continual use of the appointed means—especially, the Word of God, self-examination, self-denial, watchfulness and prayer.

11. OF THE PERSEVERANCE OF SAINTS

We believe that such only are real believers as endure unto the end; that their persevering attachment to Christ is the grand mark which distinguishes them from superficial professors; that a special Providence watches over their welfare; and they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

12. OF THE HARMONY OF THE LAW AND THE GOSPEL

We believe that the Law of God is the eternal and unchangeable rule of His moral government; that it is holy, just, and good; and that the inability which the Scriptures ascribe to fallen men to fulfill its precepts, arises entirely from their love of sin; to deliver them from which, and to restore them through a Mediator to unfeigned obedience to the holy Law, is one great end of the Gospel, and of the Means of Grace connected with the establishment of the visible Church.

13. OF THE GOSPEL CHURCH

We believe that a visible Church of Christ is a Congregation of baptized believers, associated by Covenant in the faith and fellowship of the Gospel; observing the Ordinances of Christ; governed by His Laws; and exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His Word; that its only Scriptural officers are Bishops or Pastors and Deacons, whose qualifications, claims, and duties are defined in the Epistles to Timothy and Titus.

14. OF BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER

We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion in water of a believer, into the Name of the Father, and Son, and Holy Ghost; to show forth in a solemn and beautiful emblem, our faith in the crucified, buried, and risen Saviour, with its effects, in our death to sin and resurrection to a new life; that it is a pre-requisite to the privileges of a Church relation; and to the Lord's Supper, in which the members of the Church by the sacred use of bread and wine, are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ; preceded always by solemn self-examination.

15. OF THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH

We believe that the first day of the week is the Lord's Day, or Christian Sabbath; and is to be kept sacred to religious purposes, by abstaining from all secular labor and sinful recreations, by the devout observance of all the means of Grace, both private and public; and by preparation for that rest that remaineth for the people of God.

16. OF CIVIL GOVERNMENT

We believe that Civil Government is of Divine appointment, for the interests and good order of human society; and that magistrates are to be prayed for, conscientiously honored, and obeyed; except only in things opposed to the Will of our Lord Jesus Christ, Who is the only Lord of the conscience, and the Prince of the kings of the earth.

17. OF THE RIGHTEOUS AND THE WICKED

We believe that there is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and the wicked; that such only as through faith are justified in the Name of the Lord Jesus, and sanctified by the Spirit of our God, are truly righteous in His esteem; while all such as continue in impenitence and unbelief are in His sight wicked, and under the curse; and this distinction holds among men both in and after death.

18. OF THE WORLD TO COME

We believe that the end of this world is approaching; that at the Last Day, Christ will descend from heaven, and raise the deadfrom the grave to final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment, and the righteous to endless joy; and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of men in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

CONSTITUTION

Article 1-Name

This Organization shall be known as the SUWANNEE MISSIONARY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

Article 2-Purpose

The Purpose of this Association shall be: To furnish a medium of Co-operation for the Churches of the Association in their Divinely commissioned work of Missions, Education, and Benevolences; and to this end we seek to bring into co-operative fellowship the energies of our Churches; and to secure the moral and financial support of our Churches for the Objects and Institutions fostered by the Florida Convention of Baptist Churches, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

Article 3-Churches

The Constituents of this Association shall be Missionary Baptist Churches of regular order, presenting petitionary letters from other Associations in due form; and Churches which may be constituted within the bounds of the Association, presenting proper credentials of organization and Articles of Faith, accompanied by properly accredited Messengers.

Article 4-Messengers

This Association shall be composed of Messengers holding membership in the Churches which constitute the Association; these Messengers having been duly elected by their respective Churches on the following basis: Each Church shall be entitled to Three Messengers without reference to their numerical strength; and one additional Messenger for each Twenty-five members or fraction thereof, after it has attained a membership of Fifty members.

Article 5-Officers

The Officers of this Association shall be: A Moderator, a Vice-Moderator, a Clerk, and a Treasurer; who shall be elected annually by ballot at the beginning of each Annual Meeting of the Association; and no person shall be elected Moderator for more than two consecutive years.

Article 6-Meetings

- 1. This Association shall meet Annually, Thursday and Friday after the second Sunday in October; at such Time and Place as the Association shall have selected at its last Annual Session.
- 2. In addition to the Annual Meeting, there shall be held a Union Meeting each Fifth Sunday; the Time, Place, and Program to be provided for by the Executive Committee.
- 3. In the event of an emergency, the Executive Committee is authorized to make changes in the Time and Place for the Annual Meeting, as will best serve the interests of the Association.

Article 7-Amendments

The Constitution and By-Laws of the Association may be amended at any Annual Meeting of the Association, by a two-thirds majority vote of the Messengers.

BY-LAWS

Section 1-Duties of Officers

- 1. The Duties of the Moderator shall be to preside, preserve order, and appoint all Committees not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.
- 2. The duties of the Vice-Moderator shall be to assist the Moderator; and to preside in the absence of, or at the request of, the Moderator.
- 3. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the Association; supervise the printing and distribution of the Minutes; keep a regular file of the published proceedings of the Association; and deliver same with other material belonging to his office to his successor.

The Clerk shall send to the clerks of the Churches of the Association the Associational Letter Form Blanks thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting; also the material to the Chairmen of the Standing Committees, who are to submit reports of our work at the Annual Session.

The Clerk shall notify after the adjournment of the Association, all Persons, Committees, and Chairmen of the Standing Committees, of their elections or appointments of service.

The Clerk shall receive remuneration for his services, the sum to be fixed by the Association at each Annual Meeting; also he shall receive additional funds from the Association for the expenses of his office.

- 4. The Treasurer shall keep a correct record of all Associational Funds received and disbursed by his Office; and shall submit a record of all transactions of his Office to the Association at its Annual Meeting. The Treasurer shall be the Chairman of the Finance Committee.
- 5. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be to transact all business of the Association between its Annual Meetings; and a written report of its work shall be submitted to the Association at its Annual Session.

The Executive Committee shall elect its own Chairman and Clerk; and fix the Time and Place for its Meetings between the Annual Sessions of the Association.

In the event a vacancy occurs in any office of the Association between the Annual Meetings; the Executive Committee is authorized to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term of office; if not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.

Section 2-Committees

1. The Standing Committees of the Association shall be: 1—Executive Committee; 2—Order of Business; 3—State Missions; 4—Home Missions; 5—Foreign Missions; 6—Religious Literature; 7—Christian Education; 8—Sunday Schools; 9—Baptist Training Union; 10—Woman's Missionary Union; 11—Laymen's Work—Brotherhood; 12—Florida Baptist Children's Home; 13—Ministerial Relief and Annuities; 14—Social Service. Also other Committees as the Association shall deem advisable.

2. The Special Committees of the Association shall be: 1—Nominations; 2—Finance; 3—Resolutions; 4—Obituaries; 5—Digest of Letters—State of Religion. Also other Committees as the Association shall deem advisable.

Section 3-Committees. Appointment Of

- 1. All Standing Committees shall consist of Three Members; who shall be appointed by the Moderator; the Chairman being selected in advance; the others at each Annual Session.
- 2. All Special Committees shall consist of not less than Three nor more than Five Members; who shall be appointed by the Moderator at each Annual Session.
- 3. The Committee on Order of Business shall consist of Three Members; Two of which shall be the Moderator and the Chairman of the Executive Committee; the third member shall be appointed by the Moderator at each Annual Meeting.
- 4. The Executive Committee of this Association shall consist of Seven Members; and the Officers of the Association, together with the Pastors serving some Church in the Association, whose membership is in some Church in the Association—shall be Ex-Officio members of the Executive Committee.

Section 4-Committees.-Duties Of

- 1. The duties of the Standing Committee and the Special Committees, shall be those which are commonly understood, and observed by Baptist Associations and Conventions, as suggested by their names.
- 2. The duties of the Committee on the Order of Business shall be to prepare the Program for each Annual Meeting; and to select the Speakers not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.
 - 3. The duties of the Nominating Committee shall be:

To name the Time and Place for the Annual Meeting.

To name the Preachers and Alternates for the Annual Introductory and Missionary Sermons.

To name the Associational Member of the State Board of Missions of the Florida Convention of Baptist Churches.

To name the Associational Messengers to the Florida Convention of Baptist Churches.

To name the Executive Committee.

All nominations subject to adoption by the Association.

Section 5

The Association shall have an Introductory and a Missionary Sermon at each Annual Meeting, on the first and second days respectively; the hours for the sermons to be provided for in the Order of Business.

Section 6

The fiscal year of the Association shall begin October first of each year, and end September thirtieth of the following year, both dates inclusive; and all reports to the Association shall conform to these dates.

Section 7

All written reports of Committees shall be limited to a maximum of six hundred words; and the Clerk is authorized if necessary, to edit reports to conform to this word limitation.

Section 8

When a Church fails to send an Annual letter, the Clerk shall use the report of the previous year, with reference only to record of membership of Church and organizations.

Section 9

The Association requests that Church clerks prepare and mail to the Clerk of the Association their Annual Church Letter, ten days before the Annual Meeting.

Section 10

The Parliamentary Law which shall be used by this Association in the government of its business proceedings, shall be Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law.

It is also understood, that this Association shall ever adhere to the Principles and Practices of recognized Baptist Policies in all its procedures, its methods, and its work.

Record of Proceedings of the Sixty-Sixth Annual Session of the Suwannee Baptist Association Held with the Jasper Baptist Church

FIRST DAY

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 14th, 1937, 10:00 A. M.

- 1. This session of the Association was called to order by the Moderator Dr. John E. Evans, after a hymn was sung.
- 2. Mrs. W. T. Newsome led in a devotional service by reading St. John 15:1-10. Following the reading by a very interesting talk. Rev. A. M. Parker led in prayer.
- 3. The congregation sang two verses of that good old hymn, "Rescue the Perishing." Moderator Dr. J. E. Evans made an address giving statistics of the growth of our denomination, which was very interesting.
- 4. The next order of business was the election of officers for the ensuing year. Rev. H. O. Hughes was elected by acclamation as Moderator. Rev. A. M. Parker and Bro. R. J. Bush were appointed to escort our new moderator to the chair. Bro. S. C. Kierce was elected Vice-Moderator by acclamation. G. L. Dorman was elected clerk by acclamation. R. E. Hatch was elected Treasurer by acclamation.
- 5. Rev. H. O. Hughes made a motion that all messengers present and those to come later compose this session of the Association. Motion and carried that this Association extend a vote of thanks to Dr. John E. Evans for his faithful service as Moderator.
- 6. Address of welcome was delivered by Bro. F. B. Harrell, Supt. of Jasper Sunday School, cordially welcoming all to this church and community. Response made by Rev. A. M. Parker in a very fine way.
- 7. Visitors were welcomed and enrolled (See list following list of messengers 1937 session).
- 8. Report of the Executive Committee read by S. C. Kierce, as follows:

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Regular meetings were held for selecting places for our fifth Sunday meetings also for arranging programs.

The Executive Committee arranged for our Rural State Evangelist, R. D. Corrin to spend 7 weeks in the Association, teaching and preaching. Brother Corrin did a splendid job but he did not get the full support from the churches he visited, although his services were free.

The Executive Committee also arranged for Rev. Bert Higdon, a seminary student, to stay in the Association for 10 weeks during the summer teaching Study Courses. He was kept busy all but two weeks during the summer but he was not given full support by the churches he visited. This was a disappointment to Rev. Higdon and the Executive Committee.

The Annual Bible Conference was held at the Baptist Church in Live Oak. The expenses were defrayed by the churches of the Association. Good teachers and good programs were arranged but the pastors of our Association failed to attend

Our carload of produce sent the Baptist Orphanage at Arcadia was valued at \$550.32 which was several dollars less than was sent in 1936. Bright Pond Church again headed the Association in gifts which amounted to \$92.85. Their gifts last year amounted to \$80.52.

We have held special meetings to consider several problems which have arisen. These seemed to be ironed out successfully.

We would like to recommend that our Churches cooperate more with the Executive Committee which will undoubtedly enlarge us spiritually.

- 13. Report on Co-Operative Program was read by Dr. John E. Evans, as follows:

REPORT ON CO-OPERATIVE PROGRAM

The Co-operative Program is the plan adopted by Southern Baptists in their effort to enlist all their people in the systematic support of all the general work of the Denomination. It includes Missions, education and benevolences in the several States, in the Southern States as a whole, and in sixteen foreign counties. It seeks to provide a regular income for all agencies engaged in the work. It distributes to all these agencies in proportion to their budget needs.

The expenses of the State Secretary's office are taken out of the funds contributed (it usually amounts to about 5 or 6 per cent), then the funds are divided between State causes and South Wide causes. The ideal ratio of division is 50-50, in some States however, it has been felt that because of peculiar conditions or heavy state needs this ratio could not at present be observed.

The portion of co-operative receipts retained for the State causes (state missions, education, orphanages, etc.) is divided among these causes on a percentage basis agreed upon and adopted by the State Convention or its Executive agency. The portion given to Southwide causes is divided according to the percentage adopted by the S. B. C.

- The co-operative program is based upon the assumption that our pastors and all our denominational workers will promote it.
- The co-operative program is based upon the assumption that the Every Member Canvass will be put on in every Church.
- 3. It is based upon the assumption that all new members will be enlisted in giving as they join the church during the year.
- 4. The co-operative program is based upon the assumption that fair play will be administered in distributing the funds.
- 5. The co-operative program is based upon the assumption that all who give through the co-operative program will give full length cooperation in promoting the whole program of Southern Baptists.

14. Report on State Missions read by E. T. Horne, as follows:

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

State Missions includes all the missionary and benevolent work engaged in by Florida Baptists in a cooperative way. State Mission work is absolutely necessary if we would save our beloved commonwealth from the hands of those who seek to exploit our wonderful resources for selfish and ungodly purposes.

Through our organized State Mission forces we are helping to win the lost to Christ by sending the gospel to destitute regions, by helping to organize and grow churches which become the representatives of Christ upon earth. Through our departmental workers the Board helps to develop and train Sunday School and Baptist Training Union workers and cultivate stewardship and the mission spirit through our W. M. U. and Brotherhood leaders. We are seeking to win to Christ and Christian service the large group of Baptist boys and girls found in our colleges and universities through our Student Secretaries. We maintain a strong evangelistic work with two evangelists giving full time to this holy task. We should put on others in the near future to help stem the tide of godlessness and lawlessness that is undermining our Christian work and faith.

During the lifetime of the Board, more than 500 of our 800 churches have been aided one way or another. Some of the early mission stations have become great churches.

We are this year helping to support 64 missionary pastors who are preaching to 87 churches and mission stations, including our work amongst the Indians.

Last year Florida Baptists made a splendid advance in their mission gifts. The last report made to the Convention showed that our state gave to all causes \$173,123.55. Of this amount, \$100,000.00 was given to the Cooperative Program, enabling us to reach our goal for the year. All the specials or designated funds were promptly distributed without deducting one penny of cost, while the Program funds were divided according to the percentage table adopted by the Convention.

We need for our State Mission departmental work this year \$67,820.00. This is the largest budget our State Board has adopted in several years, but we

can reach it if every church in the state will do its part in supporting the Cooperative Program liberally, thus helping to make possible the achievement of our 1937 goal of \$115,000.00 for the Program. The other sources of income for State Missions, besides 30 per cent of Program receipts, are special gifts made by W. M. U. and the Sunday Schools during October, and the appropriations made our work by the Sunday School Board.

Our Board and Convention have set up certain ideals which are worthy of our consideration, as follows:

Every member supporting his church with his time, talents and money.

Every church contributing to the Cooperative Program.

Every full time church sending in a mission offering each week.

Every part time church sending in a mission offering at least quarterly.

Every church solidly behind the Mission Program and denominational work.

A good, live Sunday School in every church.

A Spirit-led Baptist Training Union in every church.

A strong W. M. U. organization in every church.

A functioning Brotherhood in every church.

An energetic and aggressive pastor for every pastorless church.

A building adequate to the needs of every church.

The Baptist Witness in every Baptist home.

A Heaven-sent revival at least once during the year in every church.

Ten thousand baptisms as a minimum goal for 1937.

We urge every church to use the Every Member Canvass in seeking to enlist the careless and indifferent among their membership. The mission office will gladly furnish cards and literature upon request.

We also urge every church and pastor to get solidly behind and support the work of the denomination with their prayers, their influence and their gifts. Let us make it possible through our increased gifts to put on a greater evangelistic and missionary program next year than ever before in our history.

16. Report on Foreign Missions was read by Rev. A. M. Parker, as follows:

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

Jesus knew no geographical lines nor racial prejudice while on earth, neither should we. In Acts 1:8. But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth.

For the calendar year 1936, the Board received from the states of the Southern Convention the sum of \$959,794.74. In addition to this amount, we received from income on endowment funds, bequest and miscellaneous sources, the sum of \$46,003.69. From the sale of property and special gifts for debts, was received the sum of \$34,776.23, making a grand total of \$1,040,574.57. This is the first time in several years the total income passed the million mark.

The total budget for 1937, not including the debt funds, was fixed at the October meeting at \$789,165.73.

The Woman's Missionary Union set as their goal for the 1936 Lottie Moon Christmas offering \$175,000.00 and raised a total of \$291,761.72. Out of this amount \$100,000 was set aside to pay the salaries of 125 Missionaries. This generous gift enabled the Board to go through the lean months without

In 1927 the Board had a total of 544 missionaries on the rolls. In 1934 there were 377 in the active service of the board. Since January 1, 1933, the Board has appointed 90 new missionaries and reappointed 28, making a total of 118 replacements. On April 1, 1937, there were 56 emeritus missionaries on pensions, and 415 missionaries in the active service of the Board.

At the semi-annual meeting of the board in April, no new missionaries could be appointed, because the gifts through cooperative receipts was not sufficient. The board cannot consider risking any project that may incur more debt on the board. If we as Southern Baptists expect our work to grow beyond the seas we must increase our gifts from Sunday to Sunday.

There has been a tremendous growth and enlargement of the work of the Board in all departments. The foreign end of the work requires virtually all of the time of the Executive Secretary, the assistant Secretary and one stenographer. After careful consideration of the whole matter, the board at the April meeting elected field secretary R. S. Jones, Home Secretary, and will in the future use as field representatives certain missionaries who for various reasons cannot return immediately to the foreign field.

We earnestly and prayerfully request our people throughout the Suwannee Association, to bring all their tithes and offerings into the treasury of the Lord's house, that His work may be carried on in a greater way than ever before.

17. Report on Hundred Thousand Club was read by Mrs. S. C. Kierce, as follows:

REPORT ON HUNDRED THOUSAND CLUB

Refreshing our memories: The Baptist Hundred Thousand Club was launched at the Southern Baptist Convention, May, 1933. It is a debt-paying plan. It seeks to enlist 100,000 Southern Baptists who will contribute \$1.00 a month each toward the payment of the debts upon the Convention agencies. This extra dollar is to be over and above their regular church contributions. The Baptist Sunday School Board pays all the cost of the promotion so that every dollar received is applied upon the principal of the debts.

The Why of it: The necessity for some plan of raising money grew out of the enlarged work of our agencies and the decrease in their income which resulted in large and embarrassing debts. Our agencies were handicapped, our workers were discouraged, our debtors were insistent; something had to be done.

The Plan Justified: We have not found the 100,000 people or organizations willing to give this extra dollar. But we have found some of them. Perhaps as many as 50,000 people have at one time or another contributed something through this Club plan. A grand total of \$681,637.99 has been received and paid upon the debts up to June 1, 1937 (This means a saving in interest of enough money to pay the salaries of fifty-one foreign missionaries!)

The following disbursements have been made out of the Baptist Hundred Thousand Club receipts up to June 1, 1937: Foreign Mission Board, \$186,312.37; Home Mission Board, \$156,994.27; National Baptist Memorial, \$4,633.53; New Orleans Hospital, \$13,917.76; Education Board, \$34,134.54; Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, \$117,040.61; Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, \$99,536.56; Baptist Bible Institute, \$68,118.61; American Baptist Theological Seminary, \$1,249.74.

Some Encouragements: The receipts of the Club so far in 1937 are larger than in any other year.

All remittances should be made through the church treasurers who will see that the money is properly designated for the Baptist Hundred Thousand Club and sent promptly to the state mission secretary in his state.

REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

Bacon once wrote: "If I might control the literature of the household, I would guarantee the well-being of church and state."

He understood what another writer has expressed by saying that from the hour of the invention of printing, "Books, not kings, were to rule the world": "for wisdom is better than rubies and all things that may be desired are not to be compared unto it."

A great man long ago chose wisdom as God's best gift. We learn in God's word that knowledge is the beginning of wisdom.

If we would carry on and expand the great work that has been so well founded we must have knowledge of Kingdom work. Our great leaders who know so well the truths of this have given us three magazines to develop us both mentally and spiritually. With the assurance of our increasing leisure, we must make careful selection of good literature and read for enrichment as well as for pleasure and information.

Literature up-lifts the longings and stabilizes the emotions so that one feels a sense of security in the social world. We know this to be true for no christian who has experienced deep sorrow can deny that he failed to find relief and strength through reading passages of the Bible.

Have we ever stopped long enough to study the types of literature found in the Bible? A balanced meal is carefully measured, arranged and served to a patient. The Bible is more than balanced in types of literature and is at liberty to be read by the sick and well, young and old. Let us resolve to increase our study of the Bible.

Since we are blessed with christian publications other than our Bible, we should select and study these with care. We know that throughout the states we have at the public's demand, book stores where we may find much material for the development of a christian mind. Weekly and monthly periodicals may be obtained for every home, such as the "Baptist Witness," the newsbearer of our religious and economic problems of today. The Witness keeps one well informed on the work of the churches. It helps one to broaden his knowledge of the Bible and of christianity. It finds a space in every home that is truly vacant when the Witness is absent. We beg of you to place such periodicals as the Witness, the S. S. Times, Home and Foreign Fields, Royal Service, and the B. T. U. and other quarterlies in your homes, offices, schools, and other public places where the searching hands of the careful selector may find and read them.

- 2nd. Also find that there was a considerable amount of foodstuffs sent from this Association for their help. We wish to thank everyone who participated in this, and trust they and others will do as good or better next year.
- 3rd. We find that there is now 157 children at the Home to be cared for. There were applications for 113 children at the Home the past year with only 28 being taken and 85 rejected for one reason or another, mostly, we suspect, for the lack of funds.
- 4th. We recommend that our members give to this, OUR OWN CHARITY, more liberally in the future than in the past, and also recommend each delegate to next year's Association contribute the sum of \$1.00 for this cause to be used for that only.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Mentioning the new and important information about christian education in our southland is the Newly Launched Southern Baptist College News and Views, a monthly journal published by the Southern Baptist Education Commission, Charles D. Johnson, Chairman and editor, Blue Mountain Mississippi. The subscription rate to this journal is \$1.00 per year. It assembles valuable information from our academies, junior colleges, senior colleges, seminaries, and training schools. Another encouraging report shows that commendable gains in enrollment in our ranks from academies, to seminaries, totaling two thousand more students than in the preceding year. Endowments show a gain for the

year amounting to more than six million dollars, while the values of school properties have increased more than five million dollars. Facts like these show that many of our states are alert and active in their efforts to give our schools the support they need to render greater christian service.

In our own state christian education has made rapid strides in the past year as evidenced by the new Baptist Student Building that has been erected and recently dedicated on the campus of the F. S. C. W. This building has been needed for a great many years and will surely give a great impetus to the christian work being done among our Baptist girls at the Florida State College For Women.

Reports from Dr. Allen, President of Stetson University, show that the enrollment in Stetson University is greater than ever before in its history. This fine institution under the able leadership of Dr. Allen is doing a great work for Baptist Youth of Florida who are enrolled there. From our own association we have several students in this Baptist university, among them some who are studying for the ministry.

36. Report on Brotherhood Work read by B. M. Smith, as follows:

REPORT ON BROTHERHOOD WORK

The Lord evidently intended that men should have a large place in the work of His Kingdom. This is indicated by the fact that He entrusted the official and ordained leadership of His first churches to men. The pastors and deacons in the beginning were all men.

The plan of organization for the Baptist Brotherhood of the South is as follows:

- An Executive Committee, composed of zealous laymen, elected by the Southern Baptist Convention, are expected to outline its general policy, and direct its activities.
- 2. The men need, and are as much entitled to a zealous State leader of their class, as the women and the young people. Such a Secretary will bring into the treasury much more than the amount of his salary.
- 3. The plan also provides for the organization of an Associational Brother-hood, which has been found to be a very valuable agency for promoting fellowship, giving information and enlisting backward churches. In some cases the Brotherhood has been the means of inducing every church to support the Cooperative Program.
- 4. The plan also contemplates the organization of Brotherhoods in the local churches. If the men could be organized in Brotherhood work as well as the women are in W. M. U. work they, too, could accomplish great things.

The Brotherhood originated in 1907. As a means of quickening the interest of the laymen, thereby leading them to larger activity and more generous support, the Brotherhood seeks to deepen their spirituality, enlarge their information and give them training in service. Men's hearts need to be warmed, their heads informed and then they should abound in good works. It stresses personal evangelism, stewardship, missions and Scriptural support.

The Brotherhood strongly urges the Bible plan of bringing the "tithe into the storehouse upon the first day of the week." The Brotherhood has set itself to insist that every church member bring his tithe on every Lord's Day into the church (God's storehouse). There is no greater service we can render to our Association than to induce our fellow church members to pay their tithes. This is a Bible teaching that has been sorely neglected and needs to be emphasized on every occasion. Christian people are losing one of the greatest joys of their religion when they fail to pay the tithe that belongs to God and upon which He is depending to have the gospel given to the world.

The Brotherhood publishes an Annual of twelve programs for Brotherhoods that meet once a month, and a quarterly of thirteen programs, four times a year, for those that meet every week. No Brotherhood can hope to succeed that does not use these programs; every member should have his own copy. They sell at 10c each.

The leaders of the Brotherhood are very much encouraged by the fact that Brotherhoods, both church and Associational, are growing in number and efficiency. Hundreds of men who were indifferent a few years ago are becoming zcalous and active. Hundreds of men that a few years ago gave sparingly are now dedicating a tenth to the Lord. These men have been enriched spiritually and have not suffered in a material way.

37. Report on Sunday School was read by J. M. Robinson, as follows:

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOL

The Sunday School is the most important organization of the church. It teaches our young boys and girls to go to Sunday school while they are small, and then when they grow older they will not depart from that leadership, because the Bible says if we raise a child up in the way he should go when he is old he will not depart from it. And we believe this to be true.

We have 15 churches out of 32 that do not have a Sunday school. In these 32 churches we have 3111 members of which 1407 go to Sunday school, leaving 1704 who do not attend Sunday school, over half. We urge our christian leaders to pledge themselves to work harder through the coming year than they have in the past, to build up the Sunday schools, and organize more.

Standard Sunday Schools: There are many of our Sunday school workers that are trying to reach and maintain a Standard of Excellence. Not one that has had anything to do with a Standard Sunday school doubts for a moment that it helps to create interest and an excellent program the year around.

The Associational Sunday School Organization: Every Association should have an Associational Sunday School. A place where we can come together and associate with each other more. We are seeing the need of church leadership more and more. There are so many churches that do not have the leadership they should. We need associational trained officers in all of our Sunday schools in order to carry on the work in a great and prosperous way.

Florida Baptist Summer Assemblies: All of our Sunday school members should attend one or more of our summer Assemblies, it helps us to create interest in all phases of religious work. We had the greatest assembly last summer we have ever had at DeLand, and also one at Panama City. We are planning to have three next summer. We recommend all of you to attend one or all of the assemblies next year.

Sunday School Study Course: Now is the best time to have a study course. It will help to get our Sunday school members more interested in the work. Our teachers especially should take at least one study course a year in order that they might teach their classes in a more successful way. We urge you superintendents to have a study course as soon as it is possible to do so.

Our Aim for next year: 1st. To organize Sunday schools wherever we have an opportunity. 2nd. Help in every way to win to Christ and enlist them in service. 3rd. Make our hearts sure that we teach the Bible sincerely. 4th. Be sure to promote evangelism in every meeting. 5th. Do all we can to build up the weak churches. 6th. Obey Christ's command where he said "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every nation, and teach them to observe all things what soever he has commanded you.

REPORT OF THE SUWANNEE BYPU ASSOCIATION TO THE SUWANNEE MISSIONARY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

To the officers and members of the Suwannee Baptist Association, meeting in its annual session at the Jasper, Florida, Baptist Church, this resume of our year's activities is respectfully tendered.

The Suwannee BYPU Association is composed of 17 BYPU'S located in 10 of the 31 churches in the Suwannee Association. It is estimated that the average attendance for the year per union is about 20, though an absolutely accurate figure cannot be offered because a number of the unions failed to send back the questionnaire and report blanks the secretary mailed them.

Church attendance after BYPU has been greater in every case. Our young people should be commended for the fact that church attendance by BYPU members is nearly perfect. Well over 90 percent attend regularly the preaching service after BYPU.

One of the weak points of our unions is the reading daily by its members the Bible readings designated in the BYPU Quarterlies. Only about one-fourth of the members read their Bibles daily.


Two Association meetings were held during the past year, both at Live Oak, because it is the geographical center of our association, with an attendance of about 75 each time. Only a few churches were represented though even tho letters were mailed to each church in time for them to come. Work for the year was discussed and plans made for going forward in associational work in our association.

The director and several other officers and members have launched a campaign to put a BYPU in the churches in our association that do not now have one. Only recently was the Clayland BYPU's organized, but they promise to be three of the finest unions in our entire association. Other churches will be organized as soon as they invite the officers to explain the work and help them organize.

Financially our BYPU association is a failure. All finances which have come into the treasurer's hands have been from two places. First, donations by the director to the extent of \$5.38, and collections given once each month by the Live Oak BYPU's which totaled \$2.15, making a total of \$8.53. For postage and two socials held after the associational meeting, the treasurer paid out \$7.98. There is a balance of 55 cents to be carried into the new year. However, the director and secretary are greatly handicapped in sending out helps and getting reports and the like because the treasury is bare. A plan should be made with the Association to furnish the director a specified sum each year to partially help him in his work.

For the coming year, the director and the officers plan to arrange at least six new BYPU's and hold study courses in all of the BYPU's in order to get 100 more persons to receive the study awards than in this past year.

A definite plan worked out between the church association and its child the BYPU association where there will be some financial assistance rendered in order to help it foster its work.
