CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This Association shall be known as the Beulah Baptist Association.

Section 2. This Association shall be composed of Messengers selected by the several churches connected with the Association. Each church shall be entitled to one Messenger at large and one for every twenty-five members or majority fraction thereof.

Section 3. Any regular organized Baptist Church of the same faith may become a member of this Association upon application by a petitionary letter and Messengers as above provided.

Section 4. This Association shall at a regular meeting elect from their members by ballot a Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall serve for one year.

Section 5. The object of this Association shall be: First, to promote unity and brotherly love among the Churches; second, to promote Gospel discipline; to encourage the universal spread of the Gospel and practical religion throughout our bounds and elsewhere.

Section 6. The Moderator shall appoint at each annual session of the Association an Executive Committee composed of eight members whose appointment shall be approved by the body. Their duties shall be: First, to inquire into destitution within our bounds; second, to make contracts with the Ministers of the Gospel of this Association, or other Associations in correspondence with us; to supply such destitution with the Gospel; third, to draw from the treasury such funds as are available for missionary purposes to meet their contracts, and to exercise general supervision in the promotion of unity and brotherly love among the Churches and the universal spread of the Gospel throughout our bounds. They shall report the results of their labors at each annual session of the Association.

Section 7. The Moderator shall invite correspondence and visiting ministers and brethren to seats with the body when in session. They shall be entitled to the privilege of aiding the Association with their counsel.

Section 8. This Association shall have the right to withdraw from any church that may be in disorder when the same cannot be restored by Gospel discipline to the unity of faith in the bonds of peace.

Section 9. The annual meetings of this Association shall be held at such time and place as may be designated by the body; and by appointment there shall be an introductory sermon preached the first day of the session at 11 o'clock, and on the Sabbath, or last day of the session, a collection taken up for missionary purposes.

Section 10. This Association shall not lord it over God's heritage nor infringe upon any of the internal rights of churches, but shall act only as an advisory body.

Section 11. This Constitution may be amended at any regular session of the Association by a two-thirds vote of all messengers. Any amendment offered shall be in writing.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. We believe in one only true and living God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and that these are one. (See Matt. 28:19.)

2. We believe that the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the inspired Word of God and the only rules of faith and practice. (2 Timothy 3:17.)

3. We believe in election according to the foreknowledge of God, through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth. (2nd Thes. 3:13.)

4. We believe that the Grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared unto all men, and that nothing prevents the salvation of the vilest sinner but his own voluntary rejection of that Grace. (Isa. 55:1; Rev. 22:17; Acts 17:30.)

5. We believe in the depravity of the human heart, and that the natural state of man is such that he cannot prepare himself for divine favor without the assisting grace of God, enabling him to act according to the good pleasure of His Divine Will. (Eph. 2:5; Matt. 18:11; John 4:10; First Cor. 3:5-7.)

6. We believe in justification by faith, which gives peace with God, through our Lord Jesus Christ. (Romans 5:1-2.)

7. We believe that the Gospel of Christ is a means of grace to bring sinners to repentance and faith in Jesus Christ, and therefore should be preached to all the world. (John 3:16.)

8. We believe that all those who are regenerated by the Spirit of God are made heirs of God and joint heirs with our Lord Jesus Christ, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto eternal Salvation. (Peter 1:5; Rom. 8:28; Phil. 1:6.)

9. We believe that baptism is the immersion of the whole body in water; that the only proper subjects are described in the preceding section, and the only proper administrators are those who have been regularly ordained by a church of Christ, by the imposition of hands of a presbytery. (Acts 8:36; Read Timothy and Titus.)

10. We believe that the Lord's Supper was instituted by Jesus Christ to be commemorated by His followers and that none but baptized believers have a Scriptural right to partake thereof. (Luke 22:18, 19, 20; I Cor. 14:26-28.)

11. We believe in the resurrection of the righteous and the wicked, and that the wicked shall go away into everlasting punishment, but the righteous into eternal life. (Acts 24:15.)

RULES OF DECORUM

Article 1. At the first meeting of each session of the Association, the Moderator of the previous session shall call the Messengers to order, when the Messengers may elect a Moderator pro tem, who shall preside until the letters from the churches are read, and the names of the Messengers enrolled. In case of absence of the Moderator the Clerk shall call to order.

Article 2. When the letters from the Churches shall have been read and the names of the Messengers enrolled, they shall elect from the body, by ballot, a Moderator, a Clerk, and a Treasurer, who shall serve one year and until their successors shall be duly elected.

Article 3. Each day's session of the Association shall be opened with prayer.

Article 4. The Moderator shall preserve order and decide all questions in debate, subject to an appeal to the body; and when he shall speak on any subject in discussion, he shall call some member to the chair, and in case of a tie, shall give the deciding vote.

Article 5. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to approval by the body.

Article 6. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of each meeting, and in the absence of the Moderator shall call the body together and preside until a Moderator pro tem shall be elected.

Article 7. All members wishing to speak on any subject shall arise and address the Moderator as "Brother," and shall confine themselves strictly to the subject and shall not be allowed to make an unkind allusion to any brother while speaking.

Article 8. No motion shall be debated until seconded and stated by the Moderator or read by the Clerk.

Article 9. When a motion is under consideration no other motion shall be entertained except to adjourn, lay on the table, to amend, indefinitely postpone, refer to committee, or call for the previous question.

Article 10. Any member voting with the majority on any question in debate may move a reconsideration at any time during the session.

Article 11. Visiting brethren of other Associations may speak on any subject, but shall not vote.

Article 12. No brother shall speak more than twice on a subject without the consent of the Association.

Article 13. These rules of Decorum may be altered or amended at any regular session of the Association by a majority vote of the members of the body.

**RECORD OF THE
FIFTY-EIGHTH SESSION
OF THE BEULAH BAPTIST ASSOCIATION
WITH THE BETHLEHEM CHURCH
COLUMBIA COUNTY, FLORIDA
SEPT. 30 - OCT. 1, 1937**

10:00 A. M. Devotional was led by Rev. W. C. Stracener on invitation of the Moderator.

1. 10:15. The Association was called to order by the Moderator, Rev. W. T. Halstead, and messengers were enrolled by the Clerk, C. M. Ray.
2. On motion, agreed that those enrolled, and others to be enrolled, would constitute this body.
3. Rev. W. T. Halstead, and Rev. John Dicks were nominated for permanent Moderator. Ballots were distributed, and Dr. Dickens, and Rev. Roberts acting as Tellers announced the election of Rev. John Dicks. By invitation Dr. Brittain gave a short informal talk.
4. Revs. Halstead, Allen and Roberts were nominated for Vice Moderator. The names of the first two were withdrawn, and Rev. C. R. Roberts was elected, the Clerk casting the ballot. C. M. Ray was re-elected Clerk by acclamation.
5. E. A. McColskey was nominated for and re-elected Treasurer, the Clerk casting the ballot.
6. Visitors were recognized as follows:
Dr. C. M. Brittain, Executive Secretary of the Florida Baptist Mission Board and Mrs. C. M. Brittain, Dr. E. D. Solomon, Editor of the "Florida Baptist Witness," Rev. E. H. Holcomb and E. T. Horn of the Suwannee Association, Rev. A. M. Parker, Middle Florida Association, F. T. Burnett, New River Association, Rev. H. G. McLeroy, Rev. Wood Sheffield and J. F. Knight of Harmony Association and Rev. W. G. Stracener of Madison, Fla.
7. The report on Christian Literature prepared by Mrs. M. A. Townsend was read by the Clerk.
8. The report on Christian Education was read by Rev. John Dicks, and these two reports were open for discussion.
9. Dr. Solomon discussed the report on Christian Literature and

especially stressed the features of the Florida Baptist Witness.

10. The report on Christian Education was discussed briefly by Rev. John Dicks. The reports were adopted.
11. The Finance Committee was appointed. D. C. Albritton, J. J. Bielling and Perry Gay.
12. The Committee on Nominations was appointed as follows: Dr. E. C. J. Dickens, Dr. W. R. Deal and R. F. Persons.
13. The annual sermon was preached by Dr. W. R. Deal. Text, Rev. 3:15.
Adjourned for Lunch.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The Baptists of this country have ever given their most loyal support in the building of our great educational system. Experience and observation have taught us that knowledge and enlightenment have ever been the most productive soil for Baptist growth and progress, and ignorance and superstition have been the hot beds in which heresy and Godlessness have thrived.

Education of the right kind always makes for a larger liberty and opens the way for truth, and righteousness. But education alone will not always secure for us the development of the best there is in man, especially in these days when infidelity, materialism and untrue and unscriptural science are making their way into many of our State institutions, with the objective to poison the mind of youth and thus make it ever difficult to reach them with a genuine spiritual religion. Therefore, our hope for the preserving of a public system of educa-

tion lies within our Christian institutions. For these institutions will furnish the men, and women with trained minds, and also spiritual development that will largely counteract the influences that are being generated in institutions where the spiritual is not considered. With these problems before us we believe that it is very imperative that we support our denominational schools, with our money, influence and students. We certainly cannot afford to ignore our Florida Baptist School, Stetson University, at DeLand, Florida. We are glad to report that this school is making rapid progress in many ways, and especially in its enlargement of modern buildings, also a larger faculty and a larger student body than ever before.

We, your committee, most earnestly urge upon this Association that we give more consideration to Stetson University.

STATE, HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS

State missions includes all the missionary and benevolent work engaged in by Florida Baptists in a co-operative way, and should be supported, cheerfully and generously. Through our State Mission forces we are helping to win the lost to Christ by sending the gospel to destitute regions, by helping to organize and grow churches, which become representatives of Christ upon earth.

We are this year helping to support 64 missionary pastors, who are preaching to 87 churches and mission stations

Last year Florida Baptists made a splendid advance in their mission gifts but our present needs are greater and our budget for this year is fixed at \$67,820.00, which is the largest budget our State Board has adopted for several years. We can reach it if every church in the

state will do its part in supporting the the co-operative program liberally.

The purpose of the Home Mission Board is to evangelize the homeland and to marshal the forces in the homeland for world conquest for Christ and is, therefore, an essential part of our world campaign. In all departments of its work the Board has 327 missionaries, which includes 35 new missionaries placed this past year.

The budget of the Home Board for the year was \$150,000.00 for mission work and overhead, and \$203,823 for interest and principal on debt.

For the first time in several years the total income of the Foreign Mission Board passed the million mark and for this the Board is grateful to God, and to Southern Baptists for their loyalty and gifts but, even with this contribution, their activities are circumscribed, and on account of their debts and at their last meeting no new missionaries were appointed.

For the future growth Southern Baptists must increase their gifts to God for his work beyond the seas and, unless our people do raise the standards of giving, we will never be able to meet the needs and supply missionaries for the new and impelling opportunities open to us everywhere, both at home and abroad.

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOLS

At the close of our Associational year 1936, there were in our Association sixteen Sunday Schools. We now have twenty-three. However, we have one church that does not have a school. Mt. Carmel

Church is conducting a Mission School at Shady Grove. Total enrollment will be printed in the minutes.

At a glance the report of one Sunday school reads as follows: 'At the close of last year's work we had on roll thirty. We now have fifty-one. We also had eight boys and girls to come into the church from our Intermediate class.

As to our Summer Training Schools' held, wish to state our Brother, Alvis Herring, taught nine classes, in as many churches, with a total enrollment of one hundred taking, and forty-eight making a passing grade.

It is my honest opinion that there is a great improvement in some of the churches as well as Sunday schools from a standpoint of attendance, interest in general, as well as spirituality.

Please allow me to state here that it has been a great pleasure to work with the different Sunday schools, and to mix and mingle with the people.

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL RELIEF

This would help wonderfully in meeting this great need. The Relief and Annuity Board has already paid to the aged ministers and their widows over \$300,000,000 in benefits and much more is needed, so let us co-operate.

REPORT ON THE BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

ARCADIA, FLORIDA (Condensed)

A number of improvements have been made at the Home this year. The school building on the campus has again been leased by the County Board of Instruction and is now used for offices, library and the print shop. This gives much added space for the print shop, and much to efficiency. The library means much to the children, and they are collecting books.

They have done much repair work to buildings and floors and considerable painting under the supervisors. By their own efforts the children produce much of the pork used in the Home.

The dairy herd furnishes enough milk for the children. There are 40 cows and calves in the herd.

The grove is in excellent condition and will produce more than 800 boxes of citrus fruit this year.

The canning plant is an important factor in the home. The vegetable growers in South Florida give vegetables that are not saleable for shipment but are suitable for canning.

All work is done by the children. No one is hired except supervisors, who serve as foremen.

It is the intention of the Trustees to increase the number of children in the Home during the next two years. In fact it is intended to increase the capacity so that 250 children can be cared for.

If this enlargement and increase are to be realized there must be a closer co-operation of the churches of the state. If half of the churches could be depended upon for monthly contributions this splendid work would take care of all the children our buildings will hold.

It is much better to give to protect the child when he is young than to wait and be compelled by taxation to support him in a penal institution. We urge therefore, every church to support the Home regularly. Report read by Superintendent Johns.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Your committee has had several meetings during the year. Besides the usual routine matters, an offering of produce was collected and forwarded to the Florida Baptist Children's Home, the estimated value of which was \$328.50. The gifts from the individual churches are here listed and made a part of this report.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE AND LAW

They promised that we would have no saloons, but every promise has been broken. Nearly all liquor stores have girls for clerks, and drinking is far worse than ever before. So varied and vexing is the liquor situation that volumes could be written upon it, and still it would not have an adequate presentation. We quote from the findings of the National Temperance and Prohibition Council promulgated at its last annual session at Washington, D. C., Dec. 1936.

"The repeal of prohibition did not solve a single problem, except the problems of the brewers, the distillers and the liquor dealers, who under prohibition, were stopped from putting their wares on the market. For the people it multiplied and magnified their problems a hundred fold. Conditions now are incomparably worse than they were in the old saloon days. When national prohibition went into effect it closed 177,000 places in which the sale of intoxicating liquor was restricted by law, and they were hedged about by all manner of restrictive legislation. We now have appropriately 500,000 outlets for the sale of intoxicating liquors, most of them with little restrictions. Grocery stores, department stores, drug stores, restaurants, air ports and filling stations freely sell liquors, multiplying human woe in all its forms.

Widespread drinking among youth, both boys and girls, and among men and women including many church members fills our hearts with sorrow, mantles our cheeks with shame and arouses the determination that these conditions shall not continue.

We earnestly suggest that our Baptist Churches and pastors increasingly work to educate all classes concerning the evil effects of liquor on the body and brain and of the financial wreckage that follows the use of intoxicating liquors.
