## CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This Association shall be known as the Beulah Baptist Association.

Section 2. This Association shall be composed of Messengers selected by the several churches connected with the Association. Each church shall be entitled to one Messenger at large and one for every twenty-five members or majority fraction thereof.

Section 3. Any regularly organized Baptist Church of the same faith may become a member of this Association upon application by a petitionary letter and Messengers as above provided.

Section 4. This Association shall at a regular meeting elect from their members by ballot, a Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall serve for one year.

Section 5. The object of this Association shall be: First, to promote unity and brotherly love among the Churches; second, to promote Gospel discipline; to encourage the universal spread of the Gospel and practical religion throughout our bounds and elsewhere.

Section 6. The Moderator shall appoint at each annual session of the Association an Executive Committee composed of eight members whose appointment shall be approved by the body. Their duties shall be: First, to inquire into destitution within our bounds; second, to make contracts with the Ministers of the Gospel of this Association, or other Associations in correspondence with us; to supply such destitution with the Gospel; third, to draw from the treasury such funds as are available for missionary purposes to meet their contracts, and to exercise general supervision in the promotion of unity and brotherly love among the Churches and the universal spread of the Gospel throughout our bounds. They shall report the results of their labors at each annual session of the Association.

Section 7. The Moderator shall invite correspondence and visiting ministers and brethren to seats with the body when in session. They shall be entitled to the privilege of aiding the Association with their counsel.

Section 8. This Association shall have the right to withdraw from any church that may be in disorder when the same cannot be restored by Gospel discipline to the unity of faith in the bonds of peace.

Section 9. The annual meetings of this Association shall be held at such time and place as may be designated by the body; and by appointment there shall be an introductory sermon preached the first day of the session at 11 o'clock, and on the Sabbath, or last day of the session, a collection taken up for missionary purposes.

Section 10. This Association shall not lord it over God's heritage nor infringe upon any of the internal rights of churches, but shall act only as an advisory body.

Section 11. This Constitution may be amended at any regular session of the Association by a two-thirds vote of all messengers. Any amendment offered shall be in writing.

## ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. We believe in one only true and living God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and that these are one. (See Matt. 28:19.)

2. We believe that the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the inspired Word of God and the only rules of faith and practice. (2 Timothy 3:17.)

3. We believe in election according to the foreknowledge of God, through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth. (2nd Thes. 2:13.)

4. We believe that the Grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared unto all men, and that nothing prevents the salvation of the vilest sinner but his own voluntary rejection of that Grace. (Isa. 55:1; Rev. 22:17; Acts 17:30.)

5. We believe in the depravity of the human heart, and that the natural state of man is such that he cannot prepare himself for divine favor without the assisting grace of God, enabling him to act according to the good pleasure of His Divine Will. (Eph. 2:5; Matt 18:11; John 4:10; First Cor. 3:5-7.)

6. We believe in justification by faith, which gives peace with God, through our Lord Jesus Christ. (Romans 5:1-2.)

7. We believe that the Gospel of Christ is a means of grace to bring sinners to repentance and faith in Jesus Christ, and therefore should be preached to all the world. (John 3:16.)

8. We believe that all these who are regenerated by the Spirit of God are made heirs of God and joint heirs with our Lord Jesus Christ, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto eternal Salvation. (Peter 1:5; Rom. 8:28; Phi. 1:6.)

9. We believe that baptism is the immersion of the whole body in water; that the only proper subjects are described in the preceding section, and the only proper administrators are those who have been regularly ordained by a church of Christ, by the imposition of hands of a presbytery. (Acts 8:36; Rom. 6:4; Read Timothy and Titus.)

10. We believe that the Lord's Supper was instituted by Jesus Christ to be commemorated by His followers and that none but baptized believers have a Scriptural right to partake thereof. (Luke 22:18, 20; I Cor. 14:26-28.)

11. We believe in the resurrection of the righteous and the wicked, and that the wicked shall go away into everlasting punishment, but the righteous into eternal life. (Acts 24:15.)



### RULES OF DECORUM

Article 1. At the first meeting of each session of the Association, the Moderator of the previous session shall call the Messengers to order, when the Messengers may elect a Moderator pro tem, who shall preside until the letters from the churches are read, and the names of the Messengers are enrolled. In case of absence of the Moderator the Clerk shall call to order.

Article 2. When the letters from the Churches shall have been read and the names of the Messengers enrolled, they shall elect from the body, by ballot, a Moderator, a Clerk, and a Treasurer, who shall serve one year and until their successors shall be duly elected.

Article 3. Each day's session of the Association shall be opened with prayer.

Article 4. The Moderator shall preserve order and decide all questions in debate, subject to an appeal to the body; and when he shall speak on any subject in discussion, he shall call some member to the chair, and in case of a tie, shall give the deciding vote.

Article 5. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to approval by the body.

Article 6. The Clerk shall keep a careful record of the proceedings of each meeting, and in the absence of the Moderator shall call the body together and preside until a Moderator pro tem shall be elected.

Article 7. All members wishing to speak on any subject shall arise and address the Moderator as "Brother," and shall confine themselves strictly to the subject and shall not be allowed to make an unkind allusion to any brother while speaking.

Article 8. No motion shall be debated until seconded and stated by the Moderator or read by the Clerk.

Article 9. When a motion is under consideration no other motion shall be entertained except to adjourn, lay on the table, to amend, indefinitely postpone, refer to committee, or call for the previous question.

Article 10. Any member voting with the majority on any question in debate may move a reconsideration at any time during the session.

Article 11. Visiting brethren of other Associations may speak on any subject, but shall not vote.

Article 12. No brother shall speak more than twice on a subject without the consent of the Association.

Article 13. These rules of Decorum may be altered or amended at any regular session of the Association by a majority vote of the members of the body.

 OCTOBER 1-2, 1936

## THURSDAY MORNING

10:00 A. M. Devotional was led by Rev. C. F. Hooker.

1 10:15 The Moderator, Rev. John Dicks called the Association to order, and names of Messengers were enrolled by the Clerk.

2 Enrollment of Messengers was completed and the election of officers was declared in order by the Moderator, Rev. John Dicks.

3 Rev. John Dicks made a few remarks expressing appreciation for confidence during the last several years, and now he asked the Association to elect a new Moderator.

4 Rev. C. L. Clements placed in nomination Rev. W. T. Halstead, who said a few words commending E. A. McColskey, whom he placed in nomination. E. A. McColskey's name was withdrawn, and on motion, the acting Moderator cast the ballot for Rev. W. T. Halstead. Rev. Halstead on taking the chair expressed his appreciation.

5 Other officers were elected without opposition, the ballot being cast for each one separately as follows: Rev. C. L. Clements, Vice Moderator; C. M. Ray, Clerk; and E. A. McColskey, Treasurer.

6 Visitors were recognized as follows: Dr. C. M. Brittain, Secretary State Board of Missions; Hugh Latimer, State Chairman of the Laymen's Movement; Rev. W. B. Hicks, of the Santa Fe River Association; Rev. and Mrs. C. F. Hooker of New River Association; Rev. J. E. Evans, and Rev. G. H. Platt, of the Suwannee Association; Jesse G. Knight, Rev. Horace McLeroy, Rev. and Mrs. G. W. Parker, of Harmony Association; and Mrs. C. M. Brittain, of Jacksonville, Fla.

7 The program as printed in the local papers was read by Rev. John Dicks, and on motion was adopted, subject to changes.

8 On motion the Annual Sermon was deferred until the afternoon.

9 The report on Missions, State, Home and Foreign, written by

B. H. Groover, was read by Rev. C. L. Clements, and Rev. John Dicks read the report on the Unified program.

10. By invitation Dr. Brittain discussed the Mission and Program reports. His address was interesting and instructive.

## REPORT OF MISSIONS

### STATE, HOME AND FOREIGN

By Ben H. Groover

Our people should generously support State Missions. Its budget for the year calls for an expenditure of \$56,930.00, and State Missions is the base of supplies for all of our mission, and evangelizing activities in Home, and Foreign fields.

The work of State Missions is directed by the Baptist State Mission Board with offices in Jacksonville, and Dr. C. M. Brittain is Executive Secretary. It deserves generous support by all of our churches.

Home Missions is conducted by the Home Mission Board with offices in Atlanta, Ga. Its territory embraces the Southern States, Cuba and Mexico. It carried an embarrassing debt for several years, but in 1935 receipts amounted to some \$82,000.00 in excess of the amount received in 1934, and the debt is being materially reduced.

This Board employs Missionaries in all the States, and Countries of its territory.

The Baptist Foreign Mission Board is now ninety years old. Its executive offices are in Richmond, Va.

This Board also has a considerable debt. At one time this was quite embarrassing, but more than half of the original amount has been paid, leaving a balance of \$444,000.

The 100,000 Club movement has been a great factor in liquidating this debt.

Indeed it seems to be an inspired movement, and we pray that our people may continue the good work.

The work of this Board is to evangelize through its many Missionaries in foreign lands, fulfilling the command, "Go Ye Into All the World and Preach the Gospel to Every Creature."

## THE BAPTIST CO-OPERATIVE PROGRAM

The Cooperative Program is the plan by which Baptists work together in supporting the causes of Christ, including State, Home and Foreign Missions, Christian Education, Ministerial Relief, Orphanages and Hospitals. Through it we give for all the causes fostered

by our denomination and our Boards make the most equitable distribution of our offerings.

The general division of each dollar given to this program by Florida Baptists is on the basis of fifty five cents for causes in the State of Florida and forty-five cents for Southwide objects. This distribution of each dollar in detail is as follows:

Song services was led by Rev. C. F. Hooker, assisted by Mrs. Hooker in a duet; prayer by Rev. G. H. Platt.

16. The annual sermon was preached at this time by Rev. C. L. Clements, and was greatly appreciated, Text: Matth. 2:1-2.

17. The report on the Children's Home was read by E. A. McColskey, who yielded the floor and Rev. E. B. Evans of the Arcadia church spoke on the Home, and its needs.

18. The Home was further discussed by E. A. McColskey, a Trustee of that institution and cards relating to the offerings in our Sunday Schools for the Home were distributed.

**REPORT ON ORPHAN'S HOME**

Our children's Home is located at Arcadia, Florida, owned and operated by the Baptists of this State, supervised by Bro. T. M. Johns; maintained by special donations from Sunday Schools, individuals and 10% of the Cooperative Program.

We have in the Home 163 boys and girls, and many others wanting to come in, but the financial income will not justify taking them in.

**REPORT ON THE W. M. U.**

The perpetual watchword of the W. M. U. has meant so much to us through the 48 years of our organization. "Laborers together with God," and linked with that our watch word for 1936, "Jesus said as the Father hath sent me so send I you." Then our program theme "Thy Kingdom come."

Because we are willing to be laborers Jesus is saying to us, "Go out and help bring His kingdom in." The word laborer indicates hard work, but together lifts it from drudgery to happy helpfulness. Every phase of our union life emphasizes this cooperative effort.

God used a consecrated life—Miss Lottie Moon—led her to China, where she saw the needs and opportunities; then come back to America to help the women of our Southland to see what great things could

be done through cooperative effort, and down through the years God has continued to use consecrated lives to carry out His plans.

"We are laborers together with God" in every phase of our W. M. U. work, and it is because we want more laborers that our Superintendents want to enlist more of our ladies, young people, and children; not that we would boast of numbers, but to help bring God's kingdom in.

We of Beulah Association, though small in numbers as we look back over the past year, with its accomplishments, and lost opportunities also look forward to the new year yielding ourselves to Him, that we may be true "laborers together with God," and be able to pray with a earnestness, "Thy Kingdom Come, Thy Will Be Done."

25. In the absence of a report on Sunday Schools, E. V. Moore, the Associational Sunday School Superintendent gave an interesting talk on the Importance of Sunday Schools in all of our Churches.

26. With the Vice-Moderator presiding, Rev. W. T. Halstead offered a motion that E. V. Moore be re-elected Associational Sunday School Superintendent, and he was elected by acclamation.

27. The report on Christian Education was read by Rev. W. T. Halstead, and was discussed by him and Dr. Solomon.

**REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION**

If Baptists show full loyalty to Christ and execute the whole Commission, a part of which is—"Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you"—it is necessary that they put Education in their program. In the broad sense, Sunday Schools, B. Y. P. U's., and christian literature are to be classed as factors of the educational



processes and should not be overlooked by our people. Training in the home is too often neglected.

This report deals specifically with education from the point of view of the Christian School and College. The Christian School is the one place where every phase of education is given. It is their task to train the heart as well as the head. No man is truly educated who has not received Christian training. The Christian colleges of this land are responsible for whatever positive moral and spiritual standards are found in the State Schools.

Florida Baptists have watched with great joy the fine progress that Stetson University has been making the last two years under the management of President W. S. Allen. It would seem that the time is now ripe for the Baptists of Florida to rally to Stetson as they have never done before. A heavy increase in enrollment, and the construction of several new buildings tell only a part of the story of progress. A fine spiritual atmosphere prevails in the class room and on the campus.

The Baptists of America have more money invested in their schools than any other Protestant denomination. Some of the states have two, or even three or four Baptist colleges. Florida has only one. Let's support it.

## REPORT ON CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

It is of great importance that our young people should have the best reading matter, rather than the trashy literature that is so abundant.

Many parents do not realize what tremendous influences the wrong kind of literature may, and often does have in the lives of their children.

Let us awaken to this great danger, and guard and guide by supplying attractive, good literature, of which there is an abundance. Not all of it is cheap, but the extra cost should not be considered.

If a taste for the right kind of literature is once formed it will grow and mould characters, and fit our young people to become Christian citizens.

The importance of the Bible, Bible stories and lives of Christian

heroes is commended to all of our people; then we must not forget our Church and Missionary papers, so necessary for our Christian growth.

The following is Dr. Solomon's offer, which was made part of the report on Religious Literature:

To one-fourth and half-time churches we will mail twelve Florida Baptist Witnesses to twelve homes for twelve months for \$12.00. It may be more, but not less than twelve to each church unless they have fewer than twelve homes. To all-time churches the paper will be mailed to the homes of the official families for half price (\$1.00 per year)—that is, pastor, deacons, clerk, teachers and officers of Sunday Schools, B. T. U. and W. M. U.—not to each individual, but to each family. The proposition (not subscription) must be for one year, but can be paid for monthly, quarterly or yearly, in advance—(Post Office requirement.)

Adopted.

31. The committee on Resolutions was appointed as follows: C. J. Perkins, Rev. J. R. Eubanks, and Rev. E. P. DuBose.

32. Rev. C. L. Clements in the chair. Rev. W. T. Halstead introduced Dr. W. R. Deal, the Chaplain serving a number of C.C.C. Camps, and requested him to preach the Missionary sermon, displacing himself as on the program.

33. Dr. Deal accepted the invitation, and preached acceptably to all. An offering for the Unified Program was taken amounting to \$6.35.

Adjourned for lunch.

2:30 P. M. Devotional was led by Rev. C. L. Clements.

34. The report on the Relief and Annuity Board was read by Rev. J. R. Eubanks, and was briefly discussed by him.

35. With Rev. C. L. Clements presiding, Rev. W. T. Halstead read the report of Rev. S. F. Young, Chairman of Eubanks Relief fund. By agreement this was made part of the report on Ministerial Relief, and both were adopted.

## REPORT ON MINISTERIAL RELIEF AND ANNUNTIES

First, the Board continually faces the great task laid upon it by the Southern Baptist Convention and by the various States of providing food, clothing and shelter for thousands of ministers who have grown old in the service of Christ, and of the widows of ministers who have gone to their Heavenly home. The upturned faces and the outstretched hands of these needy ones make a mute appeal to the generosity of

the people of our churches that should find quick and practical response and "who would begrudge a few embers to keep the frosts of winter from chilling the weary frames of the old veterans of the Cross."

The Relief and Annuity Board is now asking that a special "Fellowship Offering" be taken by each church at least once a year in connection with the observance of the Lord's Supper. This offering will be in addition to their regular contributions and should be sent to The Relief and Annuity Board through the State offices like all other contributions but marked "Special Fellowship Offering for Ministerial Relief." If thousands of our churches will take this "Fellowship Offering" the Relief and Annuity Board will be able to send thousands of dollars more money to these aged and dependent veterans.

The Relief and Annuity Board has already paid to aged ministers and widows nearly Three Millions of dollars in benefits, but vastly more needs to be done and the Board is limited in what it can do only by the churches. Will they co-operate?

### REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOLS

In 1934 the Churches of this Association reported thirteen Sunday Schools with 947 pupils enrolled. In 1935 fifteen schools were reported with an enrollment of 1069. This year we find that we have sixteen Schools with a total enrollment of 1095. These figures tell their own story.

Your Executive Committee beelives that the time is ripe for a great forward movement in Sunday School enlargement. In the last minutes of the Southern Baptist Convention, Dr. E. P. Alldredge tells us that it is the small town, village and country churches that have made the largest gains in the last three years.

We are now in the first year of a great five-year program of intensive effort for Sunday School development. Each of the states in our convention territory is entering into this program with enthusiasm. Our state secretary, Dr. W. W. William, is leading Florida Baptists in a great way. Your Executive Committee is happy to report that Bro. Ed. V. Moore has already made a fine beginning on this program in our Association. Several new schools have been organized. Training of teachers is our next most important task. We bespeak for Bro. Moore the hearty cooperation of our churches.
