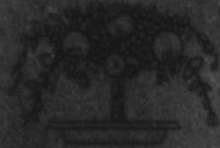

REPORTS

SUNDAY SCHOOL AND COLPORTAGE.

Your Committee makes the following report:

Looking at the Sunday School work in a national way, and especially as it is done in the South, we see every evidence of God's blessings upon our work. We are encouraged to go forward for the Master in teaching His Word as well as in preaching His Word. Because of so many of the younger generation that go to Sunday School and are not in the preaching services, such as children between three and eight years of age. There are hundreds of thousands of people attending our schools that have not yet come under the direct influence of the preaching and these are to make our future church members. The Word must be taught to these and then the Word must be preached to them by the pastors.

We report the following evidences of God's blessings on our Sunday School work, in State wide work, South-wide and nation-wide:

1. Because of the emphasis laid upon the work of the organized class for men and women and young men and young women, there are larger numbers of adults attending Sunday School than ever before. We report that Florida has 331 organized classes registered with the Board with 7000 members.

2. New Sunday School Buildings. Along with the large increase in numbers in our schools come the demand for larger buildings and better equipment. Today, Florida is embarrassed with her progress in new buildings, embarrassed in this way that so much money is being spent for needed buildings, that other causes are suffering for support. Never has there been such a demand for new structures and it may be said to the glory of the denomination that these new buildings all measure up to the standard for such work of today.

3. Organization and Graded. More and more each year, our Sunday schools are being better organized and more efficient officers elected. The schools are being graded more perfectly, thus making it easier for the teacher to do efficient work.

4. Administration. Because of the aid given by the Sunday School Board in printing and distributing literature and books to help the Sunday School officers, we have today a larger number of well manned schools. The course of instruction for Sunday School officers is one of the forward steps.

5. Special Days in our Sunday Schools. Aided by the Sunday School Board of Nashville, we have four special days to observe, and many of the Sunday Schools of the state observed every day. We report that these special days bring much needed information about the needs and causes held dear by the Southern Baptists.

6. Teacher Training. We are greatly encouraged over the training of our teachers. Demands are now being made for the teacher and officers who know their work. We unhesitatingly report that the spirit of Teacher Training is gripping our schools, and before we know it, it will be customary for all the schools not to allow teachers to teach till they have shown some knowledge about work and some special preparation for the work. We most heartily commend the teacher training work as being worthy of the highest consideration of all church and Sunday School workers.

7. Literature and books. We report that our Sunday School Board is keeping abreast with the progress of the world in issuing the best of literature and the best of good books for the pupil and the teacher. Every pastor should take all measures possible to see to it that his Sunday School has the best of literature and the best of good books for his youth to read.

8. Work in Our Local Association. In looking over the letters already in hand, we find there are 22 churches in our Association. Of this number, 15 have Sunday Schools

running all the time; and there are 7 churches that have no Sunday Schools at all. The data in our church letters show 60 baptized into the church from the Sunday Schools. The total amount of money handled by the schools of the Association for the year closed, is \$207.92. Some of our schools have had splendid Teacher Training Classes! Many of them need improved Sunday School buildings and equipment. The church at Lake City, the largest in the Association, is hoping to complete a model Sunday School building in a short time.

We commend the Sunday School work to each and every church, and to each member of every church. The teaching of the Word is needed. We commend a class in each school for the training of its teachers. In looking back over the work for the past years, we see a great and wonderful change in methods and plans for the Sunday School work. Under the direction of the Great Shepherd, our Sunday School work is due to take on added influence and power.

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL RELIEF

Brethren, many old worn-out veterans of the cross, in the past, have gone down to the grave in loneliness, sorrow and suffering, because of inadequate support by the Baptist denomination. They are some better cared for now but many still receive pitifully inadequate amount, because we Baptists are freer with reports, talks and resolutions, than with financial support. These old soldiers of the cross are entitled to and should have our warmest sympathy and financial support, while others have been making provision for old age. They have sacrificed financial interests and given their life work freely and ungrudgingly to win souls to Christ, and to make this world a better place in which to live. It is a lasting stigma and shame to our denomination if we do not provide sufficient

means for these old ministers to pass through pleasant, shady lanes to the last journey that ends "Over There".

Oh, if Florida Baptist could only catch a vision of their wonderful duties, privileges and opportunities. Should we pay into the Lord's treasury, the tenth of our incomes, as is our reasonable due. The treasury would be filled to overflowing, a vital rejuvenation would be felt in all the branches of the church. We would flourish and prosper as a Green Bay tree. The old worn ministers would pass their remaining days in comfort, joy, peace and gratitude, and would feel that the religion of Jesus Christ meant something in the lives of their brethren.

The world would have a proper and wholesome respect for our denomination as a vital factor in its affairs, Brethren. If we can not let up on talks and reports and resolutions, let us at least put the same energy and enthusiasm in financing ministerial relief and all other church work.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

The evangelization of the world is the supreme consummation for which every other christian purpose exists. It is the only adequate object for so amazing a life and death as that of Jesus Christ. It is the only result that will give Christ to see of the travail of His soul and be satisfied. The greatest and grandest enterprise launched since the dawn of creation was the Foreign Mission Movement. This enterprise was inaugurated nineteen centuries ago, when our Lord Jesus Christ, from the summit of a mountain in Galilee gave His disciples the great commission. Every Christian is logically and essentially a believer in Foreign Missions. For a Christian to refuse to enlist himself in the Foreign Mission movement is to disobey the plain command of his divine Lord. However, there are thousands of Christians who fail to respond to the appeal

of Foreign Missions because they are ignorant of its real origin, importance, dignity and grandeur. It has been truly said that we can no more accept christianity and reject missions than we can breathe the pure air without taking oxygen into the lungs. We can be christians or non-christians, but we cannot, as christians, choose between missionary and non-missionary living. We sometimes hear of anti-mission Baptists. The very term is a self-contradiction. Imagine a disciple of Jesus saying, "I believe in christianity, but am opposed to its extension!" Such a creature would be an ecclesiastical paradox, having no likeness to anything in the heavens above or the earth beneath, or the waters under the earth.

Foreign missions is but a synonym of the world Baptist. The Baptists have only prospered where they have been missionary. The others have died and are lost in the mist of the past. They are out of the race. Our Motto: has ever been—Every Southern Baptist a foreign missionary, and our slogan: The gospel preached to all nations. But Southern Baptists have forgotten both their motto and their slogan. It makes us sad to be forced as a great and mighty army for Christ from the triumphs on foreign fields during the days of the 75, millions campaign to that of defeat today.

The Foreign Mission Board reported to the last Southern Baptist Convention a debt of \$1,125,000. This debt came through no extravagance on the part of the Board. In fact the Board has been cutting its appropriations severely for the last three years, and is now holding back more than one hundred volunteers who are ready to go to the front. It has also denied for two years any additional equipment to the missionaries. This debt grew because our Baptist people are not giving adequately. The large program of the Board cannot be maintained upon the amount they are now giving.

What is the remedy for the present distressing situation? The simple remedy is for the churches to put on the program of the Southern Baptist Convention—the unified program, and cooperate with the denomination. In co-operating with our brethren we will serve and strengthen our foreign mission enterprise.

Your committee urges the churches in our association to give this matter their prayerful and financial support.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

There was a time when it was thought that preparation was neither necessary nor desirable for a Gospel preacher, then came a time when preparation was considered desirable but not necessary, but the time has come when preparation is both desirable and necessary for the effective preaching of the Gospel and the efficient ministry of the Word. A minister needs long, hard, broad, deep training for his task it matters not where his field of labor is to be—the more thorough his training the greater his worth to the churches and the Kingdom.

Christian education is an hundred fold more imperative, more vitally necessary, more absolutely essential than ever before. Florida, and the entire south stands at the opening portal of a new era. Thousands, yes, even millions are coming to our fair southland. A magnificent opportunity greets us, but with this opportunity comes a corresponding responsibility. A tremendous obligation rests heavily upon us. We must have efficient leaders and an education of the highest christian type alone can fit us for our great task.

Never was there a greater demand for well trained and efficient workers, and we must, as a great denomination, do our best to meet the demand of the hour.

Every encouragement must be extended to our best young men and women to enter active and distinctive Christian service, and every provision must be made to render every aid necessary to this end.

Your committee would recommend in concluding this report, that our churches make adequate provision for our denominational schools, and the proper training of students for the ministry and mission fields.

REPORT OF THE FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

In submitting our report to the association we acknowledge with thanksgiving the divine obligation resting upon us to participate in the work being done at Arcadia in our Children's Home for the one hundred and twenty-two boys and girls enjoying the benefits of our Home at the present time.

This year the management has found it necessary in order to take care of the work and meet the monthly current expenses to go afield for support. Information from the office of the Home tells us that the 17 1-2 per cent given the Home from the 1925 budget plan would not be sufficient to pay all of the expenses of the Home and the small amount received each month from the amount paid in on the budget would have brought suffering in the work if churches and friends had not come to the support of the work this year in independent contributions.

We are supporting at the Home at present as stated above one hundred and twenty-two children. Our Home is a home in the true sense of the word and is not a home-finding society. The children in our Home are given everything needful to their growth and proper development and are nurtured, cared for and

trained for a useful independent life. Special attention is given to the religious training and development of the children.

According to the budget suggested by the Board of Trustees in their report to the convention last December for the 1925 support, they asked for \$2200.00 a month for current support and asked, in addition for \$15000.00 for necessary improvements and other needs. We find that they are very badly crowded for room. In order to accommodate the large boys in their dormitory the superintendent had to build a sleeping porch across the west end of the boys building and in order to accommodate the school the superintendent had to divide the library and assembly room, making a school room out of half of the children's parlor. We find that a new boys building in which fifteen or sixteen little boys can be cared for is one of the greatest needs of the Home at present.

The superintendent reports good health among the children. He reports a cordial reception and liberal contributions from the different churches visited this year, carrying children with him for service in the interest of the Home and he reports that it has been the unanimous opinion of the churches visited that such visits would not in any way interfere with the churches part in our budget plan.

We have these boys and girls and at the present time a very valuable piece of property in Arcadia on which is located their Home and we must support the institution and give these boys and girls an equal chance with our children to make their way in life. Your committee regrets to report that the enlargement in the institution in order to take care of more children has not been as rapid as it should have been on account of the limited means going into the treasury of the Home but we rejoice to report that under the plan this year our work at Arcadia is being taken care of each month and some small improvements have been made and a nice amount paid on the old indebtedness on the home.

We would urge every church, Sunday School and department of our work to have some definite part in the upkeep and enlargement of our work for our orphan boys and girls at Arcadia and that we remember constantly and earnestly this department of our work in prayer.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

Last May in Memphis, Tenn., The Home Mission Board presented its eightieth annual report since its organization in 1845 thus presenting an unbroken history of fidelity and spiritual conquest. In all these years great good for the Kingdom has been accomplished. It has been for Southern Baptists the one great constructive cooperative and unifying agency, the founder and support of thousands of our churches and a great factor in their organization and progress.

The needs of the Board are greater today than ever before from the fact that opportunities were never greater for accomplishing great things for our Masters Kingdom, however in the face of urgent calls for enlargement the Board has been forced to make severe and drastic retrenchments all down the line, on account of insufficient funds to meet the pressing needs of the times.

Taken as a whole however the situation while not as bright as all of us would like to have, the outlook is hopeful and this hopefulness lies not in an immediate wide spread revival of interest in and liberal support of our organized work, but a gradual growth in this direction based upon a conviction of duty and regular weekly or monthly offerings rather than spasmodic collections. The great need everywhere is an awakened conscience in the matter of individual responsibility, that the Kingdom of our Lord may prosper.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

In spite of the fact that Southern Baptists have surpassed all other great denominations in America in the matter of soul winning, as well as to excel their own record in former years, they have very little cause for boasting and very much real need to understand how poor and pitiable is their record at best.

The South is a great enlistment mission field, and for the work of the Master to be carried out successfully His people must organize themselves in such a way as to meet all the appearing forces of darkness. The need today for an organized working force seems to be greater than ever before.

RESOLUTION

Now, Therefore, Be it Resolved, By the Beulah Baptist Association, in annual session assembled, that the executive committee of this association be, and is hereby, authorized and directed to proceed immediately to employ a full time field worker. Said worker is to give all his time with the churches of the Beulah Association as an educational director, and general enlistment man or woman, at a salary not to exceed \$2,500 a year. This salary of \$2,500 is to be paid by the churches of the Beulah Baptist Association, aided by the State Board of Missions.

REPORT ON WOMAN'S WORK

Paul in writing to the people at Corinth when there seemed to be a division among them, tried to get them to realize this one thing, that they all should be "Laborers together with God", therefore no division should exist. As it was the privilege of those people at Corinth, so it is also our privilege, we the women of Beulah Association to be "Laborers together with God." S. awarding 108 certificates and seals. Total seals and certificates received for the year 150, W. M. S. organized 3, R. A's organized 2: Y. W. A.'s organized 1, churches visited 10, attended all Union meetings in association, demonstrations of some phases of our work given at each, attended two rallies, one district meeting.

REPORT ON PUBLICATIONS

The reading matter in the homes of our people is a very important factor in the spiritual progress of our work. The Bible above everything else should be honored and respected in every home. It is God's message to the souls of men. Far too many of our people allow the sacred book to be in their homes neglected and forgotten and their children growing up ignorant of the simplest and most important truths therein contained.

District Superintendents: District 1, Mrs. G. Getzen; District 2, Mrs. Geo. Douglas; District 3, Mrs. O. L. Carver; District 4, Mrs. Fellows.

Mrs. W. L. Rogers gave a talk on the graded W. M. U., speaking of its importance.

Mrs. McCormick gave a talk on the 1925 program, telling how Christ began the program when he was here, she said it meant all the church at work, and made an appeal for missions.

Miss Jennie Camp gave report on the Young Peoples Work.

A rising vote of thanks was given Mrs. Wise for her efficient service the past year.

The question of a separate time and place for the W. M. U. annual meetings was discussed but it was decided not best to try it yet.

Two little Sunbeam girls sang a song.

Miss Jennie Camp dismissed the meeting with prayer.

MRS. C. M. RAY, Sec.

Later: Mrs. T. H. Meeks declined to serve as president of the Union and Mrs. A. R. Wise consented to continue the duties of president.

Constitution

Section 1. This Association shall be known as the Beulah Baptist Association.

Section 2. This Association shall be composed of Messengers selected by the several churches connected with the Association. Each church shall be entitled to one Messenger at large and one for every twenty-five members or majority fraction thereof.

Section 3. Any regularly organized Baptist Church of the same faith may become a member of this Association upon application by a petitionary letter and Messenger as above provided.

Section 4. This Association shall at a regular meeting elect from their members by ballot, a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer who shall serve for one year.

Section 5. The object of this Association shall be: First, to promote unity and brotherly love among the Churches; second to promote gospel discipline; to encourage the universal spread of the Gospel and practical religion throughout our bounds and elsewhere.

Section 6. The Moderator shall appoint at each annual session of the Association an Executive Committee composed of six members whose appointment shall be approved by the body. Their duties shall be: First, to inquire into destitution within our bounds; second, to make contracts with the Ministers of the Gospel of this Association, or other Associations in correspondence with us, to supply such destitution with the Gospel; third to draw from the treasury such funds as are available for missionary purposes to meet their contracts, and to exercise general supervision in the promotion of unity and brotherly love among the Churches and the universal spread of the Gospel throughout our bounds. They shall report the result of their labors at each annual session of the Association.

Section 7. The Moderator shall invite correspondents and visiting ministers and brethren, to seats with the body when in session. They shall be entitled to the privilege of aiding the Association with their counsel.

Section 8. This Association shall have the right to withdraw from any church that may be in disorder when the same cannot be restored by Gospel discipline to the unity of faith in the bonds of peace.

Section 9. The annual meetings of this Association shall

be held at such time and place as may be designated by the body; and by appointment there shall be an introductory sermon preached the first day of the session at 11 o'clock, and on the Sabbath; or last day of the session, a collection taken up for missionary purposes.

Section 10. This Association shall not lord it over God's heritage nor infringe upon any of the internal rights of the churches, but shall act only as an advisory body.

Section 11. This Constitution may be amended at any regular session of the Association by a two-thirds vote of all messengers. Any amendment offered shall be in writing.

Amendment 1. This Association shall take an offering during its session to defray the expenses of the Executive Committee, for printing, postage, etc. Approved October 1920.

Amendment 2. The Executive Committee of this Association shall hereafter be composed of eight members. Approved November 1921.

Amendment 3. A Vice Moderator shall be elected from the body to serve one year, Approved Oct. 1924.

Articles of Faith

1. We believe in one only true and living God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and that these are one. See Mathew 28:19.

2. We believe that the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the inspired Word of God and the only rules of faith and practice. 2 Timothy 3:17.

3. We believe in election according to the foreknowledge of God, through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth. 2nd Thes. 2:13.

4. We believe that the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared unto all men, and that nothing prevents the Salvation of the vilest sinner but his own voluntary rejection of that grace. Isa. 55:1; Rev. 22:17; Act. 17:30.

5. We believe in the depravity of the human heart, and that the natural state of man is such that he cannot prepare himself for divine favor without the assisting grace of God, enabling him to act according to the good pleasure of His Divine Will. Eph. 2:5; Matt. 18:11; John 4:10; First Cor. 3:5-7.

6. We believe in justification by faith, which gives peace with God, through our Lord Jesus Christ. Roman 5:1-2.

7. We believe that the Gospel of Christ is a means of

grace to bring sinners to repentance and faith in Jesus Christ, and therefore should be preached to all the world. John 3:16.

8. We believe that all those who are regenerated by the Spirit of God are made heirs of God and joint heirs with our Lord Jesus Christ, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto eternal salvation. I Peter 1:5; Rom. 8:28; Phi. 1:6.

9. We believe that baptism is the immersion of the whole body in water; that the only proper subjects are described in the preceding section, and the only proper administrators are those who have been regularly ordained by a church of Christ, by the imposition of hands of a presbytery. Acts 8:36; Rom. 6:4; Read Timothy and Titus.

10. We believe that the Lord's Supper was instituted by Jesus Christ to be commemorated by His followers and that none but baptised believers have a Scriptural right to partake thereof, Luke 22:18, 19, 20; 1. Cor. 14:26-28.

11. We believe in the resurrection of the righteous and the wicked, and that the wicked shall go away into everlasting punishment, but the righteous into eternal life. Acts 24:15.

Rules of Decorum

Article 1. At the first meeting of each session of the Association, the Moderator of the previous session shall call the Messengers to order, when the Messengers present may elect a Moderator pro tem, who shall preside until the letters from the churches are read, and the names of the Messengers are enrolled. In case of absence of the moderator the clerk shall call to order.

Article 2. When the letters from the Churches shall have been read and the names of the Messengers enrolled, they shall elect from the body by ballot, a Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer, who shall serve for one year and until their successors shall be duly elected.

Article 3. Each day's session of the Association shall be opened with prayer.

Article 4. The Moderator shall preserve order and decide all questions in debate, subject to an appeal to the body; and when he shall speak on any subject in discussion, he shall call some member to the chair, and in case of a tie, shall give the deciding vote.

Article 5. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to approval by the body.

Article 6. The Clerk shall keep a careful record of the proceedings of each meeting, and in the absence of the Moderator shall call the body together and preside until a Moderator pro tem shall be elected.

Article 7. All members wishing to speak on any subject shall arise and address the Moderator as "Brother," and shall confine themselves strictly to the subject and shall not be allowed to make an unkind allusion to a brother while speaking.

Article 8. No motion shall be debated until seconded and stated by the Moderator or read by the Clerk.

Article 9. When a motion is under consideration no other motion shall be entertained except to adjourn, lay on the table, to amend, indefinitely postpone, refer to a committee, or call for the previous question.

Article 10. Any member voting with the majority on any question in debate may move a reconsideration at any time during the session.

Article 11. Visiting brethren and correspondents of any other associations of the same faith shall have a right to speak on any and all subjects under consideration, but shall not be entitled to vote.

Article 12. No brother shall speak more than twice on a subject in debate without the consent of the Association.

Article 13. These rules of Decorum may be altered or amended at any regular session of the Association by a majority vote of the members of the body.
