Church Covenant

"Having been led, as we believe, by the Spirit of God to receive the Lord Jesus Christ as our Saviour, and on the profession of our faith, having been baptized in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, we do now in the presence of God, angels and this assembly, most solemnly and joyfully enter into Covenant with one another, as one body in Christ."

"We engage therefore, by the aid of the Holy Spirit, to walk together in Christian love; to strive for the advancement of this Church in knowledge, holiness, and comfort; to promote its prosperity and spiritually, to sustain its worship, ordinances, discipline, and doctrines; to contribute cheerfully and regularly to the support of the ministry, the expenses of the Church, the relief of the poor, and the spread of the gospel through all nations."

"We also engage to maintain family and secret devotion: to religiously educate our children; to seek the salvation of our kindred and acquaintances; to walk circumspectly in the world; to be just in our dealings, faithful in our engagements, and exemplary in our deportment; to avoid all tattling, backbiting, and excessive anger. To abstain from the sale and use of intoxicating drinks and beverages, and to be zealous in our efforts to advance the kingdom of our Saviour."

"We further engage to watch over one another in brotherly love; to remember each other in prayer, to aid each other in sickness and distress; to cultivate Christian sympathy in feeling

and courtesy in speech; to be slow to take offense, but always ready for reconciliation, and mindful of the rules of our Saviour to secure it without delay."

"We moreover engage that when we move from this place, we will as soon as possible unite with some other church, where we can carry out the Spirit of this Covenant and the principles of God's Word."

SUGGESTIONS ON STARTING A MISSION ORGANIZATION OF A CHURCH AND ORDAINING A PREACHER "HOW TO START A NEW MISSION"

1. Pastor and Church Missions Committee should pray for the Holy Spirit's leadership.
2. Make a survey to determine the best location.
3. Seek advice and guidance from the Associational Missions Committee and the Field Secretary.
4. Urge members of sponsoring church to take active leadership and work in the new work.
5. Determine the role of the sponsoring church.
 - (A) Secure property, building, equipment, and put up signs, etc.
 - (B) Mission pastor or Director.
 - (C) Supply furniture, literature, hymn books, records, etc.
 - (D) Set up date for first service.
 - (E) Visit prospects for attendance, invite pastors, associational officers etc., for first service.
 - (F) Advertise, use: Newspaper, handbills, letters, radio, church publicity, telephone, etc.
 - (G) Adopt policy for regulation of relationship between sponsoring church and mission.

How To Organize A New Church

1. Any group of Baptists desiring to organize a New Baptist Church within the bounds of the Suwannee Missionary Baptist Association, and expecting to apply for membership in the Association are respectfully asked to follow a consistent form of organization.
 - (1) The sponsoring church should make preparation toward the day the Mission is to be constituted into a church. The following suggestions are offered. The Mission should have:
 - (a) Spiritual and Trained leadership.
 - (b) Full program of Baptist Organization.
 - (c) Financial stability.
 - (d) Doctrinal soundness.
 - (e) Denominational Loyalty.
 - (f) A good Constitution and By-Laws.
 2. The sponsoring church should call a council of pastors and deacons from at least three churches in good standing with the Association; also the Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Chairman of Associational Missions Committee and the Field Secretary to assist with the Organization.
 - (a) Time and place is designated.
 - (b) Due notice is given all concerned.
 3. The council assembled for the purpose of organization should organize itself by the election of a moderator and clerk before any other procedure. The following order is suggested:
 - (a) Service of Constitution (Pastor of sponsoring church

presided until the new church is constituted).

- (b) Purpose of meeting is stated.
- (c) Reading of roll of members to form the new church.
- (d) Articles of Faith presented and adopted.
- (e) Church Covenant read and adopted.
- (f) Report of Council should be read.
- (g) Sermon of Constitution.
- (h) Prayer of Constitution.
- (i) New Church in business session.
 - (1) Selection of name.
 - (2) Call a pastor (pastor of sponsoring presides).
 - (3) Election of officers.
 - (4) Time extended for reception of charter members.
- (j) Offering for World Missions.

4. If the new church desires to become a member of the Suwannee Baptist Association, application should be made in writing, with a roll of membership, stating the above procedure has been followed, to the Executive Committee or at a regular session of the Association, and may be accepted upon recommendation of the Committee of Petitionary Letters.

5. If any applicant church has been in another fellowship of Baptist, or if there is any question as to whether the applicant has met all of the conditions stated above, the application shall be automatically received and referred to the Committee of Petitionary Letters.

The Committee shall make full investigation, and offer all aid possible in helping the applicant church to meet the required conditions, and the applicant should be considered at the next regular session of the Association.

Ordination Of A Missionary Baptist Preacher

With a desire that the pastors and churches of our Association shall have fellowship, and the form of Ordination of our preachers shall be regular, we suggest the following order of Ordination.

Any man feeling the call to preach the Gospel, who is a member of a regular Missionary Baptist Church, and has been called to serve as a pastor, should ask the church of which he is a member to arrange for his ordination.

1. The following is the regular and accepted procedure:
 - (a) The church desiring the ordination should invite several ordained preachers and deacons in good standing with the denomination to sit together as a council for the examination of the candidate.
 - (b) The examination should be held before the date set for the ordination service. By using this plan, the examination can be thorough, it could save embarrassment to the church and the candidate. No foregone approval should exist as to the man appearing for ordination.
 - (c) The candidate should be examined as to his conversion, his call to the ministry and his belief in the Scriptural doctrines.
 - (d) At the close of the examination the recommendation of the council is prepared, and if favorable, a date is set for the Ordination service. — It is customary to have an ordination sermon, charge to the church and candidate, the ordination prayer and the laying on of hands. Many churches present the candidate

with a Bible, after which the right hand of fellowship and greeting is given. The service is concluded with prayer.

The ordination of ministers other than pastors should be left to the discretion of the local church.

Ordination of Deacons

Realizing that this is a matter which solely concerns the local church, we suggest the same general procedure to that of a preacher. This will enable both the deacon and any church which may elect him to serve as a deacon, to feel that his ordination was sound and in good order.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. OF THE SCRIPTURES

We believe that the Holy Bible was written by men Divinely inspired, and a perfect treasure for heavenly instruction; that it has God for its Author, salvation for its end, and truth without any mixture of error for its matter; that it reveals the principles by which God will judge us; and therefore is, and shall remain to the end of the world, the true center of Christian union, and the supreme standard by which all human conduct, creeds and opinions should be tried.

2. OF THE TRUE GOD

We believe that there is One, and only One living and true God, an Infinite, intelligent Spirit, Whose Name is Jehovah, the Maker and Supreme Ruler of Heaven and Earth; inexpressibly glorious in Holiness, and worthy of all possible honor, confidence and love; that in the Unity of the Godhead there are Three Persons, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost; equal in every Divine Perfection, and executing distinct but harmonious Offices in the great work of Redemption.

3. OF THE FALL OF MAN

We believe that Man was created in holiness, under the law of his Maker; but by voluntary transgression fell from that holy and happy state; in consequence of which all Mankind are now sinners, not by constraint but choice; being by nature utterly void of that holiness required by the law of God; positively inclined to evil; and therefore under just condemnation to eternal ruin, without defense or excuse.

4. OF THE WAY OF SALVATION

We believe that the salvation of sinners is wholly of Grace; through the Mediatorial office of the Son of God; Who by the appointment of the Father, freely took upon Him our nature, yet without our sin; honored the Divine law by His Personal obedience, and by His death made a full Atonement for our sins; that having risen from the dead, He is now enthroned in heaven; and uniting in His wonderful Person the tenderest sympathies with Divine Perfections, He is every way qualified to be a suitable, a compassionate, and all-sufficient Saviour.

5. OF JUSTIFICATION

We believe that the great Gospel blessing which Christ secures to such as believe in Him is Justification; that Justification includes the pardon of sin, and the promise of eternal life on principles of righteousness; that is bestowed, not in consideration of any works of righteousness which we have done, but solely through Faith in the Redeemer's Blood; by virtue of which faith His Perfect righteousness is freely imputed to us of God; that it brings us into a state of most blessed peace and favor with God, and secures every other blessing needful for time and eternity.

6. OF THE FREEDOM OF SALVATION

We believe that the blessings of salvation are made free to all by the Gospel; that it is the immediate duty of all to accept them by a cordial penitent and obedient faith; and that nothing prevents the salvation of the greatest sinner on earth, but his own inherent depravity and voluntary rejection of the Gospel; which involves him in an aggravated condemnation.

7. OF GRACE IN REGENERATION

We believe that in order to be saved, sinners must be regenerated, or be born again; that regeneration consists in giving a holy disposition to the mind; that it is effected in a manner above our comprehension by the power of the Holy Spirit, in connection with Divine truth, so as to secure our voluntary obedience to the Gospel; and that its proper evidence appears in the holy fruits of repentance, and faith, and newness of life.

8. OF REPENTANCE AND FAITH

We believe that Repentance and Faith are sacred duties, and also inseparable Graces, wrought in our souls by the regenerating Spirit of God; whereby being deeply convinced of our guilt, danger and helplessness, and of the way of salvation by Christ, we turn to God with unfeigned contrition, confession, and supplication for mercy; at the same time heartily receiving the Lord Jesus Christ for our Prophet, Priest, and King, and relying on Him alone as the Only and All-sufficient Saviour.

9. OF GOD'S PURPOSE OF GRACE

We believe that Election is the Eternal purpose of God, according to which He graciously regenerates, sanctifies, and saves sinners; that being perfectly consistent with the free agency of man, it comprehends all the means in connection with the end; that it is a most glorious display of God's Sovereign Goodness, being infinitely free, wise, holy, and unchangeable; that it utterly excludes boasting, and promotes humility, love, prayer, praise, trust in God, and active imitation of His free mercy; that it may be ascertained by its effects in all who truly believe the Gospel; that it is the foundation of Christian assurance; and that to ascertain it with regard to ourselves demands and deserves the utmost diligence.

10. OF SANCTIFICATION

We believe that Sanctification is the process by which, according to the Will of God, we are made partakers of His Holiness; that it is a progressive work; that it is begun in regeneration; and that it is carried on in the hearts of believers by the presence and power of the Holy Spirit the Sealer and Comforter, in the continual use of the appointed means—especially, the Word of God, self-examination, self-denial, watchfulness, and prayer.

11. OF THE PERSEVERANCE OF SAINTS

We believe that such only are real believers as endure unto the end; that their persevering attachment to Christ is the grand mark which distinguishes them from superficial professors; that a special Providence watches over their welfare; and they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

12. OF THE HARMONY OF THE LAW AND THE GOSPEL

We believe that the Law of God is the eternal and unchangeable rule of His moral government; that it is holy just and good; and that the inability which the Scriptures ascribe to fallen men to fulfill its precepts, arises entirely from their love of sin; to deliver them from which, and to restore them through a Mediator to unfeigned obedience to the Law, is one great end of the Gospel, and of the Means of Grace connected with the establishment of the visible Church.

13. OF THE GOSPEL CHURCH

We believe that a visible Church of Christ is a Congregation of baptized believers, associated by Covenant in the faith and fellowship of the Gospel; observing the Ordinances of Christ; governed by His Laws; and exercising the gifts, rights, and privileges invested in them by His Word; that its only Scriptural officers are Bishops or Pastors and Deacons, whose qualifications, claims, and duties are defined in the Epistles to Timothy and Titus.

14. OF BAPTISM AND THE LORD'S SUPPER

We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion in water of a believer, into the Name of the Father, and Son, and Holy Ghost; to show forth in a solemn and beautiful emblem our faith in the crucified, buried, and risen Saviour, with its effects, in our death to sin and resurrection to a new life; that it is a prerequisite to the privilege of a Church relation; and to the Lord's Supper, in which the members of the Church by the sacred use of bread and wine, are to commemorate together the dying love of Christ; preceded always by solemn self-examination.

15. OF THE CHRISTIAN SABBATH

We believe that the first day of the week is the Lord's Day, or Christian Sabbath; and is to be kept sacred to religious purposes, by abstaining from all secular labor and sinful recreations, by the devout observance of all the means of Grace, both private and public; and by preparation for that rest that remaineth for the people of God.

16. OF CIVIL GOVERNMENT

We believe that Civil Government is a Divine appointment, for the interests and good order of human society; and that magistrates are to be prayed for, conscientiously honored, and obeyed; except only in things opposed to the Will of our Lord Jesus Christ, Who is the only Lord of the conscience, and the Prince of the kings of the earth.

17. OF THE RIGHTEOUS AND THE WICKED

We believe that there is a radical and essential difference between the righteous and the wicked; that such only as through faith are justified in the Name of the Lord Jesus, and sanctified by the Spirit of Our God, are truly righteous in His esteem; while all such as continue in impenitence and unbelief are in His sight wicked, and under the curse; and this distinction hold among men both in and after death.

18. OF THE WORLD TO COME

We believe that the end of this world is approaching; that at the Last Day, Christ will descend from heaven, and raise the dead from the grave to final retribution; that a solemn separation will then take place; that the wicked will be adjudged to endless punishment, and the righteous to endless joy; and that this judgment will fix forever the final state of men in heaven or hell, on principles of righteousness.

CONSTITUTION**Article 1—Name**

This Organization shall be known as the Suwannee MISSIONARY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

Article 2—Purpose

The purpose of this Association shall be: To furnish a medium of co-operation for the Churches of the Association in their Divinely commissioned work of Missions, Education, and Benevolences; and to this end we seek to bring into co-operative fellowship the energies of our Churches for the Objects and Institutions fostered by the Florida Baptist Convention, and the Southern Convention.

Article 3—Churches

The Constituents of this Association shall be Missionary Baptist Churches of regular order, presenting petitionary letters from other Associations in due form; and Churches which may be constituted within the bounds of the Association, presenting proper credentials of organization and Articles of Faith, accompanied by properly accredited Messengers.

Article 4—Messengers

This Association shall be composed of Messengers holding membership in the Churches which constitute the Association; these Messengers having been duly elected by their respective Churches on the following basis: Each Church shall be entitled to Three Messengers without reference to their numerical strength; and one additional Messenger for each Twenty-five members or fraction thereof, after it has attained a membership of Fifty members.

Article 5—Officers

The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, a Vice-Moderator, a Clerk and Treasurer; who shall be elected annually on the first day of each Annual meeting of the Association by nominations from the floor. The Moderator and Vice-Moderator shall serve from the close of the next Annual Session. The Clerk and Treasurer, however, shall take office sixty days from the close of the Annual Session. The offices of Clerk and Treasurer may be held by the same person and no person shall be elected Moderator for more than two consecutive years. No officer shall be elected unless he is present and in harmony with his nomination and his denomination.

Article 6—Meetings

1. This Association shall meet Annually at such Date, Time,

and Place as the Association shall have selected at its last Annual Session.

2. In the event of an emergency, the Executive Committee is authorized to make changes in the Time and Place for the Annual Meeting, as will best serve the interests of the Association.

Article 7—Amendments

The Constitution and By-Laws of the Association may be amended at any Annual Meeting of the Association, by a two-thirds majority vote of the Messengers.

BY-LAWS

Section 1—Duties of Officers

1. The Duties of the Moderator shall be to preside, preserve order, and appoint all Committees not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.

2. The Duties of the Vice-Moderator shall be to assist the Moderator, and to preside in the absence of, or at the request of, the Moderator.

3. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the Association; supervise the printing and distribution of the minutes; keep a regular file of the published proceedings of the Association; and deliver same with other material belonging to the office of the successor.

The Clerk shall send to the clerks of the Churches of the Association the Associational Letter Form Blanks thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting; also the material to the chairmen of the Standing Committees, who are to submit reports of our work at the Annual Session.

The Clerk shall notify after the adjournment of the Association, all Persons, Committees, and Chairmen and Standing Committees, of their elections or appointments of service.

The Clerk shall receive remuneration for his service, the sum to be fixed by the Association at each Annual Meeting; also he shall receive additional funds from the Association for the expenses of his office.

4. The Treasurer shall keep a correct record of all Associational Funds received and disbursed by his office and shall submit a record of all transactions of his office to the Executive Meeting at their quarterly meeting and to the Association at its Annual Meeting. The Treasurer shall be the Chairman of the Finance Committee.

5. The duties of the Executive Committee shall be to transact all business of the Association between the Annual Meetings; and a written report of its work shall be submitted to the Association.

In the event a vacancy occurs in any office of the Association between the Annual Meetings; the Executive Committee is authorized to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term of office; if not otherwise provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.

Section 2—Committees

The Standing Committees of the Association shall be: 1—Middle Florida Baptist Assembly; 2—Association Missions; 3—Budget and Finance; 4—Christian Education; 5—Christian Litera-

ture; 6—Committee on Committees; 7—Cooperative Program; 8—Digest of Letters; 9—Evangelism; 10—Florida Baptist Children's Home; 11—Ministerial Relief and Annuities; 12—Obituaries; 13—Publicity; 14—Resolutions; 15—United Christian Action; 16—Time, Place and Preacher; 17—Baptist Hospital Charity Committee.

Section 3—Committees

1. All Standing Committees shall consist of a chairman and as many members as needed; who shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees consisting of Moderator, Vice Moderator, and Clerk; these Committees shall be selected in advance and presented to the Association for its approval on the first day of its Annual Session.

2. All Special Committees shall consist of not less than Three nor more than Five Members; who shall be appointed by the Moderator.

3. The Committee on Order of Business shall consist of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and Clerk.

4. The Executive Committee of this Association shall be composed of:

(1) One member from each church elected by the church and reported to the Association in the regular church letter each year.

(2) The pastor of each and every church in the association.

(3) The presiding officer of each associational organization.

(4) The member of the State Board of Missions.

(5) The Field Secretary, All ministers of music, all ministers of Education and all retired ministers as advisory members. Advisory members do not have a vote but we welcome their ideas.

The Executive Committee shall meet quarterly, at a time and place that may be decided by the committee itself.

The officers of the Executive Committee, together with the presiding officers of the associational organizations shall constitute a Steering Committee that shall have the power to transact any business of the association that may be necessary during the time between the regular meeting of the Executive Committee; providing, that in the event the association is not organized as indicated above, then the Steering Committee shall be composed of the officers of the Executive Committee and four other such members of the Executive Committee as shall be elected by the Executive Committee.

The Steering Committee shall meet once each month or as often as the Chairmen may call it into session.

Section 4—Committees, Duties of

1. The duties of the Standing Committees and the Special Committees, shall be those which are commonly understood, and observed by Baptist Associations and Conventions, as suggested by their names.

2. The Duties of the Committee on the Order of Business shall be to prepare the Program for each Annual Meeting; and to select the Speakers not otherwise provided for in Constitution and By-Laws.

3. The Duties of the Committee on Time, Place, and Preacher, shall be to recommend to the Association while in session and to the Executive Committee interim if the need should arise. The date, time, and place of the next meeting of the Association,

and the minister and his alternate who shall be selected to preach the Introductory Sermon and the Minister and his alternate who shall be selected to preach the Missionary Sermon.

4. Sunday School, Training Union, Brotherhood, W.M.U., and Music Nominating Committees shall offer nominations for election to office of all Associational Officers and workers whose nomination and election has not already been provided for in the Constitution and By-Laws.

5. Except as provided by the Constitution and By-Laws members of standing Committees shall be nominated by the Committee on Committees and elected by the Association, it being understood that those elected by the Association shall begin their term of service at the close of each Annual Association meeting and serve therein through the next regular Associational Meeting. It being understood and herein provided for that in the event of a vacancy or vacancies interim on said committees, the Committee on Committees shall offer nominations for election to the Executive Committee at its next regular or special meeting. The responsibility of such election interim being that of the Executive Committee.

Section 5

The Association shall have an Introductory and a Missionary Sermon at each Annual Meeting, the hours for the sermons to be provided for in the Order of Business.

Section 6

The fiscal year of the Association shall begin October first of each year, and end September thirtieth of the following year, both dates inclusive; and all reports to the Association shall conform to these dates.

Section 7

All Departments mentioned in Section 4, Page 16, shall present a complete report to the Association at its Annual Session. All written reports of Committees shall be limited to a maximum of six hundred words; and the Clerk is authorized if necessary, to edit reports to conform to this word limitation.

Section 8

When a church fails to send in an Annual Letter, the clerk shall make no mention of that church in the Annual Report.

Section 9

The Clerks of the Churches are requested to get their letter to the Associational Clerk as early as possible.

Section 10

The Parliamentary Law which shall be used by this Association in the government of its business proceedings, shall be Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law.

It is understood, that this Association shall ever adhere to the Principles and Practices of recognized Baptist Policies in all its Proceedings, its Methods, and its Word.

10. It was the action of the Association that, for the coming year 1964-65, Bro. John Hutcherson, Pastor of the Antioch Bap-

tist Church be elected as Moderator; that Bro. Allen Price, Pastor of the Branford Church, be elected as Vice-Moderator; that Bro. Truett Comer, Pastor of the Divonia Baptist Church, be elected as Clerk; and Bro. J. M. Robinson, be elected as Treasurer of the Association.

11. A motion was made that the businesses in Suwannee County that sell beer be referred to the Resolutions Committee to draw up a Resolution that Christian people not trade with them, until beer be removed from their shelves. Motion carried.

12. Instead of the Moderator's Message, an inspiring letter from the Moderator was read to the Association by the Vice-Moderator.

Annual Report Of United Christian Action, Inc.

Spiritually, a sin-sickness of epidemic proportions destroys more, and younger, victims each day. While our churches grow in numbers and size, spiritually-dwarfism abounds.

Consider these facts:

1. The evil and greed of those who traffic in ALCOHOL spreads increasing moral decline in Florida. The state issued two thousand new alcoholic drink licenses in the past two years, increasing the total to 18,600 legalized liquor outlets, selling annually 80 million gallons of beer-wine-whiskey, for over \$500 million dollars. When all the "contributions" to human misery, economic loss and depravity are totaled up, the liquor traffic costs Floridians twenty times as much as it produces in tax income.

2. The evil and greed of those who traffic in GAMBLING spreads increasing MORAL DECLINE IN Florida. The unholy alliance of those who own the 16 dog tracks, 6 horse tracks and 6 Jai Alia Frontons, all licensed for gambling by the state, with unscrupulous officials and others who manipulate the weakness of their fellow man, has produced an environment which cannot expect God's help in survival. Over \$400 million dollars a year is poured into these legalized gambling traps.

3. The evil and greed of those who traffic in pornographic literature and other forms of obscenity spreads moral decline in Florida. The "filth" that once dismayed and sickened the public conscience is now accepted and ignored. The festering decay continues.

4. While many public officials and community leaders parrot the propaganda line put out by liquor-gambling-obscenity promoters that by legalizing evil it can be better "controlled," every dependable study shows that Florida has a tremendous amount of illegal liquor-gambling-vice; a crime, suicide, illegitimacy, delinquency rate often double the national rate; an overwhelming tide of emotionally disturbed persons and welfare cases; a greatly underfinanced school system; many public services of below average quality and quantity. All of this in spite of the professed belief by many that "tax income" from liquor and gambling would make Florida a utopia. Instead, it is fast becoming another Sodom and Gomorrah.

There are some encouraging signs. Although our peril is great, our spiritual resources to combat and overcome moral erosion are unlimited. The liquor-gambling-obscenity profiteers

are operating under a tighter binding of the barbed-wire strangulation of their own self-destruction. Greed begets greed, and if one simple word correctly describes these merchants of misery (whether it be grocery, newspaper, TV, radio, wholesaler, trucker, can maker, or joint operator) GREED is that word. They fear the day when God's people will use the sword of the Lord as it could and should be used.

The feeling of hopeless frustration in the fact of the vast power of the liquor-gambling profiteers which has kept many Christians from making any real effort, is being replaced by a genuine righteous indignation which will eventually lead to an explosion of holy wrath. We will then recognize and accept our own responsibility, as individuals and as churches, to clean up the situation in our communities, to tear down the signs, take out the taverns, close the gambling traps, and stop the flow of faith that motivates human hurt and spiritual death. We cannot solve all problems by ourselves. We cannot end all evil. But we can do our part.

16. Bro. H. L. Johns moved the adoption of the Christian Literature report as given in the Book of Reports, motion carried.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

H. L. JOHNS

All Christians everywhere should emphasize the importance of reading Christian literature. Christians should be well informed as to basis principles in Christianity. Many publications today are not worthy of the time it takes to read them. The reading of good books has much to do with our thinking. "As a man thinketh in his heart, so is he." Walking the Christian pathway in life is a matter of choice with the individual. In like manner the reading of good books and Christian literature is a matter of choice. Ruskin has said if we read this book, we may not have time to read that one. Hence, the individual should be trained so as to make a wise selection in the things he reads.

Since we have so many demands upon our time, it is beyond the ability of anyone to make the study necessary for the choice he should make. Therefore, we must all depend upon trustworthy sources of information on reference work and publications in which confidence can be placed.

For guidance in daily living the Bible is foremost in all our reading. We urge the daily reading and study of the Bible. The Southern Baptist is most trust worthy to be found. We urge its use in every church and home.

Every Baptist in Florida should be informed as to the activities and progress of our denominational work in the State. To all Churches that do not provide a copy of the Witness in every home, we suggest a budget plan whereby each family in the church may receive the Witness.

17. The Sunday School report was adopted as given in the Book of Reports.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

Julian M. Robinson

"Outreached for the Unreached . . . Spearhead for Evangelism" was the theme for the past year in our Sunday School work. It is our hope and prayer that as a result of our Witnessing Campaign in January and the follow up on it in our churches, that this past year has changed the downward trends in enrollment and evangelism in our Association.

We have had four Executive Meetings of the Associational Sunday School Officers and four Mass Sunday School meetings during the year, as well as one Witnessing Campaign sponsored by the Associational Sunday School. The "Action Night" meeting was held September 21st and was well attended. The Department also held three Group Training Schools and one Vacation Bible School Clinic, during the year.

We further report: 9 Vacation Bible Schools with an enrollment of 721 and 11 Professions of Faith. BROTHERHOOD REPORT

Brotherhood — Just to think of the word or hear it mentioned is a blessing within itself, especially if we stop to think what it really means to us. To some it may have a different meaning but to me it means a group of Christian men who loves one another and is dedicated to helping win the lost to Christ. It is also a Christian Fellowship organization where new ideas are born and promoted and many wonderful projects are carried out by men working together for the Glory of God.

We have in our Association 11 Brotherhoods with 234 members and Royal Ambassador Chapters with 89 boys enrolled making a total membership of 323.

We urge you if your church does not have a Brotherhood pray over this matter, for we believe that a church will go further with an active Brotherhood.

Royal Ambassadors: More and more Florida baptist men are manifesting their concern for boys. Brotherhood programs on Royal Ambassadors have made their contribution.

The three Congresses, held in Fort Lauderdale and Fort Walton Beach, reached 1,400 boys.

Three weeks of Royal Ambassador camps at Panama City had an enrollment of 314. Twenty-eight boys made professions of faith in Christ; 50 commitments to full-time service, and 71 rededications were made. Other commitments made a total of 149. A new high reached this year in the number of men coming to serve a week as cabin counselors.

Suwannee Missionary Baptist Association Music Report 1963-64

Our Music Department engaged in two major activities this year and have made tentative plans for a number of things in

We held our Associational Music School in February at Westwood Baptist Church with six churches taking part and seventeen earning study course awards.

Our Associational Festival was held at the First Baptist Church, Live Oak on January 26, 1964. There were six churches represented at the Festival with six choirs participating.

Two of our churches participated in the State Music Festival in Perry in February 1964. There will be 19 State Music Festivals in 1965. The State Music Festival nearest us will be held at the First Baptist Church, Madison, Florida, March 5 and 6, 1965.

We plan to encourage our churches to participate in this festival. In order to participate in the State Festival it will be necessary to first participate in the Associational Festival to be held in January.

It is hoped that more of our Churches along with their pastors, will come to the realization that a good Music program will help their churches to grow in all areas and that they will cooperate with the Associational officers and participate in the activities planned to help them promote better music in their churches.

The objective of the Church Music Department of the Florida Baptist Convention is to assist churches and associations in establishing, conducting, enlarging, and improving the music program in the churches.

The year 1965 is the year that we are going to promote WORSHIP. The Associational music ministry is the key to the promotion of this program. We hope that every Association will work to promote the training of people in the churches to read, sing, play and teach music for the glory of God. To this and many things are planned in which EACH church may participate such as music festivals, hymn sings, schools of training, music work shops, carol sings and general promotion of better music. This past year the Associational music ministry organization showed 42 out of 47 associational held Associational Festivals, 260 churches participated in the festivals with 617 choral groups, totaling 12,865 choir members—159 hymn players—36 song leaders—6 instrumental ensembles with a total of 39 participants. Our Associational Festival was held at First Baptist Church on January 26, 1964. We are planning to have a festival during January 1965.

EVANGELISM

The great Commission of our Lord, found in Matt. 28:19-20, Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, teaching them to observe all things, whatsoever I have commanded you, and lo, I am with you always even unto the end of the world. Amen.

In our state, 25 Associations during 1963 showed losses in baptisms and only 12 showed gains in baptisms in their report.

Suwannee Association at the close of 1963 reported 191 baptisms and 10 churches that reported no baptisms. We are glad to say that only 5 churches that report no baptisms at the close of 1964 year. We are happy to report a gain in baptisms with a total of 252 baptisms this past year.

It took a total of 6020 members to win 252 souls to Christ in this Association in 1963-64 year. That means it took 24 members to win one to Christ this past year. In Matt. 9:36, when Jesus saw the multitude, He was moved with compassion on them, because they were faint, and were scattered abroad, as sheep having no shepherd. How we need to see the lostness of humanity and with compassion for them, go out and bring them in to sit under the sound of the Gospel, which is the power of God unto salvation.

Dr. Warren reported at Ridgecrest, at the Home Mission Conference, that it took 29 church members last year to win just one to Christ, 5,500 churches had no baptisms last year, 19 out of 20 never attends any prayer meetings, 80 per cent of the American people never goes to church.

We need to call our churches to prayer, then go out and reach every lost soul and win them to Christ.

REPORT OF RADIO AND PUBLICITY

The Baptist Hour is broadcast over Radio Station WNER each Sunday at 8:35 A. M., with a listening potential of near 80,000, many of whom have never accepted our Saviour as theirs.

Through this media, we have been able to reach many sick and shut-ins. As well as many lost with the saving message of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

It is the Committee's desire that the Suwannee Baptist Association continue to support this Radio Ministry with our prayers and support.

HOSPITAL REPORT

J. G. Gaskins

The Christian impulse to befriend and help the sick and the troubled has flowered in church related hospitals, of which Southern Baptists now have 51. In a definition of purpose endorsed by Baptist hospitals, it is stated that "a Baptist hospital functions as an instrument of God's grace in the enriching and prolonging of human life within the scope of Divine Providence."

Within the year covered by this report more than a half-million individuals have been cared for in Baptist hospitals. Many of these could pay only a portion of the cost of their care. These have been ministered to "in Jesus' name" and in

the name of Southern Baptists with competence, skill and dignity. The cost of their care has been borne only fractionally by support from the denomination; the remainder has had to be provided from other sources, chiefly operating income.

Because the Southern Baptist Convention operates two hospitals directly, every Southern Baptist participates in some measure in the life and work of these institutions whether there is a Baptist hospital ministry in his state or not. Twenty-five thousand Cooperative Program dollars were channeled through the Southern Baptist Convention and through the Convention's two hospitals, in New Orleans, Louisiana and in Jacksonville, Florida, to the service of caring for those who otherwise could not be cared for. Eleven hundred forty-eight received this type of care through the two institutions and without charge by staff physicians. The total cost of this program of service for the year amounted to \$463,478.00.

During the course of the year realization of expansion plans in the two Convention owned hospitals drew nearer. The first phase of the expansion program in New Orleans, including a parking facility-laundry-power plant and a new ten-story apartment building for house staff were initiated (these being completed and put to use early in 1964). Under pressure for more medical and surgical beds in Jacksonville, a crash program was conceived to create nearly 90 new such beds to be completed during 1964 in a temporary structure attached to the present hospital. Long range plans for the Jacksonville institution are about complete and the first phase of actual construction should begin before the next report is made to the Associations.

ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS

"FLORIDA IS A MISSION FIELD." There is no question about this because we must provide all types of Southern Baptist Missionaries to an ever increasing population. We need to constantly strengthen our present witness as well as add new missions, churches, and new activities.

The strength of our work is dependent upon the response of the churches to cooperative giving. The hearts of men may be touched by God, but they will never be able to go unless we supply the means by giving.

The Convention has, also, voted to start a junior college program. Plans are being made by the Education Committee to bring a definite report to the State Convention Meeting in Tampa in November.

Other matters of importance will continue to claim our attention as Florida grows. One thing we should never forget, however, is the matter of winning the lost to Christ. No program is important, and no institution is necessary, when it stands in the way of evangelism in its most elementary form. BAPTIST BIBLE INSTITUTE

Dr. James Southerland

Baptist Bible Institute students average age 32, have a wife and two or three children, and usually have been deacons or other Baptist church leaders.

For such mature students we have a highly trained, experienced faculty. These men and women teach classes which parallel those in SBC seminaries, but without Hebrew and Greek. Chapel services, and field guidance classes led by visiting state and SBC denominational leaders, combine with classwork to produce both informed and loyal leaders for the churches.

Students must take 100 semester hours of class work, usually taking three years to graduate. One may choose a special emphasis in either pastoral training, religious education, or sacred music. Certain colleges now allow two years' credit for work done at the Institute.

We enrolled 232 last year, and 215 for the first semester of this year. This is 30 more than the first semester of last year. We confidently expect more students this year than ever before when both semesters of non-duplicating students are counted. We entered the new administration building in September, having occupied the new classroom building last March.

Dr. Lewis Curtis (A.B., B.D., Th.D.) has joined the faculty and will teach Biblical Theology. Miss Dorothy Wamble (A.B., W.S.M.) is the new Professor of Piano. Dr. E. W. Ware has resigned as Professor of New Testament; Mrs. Sanders resigned from the music department.

BUDGET. Our budget last year was \$205,546.50. Of this, \$114,104.48 came through the Florida Baptist Cooperative Program. The State Mission Offering to us was \$9,468.06. Designated gifts from churches and individuals came to \$31,923.64. The rest was from rentals, tuition fees, book sales, et cetera.

The recent building and endowment campaign brought cash and pledges amounting to \$175,000.00.

CURRENT NEEDS: We still need a library building, cafeteria, and student housing to include both dormitory and apartments. These are needs which we cannot put off very long.

STUDENT LOAN FUND: The student loan fund now has about \$27,000 available for students who show need.

CONCLUSION: Baptist Bible Institute is constantly working at its job, that of specializing in a field of Christian education which other Southern Baptist schools scarcely touch. We are making steady progress toward realizing the dreams of the founders. Because of the excellency of our faculty and the depth of our curriculum, students more and more seek us out. Upon graduation these men usually have pastorates; nearly every one is in demand immediately. We have no problem placing graduates.

OUR THANKS: We thank you for your love and support. As far as we are able we promise to merit your continuing cooperation. We are working with you as fellow-laborers for the King.

FLORIDA BAPTIST FOUNDATION

E. T. Horne

The Florida Baptist Foundation, an agency of the Florida Baptist Convention, concerned with the support of all causes supported by the Convention, has had another good year of service. Again, every agency and institution supported by the Convention has been named in wills prepared by the Foundation, and again this total amount goes over a million dollars.

The Foundation is concerned with assisting in the preparation of wills favoring Baptist causes, setting up trusts, and establishing endowments. We work in two fields. First, we seek to acquaint our Baptist people with the advantages of wills, trusts, and direct gifts. Second, we invest the funds coming to us with regard to safety and return on investments.

The audit of Sept. 30, 1963, shows \$863,825.68 held by the Foundation in various funds. The Foundation owns none of this money, but holds it in trust for the various institutions favored in wills or by gifts. All of this money must be handled as specified in the will or agreement.

At present the Foundation has been assigned the job of raising \$1,500,000 for Stetson University, and \$500,000 for Baptist Bible Institute. The Stetson money will be matched by Ford Foundation, and again by the trustees of Stetson, making a total of \$4,500,000 for Stetson. Good progress has been shown.

It is suggested that each church share its responsibility in this effort by placing the Christian Education Campaign in its budget to the amount of \$2.00 per resident church member for three years. We can reach the total goal in this manner. Many churches have already responded, and it is hoped that every church will have a part.

ANNUITY BOARD

J. M. Sullivan

NEW "LIFE BENEFIT PLAN" IS OFFERED TO CHURCH AND DENOMINATIONAL EMPLOYEES.

Every pastor, church and denominational employee is eligible for the new group term Life Benefit Plan being offered by the Annuity Board, regardless of whether they are a member of one of the Board's retirement plans. The Board is currently in a campaign to enlist the 3,000 members needed to put the Life Benefit Plan into effect, and hopes to have it in operation by October 1 of this year.

COST IS LOW—The new plan provides low cost life protection to members while in active service, during disability or in actual age retirement. Cost is only 1 per cent of the annual salary basis, with minimum basis of participation set at \$4,000 and maximum at \$12,000. Minimum payments will be \$3.34 a month and maximum payments, \$10.00. Car expense, housing and utility allowance, etc., may be added to the cash salary to allow the member to pay on a larger amount. All participation is on even thousands, and the cost remains the same every year unless the member's salary increases and he wants to increase payments accordingly.

BENEFITS ARE LARGE—The widow or beneficiary of a member 45 or under will receive 2½ times his salary basis of participation in the event of his death. Thus the widow of a man 44 years of age who was paying on a \$12,000 salary basis would receive \$30,000. If death was accidental her benefit would be twice this, or \$60,000. After the member passes 45, benefits are scaled downward by one-tenth of a per cent each year as he gets older. At age of 65, the member who joined during the first year of eligibility and paid at least 10 years continuously prior to retirement will have paid up benefit of \$1,000, or an amount equal to total contributions, if less than \$1,000. In case of total and presumably permanent disability, the members payments are waived, but his coverage continues.

Applications and information about the Life Benefit Plan may be obtained from the Annuity Board, 511 North Akard, Dallas, Texas, 75201, or from your state annuity secretary, whose address is given below.

Membership in Retirement Plans: As of May 1, 1964, there were 16,251, or 50 per cent of the total churches in the Southern Baptist Convention participating in the Annuity Board's retirement program with their pastors.

Benefits Paid: More than \$43½ million have been paid in relief and annuity benefits by the Annuity Board since its beginning in 1918. Last year benefits were more than \$3¼ million, and were paid to ministers and denominational workers or their families who were members of a retirement plan, and to those on the relief rolls.

FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

Garner Avery

The breakup of homes and the desertion of children has become altogether too common in our society. The sense of responsibility, if indeed many of our people have been taught any, has fled, and hundreds of children are deserted by one or both parents with little or no remorse for what they have done. The number of applications to our Children's Home during the spring and summer, indicate a turn for the worse in family relationships.

The Children's Home has four caseworkers, each of whom has graduated from an accredited school of social work. It is their business to counsel with children and parents, and in every case where good family life can be maintained, to keep them together. Their success is shown by the fact that 94 applications were withdrawn and 55 children were returned to their families or near relatives. Seventy-five children were admitted to the Homes in Lakeland and Miami for a total of 188 in residential care and 64 assisted through the Mother's Aid program. 1,094 counseling sessions were held with children and 682 with relatives.

It is the right of every child to have his own home. It is the responsibility of every parent to care for his child to the best of his ability. In fact, when children are admitted to the Home, parents are asked to pay toward support of their children if at all possible. When parents are unable to care for their children, it becomes the privilege of an institution such as ours, to help. Many excellent men and women have spent some time or have been reared in our Children's Home. Those who are so unfortunate as to need help because of the breakup of their home, should be given assistance if possible.

If the members of our churches would give 2 cents a week for child care, we could double the number we are now helping, and who knows but that some of those children might be ours.

We trust you will place the poster for the Thanksgiving offering in a prominent place in your church so that who wish to help in the care of our children, may be prepared when the offering is taken.
