CONSTITUTION.

Section 1. This Association shall be known as the Beulah Baptist Association.

Section 2. This Association shall be composed of Messengers selected by the several churches connected with the Association. Each church shall be entitled to one Messenger at large and one for every twenty-five members or majority fraction thereof.

Section 3. Any regularly organized Baptist Church of the same faith may become a member of this Association upon application by a petitionary letter and Messengers as above provided.

Section 4. This Association shall at their regular meeting elect from their members by ballot, a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall serve for one year.

Section 5. The object of this Association shall be: First, to promote unity and brotherly love among the Churches; second, to promote gospel discipline; to encourage the universal spread of the Gospel and practical religion throughout our bounds and elsewhere.

Section 6. The Moderator shall appoint at each annual session of the Association an Executive Committee composed of six members whose appointment shall be approved by the body. Their duties shall be: First, to inquire into destitution within our bounds; second, to make contracts with the Ministers of the Gospel of this Association, or other Associations in correspondence with us, to supply such destitution with the Gospel; third, to draw from the treasury such funds as are available for missionary purposes to meet their contracts, and to exercise general supervision in the promotion of unity and brotherly love among the Churches and the universal spread of the Gospel throughout our bounds. They shall report the result of their labors at each annual session of the Association.

Section 7. The Moderator shall invite correspondents and visiting ministers and brethren to seats with the body when in session. They shall be entitled to the privilege of aiding the Association with their counsel.

Section 8. This Association shall have the right to withdraw from any church that may be in disorder when the

same cannot be restored by Gospel discipline to the unity of faith in the bonds of peace.

Section 9. The annual meetings of this Association shall be held at such time and place as may be designated by the body; and by appointment there shall be an introductory sermon preached the first day of the session at 11 o'clock, and on the Sabbath, or last day of the sessions, a collection taken up for missionary purposes.

Section 10. This Association shall not lord it over God's heritage nor infringe upon any of the internal rights of the churches, but shall act only as an advisory body.

Section 11. This Constitution may be amended at any regular session of the Association by a two-thirds vote of all messengers. Any amendment offered shall be in writing.

Amendment 1. This Association shall take an offering during its sessions to defray the expenses of the Executive Committee, for printing, postage, etc. Approved October 1920.

Amendment 2. The Executive Committee of this Association shall hereafter be composed of eight members. Approved November 1921.

Amendment 3. A Vice Moderator shall be elected from the body to serve one year. Approved October 1924.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. We believe in one only true and living God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and that these are one. See Matthew, 28:19.

2. We believe that the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the inspired Word of God and the only rules of faith and practice. 2 Timothy, 3:17.

3. We believe in election according to the fore-knowledge of God, through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth. 2nd Thes. 2:13.

4. We believe that the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared unto all men, and that nothing prevents the salvation of the vilest sinner but his own voluntary rejection of that grace. Isa. 55:1; Rev. 22:17; Acts 17:30.

5. We believe in the depravity of the human heart, and that the natural state of man is such that he cannot prepare himself for divine favor without the assisting grace of God, enabling him to act according to the good pleasure of His Divine Will. Eph. 2:5; Matt. 18:11; John 4:10; First Cor. 3:5-7.

6. We believe in justification by faith, which gives peace with God, through our Lord Jesus Christ. Roman, 5:1-2.

7. We believe that the Gospel of Christ is a means of grace to bring sinners to repentance and faith in Jesus Christ, and therefore should be preached to all the world. John 3:16.

8. We believe that all those who are regenerated by the Spirit of God are made heirs of God and joint heirs with our Lord Jesus Christ, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto eternal salvation. I Peter, 1:5; Romans, 8:28; Phi. 1:6.

9. We believe that baptism is the immersion of the whole body in water; that the only proper subjects are described in the preceding section, and the only proper administrators are those who have been regularly ordained by a church of Christ, by the imposition of hands of a presbytery. Acts, 8:36; Rom. 6:4; Read Timothy and Titus.

10. We believe that the Lord's Supper was instituted by Jesus Christ to be commemorated by His followers and that none but baptized believers have a Scriptural right to partake thereof. Luke 22:18, 19, 20; I Cor. 14:26-28.

11. We believe in the resurrection of the righteous and the wicked, and that the wicked shall go away into everlasting punishment, but the righteous into eternal life. Acts 24:15.

RULES OF DECORUM

Article 1. At the first meeting of each session of the Association, the Moderator of the previous session shall call the Messengers to order, when the Messengers present may elect a Moderator pro tem, who shall preside until the letters from the churches are read, and the names of the Messengers are enrolled. In case of absence of the Moderator the Clerk shall call to order.

Article 2. When the letters from the Churches shall have been read and the names of the Messengers enrolled, they shall elect from the body by ballot, a Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer, who shall serve for one year and until their successors shall be duly elected.

Article 3. Each day's session of the Association shall be opened with prayer.

Article 4. The Moderator shall preserve order and decide all questions in debate, subject to an appeal to the body; and when he shall speak on any subject in discussion, he shall call some member to the chair, and in case of a tie, shall give the deciding vote.

Article 5. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to approval by the body.

Article 6. The Clerk shall keep a careful record of the proceedings of each meeting, and in the absence of the Moderator shall call the body together and preside until a Moderator pro tem shall be elected.

Article 7. All members wishing to speak on any subject shall arise and address the Moderator as "Brother," and shall confine themselves strictly to the subject and shall not be allowed to make an unkind allusion to a brother while speaking.

Article 8. No motion shall be debated until seconded and stated by the Moderator or read by the Clerk.

Article 9. When a motion is under consideration no other motion shall be entertained except to adjourn, lay on the table, to amend, indefinitely postpone, refer to a committee, or call for the previous question.

Article 10. Any member voting with the majority on any question in debate may move a reconsideration at any time during the session.

Article 11. Visiting brethren and correspondents of any other association of the same faith shall have a right to

speak on any and all subjects under consideration, but shall not be entitled to vote.

Article 12. No brother shall speak more than twice on a subject in debate without the consent of the Association.

Article 13. These rules of Decorum may be altered or amended at any regular session of the Association by a majority vote of the members of the body.

RECORD OF PROCEEDINGS
OF THE
FIFTY-FIRST ANNUAL SESSION
OF THE
BEULAH BAPTIST ASSOCIATION
HELD WITH THE
EVERGREEN BAPTIST CHURCH
SUWANNEE COUNTY, FLORIDA
OCTOBER 3- 4, 1930

FIRST DAY

Friday, October 3, 1930

Devotional service was conducted by Rev. W. T. Newsome.

1. The Moderator, Rev. John Dicks, called the Association to order and the Clerk, C. M. Ray, enrolled the names of messengers from the churches.

2. Rev. W. T. Hall was nominated for Moderator, Rev. John Dicks for Vice Moderator, C. M. Ray for Clerk and J. J. Swails for Treasurer, and these were all elected by acclamation, being voted for separately.

3. Visitors were welcomed and enrolled as follows: Rev. C. M. Brittain, D. D. Secretary of the State Board of Missions, of Jacksonville, Fla. Dr. W. A. Hobson of DeLand, Fla., Representative of Stetson University, Rev. J. G. Wood, of Suwannee Association, pastor of Live Oak church, Mrs. C. M. Brittain, of Jacksonville Association, Rev. H. A. Jordan of Akachua Association, Bro. P. L. Johnson Editor of the Florida Baptist Witness, Dr. G. M. Moore of Jacksonville Association and Rev. W. T. Newsome of Suwannee Association.

4. Rev. John Dicks and Rev. H. C. Chapin were appointed a Committee on Program.

5. The Annual or Introductory Sermon was preached by the appointee, Rev. H. C. Chapin.

6. Adjourned for the noon hour.

The Association Re-assembled at 1:45 P. M.

7. Devotional service was led by Rev. J. G. Wood, pastor of Live Oak Church.

8. The Committee on Program recommended minor changes, to give the floor to some of our visitors.

9. The Finance Committee was appointed by the Moderator as follows: G. D. Eatmon, John Williams and D. R. Eatmon.

10. On motion Dr. Hobson was given the floor for 30 minutes to discuss Christian education and present the claims of Stetson University, which he did in a pleasing and instructive way.

11. The Committee on Nomination was announced as follows: E. A. McColskey, Wood, Ellis and Mrs. S. W. Lamb, Jr.

12. The report on the Unified Program was read by Rev. John Dicks and motion made to adopt.

13. The report on State, Home and Foreign Missions was read by Rev. W. T. Hall and motion made to adopt.

14. On motion Rev. C. M. Brittain was asked to discuss both of the above reports.

15. Dr. Brittain gave an address replete with information, showing that our Boards are a necessity to gather and distribute our mission funds intelligently and that while the impression exists with some who are misinformed that the office expense is quite large. The truth is that the cost of handling the funds is very small, his own salary being only about 2 per cent, as mission secretary.

16. By vote on the pending motions these reports were adopted.

REPORT ON THE CO-OPERATIVE PROGRAM

The Co-operative program, of the Southern Baptist Convention, as adopted and recommended to the churches, is the fruit of long years of observation, experience and prayerful, careful study of all objects, fostered by Southern Baptists by our most capable leaders.

This committee sincerely recommends to the churches of our Association the co-operative program as the basis for distribution of all our contributions for missionary and benevolent purposes beyond our local affairs. Therefore, being confident that the co-operative program is worthy of our support and should be the object of our prayers, and the burden upon our hearts, as well as the business of our churches, and it should be all of this to us because,

First, we believe it is in perfect accord with the teaching of our Lord and the program he gave to his church, second Because it was suggested to us by our brethren, that has

carefully studied our opportunities and possibilities, having investigated our needs from the standpoint of future progress in the advancement of the kingdom of our Lord, and the salvation of a lost world. Third. Because this program when submitted to our convention was accepted and endorsed by those worthy of our confidence. Fourth. Because it calls for the united effort of the largest body of protestant Christians in the world, because it gives an opportunity to the smallest and poorest church in all the land to have a part in a world-wide program of missionary and benevolent endeavor, such as our Lord authorized a church to carry out.

In view of these reasons in favor of our people supporting the co-operative program we would especially urge our people to stand by the program and have less desinated funds, and more for the co-operative program. This means a whole work for a whole world. Respectfully submitted,

THE REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

Notwithstanding that we have had a year of unusual conditions financially, conditions that forced retrenchments in all lines of mission work, and that seriously affected local conditions in certain sections of the State, still we have much to rejoice over when we sum up the blessed results that have attended our efforts under the grace of our loving Father.

It is a sad fact that mission receipts have steadily declined the past two years, and we should weigh conditions carefully and diagnose the case seariously to determine the true cause of this decline, and prayerfully endeavor to recover the ground we have lost. This is a matter for study, both as individuals and churches. We cannot afford to continue to go backwards in our mission work.

In our last report to the State Convention the following items concerning State Missions are of vital interest.

Our Board assisted in the support of 59 missionary pastors, who labored at 93 different points.

These missionary pastors reported 576 baptisms, 512 received into their fields by letter and 55 by restoration, and reported \$3,039.07 collected for missions.

Through our Student Loan Fund, we assisted 14 students in our Seminaries and Training Schools, and at Stetson University, who are preparing definitely for ministerial or mission work.

We are assisting Stetson University in its Bible Depart-

ment, and last year gave for that purpose \$4,308.58. We are glad to note that our people are more and more sending their boys and girls to Stetson, our Baptist College.

We assisted the Children's Home in Arcadia all through the year with funds from the program receipts, which amounted to \$10,771.44. There passed through the Mission office, as special gifts for the Home, \$6,173.98, and the superintendent reported other gifts which totalled \$15,236.92. This gives a total of \$32,182.34 contributed to the Home for the year.

Florida Baptists gave to Home Missions last year \$11,055.96, and to Foreign Missions \$33,694.67.

We gave to Southwide Educational Institutions \$6,470.00. Friends in the State sent to the Louisville Seminary as special gifts direct \$2,522.55.

We sent to the New Orleans Hospital \$1,077.14. We assisted 27 aged preachers and 18 widows of preachers to the extent of \$4,467.73, and put in our Student Workers at Tallahassee and Gainesville \$2,530.36.

We are sad to note the decline in receipts this year as reported by our Secretary and trust our people will give themselves to prayer, asking for the leadership of the Holy Spirit, to the end that we may not rob God in withholding our tithes and offerings. We beg our people to support more liberally the Co-operative Program, from which State Missions gets its income. Respectfully submitted,

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

Home Missions might be defined as that group of missionary and evangelistic tasks which, either because of their nature or their size and difficulty, can best be done by a Southwide agency.

The Home Mission Board is the Southwide agency through which Southern Baptists are doing their Home Mission work. The field of operation for this Board is the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention, the four Western Provinces of Cuba and the Canal Zone.

The work is divided into the following departments: Direct and Independent Missions, including work among the Foreigners, Indians, Negroes, and City Mission work, with Dr. J. W. Beagle as Superintendent; Mountain Missions and Schools including evangelism, industrial centers and moun-

tain schools, with Dr. J. W. O'Hara as Superintendent; Mission work in Cuba with Dr. M. N. McCall as Superintendent; Mission work in Panama, Canal Zone, with Stephen Witt as superintendent; Missions to the Jews, with Rev. Jacob Gartenhaus as Missionary; Mission Study with Mrs. Una Roberts Lawrence as Director; W. M. U. Field work with Miss Emma Leachman as Field Worker; Church Building Loan Department with the Executive Secretary as Superintendent, and Rev. Geo. F. Austin as Field Representative.

The work for the ensuing year was laid out as instructed by the Convention on the basis of the cash receipts of the previous year. These receipts were \$407,357.58 on the Co-operative Program and \$32,397.18 supplemental receipts, making a total of \$439,754.76.

The Board set aside \$250,000 to be paid on interest and principal of the debt. This necessitated some reduction in Mission work, but by combining forces and consolidating mission stations, the Board is able to hold all of its fields intact, though with reduced personnel.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS — 1930

The blessing of God has been upon our work in foreign lands. While there have been many difficulties, yet through the help of the Lord there have been many encouragements.

Good progress has been made towards the further reduction of the debt which has burdened the Board. The debt was reduced \$187,423.56 during the year closing May 1, 1930.

The plan for reducing the debt is to apply 10 per cent of all receipts from the Co-operative Program, all special gifts made for this specific purpose, and all moneys received from the sale of properties owned by the Board which are not now being used for mission purposes.

On the foreign field there are 1407 churches with a membership of 161,059. The native contributions amounted to \$472,820.12.

Southern Baptists should catch the inspiration of the throbbing life of the work in foreign lands. The past year has been marked by great revivals in many fields. Thirteen thousand, two hundred and fifty baptisms were reported, a thousand more than have ever been reported in a single year.

Progress along all lines has been made in all missions. The power of the gospel has been demonstrated everywhere.

In Africa there were thirty requests for the eight graduates from the Theological Training School last June. There was a great revival in the Lagos school which resulted in the conversion of over one hundred students in the upper grades. The hospital and college at Ogbomoso had the greatest year in their history. The Nigerian Baptist Convention made fine progress. It has now 200 churches in its membership practically all of which are self-supporting.

In Argentina there are 59 churches with 4,059 members. These churches gave last year a total of \$41,083.00. There were 380 baptisms. The Publishing House prospers. It published 1,520,000 pages of tracts.

In North Brazil the work has grown from 120 churches with 6,203 members to 149 churches with 8,348 members in the last decade. Ten years ago there were 215 baptisms during the year, last year there were 876. The religious life in the schools was strong during the year. There were 510 students in the College and Seminary at Parnambuco.

In South Brazil 1930 marks the fiftieth anniversary of the opening of Baptist work in Brazil. Dr. and Mrs. W. B. Bagby were the first missionaries. They are still active in the service. One of the greatest revivals ever conducted in Brazil was held during the year in Rio College. One hundred and fifty made professions of conversion.

Chile is the newest field the Foreign Board has entered in Latin America. There were special evangelistic meetings held in every church in the country with fine results.

In Central China the Soochow field had the most encouraging year it has ever experienced. At Shanghai splendid meetings were held in the North Gate School and church. Twenty-three were baptized. In Grace Church there were 41 baptisms. At the Paoshing Road Compound center the Ming Jang Boys' School enrolled 248 students and the Eliza Yates Girls' School enrolled 240. A revival was held in this center in which 97 were baptized. At the opening service of the revival 20 were baptized.

In interior China which was torn by war, one new church was organized and two others are waiting to be when the missionary can get to them. The six churches in and around Chengchow formed themselves into a Baptist Association. The Boys' School and the Girls' School at Kaifeng had a

good year. The Boys' School is the only school of any denomination in operation in the whole Province of Honan.

In North China on account of the warring conditions, the number of students was reduced, but the work was good and there were many conversions among students. Hospitals were interfered with but helped soldiers.

In South China there were about 600 baptisms. Pooi To Girls' School celebrated its fortieth anniversary by the opening of a new building which cost \$40,000.00. This building was given entirely by the Chinese.

In Hungary the Baptists have grown in ten years from 7,000 to 12,000 members. They baptized last year 763.

In Italy, 1929 was the best year in the Italian Mission work. There were 294 baptisms, an increase of 49 percent. There was a 30 percent increase in the amount contributed to the support of the work.

In Japan, the Publishing House has a record year. It published 1,750,000 tracts, 250,000 books, a total of 66,576,000 pages. There were 700 students in Seinan Gakuin, the Boys' School at Fukuoka. There were forty baptisms amongst the students. The Girls' School at Kokura had 400 students. There were 67 converts amongst the student body during the year.

In Jugo Slavia three new chapels were added during the year. The Baptists have grown from 600 in 1922 to 1,148.

In Mexico, the Seminary at Monterrey had 14 students, 3 in graduating class. The Girls' School at Chihuahua, and the school at Culiacan were disturbed somewhat by the revolution, but were able to carry out a successful year's work. A chapel building was erected at Rosita through aid of the Sarah Hale Church Building Loan Fund.

The building for the woman's Training School in Bucharest, Roumania, is so nearly completed that it was possible to use the building during the latter part of the year for the opening of the school. There were 4,925 baptisms in Roumania. This is the largest number ever reported to our Foreign Mission Board from any one of its fields.

In Spain the Spanish Baptist Convention was organized at Barcelona. The Spanish Baptists are beginning to realize their responsibility toward evangelizing their own country. They had 107 baptisms.

Thus reads, like added pages of the Acts of the Apostles, the story of our work in foreign lands. Out among the

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL RELIEF

Ministerial Relief is fostered by the Relief and Annuities Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, of which Dr. Thos. J. Watts of Dallas, Texas, is the Secretary, and Treasurer. The purpose of the Annuities Board is to assist aged Baptist ministers, and their widows, and to some extent their dependent children.

During the past year relief benefits were paid to 1,333 persons including 150 orphans who were indirectly aided, and Annuity benefits were paid to 110 ministers' widows and orphans. The total paid in benefits was \$162,705.06, the largest amount yet paid by the Board in any year.

Contributions to the Relief and Annuity Board for this worthy, but long neglected work are received through special gifts. The special gifts are used as an endowment fund, the interest only being available for payment of benefits.

Though this Board has been in existence only a few years \$1,300,000 has been paid to beneficiaries, and the resources

in about 10 years have grown to \$3,028,000 including endowment and distributable funds.

We rejoice that some worthy Baptists are giving large amounts to the endowment fund of the Relief and Annuity Board, and may these gifts, as well as those from the Unified Program increase till these old soldiers of the cross can be adequately provided for. We rejoice to see the rapidly growing success of this work, and may God bless the Relief and Annuity Board.

REPORT ON THE B. Y. P. U.

The Baptist Young People's Union meets one of our greatest needs in church work, to train our young people for service, and this work can not be over estimated.

A B. Y. P. U. offers training in many ways for young people in their church life. One important training is in systematic giving; another is in daily Bible reading. These are both important, and mean much to the individual, and the church. Here the habit of regularly supporting the church, and its missionary enterprises is formed. Literature is furnished for weekly programs in their meetings which is very helpful in studying the Bible. They also get church and religious history, making a good foundation for active Christian work.

The study course week is an important event. Then text books, written on the Bible by some of our great authors also give our young people our distinctive doctrines, and our church history, and make them steadfast with a good foundation for effective Christian, and Baptist workers.

The B. Y. P. U. also gives clean innocent pleasure socially, which protects them against hurtful and sinful worldly pleasures.

As most of our churches have no unions yet, there is plenty of material in nearly every church, and we hope pastors will encourage their young people, and help them to find leaders.

May God give us a vision of our opportunities, and help us to greatly extend the B. Y. P. U.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS

From the Southern Baptist Handbook, 1929, Secretary Aldredge has this very significant paragraph:—"Best of all there are other unmistakable signs that God is graciously blessing our S. S. work. Otherwise, how may we account for the fact that in spite of all the losses and crosses of the World War period and the still more trying years of 1920, 1921 and 1922, the number of our Sunday Schools have continued to grow at the rate of over 250 a year while the enrollment has continued to show a net gain of more than 84,000 a year for the past 12 years? Even in the trying year of 1928 while Northern Baptists lost 8,294; Congregationalists lost 28,615; Episcopalians lost 48,314; Southern Presbyterians lost 11,111 and the Reformed Church in America 17,708, God spared us to report a modest gain of 17,086, after dropping some 20,000 which belonged to non-co-operating Baptist Churches

In the face of all these encouraging facts there is yet a great work in the way of inlisting our church membership in the Sunday school work in our State and especially in the rural districts of our Beulah Association.

We find in our Association a great need for teacher training. And we recommend that our State workers in this line be used in our Association.

It is a fact that in some of our Sunday schools classes of bright boys and girls are given over to teachers who do not make any preparation or very little in the way of teaching them God's word, and using their wonderful opportunity to win them to Christ.

REPORT ON THE BAPTIST ORPHANAGE AT ARCADIA, FLORIDA

The Baptist Orphanage at Arcadia has at present 180 children. They are being carefully trained in every respect. Thirty-six of them have been converted during the past

year, and these united with the Baptist Church in Arcadia. They have Sunday school, preaching, prayer meeting and B. Y. P. U. The children are being educated and trained in a practical way.

Seven left the Home during the first months of this year, trained to take care of themselves.

There is about 12 acres of land belonging to the Home suitable for gardening, and which was cultivated this year, producing \$1,250.25 worth of truck. The dairy produced 3,625 gallons of milk. They raised chickens and had eggs in quantity.

The administration cost is low, meals for the children cost only 10 cents per meal. Clothing, medical attention, school and other expenses amount to 13 1-2 cents per day, for each child. Supervision and care by helpers employed, costs 18 cents each per day, making the total monthly expense \$3,289.74.

REPORT ON PUBLICATIONS

Whatever else may be said concerning the present age it is certainly a literary age. We have an abundance, yes, floods of literature on every subject from the lowest to the highest and it is not all of equal value not even on any one subject, religion not excepted. And if all literature were of equal merit, nobody has the time, neither the inclination to read it all.

This being true it becomes necessary for us to exercise the power of discrimination in the choice of reading matter even as we do in reference to food and social relationship.

The distinguishing faculty needs to be both keen and alert in this day when the literary market is jammed with trashy and questionable publications.

Our Baptist interests are languishing and suffering immensely today on account of indiscriminate reading and no reading at all.

What we need as a means of progress is more readers of the best Baptist literature.

To this end we recommend therefore—The Sunday school literature, published by the Southern Baptist S. S. Board, located in Nashville, Tenn.; Home and Foreign Missionary publications provided by the Boards of S. B. C. and our own State paper, The Witness, which is a means of keeping in sympathetic touch with the State work.

New Orleans Hospital

The Southern Baptist Hospital, located in New Orleans, has been in operation about four and one-half years. It has a property which cost more than \$1,250,000 and it owes \$517,000 on the original cost.

The Hospital not only pays its operating expenses and does about \$40,000 in free work each year; but earns several thousands of dollars which it pays on its debt. Last year the Hospital earnings were more than \$30,000, after paying for its charity service. The Hospital does not receive anything from the co-operative funds for charity, but depends entirely upon voluntary gifts. It does free all the hospital work for the Protestant orphanages in New Orleans; and is a great asset to the denomination. Baptist growth was never so great in New Orleans as it has been since the Hospital was opened.

Devotional service was led by Rev. H. A. Jordan. The Report on Christian Education was read by Rev. S. F. Young, and discussed by him. The report was adopted.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Education is essential in a democracy, and Christian education deserves our best thought.

Germany had no system of religious education to give soul to the education of youth under state control. All education therefore was directed, and controlled by the state; then all of Germany's intellectual development was used for destruction in war.

Historians fix the time of the close of the universities in 529 A. D., with the beginning of the dark ages.

History shows that Christianity has always made its best

progress where Christian education has been appreciated and not neglected.

The revival of learning in Europe came with an ever increasing spread of Christianity, and the protestant reformation and the growth of Baptist doctrines.

About 95 years ago the Baptists divided about half and half. One division approved missions and schools founded to forward the missionary program. The Missionary Baptists founded schools as agencies for fulfilling the great commission. The division in opposition to missions, and education has dwindled to about 100,000 in this country, while Missionary Baptists have grown to 9,000,000, which shows a ratio of about one to ninety.

If the church should vacate the field of education, and leave it all to the state we shall see the story of education in Germany repeated. So we should be happy to pay the cost of the Baptist message through our schools.

About 35,000 students are now attending Baptist colleges and universities and every indication points to an ever increasing number. May the burden of educating our boys and girls in Christian schools rest upon our hearts.
