### ARTICLES OF FAITH

### 1. OF THE SCRIPTURES

We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men Divinely inspired, and is a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its Author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture of error for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us; and therefore is, and shall remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and opinions should be tried.

### 2. OF THE TRUE GOD

We believe that there is One, and only One living and true God, an Infinite, intelligent Spirit. Whose Name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of Heaven and Earth; inexpressibly glorious in Holiness, and worthy of all nossible honor, confidence and love; that in the Unity of the Godhead there are Three Persons, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost; equal in every Divine Perfection, and executing distinct but harmonious Offices in the great work of Redemption.

### 3. OF THE FALL OF MAN

We believe that Man was created in holiness, under the law of his Maker; but by voluntary transgression fell from that holy and happy state; in consequence of which all Mankind are now sinners, not by constraint but choice; being by nature utterly void of that holiness required by the law of God; positively inclined to evil; and therefore under just condemnation to eternal ruin, without defense or excuse.

### 4. OF THE WAY OF SALVATION

We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of Grace; through the Mediatorial office of the Son of God; Who by the appointment of the Father, freely took upon Him our nature, yet without our sin; honored the Divine law by His Personal obedience, and by His death made a full Atonement for our sins; that having risen from the dead. He is now enthroned in heaven; and uniting in his wonderful Person the tenderest sympathies with Divine Perfections. He is every way qualified to be a suitable, a compassionate, and all-sufficient Saviour.

### 5. OF JUSTIFICATION

We believe that the great Gospei blessing which Christ secures to such as believe in Him is Justification; that Justification includes the pardon of sin, and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness; that it is bestowed, not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Faith in the Redeemer's Blood; by virtue of which faith His perfect righteousness is freely imputed to us of God; that it brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every other blessing needful for time and eternity.

### 6. OF THE FREEDOM OF SALVATION

We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all by the Gospel; that it is the immediate duty of all to accept them by a cordial penitent and obedient faith; and that nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner on earth. but his own inherent depravity and voluntary rejection of the Gospel; which involves him in an aggravated condemnation.

### 7. OF GRACE IN REGENERATION

We believe that in order to be saved, sinners must be regenerated, or born again; that regeneration consists in giving a holy disposition to the mind; that it is effected in a manner above our comprehension by the power of the Holy Spirit, in connection with Divine truth, so as to secure our voluntary obedience to the Gospel; and that its proper evidence appears in the holy fruits of repentance, and faith, and newness of life.

MINUTES OF SEVENTY-THIRD ANNUAL SESSION

### 8. OF REPENTANCE AND FAITH

We believe that Repentance and Faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable Graces, wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God; whereby being deeply convinced of our guilt, danger and helplessness, and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession, and supplication for mercy; at the same time heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ as our Prophet, Priest and King, and relying on Him alone as the Only and All-sufficient Saviour.

### 9. OF GOD'S PURPOSE OF GRACE

We believe that Election is the Eternal purpose of God, according to which He graciously regenerates, sanctifies, and saves sinners; that being perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, it comprehends all the means in connection with the end; that it is a most glorious display of God's Sovereign Goodness, being Infinitely free, wise, holy and unchangeable; that it utterly excludes boasting, and promotes humility, love, prayer, praise, trust in God, and active imitation of His free mercy; that it encourages the use of means in the highest degree; that it may be ascertained by its effects in all who truly believe the Gospel; that it is the foundation of Christian assurance; and that to ascertain it with regard to ourselves demands and deserves the utmost diligence.

### 10. OF SANCTIFICATION

We believe that Sanctification is the process by which, according to the Will of God, we are made partakers of His Holiness; that it is a progressive work; that it is begun in regeneration; and that it is carried on in the hearts of believers by the presence and power of the Holy Spirit, the Sealer and Comforter, in the continual use of the appointed means-especially, the Word of God, self-examination, self-denial, watchfulness and prayer.

### 11. OF THE PERSEVERANCE OF SAINTS

We believe that such only are real believers as endure unto the end; that their persevering attachment to Christ is the grand mark which distinguishes them from superficial professors; that a special Providence watches over their welfare; and they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

### 12. OF THE HARMONY OF THE LAW AND THE GOSPEL

We believe that the Law of God is the eternal and unchangeable rule of His moral government; that it is holy, just, and good; and that the inability which the Scriptures ascribe to fallen men to fulfill its precepts, arises entirely from their love of sin; to deliver them from which, and to restore them through a Mediator to unfeigned obedience to the holy Law, is one great end of the Gospel, and of the Means of Grace connected with the establishment of the visible Church.

### 13. OF THE GOSPEL CHURCH

We believe that a visible Church of Christ is a Congregation of baptized believers, associated by Covenant in the faith and fellowship of the Gospel; observing the Ordinances of Christ; governed by His Laws; and exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His Word; that its only Scriptural officers are Bishops or Pastors and Deacons, whose qualifications, claims, and duties are defined in the Epistles to Timothy and Titus.

### 14. OF BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER

We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion in water of a believer, into the Name of Father, and Son, and Holy Ghost; to show forth in a solemn and beautiful emblem, our faith in the crucified, buried, and risen Saviour, with its effects, in our death to sin and resurrection to a new life; that it is a pre-requisite to the privileges of a Church relation; and to the Lord's Supper, in which the members of the Church by the sacred use of bread and wine, are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ; preceded always by solemn self-examination.

### 15. OF THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH

We believe that the first day of the week is the Lord's Day, or Christian Sabbath; and is to be kept sacred to religious purposes, by abstaining from all secular labor and sinful recreations, by the devout observance of all the means of Grace, both private and public; and by preparation for that rest that remaineth for the people of God.

### 16. OF CIVIL GOVERNMENT

We believe that Civil Government is of Divine appointment, for the interests and good order of human society; and that magistrates are to be prayed for, conscientiously honored, and obeyed; except only in things opposed to the Will of our Lord Jesus Christ, Who is the only Lord of the conscience, and the Prince of the kings of the earth.

### 17. OF THE RIGHTEOUS AND THE WICKED

We believe that there is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and the wicked; that such only as through faith are justified in the Name of the Lord Jesus, and sanctified by the Spirit of Our God, are truly righteous in His esteem; while all such as continue in impenitence and unbelief are in His sight wicked, and under the curse; and this distinction holds among men both in and after death.

### 18. OF THE WORLD TO COME

We believe that the end of this world is approaching; that at the Last Day, Christ will descend from heaven, and raise the dead from the grave to final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take piace; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment, and the righteous to endless joy; and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of men in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

### CONSTITUTION

### Article 1-Name

This Organization shall be known as the SUWANNEE MIS-SIONARY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

### Article 2-Purpose

The Purpose of this Association shall be: To furnish a medium of Co-operation for the Churches of the Association in their Divinely commissioned work of Missions, Education, and Benevolences; and to this end we seek to bring into co-operative fellowship the energies of our Churches; and to secure the moral and financial support of our Churches for the Objects and Institutions fostered by the Florida Convention of Baptist Churches, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

### Article 3-Churches

The Constituents of this Association shall be Missionary Baptist Churches of regular order, presenting petitionary letters from other Associations in due form; and Churches which may be constituted within the bounds of the Association, presenting proper credentials of organization and Articles of Faith, accompanied by properly accredited Messengers.

### Article 4-Messengers

This Association shall be composed of Messengers holding membership in the Churches which constitute the Association; these Messengers having been duly elected by their respective Churches on the following basis: Each Church shall be entitled to Three Messengers without reference to their numerical strength; and one additional Messenger for each Twenty-five members or fraction thereof, after it has attained a membership of Fifty members.

### Article 5-Officers

The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Vice-Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer, who shall be elected annually at the beginning of each Annual Meeting and shall be installed at the close of the session and shall serve until and through the next session of the Association. The offices of Clerk and Treasurer shall be held by the same person.

### Article 6-Meetings

- 1. This Association shall meet Annually at such Date, Time and Place as the Association shall have selected at its last Annual Session.
- 2. In addition to the Annual Meeting, there shall be held a Union Meeting each Fifth Sunday; the Time, Place, and Program to be provided for by the Executive Committee.
- 3. In the event of an emergency, the Executive Committee is authorized to make changes in the Time and Place for the Annual Meeting, as will best serve the interests of the Association.

### Article 7-Amendments

The Constitution and By-Laws of the Association may be amended at any Annual Meeting of the Association, by a two-thirds majority vote of the Messengers.

### BY-LAWS

### Section 1-Duties of Officers

- 1. The Duties of the Moderator shall be to preside, preserve order, and appoint all Committees not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.
- 2. The duties of the Vice-Moderator shall be to assist the Moderator; and to preside in the absence of, or at the request of, the Moderator.
- 3. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the Association; supervise the printing and distribution of the minutes; keep a regular file of the published proceedings of the Association; and deliver same with other material belonging to the office to his successor.

The Clerk shall send to the clerks of the Churches of the Association the Associational Letter Form Blanks thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting; also the material to the Chairmen of the Standing Committees, who are to submit reports of our work at the Annual Session.

The Clerk shall notify after the adjournment of the Association, all Persons, Committees, and Chairmen and Standing Committees, of their elections or appointments of service.

The Clerk shall receive remuneration for his service, the sum to be fixed by the Association at each Annual Meeting; also he shall receive additional funds from the Association for the expenses of his office.

- 4. The Treasurer shall keep a correct record of all Associational Funds received and disbursed by his Office; and shall submit a record of all transactions of his Office to the Association at its Annual Meeting. The Treasurer shall be the Chairman of the Finance Committee.
- 5. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be to transact all business of the Association between its Annual Meetings; and a written report of its work shall be submitted to the association at the Annual Session.

The Moderator and Clerk of the Association shall serve as Chairman and Secretary of the Executive Committee between the Annual Sessions of the Association.

In the event a vacancy occurs in any office of the Association between the Annual Meetings; the Executive Committee is authorized to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term of office; if not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.

### Section 2—Committees

- 1. The Standing Committees of the Association shall be: 1—Executive Committee; 2—Order of Business; 3—State Missions; 4—Home Missions; 5—Foreign Missions; 6—Religious Literature; 7—Christian Education; 8—Sunday Schools; 9—Baptist Training Union; 10—Woman's Missionary Union; 11—Laymen's Work—Brotherhood; 12—Florida Baptist Children's Home; 13—Ministerial Relief and Annuities; 14—Social Service. Also other Committees as the Association shall deem advisable.
- 2. The Special Committees of the Association shall be: 1—Nominations; 2—Finance; 3—Resolution; 4—Obituaries; 5—Digest of Letters—State of Religion. Also other Committees as the Association shall deem advisable.

### SUWANNEE MISSIONARY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

### Section 3-Committees. Appointment Of

- 1. All Standing Committees shall consist of Three Members; who shall be appointed by the Moderator; the Chairman being selected in advance: the others at each Annual Session.
- 2. All Special Committees shall consist of not less than Three nor more than Five Members; who shall be appointed by the Moderator at each Annual Session.
- 3. The Committee on Order of Business shall consist of Three Members, Two of Which shall be the Moderator and the Vice-Moderator. The third shall be appointed by the Moderator at each Annual Meeting.

The Executive Committee of this Association shall be composed of:

- 1. One member from each church elected by the church and reported to the association in the regular church letter each year.
  - 2. The pastor of each and every church in the association.
  - 3. The presiding officer of each associational organization.

The Executive Committee shall meet on the Second Tuesday p. m. of each of the months of December, March, June, and September at a place that may be decided by the committee itself.

The officers of the Executive Committee, together with the presiding officers of the associational organizations, shall constitute a Steering Committee that shall have the power to transact any business of the association that may be necessary during the time between the regular meeting of the Executive Committee; providing, that in the event the association is not organized as indicated above, then the Steering Committee shall be composed of the officers of the Executive Committee and four other such members of the Executive Committee as shall be elected by the Executive Committee.

The Steering Committee shall meet once each month or as often as the Chairman may call it into session.

### Section 4—Committees. Duties Of

- 1. The duties of the Standing Committees and the Special Committees, shall be those which are commonly understood, and observed by Baptist Associations and Conventions, as suggested by their names.
- 2. The duties of the Committee on the Order of Business shall be to prepare the Program for each Annual Meeting; and to select the Speakers not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.
  - 3. The duties of the Nominating Committee shall be:

To name the Time and Place for the Annual Meeting.

To name the Preachers and Alternates for the Annual Introductory and Missionary Sermons.

To name the Associational Messengers to the Florida Baptist Convention.

All nominations subject to adoption by the Association.

### Section 5

The Association shall have an Introductory and a Missionary Sermon at each Annual Meeting, on the first and second days respectively; the hours for the sermons to be provided for in the Order of Business.

### Section 6

The fiscal year of the Association shall begin September first of each year, and end August thirty-first of the following year, both dates inclusive; and all reports to the Association shall conform to these dates.

### Section 7

All written reports of Committees shall be limited to a maximum of six hundred words; and the Clerk is authorized if necessary, to diet reports to conform to this word limitation.

### Section 8

When a Church fails to send an Annual letter, the Clerk shall use the report of the previous year, with reference only to record of membership of Church and organizations.

### Section 9

The Association requests that Church clerks prepare and mail to the Clerk of the Association their Annual Church Letter, ten days before the Annual Meeting.

### Section 10

The Parliamentary Law which shall be used by this Association in the government of its business proceedings, shall be Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law.

It is also understood, that this Association shall ever adhere to the Principles and Practices of recognized Baptist Policies in all its Procedures, its Methods and its Word,

In addition to our great denominational press; an endless flow of quarter-lies, periodicals, and other graded and classified literature is published to meet the needs and demands of our Sunday Schools, and Training Unions.

Our Home and Foreign Mission Boards publish periodicals. "Home Misgiving information about all of our Home Mission work and workers, and "Foreign Missions', giving like information about our Foreign Miss on work These publications should be as widely distributed and read by the Churches

Solomon, who spoke on I Timothy 1:15, using the subject "Faithful Is The Saying", bringing a very stirring and inspiring message. The morning service was closed by singing "Only Trust Him." The primary interest of Christian people should be, the salvation of the lest, and a balanced education for the masses. There was a time when it was zenerally thought that only a select few was entitled to, or even needed an education. Even our churches were guilty of such warped and unethical ideas. Even now there are many who are not thoroughly sold on the question of, "Educating the Masses." Many others have been able to see this need with an Economic Eye, but Spiritually they have fallen asleep. To these the dollar mark has been the chief weapon of persuasion. Spiritually has been given a back seat, and in many instances crowded out altogether.

According to statistics, only three tenths of one percent of our Southern Baptist people have been able to see the value of Christian Education. The best evidence of this fact is the few Christian schools and colleges, and their sparing. enrollment, as compared with our numerous tax supported institutions, literally bubbling over with the youth of our nation, in their quest for knowledge. Many of these young people are from our Baptist homes. When we ask why? They reply, "It's Chcaper.

If Christian Education is to flourish, Christian people must realize the need of it to the extent that they are willing to support it, in patronage, in prayer, and in money.

I am happy indeed that our seminaries show a slightly increased enrollment as compared with last year, and that these seminaries are in larger positions of influence than at any time in their history. This influence is felt at home and Many of our seminary trained men are serving as chaplains in the most heroic manner with the fighting forces.

It is gratifying that a few Florida Baptists have realized the need for im-

proving and endowing our own Stetson University. However, I was shocked to learn that only five of the thirty churches of the Suwannee Association have agreed to assume any responsibility, or enjoy a part in this great and worthy undertaking. Our goal is \$1,000,000 and only \$500,000 has been pledged and

### Brotherhood report, read by I. T. Carter, spoken to by Dr. J. H. Griffin. Report adopted

Since the organization of the Suwannee Baptist Brotherhood Association much progress has come from the activities of our men.

We now have active brotherhoods in the following churches, Bright Pond and New Hope in Hamilton County and Live Oak and Mount Olive in Suwannee County. With a membership of over 150, these brotherhoods have all carried on worthy programs in their churches. We have one inter-denominational brotherhood at Branford

The aim of our brotherhood movement is to organize and place our men behind the pastor and the church program.

Our Home at Arcadia has had two excellent years in its financial program.

The highlight of our association activities is the quarterly meeting, presently held in Live Oak, with an average of 75 to 80 men attending each time. Good programs are provided and discussion made on local brotherhood activities. When restrictions of travel are lifted our existing brotherhoods will carry on an extensive campaign to organize in all churches. We sincerely urge men of all churches to obtain information available on brotherhood work and plan to organize a brotherhood.

We have in Florida about 815 Baptist Churches, with a membership of over 165,000. Out of this number there are approximately 40,000 laymen, less than of this number are enlisted in the work of the church. There are around 240 Brotherhoods with an enrollment of 4,800 men.

Our brotherhoods have been active in support of the John B. Stetson Million Dollar Campaign drive; paying off church debts and remodeling church houses, placing the Witness in the church budgets, and supporting the Co-

Dr. M. E. Dodd is calling for full cooperation in winning a million souls to Christ in our "Centennial Crusade," Baptist brotherhoods can be counted on to do their part.

We urge our men to observe Layman's Day, October 15th., by planning an appropriate program in their church.

The challenge for every layman to serve, is now. The future security of our economical, social and religious life depends largely upon the way in which our laymen accept the challenge of service, which is ours to-day.

### 17. Florida Baptist Children's Home report read by Mrs. Jimmie Deese, spoken to by Supt. T. M. Johns. Report adopted.

In keeping with many of our denominational agencies it has been laying aside all surplus for a post war program. We must remodel two of our dormitories at the earliest possible time and build one or two new buildings for our children. The total expense involved in remodeling and building will be more than fifty thousand dollars. These improvements will be made as soon as possible. It is the hope of our Superintendent to make these repairs and erect the new buildings without a special campaign.

We have one hundred eighteen (118) children in the Home. The increased earning power of our people has made it possible for relatives to keep more of our dependent children in their homes. This should be an incentive for us to give more now and keep giving, as it shows that people will take care of children when they can, and when they find it impossible we should be ready to stop in and help prevent any child in our denomination coming to want.

### The educational program, both secular and religious, is paramount in our Home. Our children go to the city schools and to the First Baptist Church in They make their contribution to the life of the school and commun-

ity. We have three young people in Stetson this year. The Home always does its utmost to develop leadership in our boys and girls. They teach Sunday School classes, work in Training Union and assist in all phases of church life. A program for the development of our children and young people that majors on the scholastic ability of the child and the spiritual development of his soul is worthy of the support of every Christian

organiztaion as well as every individual everywhere.



However the reports indicate our Churches have not visualized the value of the Co-operative program, for last year only Nineteen churches, with a total of \$2,452.71 in gifts through the co-operative program.

The Southern Baptist Convention will celebrate its one hundredth anniversary of its organization May 1945. A great program 1. being planned, and a centennial Crusade is being launched seeking to complete, celebrate, climax, and crown the century for Christ.

The objectives of this crusade are Evangelism, Education, enlistments Stewardship, and Benevolence. We hope to win a million more souls to Christ, to enroll a million more in our Sunday Schools, Training Unions, W. M. U. Organizations, and Brotherhoods, to secure ten thousand volunteers for the ministery and definite christian service. To rebuild and enlarge our missionary work; and to secure a million Christian stewards giving self service; and substances to the kingdom of Christ.

In the promotion of this great crusade, all of our people are urged to give full length co-operation. The south wide all inclusive goal is Ten million dollars, which is approximately double the receipts of last year.

To help realize these high and hely objectives, we call upon all of our Churches and people:

- 1. To magnify the co-operative program for the financial support of all of our work.
- To make the centennial crusade with all of its objectives state and southwide a matter of constant prayer and effort.

### 23. Report on Ministerial Relief and Annuities read by the Moderator, Rev. T. M. Smiley, spoken to by Rev. Smiley. Report adopted.

We, your committee, beg to submit the following report of the work of the Relief and Annuity Board. The growth of this Board has been steady and constant since it was founded in 1918. Its ministry of service has grown to such extent that protection against age and infirmity is offered to all those gainfully employed in our complex denominational life. About 10,000 now enjoy this protection and the number is increasing by many hundred each year.

### Pertinant Facts:

Investments: The investments of the Board are in excellent condition. The Board earned 4.22% on its total investments for the year 1943. The Board is actively supporting the war effort by purchasing U. S. Government Bonds. It now has \$1,200,000.00 invested in these bonds.

Relief Department: It being more blessed to give than receive. They who administer the funds of the relief department had a happy year in 1943. Increased contributions from the churches through the cooperative program made possible two note-worthy achievements. First, every beneficiary on our roll received two extra checks during the year. Second, no application for aid, properly attested, was denied. Twelve hundred aged workers, many with no other source of income, look to Southern Baptists and to the Relief Fund of your Board. We must not fail them.

The Centennial Crusade and Beyond: Our immediate goal is ten thousand preachers in the Ministers Retirement Plan together with their churches by the preachers in the Ministers Retirement Fian together with their churches by the Centennial Convention in Atlanta, May, 1945. In addition we aim to provide security for every denominational worker, lay as well as ordained. Our various plans will embrace all institutions, boards, and agencies of the convention. There is a place for every individual. Every local Baptist Church owes such protection to every salaried worker as well as to its pastor.

### STATE MISSIONS

- S tate Missions is the active work of Baptists carrying out the Great Commission of a given State; Florida being our own field of labor.
- T raining Union, Sunday School, Woman's Missionary Union, Baptist Student Union, Brotherhood, Administration and Finance and Account Departments are made possible through the State Mission Budget of our Convention.
- A "Little Child Shall Lead Them." The Arcadia Children's Home is one of Florida Baptists' greatest assets. No better place could our State Mission money be used than in the investment of these lives.
- T he Promotional Workers among our Associations are doing a good job. They promote our State Mission program in all of its phases. We now have six of these men connected with the Board.
- E very Florida Baptist home should have a weekly visit from our State Paper, the Florida Baptist Witness. Home Mission, Foreign Mission and State Mission information is available through its pages. This paper is owned by the Florida Baptist Convention but edited and managed by Dr. E. D. Solomon.
- M issionaries in four Florida CITIES: Tampa, Jacksonville, Pensacola and Miami, are being supported jointly by our State Mission Board and the Home Mission Board. New Churches are being organized by these men and mission work in general administered under their direction.
- I ndians in the Glades Section are being given the opportunity to know Christ as their Saviour through the efforts of Willie King. His headquarters are at Okeechobee. Also Rev. Stanley Smith of Dania is a new comer to our State. Both of these men are working among the Seminole indians their own race.
- S ouls for the Kingdom is the effort of Southern Baptists this year. One Million souls won to Christ is the goal. Florida will certainly want to do her best along this line.
- S ervices are made possible in a number of our Florida Churches because of the financial assistance given the pastors by our Board. Many Churches also make loans from the State Mission Board to help carry out their building programs. A number of gifts have been made outright this past year to mission stations in order that they might form themselves into churches and carry on the work more adequately.
- 1 s Your Church behind cur Denominational Program? State Missions promote the whole program, so lets be State Mission minded!
- O ur System of Missions is of the finest type we believe, because it reaches the native peoples of the State, thereby helping to keep them informed as to our Denomination.
- N egro Christian Education is being encouraged by monthly contributions to the Florida Normal and Industrial Institute at St. Augustine, which is a negro Baptist College. We also assist each year the negro Seminary at Lakeland
- S tetson University, our Baptist College of Florida, is in a Campaign to raise \$1,000,000 for endowment purposes. Christian education should be encouraged now as never before. Lets remember Stetson!

### HOME MISSIONS

The Home Mission Board now has 514 missionaries working in 1050 churches and mission stations in every state in the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention and in Cuba and Central America. In 1943 these missionaries preached 36,000 sermons, led more than 12,000 to make a profession of faith in Christ and received 8,200 members into the fellowship of Baptist Churches. Seventy-four missionaries have been added since January 1, 1943.

We rejoice that the debt which so burdened the Board for many years has been paid and the freedom from debt has made possible an enlarged Missionary Program. Missionaries of the Board are working among the Spanish, Indians, Frach, Italians, Negroes, Jews, Deaf, Chinese, Japanese, Mountaiy Peoples and underprivileged groups. Workers are supported in mission churches, good-will centers, kindergartens, rescue homes, preachers institutes, and in house to house evangelism. The Board has cooperated with the government by certifying 1139 Southern Baptist preachers for the chaptaincy.

The Home Mission Board is now cooperating with the respective state mission boards in the selection and support of workers for the City Mission Program and the Country Church Program. Work is now being done in thirty-one cities and rural workers are serving in this cooperative effort in six states. Never have the Baptists of the Southland been so challenged by the task to be accomplished and by the opportunities for Missionary service. Think of the evangelistic opportunities in the Southland! Of a population of 45,000,000, about 20,000,000 have come to the years of accountability without a profession of faith in Christ.

To meet this challenge, the year of 1945, which is the Centennial Year of the Southern Baptist Convention, has been designated as a time for a special Southwide evangelistic campaign. Other Southwide Boards and Agencies are Joining the Home Mission Board to make this an all-out soul winning effort. Dr. M. E. Dodd, Pastor of the First Baptist Church of Shreveport, has been chosen to lead in this great crusade for souls. Every Association will be asked to cooperate. Pastors and laymen alike are asked to consecrate themselves and dedicate their talents and resources to this great soul winning effort.

The Home Mission Board desires to thank Southern Baptists for their fine spirit of cooperation and their increased support and to ask that they continue to pray for the workers of this Board and especially for the special evangelistic effort that is being planned for our Centennial Year.

### FOREIGN MISSIONS

As the day of victory draws nearer in this tragic war. Southern Baptists face the greatest missionary needs in their history. The fact that the whole world is being ravaged by war does not minimize, but rather intensifies, our missionary obligations. The world needs the gospel message more that ever before.

During the dark days of the present, the Foreign Mission Board has been proparing for the dawn of a new day in world missions. Early in 1943 the indebtedness of the Board, which at one time had exceeded \$1.620,000, including some debts in mission lands, was paid in full. We are glad to report that a year later the Board had accumulated a reserve of approximately \$1,000,000,00. Every dollar of this and far more will be needed, when the war closes, to rebuild our missionary work in Europe and in the Orient. We are also glad to report that since. December 1937, Southern Baptists have given \$1,340,820,14 for relief purposes around the world.

Southern Baptists have mission work in seventeen countries: China. Japan. Africa. Brazil. Argentina. Chile, Uruguay. Colombia. Mexico. Hungary. Italy. Rumania. Soain. Yugoslavia. Palestine. Syria. Hawaii with plans to enter Paracous when the was is open. While we are shut out of Occupied China for the present, the work one in that area by native churches continues with fidelity unsurpassed in missionary annals. Glorious reports come of evangelistic labors in Free China. Last December 1, thirty-nine of our missionaries from occupied China came home on the Gripsholm.

Since April 1943, fifty-two missionaries have been appointed to Southern Baptist foreign mission fields. At the close of the war we should double the number of our active missionaries to meet the incomparable needs and opportunities. We pray the Lord of the Harvest that he will send forth laborers into the harvest field. In the Kim'dom of God we should at least match the suirit and devotion of men who have volunteered for military service. The Foreign Mission Board now has 502 missionaries in active service.

These species constitute a manner to the health moral and spiritual life, to These agencies constitute a menace to the health, moral and spiritual life of our

We, of the Suwannec Baptist Association, must face the facts about this sordid condition as it exists in our towns and communities. It is reported that there are more open saloons and places where intoxicating drinks are sold, in Live Oak, than any other town of its size in Central Florida.

It is high time that the righteous forces rise up and challenge these unrighteous agencies which are imposing these tragedies upon us. It is time to declare ourselves and "Touch not, taste not, and handle not, the unclean thing."

### REPORT ON WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

The Woman's Missionary Union of the Association, has endeavored even in the face of this Global war, to keep the torch of Missionary interest and giving, burning brightly through our Churches and societies.

In some respects our Associational work has progressed most splendidly. We have twelve societies with an enrollment of 331 and 12 auxiliaries with an enrollment of 94. In view of the far reaching and effective ministry of the Woman's Missionary Union, in disseminating missionary information and teaching the Bible plan of giving especially to our women and young neople, should be a challenge to all of our Churches to enlist the women and Children in the organization of Societies and Auxiliaries.

Gifts for the year have shown a slight increase over last year. Through the co-operative program we have given \$850.00 and for all other causes \$1,392.47 a grand total of \$2,242.54. If the other Churches had been organized and working, what a difference this one phase of our work would have shown.

Associational meetings have been limited due to war restrictions on travel, but we have held the March rully at the Mt. Olive Church, which was well attended. Mrs. J. L. Rosser, our State president was our guest speaker for the day, and brought a most inspiring message. We also had charge of the afternoon program during the fifth Sunday meeting in July, during which Miss Elizabeth Provence was our guest speaker.

It is our plan and hope that the new year might see the lifting of war clouds, and the restrictions which have been imposed upon our work, and we might be able to return to the normal endeavors of growing great missionary Unions in all of our Churches.

Since the annual meeting of Woman's Missionary Union, will not be held until next week we are not able to give as full and complete a report as we might. We urge that a large attendance of our pastors as well as members be present next Wednesday for our meeting during which Miss Alva Grayson, missionary to China and Miss Elizabeth Provence will be our guest Speakers.

### REPORT ON TRAINING UNION

In the brief existence of the Baptist Training Union as p department of our great denominational family of agencies, none has so completely justified and distinguished itself in supplying a definite need for training and enlistment in our Churches. The Training Union occupies a distinct place in the Church, yet it is essentially a part of the whole. Above all else, the Training Union is seeking to know and do God's will in these times. "Thy Will Be Done" is our theme for 1944.

Our State Training Union Department, with Mr. O. K. Radford, Secretary, offers the services of his office in planning study courses, organizing new unions, and assisting Churches in securing well trained workers to assist the local Church in conducting Training Courses and organizing new work.

In our Association, we have nine Churches with a total of twenty-seven unions and story hours, which leaves twenty churches without any kind of training service. No Church can ever rise higher than its leadership. Leaders are not born, they are made. The Baptist Training Union is the only agency in our Churches equipped, to make and prepare out of the membership, leaders and workers to carry forward the work of our Master effectively and efficiently.

During the year we have had three Associational Meetings. We had charge of the afternoon program at the Fifth Sunday Meeting in April, at which time our Sword Drill Contestant was chosen to represent us at the Assembly in DeLand, last June. Several of our Young People attended both the Assembly at DeLand and Ridgecrest.

We also had an Associational-wide week of Training and Study Courses last November, in which 10 Churches participated. Mr. Hawley Ridenour, assistant to Mr. Radford, was with us and led in the work. We are planning another week along the same line for the near future.

We urge and recommend that every Church in our Association plan to have one or more weeks for Study Courses, and Churches without Training Unions proceed as soon as possible with the Organization.
