The report of the Committee on Foreign Missions was read by Rev. C. D. Creasman. Pending adoption it was discussed by Rev. C. D. Creasman, C. C. Rawls and C. M. Ray.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

Our foreign mission work is the effort on our part to carry out the last command of our Lord and Master to go into all the world and make disciples of all nations. The challenge of the hour to all our churches is the present call of our foreign mission work. The conditions of the world today are giving tremendous emphasis to the fact that all men need a simple New Testament religion. The non-Christian nations are awakening in a wonderful way and enquiring for the path of peace and the way of life. The doors are wide open. The people are more accessible than ever before. The harvest fields are ripe and we should now thrust in the sickle and reap on a scale that will far transcend anything in the past.

The Foreign Mission Board, located at Richmond, Virginia, composed of eighteen local members and

eighteen state members representing each state in cooperation with the Southern Baptist Convention, is conducting work in Italy, Brazil, Mexico, Argentina, China, Japan and Africa. In these fields the missionaries reported last year 382 churches with 819 out-stations, 33,584 church members, 442 Sunday Schools with 23,959 scholars and 8,833 students in mission schools, 384 of whom are in theological seminaries and training schools preparing to preach the gospel to their own people. There are 300 missionaries on the fields, 20 of whom were sent out during the past year, and a total of 651 native workers. Notwithstanding difficult conditions on many of the fields caused by the European war and the injury to the work in Mexico from chaotic political conditions in that country, 5,190 baptisms were reported during the year.

The distressing financial conditions throughout the South created by the war in Europe, caused a falling off in contributions to foreign missions last year. Many of the churches made heroic and sacrificial efforts but some of them were not able to keep up their usual contributions. This will make it more difficult for us to maintain the work this year unless Jod's people meet the situation in a still more heroic spirit. The Convention in Houston asked for an apportion ment of \$624,000 for foreign missions last year. Every dollar of it will be needed to carry on the work successfully. Our supreme task now should be the raising of the apportionment as a minimum in every association and every state. We should not for a moment think of anything lesss and we must do more than this if possible.

We therfore recommend:

1. That we as an association undertake to raise for foreign missions our full proportion of the above sum; that this amont be divided among the churches on an equitable basis; that we earnestly urge the churches to contribute the amount asked of them; that each church inaugurate a plan of systematic weekly or monthly giving and remitting for this cause so that the work may be taken care of and debt and interest payments may be avoided.

2. That each pastor in the association appoint a committee in each church of which he is pastor to canvass the membership with a view to securing a subscription to the Foreign Mission Journal in every Baptist family within our bounds, so that our people may be more fully informed as to our world-wide work.

We, your committee on Temperance, regard it an unmistakble fact—that the cause of temperace is gaining ground. In one way or another there is an unceasing effort being made in its behalf. We find that the Bible is plain and positive, warning and rebuking the use and traffic of spiritous liquors, clearly setting forth the mind of God as to our duty and danger.

We know that the wisest minds and the men most competent to judge deem alcohol dangerous—whether much or little, and declare that it can be done without even medicinally. So largely has this sentiment been accepted that now all business men have excluded the drinkers from place and position. We find that state after state in our land, have passed state enactments against it as a traffic. And even the nations of Europe now in the crisis of war have enacted laws aginst intemperance—as a means for victory. We can perhaps do no better than to urge that we hold fast that we have gained—and as individuals and as a body—pray God to conduct us to speedy and joyful ending of the most stameful SIN and curse of the age.

WOMAN'S WORK

Our women have always been an important factor in church work, and they occupy an ever increasingly important position in all our work. The secret of their success is due to their faithfulness and energetic work. They have sent out 30,000 pieces of literature, tracts, etc. Wonderful results have been accomplished by the mission study classes and we hope that every society which has no class will soon organize one.

The woman's work has had a wonderful growth. Forty-seven new societies have been organized, 20 Sunbeam bands, one Royal Ambassador Society, and 12 Young Women's Auxiliaries. There were three "Honor Societies" last May and several have been added since.

The women have given to the Building Fund \$3,413.57; Foreign Missions, \$2,505.25; Home Missions \$1,981.87; State Missions, \$3,199.43; Bible Fund, \$46.07; City Missions, \$137.40; Education, \$860.38; Benevolences, \$951.26; Boxes, \$1,389.38; Literature, \$30.43; making a grand total of \$14,515.04.

We pray God's blessings upon our faithful women and hope that their work will be an inspirtion to the churches.

1st. That our Sunday Schools purchase literature and books needed in the Sunday School from the Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tenn.

2nd. We recommend the "Florida Baptist Witness" published at Arcadia, Fla., as we believe that Florida Baptists should keep in touch with our state work, knowing that the only way for us to keep informed concerning our own state is to read our denominational paper. We urge that all Baptists subscribe for this paper and read its contents from week to week.

3rd. We also recommend the "Home Fields", published in Atlanta, Ga., which gives information concerning the work of the Home Board.

4th. We recommend the "Foreign Mission Journal," published at Richmond, V., bringing to us monthly an account of the progress being made by our denomination in the Foreign lands to which our Master has commanded us to carry the good tidings of great joy.

CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This Association shall be known as the Beulah Baptist Association.

Sec. 2. This Association shall be composed of Messengers selected by the several churches connected with the Association. Each church shall be entitled to one Messenger at large and one for every twenty-five members or majority fraction thereof.

Sec. 3. Any regularly organized Baptist Church of the same faith may become a member of this Association upon application by petitionary letter and Messenger as above provided.

Sec. 4. This Association shall at their regular meeting elect from their members, by ballot, a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall serve for one year.

Sec. 5. The object of the Association shall be: First, to promote unity and brotherly love among the Churches; second, to promote Gospel discipline; to encourage the universal spread of the Gospel and practical religion throughout our bounds and elsewhere.

Sec. 6. The Moderator shall appoint at each annual session of the Association an Executive Committee composed of six members, whose appointment shall be approved by the body. Their duties shall be: First, to inpuire into the destitution within our bounds; second, to make contracts with the Ministers of the Gospel of this Association, or other associations in correspondence with us, to supply such destitution with the Gospel; third, to draw from the treasury such funds as are available for missionary purposes to meet their contracts, and to exercise general supervision in the promotion of unity and brotherly love among the Churches and the universal spread of the Gospel throughout our bounds. They shall report the result of their labors at each annual session of the Association.

Sec. 7. The Moderator shall invite correspondents and visiting ministers and brethren to seats with the body when in session. They shall be entitled to the privilege of aiding the Association with their counsel.

Sec. 8. This Association shall have the right to withdraw from any Church that may be in disorder when the same cannot be restored by Gospel discipline to the unity of faith in the bonds of peace.

Sec. 9. The annual meetings of this Association shall be held at such time and place as may be designated by the body; and by appointment there shall be an introductory sermon preached the first day of the session at 11 o'clock, and on the Sababth, or last day of the session, a collection taken up for missionary purposes.

Sec. 10. This Association shall not lord it over God's heritage nor infringe upon any of the internal rights of the churches, but shall act only as an advisory body.

Sec. 11. This Constitution may be amended at any regular session of the Association by a two-thirds vote of all the Messengers. Any amendment offered shall be in writing.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. We believe in one only true and living God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and that these are one. See Matthew 28:19; 2nd Corinthians 12:4-6.

2. We believe that the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the inspired Word of God and the only rules of faith and practice. See Timothy 3:16-17.

3. We believe in election according to the fore-knowledge of God, through santification of the Spirit and belief of the truth. 2nd. Thes. 2:13-14.

4. We believe that the grace of God that bring-

eth salvation hath appeared unto all men, and that nothing prevents the salvation of the vilest signer but his own voluntary rejection of that grace. Isa. 55:1; Rev. 22:17; Acts 17:30.

5. We believe in the depravity of the human heart, and that the natural state of man is such that he cannot prepare himself for divine favor without the assisting grace of God, enabling him to act according to the good pleasure of His Divine Will. Eph. 2:5; Matt. 18:11; John 4: 10; 1st Cor. 3:5-7.

6. We believe in justification by faith, which gives peace with God, through our Lord Jesus Christ. Romans 5:1-2.

7. We believe that the Gospel of Christ is a means of grace to bring sinners to repentance and faith in Jesus Christ, and therefore should be preached to all the world. John 3:16.

8. We believe that all those who are regenerated by the Spirit of God are made heirs of God and joint heirs with our Lord Jesus Christ, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto eternal salvation. John 8:31; 1 Peter 1:5; Rom. 8.28; Phi. 1:6.

9. We believe that baptism is the immersion of the whole body in water; that the only proper subjects are described in the preceding section, and the only proper administrators are those who have been regularly-ordained by a Church of Christ by the imposition of hands of a presbytery. Acts 8:36; Romans 6:4; Read Timothy and Titus.

10. We believe that the Lord's Super was instituted by Jesus Christ to be commonorated by His followers and that none but baptised believers have a Scriptural right to partake thereof. Luke 22:18, 19, 20: I Cor. 14:26-28.

11. We believe in the rsurcection of the right-

eous and the wicked, and that the wicked shall go away into everlasting punishment, but the righteous into life eternal. Acts 24:15; Matt. 25 16

RULES OF DECORUM

Article 1. At the first meeting of each annual session of the Association, the Moderator of the previous session shall call the Messengers to order. In case of the absence of the Moderator, the Clerk shall call to order, when the Messengers present may elect a Moderator pro tem, who shall preside until the letters from the churches are read, including the petitionary letters for membership, and the names of the Messengers are enrolled.

Art. 2. When the letters from the churches shall have been read and the names of Messengers enrolled, they shall elect from the body, by ballot, a Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer, who shall serve for one year and until their successors shall be duly elected.

Art. 3. Each day's session of the As'sociation shall be opened with prayer.

Art. 4. The Moderator shall preserve order and decide all questions in debate, subject to an appeal to the body; and when he shall speak on any subject in discussion, he shall call some member to the chair, and in case of a tie, shall give the deciding vote.

Art. 5. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to approval by the body.

Art. 6. The Clerk shall keep a careful record of the proceedings of each meeting, and in the absence of the Moderator shall call the body together and preside until a Moderator pro tem. shall be elected.

Art. 7. All members wishing to speak on any subject shall arise and address the Moderator as "brother," and shall confine themselves strictly to the subject, and shall not be allowed to make any unkind allusion to a brother while speaking.

Art. 8. No motion shall be debated until seconded

and stated by the Moderator or read by the Clerk.

Art. 9. When a motion is under consideration no

other motion shall be entertained except to adjourn, lay on the table, to amend, indefinitely postpone, refer to a committee, or call for the previous question.

Art. 10. Any member voting with the majority on any question in debate may move a reconsideration at any time during the session.

Art. 11. Visiting brethren and correspondents from other associations of the same faith shall have a right to speak on any and all subjects under consideration, but shall not be entitled to vote.

Art. 12. No brother shall speak more than twice on a subject in debate without the consent of the Association.

Art. 13. These rules of Decorum may be altered or amended at any regular session of the Association by a majority vote of the members of the body.
