Church Covenant

"Having been led, as we believe, by the Spirit of God to receive the Lord Jesus Christ as our Saviour, and on the profession of our faith, having been baptized in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, we do now in the presence of God, angels and this assembly, most solemnly and joyfully enter into Covenant with one another, as one body in Christ."

"We engage therefore, by the aid of the Holy Spirit, to walk together in Christian love; to strive for the advancement of this Church in knowledge, holiness, and comfort; to promote its prosperity and spiritually, to sustain its worship, ordinances, discipline, and doctrines; to contribute cheerfully and regularly to the support of the ministry, the expenses of the Church, the relief of the poor, and the spread of the gospel through all nations."

"We also engage to maintain family and secret devotion; to religiously educate our children; to seek the salvation of our kindred and acquaintances; to walk circumspectly in the world; to be just in our dealings, faithful in our engagements, and exemplary in our deportment; to avoid all tattling, backbiting, and excessive anger. To abstain from the sale and use of intoxicating drinks and beverages, and to be zealous in our efforts to advance the kingdom of our Saviour."

"We further engage to watch over one another in brotherly love; to remember each other in prayer, to aid each other in sickness and distress; to cultivate Christian sympathy in feeling and courtesy in speech; to be slow to take offense, but always ready for reconciliation, and mindful of the rules of our Saviour to secure it without delay."

"We moreover engage that when we move from this place, we will as soon as possible unite with some other church, where we can carry out the Spirit of this Covenant and the principles of God's Word."

ARTICLES OF FAITH**1. OF THE SCRIPTURES**

We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men Divinely inspired, and a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its Author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture of error for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us; and therefore is, and shall remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and opinions should be tried.

2. OF THE TRUE GOD

We believe that there is One, and only One living and true God, an Infinite, intelligent Spirit, Whose Name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of Heaven and Earth; inexpressly glorious in Holiness, and worthy of all possible honor, confidence and love; that in the Unity of the Godhead there are Three Persons, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost; equal in every Divine Perfection, and executing distinct but harmonious Offices in the great work of Redemption.

3. OF THE FALL OF MAN

We believe that Man was created in holiness, under the law of his Maker; but by voluntary transgression fell from that holy and happy state; in consequence of which all Mankind are now sinners, not by constraint but choice; being by nature utterly void of that holiness required by the law of God; positively inclined to evil; and therefore under just condemnation to eternal ruin, without defense or excuse.

4. OF THE WAY OF SALVATION

We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of Grace; through the Mediatorial office of the Son of God; Who by the appointment of the Father, freely took upon Him our nature, yet without our sin; honored the Divine law by His Personal obedience, and by His death made a full Atonement for our sins; that having risen from the dead, He is now enthroned in heaven; and uniting in His wonderful Person the tenderest sympathies with Divine Perfections, He is every way qualified to be a suitable, a compassionate, and all-sufficient Saviour.

5. OF JUSTIFICATION

We believe that the great Gospel blessing which Christ secures to such as believe in Him is Justification; that Justification includes the pardon of sin, and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness; that is bestowed, not in consideration of any works or righteousness which we have done, but solely through Faith in the Redeemer's Blood; by virtue of which faith His Perfect righteousness is freely imputed to us of God; that it brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every other blessing needful for time and eternity.

6. OF THE FREEDOM OF SALVATION

We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all by the Gospel; that it is the immediate duty of all to accept them by a cordial penitent and obedient faith; and that nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner on earth, but his own inherent depravity and voluntary rejection of the Gospel; which involves him in an aggravated condemnation.

7. OF GRACE IN REGENERATION

We believe that in order to be saved, sinners must be regenerated, or be born again; that regeneration consists in giving a holy disposition to the mind; that it is effected in a manner above our comprehension by the power of the Holy Spirit, in connection with Divine truth, so as to secure our voluntary obedience to the Gospel; and that its proper evidence appears in the holy fruits of repentance, and faith, and newness of life.

8. OF REPENTANCE AND FAITH

We believe that Repentance and Faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable Graces, wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God; whereby being deeply convinced of our guilt, danger and helplessness, and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession, and supplication for mercy; at the same time heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ for our Prophet, Priest, and King, and relying on Him alone as the Only and All-sufficient Saviour.

9. OF GOD'S PURPOSE OF GRACE

We believe that Election is the Eternal purpose of God, according to which He graciously regenerates, sanctifies, and saves sinners; that being perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, it comprehends all the means in connection with the end; that it is a most glorious display of God's Sovereign Goodness, being Infinitely free, wise, holy, and unchangeable; that it utterly excludes boasting, and promotes humility, love, prayer, praise, trust in God, and active imitation of His free mercy; that it may be ascertained by its effects in all who truly believe the Gospel; that it is the foundation of Christian assurance; and that to ascertain it with regard to ourselves demands and deserves the utmost diligence.

10. OF SANCTIFICATION

We believe that Sanctification is the process by which, according to the Will of God, we are made partakers of His Holiness; that it is a progressive work; that it is begun in regeneration; and that it is carried on in the hearts of believers by the presence and power of the Holy Spirit, the Sealer and Comforter, in the continual use of the appointed means — especially, the Word of God, self-examination, self-denial, watchfulness, and prayer.

11. OF THE PERSEVERANCE OF SAINTS

We believe that such only are real believers as endure unto the end; that their persevering attachment to Christ is the grand mark which distinguishes them from superficial professors; that a special Providence watches over their welfare; and they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

12. OF THE HARMONY OF THE LAW AND THE GOSPEL

We believe that the Law of God is the eternal and unchangeable rule of His moral government; that it is holy just and good; and that the inability which the Scriptures ascribe to fallen men to fulfill it precepts, arises entirely from their love of sin; to deliver them from which, and to restore them through a Mediator to unfeigned obedience to the Law, is one great end of the Gospel, and of the Means of Grace connected with the establishment of the visible Church.

13. OF THE GOSPEL CHURCH

We believe that a visible Church of Christ is a Congregation of baptized believers, associated by Covenant in the faith and fellowship of the Gospel; observing the Ordinances of Christ; governed by His Laws; and exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His Word; that its only Scriptural officers are Bishops or Pastors and Deacons, whose qualifications, claims, and duties are defined in the Epistles to Timothy and Titus.

14. OF BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER

We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion in water of a believer, into the Name of the Father, and Son, and Holy Ghost; to show forth in a solemn and beautiful emblem our faith in the crucified, buried, and risen Saviour, with its effects, in our death to sin and resurrection to a new life; that it is a pre-requisite to the privilege of a Church relation; and to the Lord's Supper, in which the members of the Church by the sacred use of bread and wine, are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ; preceded always by solemn self-examination.

15. OF THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH

We believe that the first day of the week is the Lord's Day, or Christian Sabbath; and is to be kept sacred to religious purposes, by abstaining from all secular labor and sinful recreations, by the devout observance of all the means of Grace, both private and public; and by preparation for that rest that remaineth for the people of God.

16. OF CIVIL GOVERNMENT

We believe that Civil Government is of Divine appointment, for the interests and good order of human society; and that magistrates are to be prayed for, conscientiously honored, and obeyed; except only in things opposed to the Will of our Lord Jesus Christ, Who is the only Lord of the conscience, and the Prince of the kings of the earth.

17. OF THE RIGHTEOUS AND THE WICKED

We believe that there is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and the wicked; that such only as through faith are justified in the Name of the Lord Jesus, and sanctified by the Spirit of Our God, are truly righteous in His esteem; while all such as continue in impenitence and unbelief are in His sight wicked, and under the curse; and this distinction hold among men both in and after death.

18. OF THE WORLD TO COME

We believe that the end of this world is approaching; that at the Last Day, Christ will descend from heaven, and raise the dead from the grave to final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment, and the righteous to endless joy; and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of men in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

CONSTITUTION**Article 1—Name**

This Organization shall be known as the SUWANNEE MISSIONARY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

Article 2—Purpose

The Purpose of this Association shall be: To furnish a medium of co-operation for the Churches of the Association in their Divinely commissioned work of Missions, Education, and Benevolences; and to this end we seek to bring into co-operative fellowship the energies of our Churches for the Objects and Institutions fostered by the Florida Baptist Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

Article 3—Churches

The Constituents of this Association shall be Missionary Baptist Churches of regular order, presenting petitionary letters from other Associations in due form; and Churches which may be constituted within the bounds of the Association, presenting proper credentials of organization and Articles of Faith, accompanied by properly accredited Messengers.

Article 4—Messengers

This Association shall be composed of Messengers holding membership in the Churches which constitute the Association; these Messengers having been duly elected by their respective Churches on the following basis: Each Church shall be entitled to Three Messengers without reference to their numerical strength; and one additional Messenger for each Twenty-five members or fraction thereof, after it has attained a membership of Fifty members.

Article 5—Officers

The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, a Vice-Moderator, a Clerk and Treasurer: who shall be elected annually on the second day of each Annual meeting of the Association by nominations from the floor. The Moderator and Vice-Moderator shall serve from the close of the next Annual Session. The Clerk and Treasurer, however, shall take office sixty days from the close of the Annual Session. The offices of Clerk and Treasurer may be held by the same person and no person shall be elected Moderator for more than two consecutive years. No officer shall be elected unless he is present and in harmony with his nomination and his denomination.

Article 6—Meetings

1. This Association shall meet Annually at such Date, Time, and Place as the Association shall have selected at its last Annual Session.

2. In the event of an emergency, the Executive Committee is authorized to make changes in the Time and Place for the Annual Meeting, as will best serve the interests of the Association.

Article 7—Amendments

The constitution and By-Laws of the Association may be amended at any Annual Meeting of the Association, by a two-thirds majority vote of the Messengers.

BYLAWS**Section 1—Duties of Officers**

1. The Duties of the Moderator shall be to preside, preserve order, and appoint all Committees not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.

2. The Duties of the Vice-Moderator shall be to assist the Moderator; and to preside in the absence of, or at the request of, the Moderator.

3. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the Association; supervise the printing and distribution of the minutes; keep a regular file of the published proceedings of the Association; and deliver same with other material belonging to the office to his successor.

The Clerk shall send to the clerks of the Churches of the Association the Associational Letter Form Blanks thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting; also the material to the chairmen of the Standing Committees, who are to submit reports of our work at the Annual Session.

The Clerk shall notify after the adjournment of the Association, all Persons, Committees, and Chairmen and Standing Committees, of their elections or appointments of service.

The Clerk shall receive remuneration for his service, the sum to be fixed by the Association at each Annual Meeting; also he shall receive additional funds from the Association for the expenses of his office.

4. The Treasurer shall keep a correct record of all Associational Funds received and disbursed by his office and shall submit a record of all transactions of his office to the Executive Meeting at their quarterly meeting and to the Association at its Annual Meeting. The Treasurer shall be the Chairman of the Finance Committee.

5. The Duties of the Executive Committee shall be to transact all business of the Association between its Annual Meetings; and a written report of its work shall be submitted to the association.

In the event a vacancy occurs in any office of the Association between the Annual Meetings; the Executive Committee is authorized to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term of office; if not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and Bylaws.

Section 2—Committees

The Standing Committees of the Association shall be:
1—Middle Florida Baptist Assembly; 2—Associations Missions; 3—Budget and Finance; 4—Christian Education; 5—Christian Literature; 6—Committee on Committees; 7—Cooperative Program; 8—Digest of Letters; 9—Evangelism; 10—Florida Baptist Children's Home; 11—Ministerial Relief and Annuities; 12—Obituaries; 13—Publicity; 14—Resolutions; 15—United Christian Action; 16—Time, Place, and Preacher; 17—Baptist Hospital Charity Committee.

Section 3—Committees

1. All Standing Committees shall consist of a chairman and as many members as needed; who shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees, consisting of Moderator, Vice Moderator, and Clerk; these Committees shall be selected in advance and presented to the Association for its approval on the first day of its Annual Session.

2. All Special Committees shall consist of not less than Three nor more than Five Members; who shall be appointed by the Moderator.

3. The Committee on Order of Business shall consist of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and Clerk.

4. The Executive Committee of this Association shall be composed of:

- (1) One member from each church elected by the church and reported to the association in the regular church letter each year.
- (2) The pastor of each and every church in the association.
- (3) The presiding officer of each associational organization.
- (4) The member of the State Board of Missions.
- (5) The Field Secretary, All ministers of music, all ministers of Education and all retired ministers as advisory members. Advisory members do not have a vote but we welcome their ideas.

The Executive Committee shall meet quarterly, at a time and place that may be decided by the committee itself.

The officers of the Executive Committee, together with the presiding officers of the associational organizations shall constitute a Steering Committee that shall have the power to transact any business of the association that may be necessary during the time between the regular meeting of the Executive Committee; providing, that in the event the association is not organized as indicated above, then the Steering Committee shall be composed of the officers of the Executive Committee and four other such members of the Executive Committee as shall be elected by the Executive Committee.

The Steering Committee shall meet once each month or as often as the Chairman may call it into session.

Section 4—Committees, Duties of

1. The Duties of the Standing Committees and the Special Committees, shall be those which are commonly understood, and observed by Baptist Associations and Conventions, as suggested by their names.

2. The Duties of the Committee on the Order of Business shall be to prepare the Program for each Annual Meeting; and to select the Speakers not otherwise provided for in Constitution and Bylaws.

3. The Duties of the Committee on Time, Place, and Preacher, shall be to recommend to the Association while in session and to the Executive Committee interim if the need should arise. The date, time, and place of the next meeting of the Association, and the minister and his alternate who shall be selected to preach the Introductory Sermon and the Minister and his alternate who shall be selected to preach the Missionary Sermon.

4. Sunday School, Training Union, Brotherhood, W. M. U., and Music Nominating Committees shall offer nominations for election to office of all Associational Officers and workers whose nomination and election has not already been provided for in the Constitution and Bylaws.

5 Except as provided by the Constitution and Bylaws members of standing Committees shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association, it being understood that those elected by the Association shall begin their term of service at the close of each Annual Associational meeting and serve therein through the next regular Associational Meeting. It being understood and herein provided for that in the event of a vacancy or vacancies interim on said committees, the Committee on Committees shall offer nominations for election to the Executive Committee at its next regular or special meeting. The responsibility of such election interim being that of the Executive Committee.

Section 5

The Association shall have an Introductory and a Missionary Sermon at each Annual Meeting, the hours for the sermons to be provided for in the Order of Business.

Section 6

The fiscal year of the Association shall begin October first of each year, and end September thirtieth of the following year, both dates inclusive; and all reports to the Association shall conform to these dates.

Section 7

All Departments mentioned in Section 4, Page 16, shall present a complete report to the Association at its Annual Session. All written reports of Committees shall be limited to a maximum of six hundred words; and the Clerk is authorized if necessary, to edit reports to conform to this word limitation.

Section 8

When a church fails to send in an Annual Letter, the clerk shall make no mention of that church in the Annual Report.

Section 9

The Clerks of the Churches are requested to get their letter to the Associational Clerk as early as possible.

Section 10

The Parliamentary Law which shall be used by this Association in the government of its business proceedings, shall be Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law.

It is understood, that this Association shall ever adhere to the Principles and Practices of recognized Baptist Policies in all its Proceedings, its Methods, and its Word.

Report Of The Cooperative Program

The Cooperative Program is Southern Baptist's way of saying "yes" to the Great Commission. When Jesus said "Go ye" He said it in the framework of a Biblical plan of finance, which is the tithe. Jesus made this very clear when He said,

"Think not that I am come to destroy the law, or the prophets: I am not come to destroy, but to fulfil" (Matt. 5:17). Every church should give more earnest attention to the teaching of tithing as the Biblical principle of giving, and to the consistent increase in Cooperative Program giving.

The Forward Program of Church Finance is fast becoming standard procedure for many churches in helping the leadership guide all members toward Scriptural giving. The Forward Program is tested and proven. It is no longer a question mark in the minds of our people, but is now a finance program of proven quality.

We feel that our world missions program calls for a stronger appeal than ever before. The work we are able to do through the Cooperative Program and the added strength it receives from the regular use of the Forward Program is encouraging. But the greatest uplift we can ever give it is prayer. In this month of October we are participating in a special program of prayer for the Cooperative Program. If your church is not already engaged in this prayer program, we recommend that you use the remaining Wednesday nights of the month to pray for Cooperative Program causes.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

We recommend:

1. That each church in Suwannee Association plan and carry out a definite program for teaching its membership to participate in the Biblical form of giving, the tithe;

2. That each church in Suwannee Association set up a system of regular monthly contribution through the Cooperative Program;

3. That each church in Suwannee Association consider the two-plus plan, this is increasing cooperative program gifts by 2 per cent each year;

4. That each church in Suwannee Association study and use the Forward Program in its full form, or its intermediate or beginner stages; and

5. That each church in Suwannee Association make a regular habit of praying for Cooperative Program causes.

Florida Baptist Foundation Report

On the first day of April, 1947, a charter was approved for the Florida Baptist Foundation.

The Florida Baptist Foundation operated successfully for a period of fourteen years under the leadership of Dr. J. Harrison Griffin, and Dr. G. A. Leichter. Florida owes an eternal debt of gratitude to these two servants of God. Trusts set up, and wills written in cooperation with Convention agencies and institutions during the years of their leadership will furnish funds for the Master's work until He comes again.

On the fourteenth day of November, 1961, an amendment charter was approved by the Florida Baptist Convention. Under the amended charter, the objects of this corporation include: "To solicit, encourage, motivate, and facilitate the making of gifts, donations, and benefactions by deeds, will, gift, annuity contract, or otherwise, for the advancement, promotion, and maintenance of the Florida Baptist State Convention and the various causes and objects now or at any time hereafter fostered, approved, endorsed, or officially sanctioned by the Florida Baptist State Convention or

the Southern Baptist Convention, and for any other purposes embraced within the scope of the objects of this corporation as set forth in this Charter."

During this year the Foundation office was transferred to Jacksonville, and details of the transfer worked out. An agreement was entered into with the Florida National Bank, Jacksonville, to assist with the program of the Foundation.

Although these details took considerable time, progress was made along other lines. New wills have been written, and old wills have been re-written to include Baptist causes. New trust agreements have been entered into, and groundwork had been laid for other wills, annuities, and trust agreements. The financial condition of every agency and institution of the Florida Baptist Convention has been improved through the work of the foundation. The Lord's work will receive thousands of dollars annually as a direct result of the work done this year.

Annuity Board Report

A total of \$2,879,816.21 was paid in benefits by the Annuity Board during 1961. More than \$2,654,222 of this went to approximately 4,500 ministers, denominational workers of their families who participated in one of the Board's retirement plans. The remaining amount was paid in relief to 826 aged ministers and widows. During the Board's 43 years of operation, it has paid out benefits totaling more than \$37,304,916.

In 1961, 1,808 new members were enlisted in the Southern Baptist Protection Plan and 789 churches were enrolled. At the end of the year, 64 per cent of the churches in the Convention were participating in the Board's program. Of this number, 43 per cent were paying total dues for both church and pastor. The Institution Protection Program, for employees in colleges, hospitals, orphanages and other institutions of this type, enlisted in 1961.

According to the Protection Plan certificate, a person must join within a year after he begins denominational service or after his 25th birthday, whichever is later. For each year he delays joining the Plan, his widow and disability benefits are reduced. Now, because of the trustee's action, anyone joining the Protection Plan before January 1, 1963, will have this penalty removed. The waiver affects only the Southern Baptist Protection Plan.

The waiver also removed the penalty from any person currently in the Protection Plan who may have been affected by it, and it allowed the Annuity Board to make adjustments in Annuity checks to widows and disabled persons who were penalized because of delayed entry into the Plan.

After January 1, 1963, any person who delays joining will penalize himself according to the participation clause.

The Annuity Board now has 14 field men working in 21 state conventions. Their program of education and promotion is conducted through state and associational meetings, on college and seminary campuses, in local churches and through conferences with laymen and pastors.

Report Of The Baptist Bible Institute

God-called men need a place to prepare for their ministry, where they can study in a loyal, dedicated atmosphere. Our Southern Baptist seminaries meet this need for the college graduates, but barely touch it for almost 40 per cent of our active pastors. This is because the seminaries try to restrict their non-college students to 10 per cent or less of their enrollment, lest they receive notations by the accrediting agencies.

Baptist Bible Institute of Graceville, Florida, uniquely meets this need in a way that is forbidden to either a college or seminary. We specialize in training men who, having entered the ministry later than the average, still must study or not do a good job. A man may enroll without even a high school diploma.

We teach courses in Bible, homiletics, evangelism, missions, history, doctrine, church administration, religious education, English, and related subjects. This comes to 100 semester hours, or three years, in all. This parallels the Bachelor or Divinity course in our seminaries, without the Hebrew and Greek.

We enrolled 232 last year, and 189 the year before. We expect to reach 250 or more this year.

We invite you to compare the training of our faculty with that of any Southern Baptist college or seminary. Be added either to the theological faculty, or to the religious education faculty, a man must have earned doctorate or he must be working on it. We have a faculty of 13 — 9 teachers and 4 in administration.

We are owned and controlled by the Florida Baptist Convention, the Institute is a vital part of Southern Baptist work, and is sending out loyal, cooperative church leaders.

Our success has brought favorable attention to us from across the Southern Baptist Convention. SBC leaders have noted our effective teaching program; they have seen the work of our students and alumni; and they are aware of our unmarred denominational loyalty. They like what they see.

Considering this, and the widespread need for our type of teaching ministry, the SBC Program Committee recently considered the matter of Bible schools for the Convention.

More colleges are accepting our credits than ever before. This gives evidence of a growing respect for our work.

Pray for us; we face an ever-challenging future. Put us in your budgets; we have to pay our own bills. Call on us when you need us; we can help in numerous ways. We, the entire

Institute family, feel ourselves to be the fellow-workers — God's own — with you.

**Report On Baptist Literature
And**

The Florida Baptist Witness

"Through good reading we become acquainted with the wisest men of the ages . . . are kept cognizant of the affairs of our own day . . . and experience the joys of losing ourselves in other men's minds."

First and foremost in the regular reading for every Baptist should always be the Bible, God's own Word.

Close behind that first place should be the generous and wise use of good Christian literature which has become so tremendously important to our Christian living and to the growth and development of our churches and our denomination.

Southern Baptists have many of their best minds engaged in the writing, preparation and publication of literature which is second to none. It is sound in doctrine, easy to understand and attractive to the eye. Both its content and its appearance make it superb literature, and its reasonable cost puts it within the reach of every church.

The circulation of Southern Baptist publications continues to be expanded to meet the indicated needs of our people. Last year our chief publication agency, The Baptist Sunday School Board at Nashville, Tenn., printed and distributed 110,395,424 copies of its periodicals and graded literature, 5,920,177 books, 67,217,225 preprinted church bulletins, and nearly 17,000 tracts.

The other agencies and auxiliaries of the Southern Baptist Convention have growing subscriber lists for their splendid periodicals such as The Commission (Foreign Missions Journal), Home Missions Magazine, Brotherhood Journal, Ambassador Life, and all the Woman's Missionary Union publication.

The 28 Baptist state papers now have a total circulation of 1,495,285 copies per issue, according to the report made to the 1962 Southern Baptist Convention. Thus, the readers of these papers received a total of more than 77,500,000 copies of these papers during the last 12-month period.

Our own state paper, the Florida Baptist Witness, (as of August 1, 1962) had 63,104 different persons on its paid subscriber list with this many papers going into 843 different churches, 739 of which are using the budget plan for at least some portion of their membership. One hundred four other churches have small clubs of subscribers. Each succeeding year sees more churches sending the Witness to every resident family. In spite of the increased circulation over which we rejoice, however, let us remember that there are still 449 churches affiliated with the Florida Baptist Convention which are failing to provide their members and themselves with all the benefits to be gained from a group subscription to the Florida Baptist Witness.

Every church which now sends the WITNESS into only

part of its homes is urged to complete its subscription list by including every resident family, and every church which does not now include the WITNESS in its budget is urged to consider doing so promptly. The paper is still available through the church budget plan for the low cost of \$1.20 per year to be paid in installments of only 10c per month for each family on the subscription list.

In the campaign to reach a circulation of 70,000 by 1964, our association is asked to cooperate by electing a WITNESS representative who will serve as a contact person between the Florida Baptist Witness office and the churches of this association.

Report On Christian Education

Christian education goes beyond the development of the mental, physical, and social, to include the development of the spiritual side of a student's nature. This plus quality is the justification for the existence of Christian educational institutions and the expenditures of the large sums of monies that are allocated for this cause.

Southern Baptists now operate thirty-two senior colleges and nineteen junior colleges. Seven new colleges are in various stages of planning, to be located in densely populated areas, to serve the hundreds of Baptist students not now near an existing Baptist college. Southern Baptists operate six seminaries, Carver School of Missions and Social work, and the American Baptist Theological Seminary (operated jointly with National Baptists), seven academies, and five Bible schools. The 1962 meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention approved the merger of Carver School of Missions and Social Work and Southern Baptist Seminary.

There are 77,143 students enrolled in Southern Baptist colleges, academies, Bible schools, and seminaries, an increase of 5,343 over the previous year. Southern Baptist contributed to these educational institutions \$15,677,189 during the past year. In addition, the schools received \$12,169,480 in gifts, grants, and donations. The total assets of Southern Baptist educational institutions are \$358,795,815.

Florida Baptists have two schools: Stetson University, the oldest university in Florida, located at DeLand, and Baptist Bible Institute, located at Graceville. During the 1961-62 term, there were 2,788 students enrolled in Stetson University, 635 of whom are Baptists. Eighty-three students are committed to some full time church-related vocation. Of these, 50 are ministerial students, 9 are mission volunteers, 7 are preparing for religious education work, and 17 are preparing for church music service.

Baptist Bible Institute offers a special training program for students who do not qualify for college entrance. Enrollment increased this past year from 187 to 224. Members of the student body come from 19 states, plus Canada, Cuba, and the District of Columbia. The Institute has been engaged in a campaign to secure \$200,000 in funds for capital improvements and endowment.

During this year, the joint committee from the trustees of Stetson University and the Florida Baptist Convention have been working to bring about a closer relationship and understanding between Stetson University and the Florida Baptist Convention. The committee will report to the annual

meeting of the Florida Baptist State Convention this fall.

Well conducted educational institutions are vital in the work of Baptists. Baptist young people need to be guided to our Baptist schools for their college experience. Furthermore, there is need to undergird the administration, faculty, and students with the spirit of love and constant prayer.

Report Of Radio And Publicity

America's radio and television networks — NBC-CBS and ABC — offer the Southern Baptist Convention its best opportunity for reaching large segments of the U. S. audience at relatively low cost, according to a recent study made by the Radio-TV Commission.

Southern Baptists will be represented by nine 30-minute television programs and one hour-long "special" on the three networks this year, plus a minimum of 14 network radio shows.

Southern Baptist Radio and Television Commission now produces and distributes a total of 10 weekly radio programs and "The Answer" weekly television series for local consumption.

It takes the Gospel through electronic media to 48 states and 25 foreign countries over an independent denomination network of 1300 stations. These programs have an audience estimated at 50 million each week.

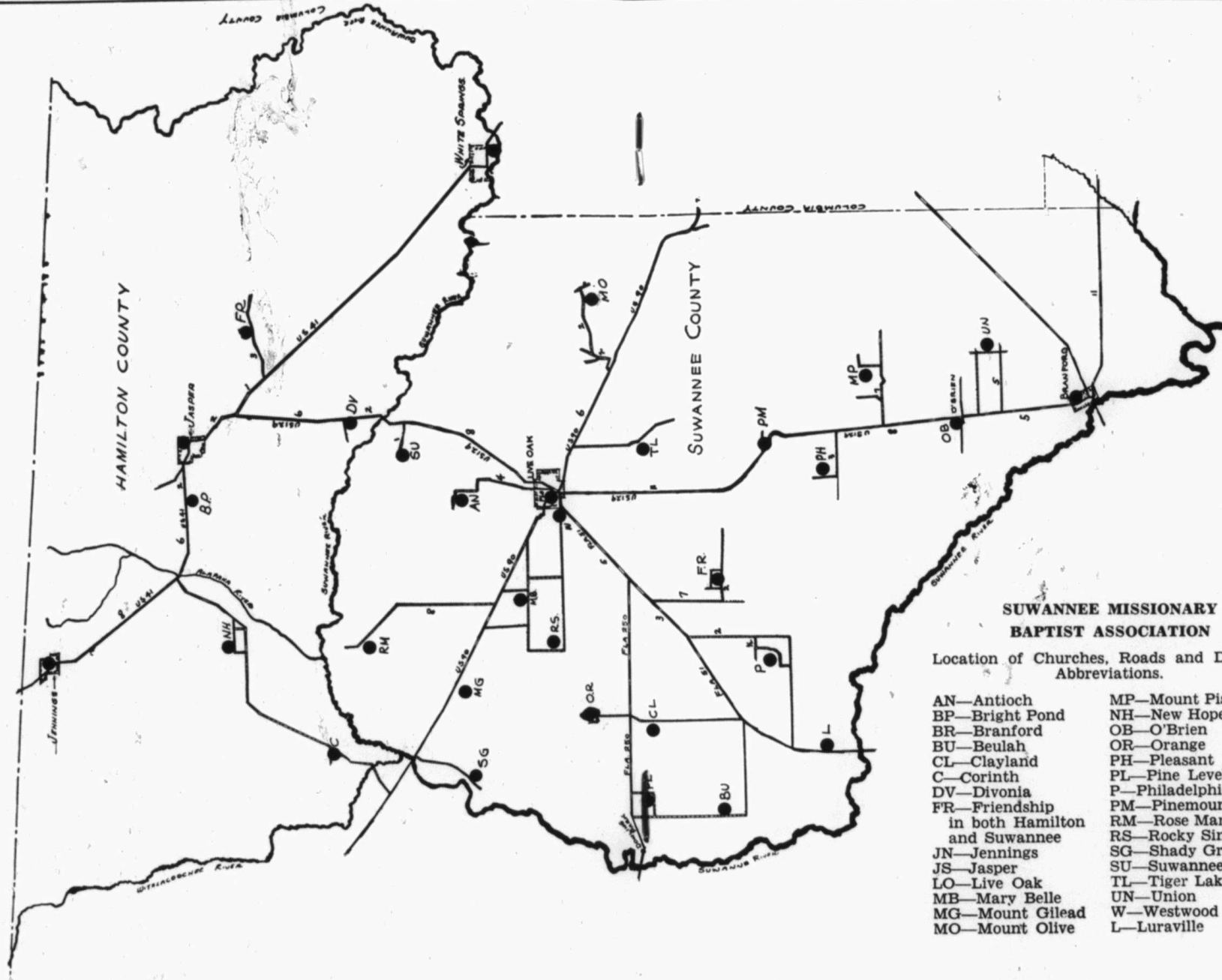
Earlier this year, the Commission launched a completely new approach to religious radio programming. Called "Patterns", this weekly package of minute-long, tape-recorded segments by well-known people on a wide variety of subjects. It is provided as a public service to stations. "Patterns" contain 20 secular and 10 inspirational briefs to be used throughout the day or night at the discretion of the station.

The Baptist Hour is broadcast over Radio Station WNER each Sunday at 8:35 a.m., with a listening potential of near 80,000, many of whom have never accepted our Saviour as theirs.

Through this media, we have been able to reach many sick and shut-ins. As well as many lost with the saving message of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

Report Of United Christian Action

Florida Baptist face four problems in 1962 — as follows:

1. The Liquor Traffic . . . (beer, wine & whiskey); Legalized outlets—Fla. 16,819, U. S. 425,000; Consumption—Fla. 74,000,000 gallons, U. S. 3,000,000,000 gallons; Cost in dollars—Fla. \$450,000,000.00, U. S. \$12,000,000,000.00; Cost in broken lives—Fla. 250,000 alcoholics, 400,000 problem drinkers, 900,000 social drinkers from which the future alcoholics will develop and U. S. 7,000,000 alcoholics, 15,000,000 problem drinkers, 45,000,000 social drinkers. This evil industry is now spending a half billion dollars per year to advertise, glamorize and promote their products in around the clock "brain-washing" to make customers and addicts out of youth and adults.

2. The Gambling Traffic . . . now operating 17 dog tracks (more than the other 49 states combined), plus 6 horse tracks, plus 6 Jai Alai Frontons (only state in U. S. with this type of gambling) with \$375,000,000 legally gambled in Florida last year. Bingo, raffles and other games of chance are practiced wherever the law winks at them.

3. The Obscene Literature Traffic . . . with its thousands of books, magazines, movies and other "accepted" areas of entertainment literally polluting the very souls of many youths and adults.

4. Moral Astigmatism and Laringitis (Loss of ability to recognize evil and loss of voice to oppose it) on the part of far too many church members.

It's Hard To Believe — Yet True

Florida today has over twice as many bars as churches of all faiths; its people spend over 5 times as much on liquor-gambling and obscenity as on all religious activities; consistently leads the South and ranks high in the nation in crime rates (usually double the national average); has double the suicide rate; ranks far above average in venereal disease and other sex delinquency; has an overwhelming number of broken families, emotionally disturbed persons (young and old); lags far behind in meeting welfare and charity needs; continues to slaughter and maim on our highways through lax drinking drivers controls — and on, and on the sordid story goes. The liquor manufactures and sellers alone are spending over \$16 million a year to brain wash the people of Florida into acceptance of their destructive products while all the churches in the 12 cooperating denominations which support UNITED CHRISTIAN ACTION, Inc. are providing less than one cent to operate UCA for each \$4.00 spent on alcohol promotion—i.e., the liquor traffic spends 400 times as much to sell their lie as we spend to present the truth.

UNITED CHRISTIAN ACTION, INC. is supported entirely from the gifts of concerned churches and individuals. Florida Baptist have consistently provided strong support and encouragement to the program. At present, 175 of our 1200 Florida Baptist Churches provide some special support each year through monthly or annual budget allotments. With our lifeline support coming through the ANNUAL STATE MISSION OFFERING, from which UCA received \$8,250.00 in 1961 and is scheduled to receive \$8,400.00 in 1962.

With headquarters in Lakeland, the staff is composed of two Baptist ministers, both native Floridians who served in Florida pastorates prior to entering this specialized field of Christian Action. Jack Epps is Executive Secretary-Treasurer, Phil Padgett is Associate Director. We will be happy to pro-

vide any church or individual with complete finance or organizational reports upon request.

Hospital Charity Report Mr. Charles Howes

Report On Southern Baptist Hospitals

Facilities of the two hospitals owned by the Southern Baptist Convention and operated by its Hospital Board have been strained during the past year in attempting to meet the steadily increasing demands placed upon them. Southern Baptist Hospital in New Orleans admitted 24,894 patients to its 467 beds, including 4,520 newborn babies. Baptist Memorial Hospital, Jacksonville, Florida, admitted 17,795 patients to its 329 beds, including 4,424 newborn babies.

While the two hospitals are maintained to provide the highest quality of patient care in a setting of the Christian faith, an additional 53,370 patients were treated in the outpatient clinics maintained for those whose needs can be met without hospitalization. Needs presented in these clinics ranged from accident victims to pre-and-post-natal care for unmarried mothers, from remedying eye defects to well-baby preventive care.

Patients in the two hospitals have been drawn literally from all over the world. Missionary personnel have on occasion been flown in from their stations for emergency treatment. Since both New Orleans and Jacksonville are port cities engaged in international commerce, patients have been drawn from all the Americas particularly. The opportunities for demonstrating a positive Christian witness and concern in the two institutions grow greater year by year.

Charity programs providing services at no charge and on a part-pay basis continue to grow in scope and magnitude. In 1961 the expense of these programs amounted to a grand total of \$383,200.73. The full Cooperative Program allocation for "operating" in the amount of \$25,000 was applied against this cost. Christian friends moved to compassionate response by the needs served through these programs contributed an additional \$41,500. The remainder of the expense was borne by the hospitals as an operating cost.

Educational programs in the two hospitals for young doctors, students of nursing, students of medical technology and x-ray technique, along with ministers receiving clinical pastoral education, required an outlay by the two hospitals of \$502,670.48. The total cost of these educational programs was borne by the hospitals. It is perhaps in this area that additional support is most sorely needed.

A portion of the Statement of Purpose adopted by all Southern Baptist hospitals reads, "A Baptist hospital functions as an instrument of God's grace in enriching and prolonging life within the scope of Divine Providence. . . .". In creating and operating hospitals, Southern Baptists have fashioned instruments that are effective in a far wider sense than providing organized care for the acutely ill. Their very existence is a testimony to the sensitivity of Southern Baptists to human need. In the conduct of their work, the hospitals underscore the Christian conviction that man is more than an intricate organism; he is soul and mind as well. By maintaining institutions for healing that keep in clear perspective the three-fold nature of man, Southern Baptists are obeying the command to "Go ye into all the world. . .", including the world of pain, suffering and death.

Report Of Florida Baptist Retirement Centers

The Retirement Center program has been in operation but one year and a half. The Lord has blessed it abundantly and in many ways. During the last year two more duplex cottages have been built and nine rooms added to the main building. Also, all the porches have been screened, which has added much to the comfort and security of the residents as well as to the general appearance of the building.

We now have twenty-two residents. Only two single rooms and one duplex cottage are available.

It will be necessary to continue the building program perhaps for several years to come because many worthy senior citizens are knocking at our doors. Almost all of the Cooperative Program funds received have been used in the building program. The property and buildings are now valued at something more than four hundred thousand dollars including the property which was the gift of Mr. and Mrs. Buckingham. The building program is largely dependent on mission receipts.

Associational Sunday School Report

"OUTREACHED FOR THE UNREACHED . . . SPEAR-HEAD FOR ADVANCE" was the theme for our 1961-62 Sunday School program. Our prayer is that every Church and Association will be able to report a good advance in Sunday School enrollment, which is essential to a worthy Advance in all other areas of our total church programs of ministering

to the people.

Available records of our Sunday School reveal that churches in our Association participated as follows:

Total Church Study Course Awards through 9-30-62 \$501.00; in Sunday School Principles and methods, Category 17, 186; No. Churches earning awards in Church Study Course 20; Standard Departments 1; Standard Classes 6; Standard Sunday School 1; No. Vacation Bible Schools 9; No. of Mission Sunday Schools 3; Total Sunday School Enrollment 3,674; Our 1961 Sunday School enrollment 3570; Loss _____; Gain 104; No. Teachers & Officers 405; No. Dept. 64; No. Classes 285; No. Churches having Teachers and Officers Meetings 4; No. Churches having Supt. of Training 3; No. Churches keeping record of Training 4.

We would like to report that we have had very good Sunday School meetings this year, although the attendance wasn't as good as we would have liked for it to have been, but the spirit was good and also the fellowship. A good many of our Sunday Schools have had training school for the workers and members.

In our Sunday School Planning Meeting for the coming year, we set the following goals:

1. We plan to attend a one night clinic for our Associational Sunday School officers, November 29, 1962, at Monticello, Florida.

2. The Sunday School Planning Meeting for 1963 will be September 6, 1963 at Westwood Church.

3. Our V. B. S. will be held March 13, 1963, at Perry, Florida.

5. Our goal for Action Night, September 17, 1963, is 200 in attendance and 30 churches represented.

Our meetings for next year will be quarterly, the first meeting will be November 20, 1962. We urge all the Sunday School to attend the Associational Sunday School meetings next year.

State Secretary C. F. Barry reports continued advancement in all phases of our State Sunday School program. Although all reports are not in, he estimates the following: Approximately 1,450 Sunday Schools (including all missions); an enrollment gain of about 15,000, brings our Florida Sunday School enrollment to about 425,000. Church Study Course awards of 91,595; Sunday School Category 17 Awards 23,559; Vacation Schools 1,100; Standard Sunday Schools 78; Standard Classes 923; Standard Depts. 341; Total Standard Units 1,346; Standard Associations 3 — Alachua, Pasco and Taylor.

We recommend that our Association vote in this Annual Session to place in our Associational Calendar of Activities the week of January 25-31, 1964, for an Associational-wide Sunday School Witnessing Campaign. This is to be a State-Wide Simultaneous Campaign. Such vote to authorize our Association to be one of the 47 Associations so voting, to make our state 100% in this program of evangelism. This program is being promoted jointly by the Sunday School Dept. and the Dept. of Evangelism of the Florida Baptist Convention. Dr. Paul Meigs and Rev. C. F. Barry are Co-Directors.

Music Report

Throughout our state in 1961-62, there were some 350 churches in music training out of 1300 churches in our state. This year we hope that our association will have every church participating in some form of music training. As an Associational Music Ministry organization, we are going to strive to reach every church in our association.

This past year on an associational level, the Associational Music Ministry organizations show 37 out of 47 associations held Associational Festivals. 254 churches participated in the Festivals with 507 choral groups, totaling 10,011 choir members — 145 hymn players — 47 song leaders — 6 instrumental assemblies, with a total of 18 participants. Our Associational Festival was held at First Baptist Church, Live Oak, February 4, 1962. We are planning to have a festival during January 1963. There is a potential in our state of 329 associational music officers in the Associational Music Ministry organizations. This past year Florida reported 329 of these officers with a percentage of 100 which is the highest in the Southern Baptist Convention for Associational Music Ministry organizations. Again, we say thanks to you pastors, music directors, and others for your cooperation in this endeavor. Our Associational Ministry organization is complete with nominations for every office.

On a state level the Church Music Ministry Department continues to promote a program which should best serve the needs of the majority of our churches. Ten State Music Festivals were held during 1962. There was a total of 310 choral groups with 6,622 members — 94 hymn players — 22 song leaders — 5 instrumental ensembles with 14 participants. This gave us a grand total of 6,768 individuals participating in the State Festivals. There were 134 churches participating. 446 certificates were issued. There will be ten Festivals again this year. The one for the Suwannee Association will be held on February 8-9, 1963 at the First Baptist Church, Lake City, Florida.

We plan to encourage our churches to participate in this Festival.

Let every church in our Association strive for a larger and more efficient Music Ministry this year.
