ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. We believe in one only true and living God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and that these are one. (See Matt. 28:10).
2. We believe that the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the inspired Word of God and the only rules of faith and practice. (2 Timothy 3:17).
3. We believe in election according to the foreknowledge of God, through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth. (2nd Thes., 3:13).
4. We believe that the Grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared unto all men, and that nothing prevents the salvation of the vilest sinner but his own voluntary rejection of that Grace. (Isa. 55:1; Rev. 22:17; Acts 17:30).
5. We believe in the depravity of the human heart, and that the natural state of man is such that he cannot prepare himself for divine favor without the assisting grace of God, enabling him to act according to the good pleasure of His Divine Will. (Eph. 2:5; Matt. 18:11; John 4:10; First Cor. 3:5-7).
6. We believe in justification by faith, which gives peace with God, through our Lord Jesus Christ. (Romans 5:1-2).
7. We believe that the Gospel of Christ is a means of grace to bring sinners to repentance and faith in Jesus Christ, and therefore should be preached to all the world. (John 3:16).
8. We believe that all those who are regenerated by the Spirit of God are made heirs of God and joint heirs with our Lord Jesus Christ, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto eternal Salvation. First Peter 1:5; Rom. 8:28; Phi. 1:6).
9. We believe that baptism is the immersion of the whole body in water; that the only proper subjects are described in the preceding section, and the only proper administrators are those who have been regularly ordained by a church of Christ, by the imposition of hands of a presbytery. (Acts 8:36; Rom. 6:4; Read Timothy and Titus).
10. We believe that the Lord's Supper was instituted by Jesus Christ to be commemorated by His followers and that none but baptized believers have a Scriptural right to partake thereof. (Luke 22:18, 19, 20; First Cor. 14:26-28).
11. We believe in the resurrection of the righteous and the wicked, and that the wicked shall go away into everlasting punishment, but the righteous into eternal life. (Acts 24:15).

RECORD OF THE FIFTY-SIXTH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE BEULAH BAPTIST ASSOCIATION WITH THE MT. BEULAH CHURCH SUWANNEE COUNTY, FLORIDA SEPTEMBER 26-27, 1935

THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 26

- 10:00 A. M. Devotional was conducted by Rev. W. T. Halstead.
1. 10:15 The Moderator, Rev. John Dicks, called the Association to order.
 2. Names of Messengers were enrolled.
 3. On motion by Rev. E. C. J. Dickens all officers were re-elected by acclamation, as follows: Rev. John Dicks, Moderator; Rev. W. T. Halstead, Vice-Moderator; C. M. Ray, Clerk and E. A. McColskey, Treasurer.
 4. Visitors were recognized and cordially welcomed as follows: Rev. C. M. Brittain, Mrs. C. M. Brittain and Rev. E. D. Solomon from the Jacksonville Association, and Rev. Jno. E. Evans, Rev. W. T. Newsome and Rev. G. H. Platt from the Suwannee Association.
 5. The program as printed was adopted as the order of business.
 6. The report on the Children's Home was deferred until tomorrow to await the arrival of Supt. Johns for the main discussion.
 7. The report on Christian Education was read by Rev. C. R. Roberts.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

REPORT ON CO-OPERATIVE PROGRAM

I. WHAT IT IS

The Co-operative Program is a program of Southern Baptists embracing all of our denominational work including our State work and South wide objects.

II. IT'S PURPOSE

It is a program designed to enlist every church and each individual member in one great Cooperative and unified movement to carry out what we believe to be a new testament program of Christianity as given by the Lord himself to the churches thus, affording to every man, woman and child the privilege of supporting with their offerings whether large or small the entire program of Christian work. From their local community to the utmos. parts of the earth.

III. THE SUCCESS

The success of the program from the human side is dependent upon the Cooperation of our churches and the Cooperation of the churches is largely determined by the attitude of their leaders and their efforts to stimulate interest by giving information to the people concerning the program for if pastors and other leaders of our churches are indifferent toward the program we must expect that such churches will contribute little or nothing.

11. The report on State, Home and Foreign Missions was read by C. G. Campbell. Discussion by the author and by Dr. C. M. Brittain. Dr. Brittain in his address on missions included the Unified Program. The report was adopted. The report follows:

STATE MISSIONS

We have listed in Florida 820 Baptist churches. During the past year 258 of these churches did not contribute one cent to missions or benevolences. The State Mission Board received last year from the 32 percent. allocated to the State work thru the Co-operative Program; The special appropriation made to Florida by the S. S. Board; and by the special gift made to State Missions by the Women and S. S. \$53,-166.00 for carrying on the work within the State, which includes the S. S. and B. Y. P. U. Departments, the W. M. U., Missionary Pastors, Student work in State Institutions, printing the Witness, Evangelism and administration. It is assisting in the support of 67 missionary pastors, one full time missionary, five other special workers, and a State evangelist—we beg you to co-operate in helping to do a greater work.

HOME MISSIONS

The Home Mission Board has 228 missionaries and maintains 598 mission stations and preaching places. It has 29 schools. It operates the Southern Baptist Sanatorium in El Paso, Texas. It has loaned \$1,176,000.00 to churches.

The Missionaries of this Board distributed 443,225 tracts and Bibles and preached to 39,515 people and had 3,740 converts.

In 1934 the Board received \$320,030.95. The budget fixed for the year was \$150,000.00 for missions and operating expenses and \$170,030.95 for debt reduction. They have borrowed no money for the past year.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

The budget for 1935 was fixed at \$659,927.75.

The 388 Foreign Missionaries report a gain of 21,733 souls and that

the 205,000 Baptists in these lands gave \$370,075.66 to the Master's cause last year.

Rev. Milner Brittain, son of our own Dr. Brittain, recently graduated from the Seminary, has been appointed Missionary to China and will sail in November.

15. Dr. Jno. E. Evans by invitation gave an interesting account of a minister's school in Live Oak, in January this year.

Dr. Brittain, Rev. T. W. Newsome, Rev. T. W. Allen, Rev. C. L. Clements and Mrs. Brittain briefly commended the minister's school.

Dr. Evans requested co-operation for another minister's school early in 1936.

16. He also spoke a good word about the Baptist Brotherhood in the Suwannee Association.

Adjourned to meet tomorrow.

REPORT ON THE W. M. U.

Last year at our annual W. M. U. meeting we were unable to elect a president. Therefore the work has been somewhat handicapped. Mrs. A. R. Wise has carried on as best she could under the circumstances.

I have been receiving reports from five societies. These show that Kingdom work has been done by them, and I am sure that the pastors of the churches where these have been functioning would tell us that

it is a help to have a good live missionary society. That should be one aim of every M. S. to be an auxiliary to the church.

Reports from the societies show a membership of 169. Contributed to missions through the Unified Program, \$346.87. Special for missions during week of prayer, \$103.15, Children's Home \$39.00, Margaret Fund \$4.00, Aged Ministers \$2.00, One Hundred Thousand Club \$35.91.

I have been officially connected with our W. M. U. since its organization in 1904. I am retiring after finishing the work of this year, but hope that I may find a place for service.

REPORT ON THE B. Y. P. U.

Recently a change has been made in the name of the training work, the "Baptist Training Union," (abbreviation, B. T. U.) However, the several Unions, such as the Junior, Intermediate and Senior Unions still go by the name of "B. Y. P. U." Let us get in the habit of saying "Baptist Training Union," instead of using the abbreviation.

Our several Training Unions in our churches seem to be doing well, but we know little, one of another. Let us organize.

Five or six years ago we had a good Associational B. Y. P. U., and right now at this meeting let us elect an Associational Director, an Associate Director and Secretary-Treasurer and move forward. By having such an organization we can know what each other is doing and help to work out our problems.

Last year, Oct. 17-18, a conference of Associational Directors was held. Russell Wade from the Lake City church attended as a representative of Beulah Association. This conference was a success, and it will be repeated Oct. 18-19 of this year.

We should organize now so that we can send our Director to the Conference who will have no expense, except for transportation.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS

Of fundamental importance to our work is our Sunday School development, which contemplates in its plans the organization of a Bible school in every Baptist Church and the bringing of every school already established to the highest possible degree of usefulness and efficiency as the teaching agency of the church. Some of the milestones along the way of Sunday School development are: Graded Sunday schools, Teacher Training, The Six Point Record System to mention only a few. Yet, we find that in many Sunday schools in our Associa-

tion these things are unknown. Dr. W. W. Willian and his helpers stand ready to give needed assistance to churches either singly or in groups.

About one-half the churches of the Association report Sunday Schools with a total enrollment of approximately 1,000. What a challenge these other churches without Sunday School offer! What a task of training of teachers lies before us. It is not an easy way but it is the only way to success.

Your committee recommends that every pastor and church leader give consideration to the task of establishing a Sunday School in every Church in the Association.

We further recommend to the teachers and workers everywhere consideration of the new teacher training course.

We wish to register our appreciation of the fine work over the state by Dr. Willian and his helpers, and we heartily recommend that churches in this Association, in groups or singly, secure such help as he can give for the building up of all our Schools.

REPORT ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE

26. The report on Religious Literature was read by Mrs. C. M. Ray.

27. The report was discussed by Dr. E. D. Solomon. He stressed the importance of Christian education, the indispensable need of the Bible, and good literature that helps to make character. He also pressed the claims of the Florida Baptist Witness if we become intelligent about our Christian and Baptist activities at home and abroad.

REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

There is no doubt that literature has much, very much to do in moulding character, and this leads us to commend Christian literature which tends to ennoble and elevate; to bring happiness to the young and old; makes living worth while, and tends toward eternal life beyond. First of all we commend the Bible in which God speaks to us. Then next to the Bible there is a long list of good literature that is entertaining, and instructive. Bible stories, related in simple language, contain history and romance that is unsurpassed in interest, and is worth while instruction.

We commend especially for our older Christians the "Florida Baptist Witness," our denominational organ.

Parents should select with painstaking care good books suited to their children's needs, of which there are many. Sunday School papers, and magazines placed in the hands of the young are a great help in Christian training.

Very few of our daily newspapers of the present day are dependable for the truth in many respects. To illustrate: During the recent campaign to repeal the 18th Amendment to the Constitution the misstatements, and wrong conclusions of the secular papers had much to do in moulding sentiment in favor of legalizing the liquor traffic, with all of its old attendant evils, and with others added.

Literature that familiarizes the young mind with crime and makes heroes and heroines of divorcees, and promotes a wordly standard of living are opposed to the Divine standard.

28. The report on the Children's Home was not ready, but Prof. T. M. Johns, superintendent of the Home, being present, was invited to speak on the subject.

29. He discussed the Home where 141 orphan children live, of which he is superintendent. The institution belongs to the Baptists of Florida and is dependent upon them for support. There the children are carefully educated, and trained for Christian citizenship. They must be fed and clothed and part of that expense is being borne by the Baptists and friends of this Association.

Superintendent Johns expressed his appreciation for gifts from this Association in money and produce, and hoped our interest in the Home and its needs will continue.

30. Dr. E. C. J. Dickens read the report on Temperance and Law Enforcement.

31. Dr. Dickens yielded the floor to Judge Petteway of Tampa, who discussed Christian citizenship, and Temperance together. The address was well received and a vote of thanks was extended to Judge Petteway.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE AND LAW ENFORCEMENT

The people of the United States have never passed through a more serious period of testing. In every phase of life changes, and confusion have come. The years of economic depression have wrought havoc all over America. After some years of good results the 18th amendment was fought by wicked men. The liquor makers, and sellers from the start yelled "Bootlegger". They were anxious about our boys and girls, so afraid they would drink. Yet these selfish men built places, and sold the rotten stuff to our boys and girls. Then after fake propaganda for years, repeal came. Millions of Christian men were deceived and voted for repeal. The idea of now talking open salons as a temperance effort. How can we free slaves, and at the same time support the slave trade. How can you preach temperance, and license men to make and sell liquor.

The situation is indeed chaotic. Statistics show more drunkenness, crime and death than ever.

It is up to the churches. There must be a solid front. Liquor must be put out by law, and out to stay. No Christian man or woman can dodge the issue.

The cry "for revenue is false economically and morally." Report adopted.
