Church Covenant

"Having been led, as we believe, by the Spirit of God to receive the Lord Jesus Christ as our Saviour, and on the profession of our faith, having been baptized in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, we do now in the presence of God, angels and this assembly, most solemnly and joyfully enter into Covenant with one another, as one body in Christ."

"We engage therefore, by the aid of the Holy Spirit, to walk together in Christian love; to strive for the advancement of this Church in knowledge, holiness, and comfort; to promote its prosperity and spiritually, to sustain its worship, ordinances, discipline, and doctrines; to contribute cheerfully and regularly to the support of the ministry, the expenses of the Church, the relief of the poor, and the spread of the gospel through all nations."

"We also engage to maintain family and secret devotion; to religiously educate our children; to seek the salvation of our kindred and acquaintances; to walk circumspectly in the world; to be just in our dealings, faithful in our engagements, and exemplary in our deportment; to avoid all tattling, backbiting, and excessive anger. To abstain from the sale and use of intoxicating drinks and beverages, and to be zealous in our efforts to advance the kingdom of our Saviour."

"We further engage to watch over one another in brotherly love; to remember each other in prayer, to aid each other in sickness and distress; to cultivate Christian sympathy in feeling and courtesy in speech; to be slow to take offense, but always ready for reconciliation, and mindful of the rules of our Saviour to secure it without delay."

"We moreover engage that when we move from this place, we will as soon as possible unite with some other church, where we can carry out the Spirit of this Covenant and the principles of God's Word."

SUGGESTIONS ON STARTING A MISSION, ORGANIZATION OF A CHURCH AND ORDAINING A PREACHER
"HOW TO START A NEW MISSION"

1. Pastor and Church Missions Committee should pray for the Holy Spirit's leadership.
2. Make a survey to determine the best location.
3. Seek advice and guidance from the Associational Missions Committee and the Field Secretary.
4. Urge members of sponsoring church to take active leadership and work in the new work.
5. Determine the role of the sponsoring church.
 - (A) Secure property, building, equipment, and put up signs etc.
 - (B) Mission pastor or Director.
 - (C) Supply furniture, literature, hymn books, records, etc.
 - (D) Set date for first service.
 - (E) Visit prospects for attendance, invite pastors, associational officers etc., for first service.
 - (F) Advertise, use: Newspaper, handbills, letters, radio, church publicity, telephone etc.
 - (G) Adopt policy for regulation of relationship between sponsoring church and mission.

How To Organize A New Church

1. Any group of Baptists desiring to organize a New Baptist Church within the bounds of the Suwannee Missionary Baptist Association, and expecting to apply for membership in the Association are respectfully asked to follow a consistent form of organization.
 - (1) The sponsoring church should make preparation toward the day the Mission is to be constituted into a church. The following suggestions are offered. The Mission should have:
 - (a) Spiritual and Trained leadership.
 - (b) Full program of Baptist Organization.
 - (c) Financial stability.
 - (d) Doctrinal soundness.
 - (e) Denominational Loyalty.
 - (f) A good Constitution and By-Laws.
2. The sponsoring church should call a council of pastors and deacons from at least three churches in good standing with the Association; also the Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Chairman of Associational Missions Committee and the Field Secretary to assist with the Organization.
 - (a) Time and place is designated.
 - (b) Due notice is given all concerned.
3. The council assembled for the purpose of organization should organize itself by the election of a moderator and clerk before any other procedure. The following order is suggested:
 - (a) Service of Constitution (Pastor of sponsoring church presided until the new church is constituted).
 - (b) Purpose of meeting is stated.
 - (c) Reading of roll of members to form the new church.
 - (d) Articles of Faith presented and adopted.
 - (e) Church Covenant read and adopted.
 - (f) Report of Council should be read.
 - (g) Sermon of Constitution.
 - (h) Prayer of Constitution.
 - (i) New Church in business session.
 - (1) Selection of name.
 - (2) Call a pastor (pastor of sponsoring presides).
 - (3) Election of officers.
 - (4) Time extended for reception of charter members.
 - (j) Offering for World Missions.

4. If the new church desires to become a member of the Suwannee Baptist Association, application should be made in writing, with a roll of membership, stating the above procedure has been followed, to the Executive Committee or at a regular session of the Association, and may be accepted upon recommendation of the Committee of Petitionary Letters.

5. If any applicant church has been in another fellowship of Baptist, or if there is any question as to whether the applicant has met all of the conditions stated above, the application shall be automatically received and referred to the Committee of Petitionary Letters.

The Committee shall make full investigation, and offer all aid possible in helping the applicant church to meet the required conditions, and the application should be considered at the next regular session of the Association.

Ordination Of A Missionary Baptist Preacher

With a desire that the pastors and churches of our Association shall have fellowship, and that the form of Ordination of our preachers shall be regular, we suggest the following order of Ordination.

Any man feeling the call to preach the Gospel, who is a member of a regular Missionary Baptist Church, and has been called to serve as a pastor, should ask the church of which he is a member to arrange for his ordination.

1. The following is the regular and accepted procedure.
 - (a) The church desiring the ordination should invite several ordained preachers and deacons in good standing with the denomination to sit together as a council for the examination of the candidate.
 - (b) The examination should be held before the date set for the ordination service. By using this plan, the examination can be thorough, it could save embarrassment to the church and the candidate. No foregone approval should exist as to the man appearing for ordination.
 - (c) The candidate should be examined as to his conversion, his call to the ministry and his belief in the Scriptural doctrines.
 - (d) At the close of the examination the recommendation of the council is prepared, and if favorable, a date is set for the Ordination service. — It is customary to have an ordination sermon, charge to the church and candidate, the ordination prayer and the laying on of hands. Many churches present the candidate with a Bible, after which the right hand of fellowship and greeting is given. The service is concluded with prayer.

The ordination of ministers other than pastors should be left to the discretion of the local church.

Ordination Of Deacons

Realizing that this is a matter which solely concern the local church, we suggest the same general procedure to that of a preacher. This will enable both the deacon and any church which may elect him to serve as a deacon, to feel that his ordination was sound and in good order.

ARTICLES OF FAITH**1. OF THE SCRIPTURES**

We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men Divinely inspired, and a perfect treasure of heavenly instruction; that it has God for its Author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture of error for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us; and therefore is, and shall remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds, and opinions should be tried.

2. OF THE TRUE GOD

We believe that there is One, and only One living and true God, an Infinite, intelligent Spirit, Whose Name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of Heaven and Earth; inexpressly glorious in Holiness, and worthy of all possible honor, confidence and love; that in the Unity of the Godhead there are Three Persons, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost; equal in every Divine Perfection, and executing distinct but harmonious Offices in the great work of Redemption.

3. OF THE FALL OF MAN

We believe that Man was created in holiness, under the law of his Maker; but by voluntary transgression fell from that holy and happy state; in consequence of which all Mankind are now sinners, not by constraint but choice; being by nature utterly void of that holiness required by the law of God; positively inclined to evil; and therefore under just condemnation to eternal ruin, without defense or excuse.

4. OF THE WAY OF SALVATION

We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of Grace; through the Mediatorial office of the Son of God; Who by the appointment of the Father, freely took upon Him our nature, yet without our sin; honored the Divine law by His Personal obedience, and by His death made a full Atonement for our sins; that having risen from the dead, He is now enthroned in heaven; and uniting in His wonderful Person the tenderest sympathies with Divine Perfections, He is every way qualified to be a suitable, a compassionate, and all-sufficient Saviour.

5. OF JUSTIFICATION

We believe that the great Gospel blessing which Christ secures to such as believe in Him is Justification; that Justification includes the pardon of sin, and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness; that is bestowed, not in consideration of any works or righteousness which we have done, but solely through Faith in the Redeemer's Blood; by virtue of which faith His Perfect righteousness is freely imputed to us of God; that it brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every other blessing needful for time and eternity.

6. OF THE FREEDOM OF SALVATION

We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all by the Gospel; that it is the immediate duty of all to accept them by a cordial penitent and obedient faith; and that nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner on earth, but his own inherent depravity and voluntary rejection of the Gospel; which involves him in an aggravated condemnation.

7. OF GRACE IN REGENERATION

We believe that in order to be saved, sinners must be regenerated, or be born again; that regeneration consists in giving a holy disposition to the mind; that it is effected in a manner above our comprehension by the power of the Holy Spirit, in connection with Divine truth, so as to secure our voluntary obedience to the Gospel; and that its proper evidence appears in the holy fruits of repentance, and faith, and newness of life.

8. OF REPENTANCE AND FAITH

We believe that Repentance and Faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable Graces, wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God; whereby being deeply convinced of our guilt, danger and helplessness, and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession, and supplication for mercy; at the same time heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ for our Prophet, Priest, and King, and relying on Him alone as the Only and All-sufficient Saviour.

9. OF GOD'S PURPOSE OF GRACE

We believe that Election is the Eternal purpose of God, according to which He graciously regenerates, sanctifies, and saves sinners; that being perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, it comprehends all the means in connection with the end; that it is a most glorious display of God's Sovereign Goodness, being Infinitely free, wise, holy, and unchangeable; that it utterly excludes boasting, and promotes humility, love, prayer, praise, trust in God, and active imitation of His free mercy; that it may be ascertained by its effects in all who truly believe the Gospel; that it is the foundation of Christian assurance; and that to ascertain it with regard to ourselves demands and deserves the utmost diligence.

10. OF SANCTIFICATION

We believe that Sanctification is the process by which, according to the Will of God, we are made partakers of His Holiness; that it is a progressive work; that it is begun in regeneration; and that it is carried on in the hearts of believers by the presence and power of the Holy Spirit, the Sealer and Comforter, in the continual use of the appointed means — especially, the Word of God, self-examination, self-denial, watchfulness, and prayer.

11. OF THE PERSEVERANCE OF SAINTS

We believe that such only are real believers as endure unto the end; that their persevering attachment to Christ is the grand mark which distinguishes them from superficial professors; that a special Providence watches over their welfare; and they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

12. OF THE HARMONY OF THE LAW AND THE GOSPEL

We believe that the Law of God is the eternal and unchangeable rule of His moral government; that it is holy just and good; and that the inability which the Scriptures ascribe to fallen men to fulfill its precepts, arises entirely from their love of sin; to deliver them from which, and to restore them through a Mediator to unfeigned obedience to the Law, is one great end of the Gospel, and of the Means of Grace connected with the establishment of the visible Church.

13. OF THE GOSPEL CHURCH

We believe that a visible Church of Christ is a Congregation of baptized believers, associated by Covenant in the faith and fellowship of the Gospel; observing the Ordinances of Christ; governed by His Laws; and exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His Word; that its only Scriptural officers are Bishops or Pastors and Deacons, whose qualifications, claims, and duties are defined in the Epistles to Timothy and Titus.

14. OF BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER

We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion in water of a believer, into the Name of the Father, and Son, and Holy Ghost; to show forth in a solemn and beautiful emblem our faith in the crucified, buried, and risen Saviour, with its effects, in our death to sin and resurrection to a new life; that it is a pre-requisite to the privilege of a Church relation; and to the Lord's Supper, in which the members of the Church by the sacred use of bread and wine, are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ; preceded always by solemn self-examination.

15. OF THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH

We believe that the first day of the week is the Lord's Day, or Christian Sabbath; and is to be kept sacred to religious purposes, by abstaining from all secular labor and sinful recreations, by the devout observance of all the means of Grace, both private and public; and by preparation for that rest that remaineth for the people of God.

16. OF CIVIL GOVERNMENT

We believe that Civil Government is of Divine appointment, for the interests and good order of human society; and that magistrates are to be prayed for, conscientiously honored, and obeyed; except only in things opposed to the Will of our Lord Jesus Christ, Who is the only Lord of the conscience, and the Prince of the kings of the earth.

17. OF THE RIGHTEOUS AND THE WICKED

We believe that there is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and the wicked; that such only as through faith are justified in the Name of the Lord Jesus, and sanctified by the Spirit of Our God, are truly righteous in His esteem; while all such as continue in impenitence and unbelief are in His sight wicked, and under the curse; and this distinction hold among men both in and after death.

18. OF THE WORLD TO COME

We believe that the end of this world is approaching; that at the Last Day, Christ will descend from heaven, and raise the dead from the grave to final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment, and the righteous to endless joy; and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of men in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

CONSTITUTION**Article 1—Name**

This Organization shall be known as the SUWANNEE MISSIONARY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

Article 2—Purpose

The Purpose of this Association shall be: To furnish a medium of co-operation for the Churches of the Association in their Divinely commissioned work of Missions, Education, and Benevolences; and to this end we seek to bring into co-operative fellowship the energies of our Churches for the Objects and Institutions fostered by the Florida Baptist Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

Article 3—Churches

The Constituents of this Association shall be Missionary Baptist Churches of regular order, presenting petitionary letters from other Associations in due form; and Churches which may be constituted within the bounds of the Association, presenting proper credentials of organization and Articles of Faith, accompanied by properly accredited Messengers.

Article 4—Messengers

This Association shall be composed of Messengers holding membership in the Churches which constitute the Association; these Messengers having been duly elected by their respective Churches on the following basis; Each Church shall be entitled to Three Messengers without reference to their numerical strength; and one additional Messenger for each Twenty-five members or fraction thereof, after it has attained a membership of Fifty members.

Article 5—Officers

The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, a Vice-Moderator, a Clerk and Treasurer; who shall be elected annually on the second day of each Annual meeting of the Association by nominations from the floor. The Moderator and Vice-Moderator shall serve from the close of the next Annual Session. The Clerk and Treasurer, however, shall take office sixty days from the close of the Annual Session. The offices of Clerk and Treasurer may be held by the same person and no person shall be elected Moderator for more than two consecutive years. No officer shall be elected unless he is present and in harmony with his nomination and his denomination.

Article 6—Meetings

1. This Association shall meet Annually at such Date, Time, and Place as the Association shall have selected at its last Annual Session.
2. In the event of an emergency, the Executive Committee is authorized to make changes in the Time and Place for the Annual Meeting, as will best serve the interests of the Association.

Article 7—Amendments

The constitution and By-Laws of the Association may be amended at any Annual Meeting of the Association, by a two-thirds majority vote of the Messengers.

BYLAWS**Section 1—Duties of Officers**

1. The Duties of the Moderator shall be to preside, preserve order, and appoint all Committees not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.

2. The Duties of the Vice-Moderator shall be to assist the Moderator; and to preside in the absence of, or at the request of, the Moderator.

3. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the Association; supervise the printing and distribution of the minutes; keep a regular file of the published proceedings of the Association; and deliver same with other material belonging to the office to his successor.

The Clerk shall send to the clerks of the Churches of the Association the Associational Letter Form Blanks thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting; also the material to the chairmen of the Standing Committees, who are to submit reports of our work at the Annual Session.

The Clerk shall notify after the adjournment of the Association, all Persons, Committees, and Chairmen and Standing Committees, of their elections or appointments of service.

The Clerk shall receive remuneration for his service, the sum to be fixed by the Association at each Annual Meeting; also he shall receive additional funds from the Association for the expenses of his office.

4. The Treasurer shall keep a correct record of all Associational Funds received and disbursed by his office and shall submit a record of all transactions of his office to the Executive Meeting at their quarterly meeting and to the Association at its Annual Meeting. The Treasurer shall be the Chairman of the Finance Committee.

5. The Duties of the Executive Committee shall be to transact all business of the Association between its Annual Meetings; and a written report of its work shall be submitted to the association.

In the event a vacancy occurs in any office of the Association between the Annual Meetings; the Executive Committee is authorized to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term of office; if not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and Bylaws.

Section 2—Committees

The Standing Committees of the Association shall be:
1—Middle Florida Baptist Assembly; 2—Associations Missions; 3—Budget and Finance; 4—Christian Education; 5—Christian Literature; 6—Committee on Committees; 7—Cooperative Program; 8—Digest of Letters; 9—Evangelism; 10—Florida Baptist Children's Home; 11—Ministerial Relief and Annuities; 12—Obituaries; 13—Publicity; 14—Resolutions; 15—United Christian Action; 16—Time, Place, and Preacher; 17—Baptist Hospital Charity Committee.

Section 3—Committees

1. All Standing Committees shall consist of a chairman and as many members as needed; who shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees, consisting of Moderator, Vice Moderator, and Clerk; these Committees shall be selected in advance and presented to the Association for its approval on the first day of its Annual Session.

2. All Special Committees shall consist of not less than Three nor more than Five Members; who shall be appointed by the Moderator.

3. The Committee on Order of Business shall consist of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and Clerk.

4. The Executive Committee of this Association shall be composed of:

- (1) One member from each church elected by the church and reported to the association in the regular church letter each year.
- (2) The pastor of each and every church in the association.
- (3) The presiding officer of each associational organization.
- (4) The member of the State Board of Missions.
- (5) The Field Secretary, All ministers of music, all ministers of Education and all retired ministers as advisory members. Advisory members do not have a vote but we welcome their ideas.

The Executive Committee shall meet quarterly, at a time and place that may be decided by the committee itself.

The officers of the Executive Committee, together with the presiding officers of the associational organizations shall constitute a Steering Committee that shall have the power to transact any business of the association that may be necessary during the time between the regular meeting of the Executive Committee; providing, that in the event the association is not organized as indicated above, then the Steering Committee shall be composed of the officers of the Executive Committee and four other such members of the Executive Committee as shall be elected by the Executive Committee.

The Steering Committee shall meet once each month or as often as the Chairman may call it into session.

Section 4—Committees, Duties of

1. The Duties of the Standing Committees and the Special Committees, shall be those which are commonly understood, and observed by Baptist Associations and Conventions, as suggested by their names.

2. The Duties of the Committee on the Order of Business shall be to prepare the Program for each Annual Meeting; and to select the Speakers not otherwise provided for in Constitution and Bylaws.

3. The Duties of the Committee on Time, Place, and Preacher, shall be to recommend to the Association while in session and to the Executive Committee interim if the need should arise. The date, time, and place of the next meeting of the Association, and the minister and his alternate who shall be selected to preach the Introductory Sermon and the Minister and his alternate who shall be selected to preach the Missionary Sermon.

4. Sunday School, Training Union, Brotherhood, W. M. U., and Music Nominating Committees shall offer nominations for election to office of all Associational Officers and workers whose nomination and election has not already been provided for in the Constitution and Bylaws.

5 Except as provided by the Constitution and Bylaws members of standing Committees shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association, it being understood that those elected by the Association shall begin their term of service at the close of each Annual Associational meeting and serve therein through the next regular Associational Meeting. It being understood and herein provided for that in the event of a vacancy or vacancies interim on said committees, the Committee on Committees shall offer nominations for election to the Executive Committee at its next regular or special meeting. The responsibility of such election interim being that of the Executive Committee.

Section 5

The Association shall have an Introductory and a Missionary Sermon at each Annual Meeting, the hours for the sermons to be provided for in the Order of Business.

Section 6

The fiscal year of the Association shall begin October first of each year, and end September thirtieth of the following year, both dates inclusive; and all reports to the Association shall conform to these dates.

Section 7

All Departments mentioned in Section 4, Page 16, shall present a complete report to the Association at its Annual Session. All written reports of Committees shall be limited to a maximum of six hundred words; and the Clerk is authorized if necessary, to edit reports to conform to this word limitation.

Section 8

When a church fails to send in an Annual Letter, the clerk shall make no mention of that church in the Annual Report.

Section 9

The Clerks of the Churches are requested to get their letter to the Associational Clerk as early as possible.

Section 10

The Parliamentary Law which shall be used by this Association in the government of its business proceedings, shall be Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law.

It is understood, that this Association shall ever adhere to the Principles and Practices of recognized Baptist Policies in all its Proceedings, its Methods, and its Word.

Report On Stewardship And The Cooperative Program

The Cooperative Program is the fundamental, effective, indispensable channel for the support of missions at home and around the world. It is the basic finance program of Southern Baptists, and demands the continual support of all Southern Baptist Churches. Through it, we achieve the purposes of our denomination, and make it possible for every gift, regardless of size to go to the support of all our common endeavors.

In cooperation with, and support of our cooperative program, the Stewardship Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention has developed three programs that will continue to be of great value to our churches.

The Forward Program of Church Finance, now called the Forward Program Of Christian Stewardship, is the oldest program, and has served well the churches that have chosen to use it through the years.

Last year the above program was joined by a new stewardship development program for churches up to three hundred members, called growth in Christian Stewardship. These two programs aid churches in developing giving congregations.

Early in 1964, a third program entitled, Year-Round Stewardship Development, will be available for churches to use in keeping Christian Stewardship before the people all through the year.

RECOMMENDATION:

1. That our churches focus attention upon world missions by observing October as Cooperative Program Month. We suggest that our churches use Wednesday prayer services to pray for world missions.
2. That every church put the Cooperative Program in the church budget on a percentage basis.
3. That the 2 Plus Plan be used, by which a church gives at least 2 per cent more of the total church budget to world missions than they did the previous year through the Cooperative Program.
4. That every church select the stewardship program best fitted to its needs, and use that plan for its promotional plan.

11. Report of Florida Baptist Foundation by Mr. D. S. McLeod and approved.**Florida Baptist Foundation Report**

The Florida Baptist Foundation is an agency of the Florida Baptist Convention concerned with the support of all causes fostered or supported by the Convention.

The Foundation operates under the direction of fifteen of the best qualified and finest laymen, and one pastor. These trustees meet annually to receive reports from committees and determine general policies. An executive committee is elected from the trustees, and serves in operational matters. These trustees serve without compensation, and pay their own expense in connection with all meetings.

The Foundation is concerned with assisting men and women in preparing wills favoring Baptist causes, setting up trust funds, and establishing endowments.

Professional guidance is available to the Foundation in the field of investments. The Trust Department of the Florida National Bank, Jacksonville, makes suggestions as to investments. Remarkable progress has been made in the investment field, and earnings are considered good.

The Audit of September 30, 1962 shows \$792,204.83 held by the Foundation compared to \$730,012.21 held at the same time the previous year. None of this money is owned by the Foundation, but it is held as specified by the trust or will covering the particular fund. No part of these funds can be spent except as specified in the agreement.

Partial settlement of one large estate has been received, and final settlement is expected soon.

The part received by Baptist causes will amount to more than \$80,000.00.

Mr. Gus Johnson is Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Foundation and is ready to help anyone interested in this great cause.

Report Of Relief And Annuity Board

The Southern Baptist Protection Plan now provides a special death benefit for all members, both ministers and denominational workers, under 40 years of age. It covers both natural and accidental death.

BENEFITS PAID — Interesting figures to show what the Annuity Board has paid out since its beginning in 1918, more than \$41 million have been paid in Relief and Annuity benefits. Last year these benefits totaled more than 3 million paid to more than 4,500 ministers and denominational workers or their families, who were members of a retirement plan and to approximately 750 on the relief rolls.

MEMBERSHIP IN RETIREMENT PLANS, as of April 1, 1963, there were 15,904 or 49 per cent of the total churches in the Southern Baptist Convention having any part in the Annuity Board's retirement program for their pastors. Out of a total of 212 educational institutions, hospitals, children's homes, and homes for the aged, 121 are enrolled in an Annuity Board retirement plan with their employees. Total membership in all the Board's plans is about 25,000.

FIELD REPRESENTATIVES — Our Representative for this state is Rev. Phil Maxwell, 1105 Sarasota Drive, Tallahassee, Florida. He is trying to enlist more of our churches and pastors in this our Annuity Plan of plans. We ought to have at least half of our churches and workers enlisted in this our own Southern Baptist Plan.

Rev. Maxwell is available at any time to help in any way by answering your letters or coming to a group. Feel free to write him asking any question that you would like to have answered, he is always ready to serve.

Christian Education Report

Our greatest hope of building a bulwark against the satanic forces lies in Christian Education. Southern Baptists today are keenly interested in a sane Christian balance between academic learning and spiritual development. Our denomination

and schools must work together in building this two way street.

Florida Baptist have two schools, Stetson University, the oldest in the state, and the Baptist Bible Institute. Stetson enrolled last year 2686 students, 501 were Baptist young people; 87 Stetson students are committed to church-related vocations, 43 are ministerial students, 4 are home and foreign mission volunteers, 13 are studying to be ministers of education and 27 ministers of music.

Baptist Bible Institute offers special training for students who do not qualify for college training. The past year 225 were enrolled. Members of the student body came from 18 different states, with 121 of them from Florida. Baptist Bible Institute is ministering to a large segment of the Southeastern part of our country. We are proud of the high quality of work being done by both of our schools.

Baptists firmly believe in Christian Education. We know we must have the very best leadership for our churches, institutions and denominations in the years to come. Let us strengthen our institutions, guide our Baptist young people to attend our Baptist schools, and undergird the administration faculties and student bodies with the spirit of love and constant prayer. Christian Education is the greatest weapon we have to fight atheistic communism.

Report On Florida Baptist Retirement Centers

The first unit of these Retirement Centers is located at Vero Beach, a beautiful location.

It is hoped that each Association in our state will eventually have such a Center for our retired Ministers, Officers, and Workers, and also for retired Christian laymen and women.

Florida is an ideal place for retirement, and our Centers should be models, with a warm spiritual atmosphere, requiring applicants to have recommendation from their Pastor, Deacon, and the Church, as to Christian spirit, as well as their activities.

Our Centers are not a Nursing Home — but each Center has a "sick bay", for temporary illness, and periodic visits of a doctor or nurse will be arranged. No provision can be made for special or individual diets.

Residents are responsible for furnishings and keeping their rooms in order. Community facilities are provided.

Our Retirement Centers are not endowed, since all available funds are needed for the erection of buildings, etc.

In motel units, the charge is \$125.00 per month per person, for room, board, and general expenses.

In cottages, equipped for light-housekeeping for two persons, a 'Founders Fee' of \$8,000.00 or more, according to accommodations desired. These may be rented.

For full information write Florida Baptist Retirement Centers, Vero Beach, Florida.

A "Founders Fee" of \$4,000.00 is also applicable to motel units. All 'Founders Fees' are for life tenancy.

22. Report of Baptist Literature and Florida Baptist Witness by Rev. Brady Brinkley.

Report On Baptist Literature And The Florida Baptist Witness

"Forasmuch as many have taken in hand to set forth in order a declaration of those things which are most surely believed among us . . . it seemed good to me also . . . to write . . . that thou mightest know the certainty of those things, wherein thou hast been instructed." These excerpts from Luke 1:1-4 set the pattern for the writing of the Gospel that the early Christians might be more perfectly instructed in their faith.

These same words seem an appropriate background for the work of those who edit and publish Baptist literature that has become vitally important to our Christian living and to our churches. These publications are not only instruments of instruction, but also valuable sources of information about the religious and moral trends of our changing world. These same publications become tools of evangelism, missions and stewardship, both in the churches and in the missions established by them.

The 28 Baptist State papers, at the 1963 convention, reported that their circulation was some 78,000,000 copies mailed last year.

Our own state paper, the Florida Baptist Witness, (as of August 1, 1963) is going into 65,189 homes in 895 different churches, with 759 of these churches using the budget plan for at least a portion of their membership. An increasing number are sending the paper to every resident family. One hundred thirty-six other churches have small clubs of subscription. Some thirty to thirty-five thousand Baptist Homes in Florida, however, are not yet receiving the paper. There are also still 432 Florida Baptist Churches which are saving a little and losing a lot by failing to take advantage of the most economical medium of information which they can possibly provide their members, a subscription to the Florida Baptist Witness.

We urge every church to send the Witness to every resident family. In spite of all increases in production costs, the paper is still available through the church budget plan for the low cost of \$1.20 per year, which may be paid in installments of only 10c per month for each family on the church's subscription list.

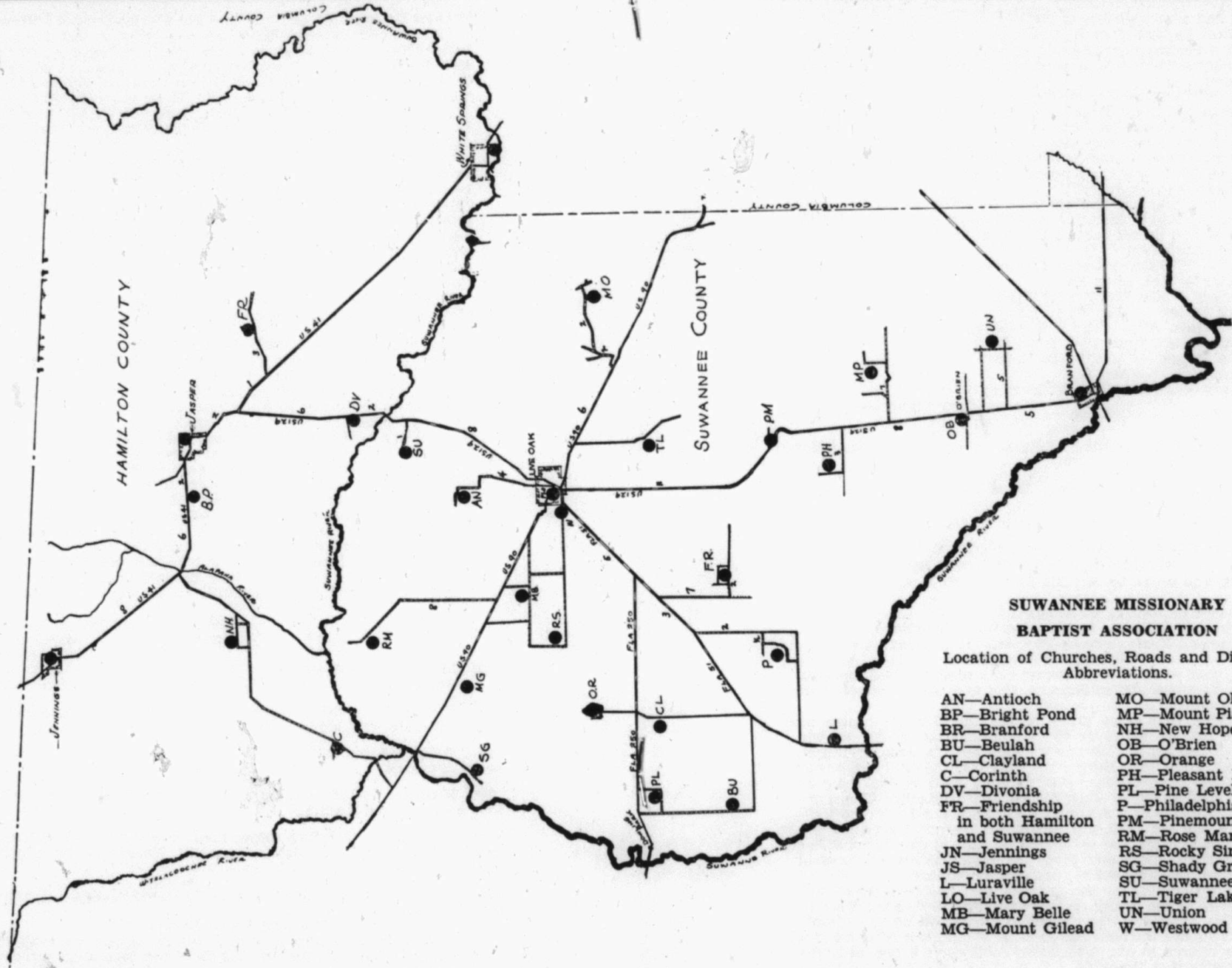

(b) Hospital Report by Mr. Charles Howes.

Hospital Charity Report

At this time there are 48 Baptist Hospitals located from Miami, Florida, to Yuma, Arizona, and from Kansas City, Missouri, to San Antonio, Texas. Most of these are owned and operated by State Conventions of Southern Baptists. The ownership of some is in the hands of local associations. Southern Baptist Hospital in New Orleans and Baptist Memorial Hospital, Jacksonville, Florida, are owned by all Southern Baptists and operated in their behalf by a Southern Baptist Convention agency.

During the year covered by this report, the Convention's hospitals operated at near-capacity. The combined total of 800 beds were occupied by 35,953 patients. An average of 97 new patients were admitted each day.

Baptist Memorial Hospital has received intensive study

throughout the year. Chairman Hardy Harrell of the Jacksonville Administrative Committee and Administrator Lawrence R. Payne have led in surveys that indicate the need to proceed with long-range development of the institution into a medical center complex. Whether this should be attempted is under active consideration; confidence has been expressed that doubling present capacity would likely not meet even current needs.

Each year our churches throughout North Florida ban together to form a charity board to take care of patients that are unable to pay and on Mother's Day, we receive a special offering for this. In the years past our Association has not received as much money as our people have received benefits. We urge our churches to look with favor on this worthwhile cause this year.

Music Report

The year 1964 should be a very significant one for Baptists

in America. The Associational music ministry organization can do much to encourage our churches to participate in this "Jubilee" year by planning hymn sings, schools of training, carol sings, and generally promoting better music.

There are some 375 churches in music training out of approximately 1500 churches in the state during 1962-63. This is an area which has failed in our Association. It is hoped that our churches will recognize their musical needs and endeavor to inform themselves by having some training schools this next year. The Associational organization and the Church Music Department of the Florida Baptist Convention stands ready to assist every church with its music training needs. Special application forms for workers may be secured from the Church Music Department of the Florida Baptist Convention, 1230 Hendricks Ave., Jacksonville 7, Florida.

This past year the Associational music ministry organization showed 43 out of 47 associations held Associational Festivals. Our Associational Festival was held at the First Baptist Church, Live Oak, on January 27, 1963. There were four churches represented at the Festival with four choirs participating and three hymn players. This was not the participation that was anticipated, but it is hoped that many of our churches will send their choirs next year to the Associational Festival in January, 1964.

Three of our churches participated in the State Music Festival in Lake City in February, 1963, and there was one hymn player participating from this Association.

There will be 11 State Music Festivals in 1964. The State Music Festival nearest us will be held at the First Baptist Church, Perry, Florida, February 14 and 15. We plan to encourage our churches to participate in this Festival.
