CHURCH COVENANT

"Having been led, as we believe, by the Spirit of God to receive the Lord Jesus Christ as our Saviour, and on the profession of our faith, having been baptised in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, we do now in the presence of God, angels, and this assembly, most solemnly and joyfully enter into Covenant with one another, as one body in Christ."

"We engage therefore, by the aid of the Holy Spirit, to walk together in Christian love; to strive for the advancement of this Church in Knowledge, holiness, and comfort; to promote its prosperity and spirituality, to sustain its worship, ordinances, discipline, and doctrines; to contribute cheerfully and regularly to the support of the ministry, the expenses of the Church, the relief of the poor, and the spread of the goesal through all potions." and the spread of the gospel through all nations.'

"We also engage to maintain family and secret devotion; to religiously educate our children; to seek the salvation of our kindred and acquaintances; to walk circumspectly in the world; to be just in our dealings, faithful in our engagements, and exemplary in our deportment; to avoid all tattling, backbiting, and excessive anger. To abstain from the sale and use of intoxicating drinks and beverages, and to be zealous in our efforts to advance the kingdom of our Saviour."

"We further engage to watch over one another in brotherly love; to remember each other in prayer, to aid each other in sickness and distress; to cultivate Christian sympathy in feeling and courtesy in speech; to be slow to take offense, but always ready for reconciliation, and mindful of the rules of our Saviour to secure it without delay."

"We moreover engage that when we move from this place, we will as soon as possible unite with some other church, where we can carry out the Spirit of this Covenant and the principles of God's Word.'

ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. OF THE SCRIPTURES

We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men Divinely inspired, and a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its Author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture of error for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us; and therefore is, and shall remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and opinions should be tried.

2. OF THE TRUE GOD

We believe that there is One, and only One living and true God, an Infinite, intelligent Spirit, Whose Name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of Heaven and Earth; inexpressibly glorious in Holiness, and worthy of all possible honor, confidence and love; that in the Unity of the Godhead there are Three Persons, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost; equal in every Divine Perfection, and executing distinct but harmonious Offices in the great work of Redemption.

3. OF THE FALL OF MAN

We believe that Man was created in holiness, under the law of his Maker; but by voluntary transgression fell from that holy and happy state; in consequence of which all Mankind are now sinners, not by constraint but choice; being by nature utterly void of that holiness required by the law of God; positively inclined to evil; and therefore under just condemnation to eternal ruin, without defense or excuse.

4. OF THE WAY OF SALVATION

We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of Grace; through the Mediatorial office of the Son of God; Who by the appointment of the Father, freely took upon Him our nature, yet without our sin; honored the Divine law by His Personal obedience, and by His death made a full Atonement for our sins; that having risen from the dead. He is now enthroned in heaven; and uniting in his wonderful Ferson the tenderest sympathies with Divine Perfections, He is every way qualified to be a suitable, a compassionate, and all-sufficient Saviour.

5. OF JUSTIFICATION

We believe that the great Gospel blessing which Christ secures to such as believe in Him is Justification; that Justification includes the pardon of sin, and the promise of eternal life on prnciples of righteousness; that it is bestowed, not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Faith in the Redeemer's Blood; by virtue of which faith His Perfect righteousness is freely imputed to us of God; that it brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every other blessing needful for time and eternity.

6. OF THE FREEDOM OF SALVATION

We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all by the Gospel; that it is the immediate duty of all to accept them by a cordial penitent and obedient faith; and that nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner on earth, but his own inherent depravity and voluntary rejection of the Gospel; which involves him in an aggravated condemnation.

7. OF GRACE IN REGENERATION

We believe that in order to be saved, sinners must be regenerated, or born again; that regeneration consists in giving a holy disposition to the mind; that it is effected in a manner above our comprehenson by the power of the Holy Spirit, in connection with Divine truth, so as to secure our voluntary obedience to the Gospel; and that its proper evidence apears in the holy fruits of repentance, and faith, and newness of life.

8. OF REPENTANCE AN DEAITH

We believe that Repentance and Faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable Graces, wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God; whereby being deeply convinced of our guilt, danger and helplessness, and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession, and supplication for mercy; at the same time heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ for our Prophet. Priest and King, and relying on Him alone as the Only and All-sufficient Saviour.

9. OF GOD'S PURPOSE OF GRACE

We believe that Election is the Eternal purpose of God, according to which He graciously regenerates, sanctifies, and saves sinners; that being perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, it comprehends all the means in connection with the end; that it is a most glorious display of God's Sovereign Goodness, being Infinitely free, wise, holy and unchangeable; that it utterly excludes boasting, and promotes humility, love, prayer, praise, trust in God, and active imitation of His free mercy; that it encourages the use of means in the highest degree; that it may be ascertained by its effects in all who truly believe the Gospel; that it is the foundation of Christian assurance; and that to ascertain it with regard to ourselves demands and deserves the utmost diligence.

10. OF SANCTIFICATION

We believe that Sanctification is the process by which, according to the Will of God, we are made partakers of His Holiness; that it is a progressive work; that it is begun in regeneration; and that it is carried on in the hearts of believers by the presence and power of the Holy Spirit, the Sealer and Comforter, in the continual use of the appointed means—especially, the Word of God, self-examinatoin, self-denial, watchfulness and prayer.

11. OF THE PERSEVERANCE OF SAINTS

We believe that such only are real believers as endure unto the end; that their persevering attachment to Christ is the grand mark which distinguishes them from superficial professors; that a special Providence watches over their welfare; and they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

12. OF THE HARMONY OF THE LAW AND THE GOSPEL

We believe that the Law of God is the eternal and unchangeable rule of His moral government; that it is holy, just and good; and that the inability which the Scriptures ascribe to fallen men to fulfill its precepts, arises entirely from their love of sin; to delive them from which, and to restore them through a Mediator to unfeigned obedience to the Law, is one great end of the Gospel, and of the Means of Grace connected with the establishment of the visible Church.

13. OF THE GOSPEL CHURCH

We believe that a visible Church of Christ is a Congregation of baptized believers, associated by Covenant in the faith and fellowship of the Gospel; observing the Ordinances of Christ; governed by His Laws; and exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His Word; that its only Scriptural officers are Bishops or Pastors and Deacons, whose qualifications, claims, and duties are defined in the Epistles to Timothy and Titus.

14. OF BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER

We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion in water of a believer, into the Name of Father, and Son, and Holy Ghost; to show forth in a solemn and beautiful emblem, our faith in the crucified, buried, and risen Saviour, with its effects, in our death to sin and resurrection to a new life; that it is a pre-requisite to the privilege of a Church relation; and to the Lord's Supper, in which the members of the Church by the sacred use of bread and wine, are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ; preceded always by solemn self-examination.

15. OF THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH

We believe that the first day of the week is the Lord's Day, or Christian Sabbath; and is to be kept sacred to religious purposes, by abstaining from all secular labor and sinful recreations, by the devout observance of all the means of Grace, both private and public; and by preparation for that rest that remaineth for the people of God.

16. OF CIVIL GOVERNMENT

We believe that Civil Government is of Divine appointment, for the interests and good order of human society; and that magistrates are to be prayed for, conscientiously honored, and obeyed; except only in things opposed to the Will of our Lord Jesus Christ, Who is the only Lord of the conscience, and the Prince of the kings of the earth.

17. OF THE RIGHTEOUS AND THE WICKED

We believe that there is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and the wicked; that such only as through faith are justified in the Name of the Lord Jesus, and sanctified by the Spirit of Our God, are truly righteous in His esteem; while all such as continue in impentitence and unbelief are in His sight wicked, and under the curse; and this distinction holds among men both in and after death.

18. OF THE WORLD TO COME

We believe that the end of this world is approaching; that at the Last Day, Christ will descend from heaven, and raise the dead from the grave to final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment, and the righteous to endless joy; and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of men in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

CONSTITUTION

Article 1-Name

This Organization shall be known as the SUWANNEE MIS-SIONARY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

Article 2-Purpose

The Purpose of this Association shall be: To furnish a medium of Co-operation for the Churches of the Association in their Divinely commissioned work of Missions, Education, and Benevolences; and to this end we seek to bring into co-operative fellowship the energies of our Churches; and to secure the moral and financial support of our Churches for the Objects and Institutions fostered by the Florida Baptist Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

Article 3-Churches

The Constituents of this Association shall be Missionary Baptist Churches of regular order, presenting petitionary letters from other Associations in due form; and Churches which may be constituted within the bounds of the Association, presenting proper credentials of organization and Articles of Faith, accompanied by properly accredited Messengers.

Article 4-Messengers

This Association shall be composed of Messengers holding membership in the Churches which constitute the Association; these Messengers having been duly elected by their respective Churchs on the following basis: Each Church shall be entitled to Three Messengers without reference to their numerical strength: and one additional Messenger for each Twenty-five members or fraction thereof, after it has attained a membership of Fifty members.

Article 5-Officers

The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, a Vice-Moderator, a Clerk and Treasurer; who shall be elected annually on the second day of each Annual meeting of the Association. The Moderator and Vice-Moderator shall serve from the close of one Annual Session to the close of the next Annual Session. The Clerk and Treasurer, however, shall take office sixty days from the close of the Annual Session and serve until sixty days after the close of the next Annual Session. The offices of Clerk and Treasurer shall be held by the same person and no person shall be elected Moderator for more than two consecutive years.

Article 6-Meetings

- 1. This Association shall meet Annually at such Date. Time and Place as the Association shall have selected at its last Annual Session
- 2. In addition to the Annual Meeting, there shall be held an Inspirational Meeting each Fifth Sunday; the Time, Place, and Program to be provided for by the Executive Committee.
- 3. In the event of an emergency, the Executive Committee is authorized to make changes in the Time and Place for the Annual Meeting, as will best serve the interests of the Association.

Article 7-Amendments

The Constitution and By-Laws of the Association may be amended at any Annual Meeting of the Association, by a two-thirds majority vote of the Messengers.

BY-LAWS

Section 1-Duties of Officers

- 1. The Duties of the Moderator shall be to preside, preserve order, and appoint all Committees not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.
- 2. The duties of the Vice-Moderator shall be to assist the Moderator; and to preside in the absence of, or at the request of, the Moderator.
- 3. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the Association; supervise the printing and distribution of the minutes; keep a regular file of the published proceedings of the Association; and deliver same with other material belonging to the office to his successor.

The Clerk shall send to the clerks of the Churches of the Association the Associational Letter Form Blanks thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting; also the material to the chairmen of the Standing Committees, who are to submit reports of our work at the Annual Session.

The Clerk shall notify after the adjournment of the Association, all Persons, Committees, and Chairmen and Standing Committees, of their elections or appointments of service.

The Clerk shall receive remuneration for his service, the sum to be fixed by the Association at each Annual Meeting; also he shall receive additional funds from the Association for the expenses of his office.

- 4. The Treasurer shall keep a correct record of all Associational Funds received and disbursed by his office and shall submit a record of all transactions of his office to the Executive Meeting at their quarterly meeting and to the Association at its Annual Meeting. The Treasurer shall be the Chairman of the Finance Committee.
- 5. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be to transact all business of the Association between its Annual Meetings; and a written report of its work shall be submitted to the association at the Annual Session.

The Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and Clerk of the Association shall serve as Chairman, Vice-Chairman and Secretary of the Executive Committee between the Annual Sessions of the Association,

In the event a vacancy occurs in any office of the Association between the Annual Meetings; the Executive Committee is authorized to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term of office; if not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.

Section 2—Committees

1. The Standing Committees of the Association shall be: 1—American Bible Society; 2—Associational Missions; 3—Brotherhood; 4—Christian Education; 5—Christian Literature; 6—Cooperative Program; 7—Digest of Letters; 8—Evangelism; 9—Finance; 10—Florida Baptist Children's Home; 11—Ministerial Relief and Annuities; 12—Missions; 13—Music; 14—Nominations;

15—Obituaries; 16—Radio; 17—Resolutions; 18—Social Service; 19—Sunday School; 20—Training Union; 21—Vacation Bible School; 21—Woman's Missionary Union.

Section 3-Committees. Appointment of

- 1. All Standing Committees shall consist of Three Members: who shall be appointed by the Moderator; the Chairman being selected in advance; the others at each Annual Session.
- All Special Committees shall consist of not less than Three nor more than Five Members; who shall be appointed by the Moderator.
- 3. The Committee on Order of Business shall consist of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and Clerk.
- 4. The Executive Committee of this Association shall be composed of:
- One member from each church elected by the church and reported to the association in the regular church letter each year.
 - 2. The pastor of each and every church in the association.
 - 3. The presiding officer of each associational organization.

The Executive Committee shall meet quarterly, at a time and place that may be decided by the committee itself.

The officers of the Executive Committee, together with the presiding officers of the associational organizations, shall constitute a Steering Committee that shall have the power to transact any business of the association that may be necessary during the time between the regular meeting of the Executive Committee; providing, that in the event the association is not organized as indicated above, then the Steering Committee shall be composed of the officers of the Executive Committee and four other such members of the Executive Committee as shall be elected by the Executive Committee.

The Steering Committee shall meet once each month or as often as the Chairman may call it into session.

Section 4—Committees. Duties Of

- 1. The duties of the Standing Committees and the Special Committees, shall be those which are commonly understood, and observed by Baptist Associations and Conventions, as suggested by their names.
- The duties of the Committee on the Order of Business shall be to prepare the Program for each Annual Meeting; and to select the Speakers not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.
 - 3. The duties of the Nominating Committee shall be:

To name the Time and Place for the Annual Meeting.

To name the Preachers and Alternates for the Annual Introductory and Missionary Sermons.

All nominations subject to adoption by the Association.

Section 5

The Association shall have an Introductory and a Missionary Sermon at each Annual Meeting, on the first and second days respectively; the hours for the sermons to be provided for in the order of Business.

Section 6

The fiscal year of the Association shall begin October first of each year, and end September thirty of the following year, both dates inclusive; and all reports to the Association shall conform to these dates.

Section 7

All written reports of Committees shall be limited to a maximum of six hundred words; and the Clerk is authorized if necessary, to edit reports to conform to this word limitation.

Sectin 8

When a Church fails to send an Annual letter, the Clerk shall use the report of the previous year, with reference only to record of membership of Church and organizations.

Section 9

The Clerks of the Churches are requested to get their letter to the Associational Clerk as early as possible.

Section 10

The Parliamentary Law which shall be used by this Association in the government of its business proceedings, shall be Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law.

It is also understood, that this Association shall ever adhere to the Principles and Practices of recognized Baptist Policies in all its Proceedings, its Methods and its Word.

The building will house the Ministerial Association, the YWA the Volunteer Band, and the Baptist Student Union Executive Council.

The college day will begin with the strains of hymns sung at Morning Watch and will close with the hymns of the Vesper Services which are a vital part of the religious program at Stetson.

Southern Baptist own and operate the finest Religious Schools in the world. The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville, Ky .: the Southwest Baptist Theolgical Seminary in Ft. Worth Texas; the New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary in New Orleans, La.; the Golden Gate Baptist Theological Seminary, San Francisco Calif.: the Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, Wake Forest, N. AND FOREIGN MISSIONS"

In Florida, State Missions has an important place in Baptist life We employ 38 full-time missionaries for Florida. They are busy teaching, preaching, directing assemblies, organizing missions and new churches, and other worthy missionary objects of our donomination.

State Missions, provides for the care of homeless children, aiding 2,000 students in securing an education, provides for the education and training of more than one hundred ministerial students and assist some two hundred others who are proparing for full-time Christian service and for missions fields.

We are intirely too slow in our state in recognizing the challanges that are ours. Now missions fields need to be opened in our own state, now churches need to be established. The Advance Program of the kingdom of God in Florida waits on a proper understanding and rightful undergirding of our State Mission Program. If our churches will do everything possible to help promote our State Mission Program Program, Both in volunteer work and in a financial way, we will be ready for the Advance Program.

The Home Mission Program is majoring on Evangelism for the next five years, of which this year is a part of what program. We were not satisfied with the report of 1949, of 334,862 baptisms. Add to that 4,893 professions reported by Baptist Chaplains also home missionaries reported 35,913 conversions.

During the year reports showed 165 new churches coonstituted and 577 new missions opened. Fifty new buildings were either completed or were under construction. Fifty-four pieces of home mission property were inproved, Appropriations for building projects during the year amounted to \$751,896.85.

A total of 779 regular missions served the Home Mission Board during the year and 251 summer students workers gave ten weeks of mission service. Missionaries contacted 177,139 in personal work, delivered 81,039 sermons, taught 22,987 classes conducted, 817 revivals, distributed 57,519 Bibles and made 258,818 religious visits.

There are 21,000,000 people in areas served by the Board who are not within easy reach of any Baptist church that can serve them. Within this tive-year period an effort will be made to lead in constituting 5,000 new churches and 10,000 new mission stations. A survey reveals a need far in excess of this goal. The work among the langue goups, underprivileged, juvenile delinquents, migrants, and isolated people will receive special emphasis Effects to reach the 1,500.00 "unattached" Baptistsm to revitalize 1,000 inactive country churches, and to create a greater loyalty on the part of all our constituency are included in the Five-year Crusade goals.


To accomplish these tasks, the home Mission Board will need 1,027 missionaries (an increase of 248,) and annual operating budget of \$2,000,000., and a total of \$3,500,000, to meet capital needs.

Foreign Missions are meeting the needs of a lost and dying world to the very best of their ability.

Foreign missionaries reported a total of 13,322 baptisms during the year 1949 a reasonable estimate for China, from which no report was received, would bring the total to approximately 15,000.

The Board appointed 67 new missionaries during the year of 1949. Fifty have been appointed during the first four months of 1950. The total number of active foreign missionaries new under appointment is 753. Missionaries are stationed in 24 countries and assist national Baptists in several more.

24



Foreign Mission Board receipts for 1949 totaled \$5,319,261.04, not including \$120,354.15 received for world relief.

A new project has been institued in Foreign Missions, for the first time Southern Baptist are using mission airplanes for transportation. The two in use are both in Brazil one based at Corrente and the other at Fortaloza. Distances once requiring weeks of boat or muleback travel are covered in a few hours by plain.

A co-operative farm is being established at Petach Tikva, near Tel Aviv, Israel, by a group of Baptists of Slavic origin aided by Southern Baptist.

In reality the Southern Baptist are not on the march in a State, Home and Foreign Mission Program, instead are realizing day by day that we are in a World Wide Mission Program, beginning in the local church.

REPORT ON AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

The American Bible Society has been a mighty force in kingdom building; in that it has given the Word of God a wider circulation.

The Society is a non-profit organization publishing the scriptures in numerous languages and dialects. It distributes them in almost every nation at cost or below.

Although other Faiths are supporting the Society, Baptist can and are glad to help because it prints and makes the Word without comment.

It is not too late in Japan! The people are eager to read the Bible in their own languageg. The ways for effective is distribution of the Scriptions are open now!

General MacArthur has asked for 10,000,000 volumes of the Scriptures for Japan at once and has also urged a permanent program for furnishing the Bible of the people of "every village and hamlet in the land". Since V-J Day in 1945 the American Bible Society has supplied to Japan over 4,000,000 copies of the Scriptures.

But this is only a beginning. The Bible is Japan's spiritual armanent. Will be there "too late with too little" The answer to that question depends on the Christian people of America.

The American Bible Society, with the help of the Japan Bible Society, can print and distribute in Japan 3,000,000 Japanese Scriptures in 1950 and 5,000,000 Japanese Scriptures in 1951, if it receives only \$500,000 for this purpose—a small sum to match such an opportunity.

Thus far singers of the "Good Will book," the book of signatures to be presented in dramatic ceremonies in Japan in November, have given over \$100,000. Other designated gifts for Japan thus far in 1950 amount to over \$60,000. We still need \$340,000 for the Japan Program!

The American Bible Society has an effective, economical, permanent program for Scripture work in Japan. Already 85 coloporteurs of the Japan Bible Society are traveling over Japan by bicycle, selling the Japanese New Testaments and Bibles. Yes, selling!—Selling at the price the people can afford to pay. Your gifts make up the difference.

If he has no money to buy and is eager to read he is, of course, given a Gospel or New Testament or Bible.

The Society knows from long experience that a complete "give-away program on a mission field is haphazard and wasteful of Christian gifts."

The American Bible Society program works through the Japan Bible Society. The project is one of the Japanese people. This means the Bible is not offered as an American book, but as God's Book for all people.

Just think of it—for only \$500.00 a total of 8.000,000 volumes can go out in such effective distribution that there is reasonable assurance every volume will be read by at least one person—often by many more.

Every penny received by sale remains with the Japan Bible Society for future Bible Production No money comes back to the American Society. This means the establishing of permanent Bible production by Japanese people.

We recommend that the churches of our Association support the American Bible Society.

MUSIC REPORT

The work of Music in the Southern Baptist Convention, The state of Florida, and our Association has progressed marvelously in the past twelve months. We have seen the publication of several more of the Music Training Course books which were greatly needed to carry on the work of training our Church Musicians. In addition to this there has come from the presses of the Baptist Sunday School Board in Nashville, the first issue of our own Baptist Music Magazine. It is known as "The Church Musician". The first issue was October 1st. This magazine is to be published monthly and may be ordered along with all other Sunday School and Training Union literature, on the order blanks now being sent out from the Sunday School Board. This magazine should be in the hands of every Pastor, every Church Music Director, Church Organist or Pianist, every month, It will have 32 pages, plus cover and we heartily recommend it to our people. The use of the magazine will keep many of our people from desiring the use of inferior publiciations that are coming from commercial presses day by day.

Florida. The Music-Brotherhood Department of our State Convention has been fostering a Music education program in many churches, has taken workers into several churches during the year, has led in providing leadership conferences and Associational Schools of Music. It has sponsored Music Camp for Young People and provide Music in Assemblies. Six regional Music Festivals were held in the spring, culminated by the State Music Festival held at Stetson University. This idea is to be carried out on a larger scale in 1951. We urge our Churches to participate in these activities.

The Music program of our Association has progressed nicely during the past year. We have had five schools of Music, one in Live Oak and one in Bright Pond taught by Miss Mary Etta Gatlin, Schools were held at Mt. Pisgah, Union, and Friendship with W. P. Ganus as teacher.

We plan to have at least one school of music next year for all Music Directors and Pianist of the Association and as many other Schools as possible.

Since the State Brotherhood is encouraging and backing the Musical Program of the State, we urge the Brotherhood of this Association to back the Musical Program of the Suwannee Association, because we believe the Music Program is just as important as any other organization of the Association.
