CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This Association shall be known as the Beulah Baptist Association.

Section 2. This Association shall be composed of Messengers selected by the several Churches connected with the Association. Each church shall be entitled to one Messenger at large and one for every twenty-five members or majority fraction thereof.

Section 3. Any regular organized Baptist Church of the same faith may become a member of this Association upon application by a petitionary letter and Messengers as above provided.

Section 4. This Association shall at a regular meeting elect from their members by ballot a Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall serve for one year.

Section 5. The object of this Association shall be: First, to promote unity and brotherly love among the Churches; second to promote Gospel discipline; to encourage the universal spread of the Gospel and practical religion throughout our bounds and elsewhere.

Section 6. The Moderator shall appoint at each annual session of the Association an Executive Committee composed of eight members whose appointment shall be approved by the body. Their duties shall be: First, to inquire into destitution within our bounds; second, to make contracts with the Ministers of the Gospel of this Association, or other Associations in correspondence with us; to supply such destitution with the Gospel; third, to draw from the treasury for such funds as are available for missionary purposes to meet their contracts, and to exercise general supervision in the promotion of unity and brotherly love among the Churches and the universal spread of the Gospel throughout our bounds. They shall report the results of their labors at each annual session of the Association.

Section 7. The Moderator shall invite correspondence and visiting ministers and brethren to seats with the body when in session. They shall be entitled to the privilege of aiding the Association with their counsel.

Section 8. This Association shall have the right to withdraw from any church that may be in disorder when the same cannot be restored by Gospel discipline to the unity of faith in the bonds of peace.

Section 9. The annual meetings of this Association shall be held at such time and place as may be designated by the body; and by appointment there shall be an introductory sermon preached the first day of the session at 11 o'clock, and on the Sabbath, or last day of the session, a collection taken up for missionary purposes.

Section 10. This Association shall not lord it over God's heritage nor infringe upon any of the internal rights of churches, but shall act only as an advisory body.

Section 11. This Constitution may be amended at any regular session of the Association by a two-thirds vote of all messengers. Any amendment offered shall be in writing.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. We believe in one only true and living God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and that these are one. (See Matt. 28:19.)

2. We believe that the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the inspired Word of God and the only rules of faith and practice. (2 Timothy 3:17.)

3. We believe in election according to the foreknowledge of God, through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth. (2nd Thes. 3:13.)

4. We believe that the Grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared unto all men, and that nothing prevents the salvation of the vilest sinner but his own voluntary rejection of that Grace. (Isa. 55:1; Rev. 22:17; Acts 17:30.)

5. We believe in the depravity of the human heart, and that the natural state of man is such that he cannot prepare himself for divine favor without the assisting grace of God, enabling him to act according to the good pleasure of His Divine Will. (Eph. 2:5; Matt. 18:11; John 4:10; First Cor. 3:5-7.)

6. We believe in justification by faith, which gives peace with God, through our Lord Jesus Christ. (Romans 5:1-2.)

7. We believe that the Gospel of Christ is a means of grace to bring sinners to repentance and faith in Jesus Christ, and therefore should be preached to all the world. (John 3:16.)

8. We believe that all those who are regenerated by the Spirit of God are made heirs of God and joint heirs with our Lord Jesus Christ, and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto eternal Salvation. (Peter 1:5; Rom. 8:28; Phil. 1:6.)

9. We believe that baptism is the immersion of the whole body in water; that the only proper subjects are described in the preceding section, and the only proper administrators are those who have been regularly ordained by a church of Christ, by the imposition of hands of a presbytery. (Acts 8:36; Read Timothy and Titus.)

10. We believe that the Lord's Supper was instituted by Jesus Christ to be commemorated by His followers and that none but baptized believers have a Scriptural right to partake thereof. (Luke 22:18, 19, 20; I Cor. 14:26-28.)

11. We believe in the resurrection of the righteous and the wicked, and that the wicked shall go away into everlasting punishment, but the righteous into eternal life. (Acts 24:15.)

RULES OF DECORUM

Article 1. At the first meeting of each session of the Association, the Moderator of the previous session shall call the Messengers to order when the Messengers may elect a Moderator pro tem, who shall preside until the letters from the churches are read, and the names of the Messengers enrolled. In case of absence of the Moderator the Clerk shall call to order.

Article 2. When the letters from the Churches shall have been read and the names of the Messengers enrolled, they shall elect from the body, by ballot, a Moderator, a Clerk, and a Treasurer, who shall serve one year and until their successors shall be duly elected.

Article 3. Each day's session of the Association shall be opened with prayer.

Article 5. The Moderator shall preserve order and decide all questions in debate, subject to an appeal to the body; and when he shall speak on any subject in discussion, he shall call some member to the chair, and in case of a tie, shall give the deciding vote.

Article 5. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to approval by the body.

Article 6. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of each meeting, and in the absence of the Moderator shall call the body together and preside until a Moderator pro tem shall be elected.

Article 7. All members wishing to speak on any subject shall arise and address the Moderator as "Brother," and shall confine themselves strictly to the subject and shall not be allowed to make an unkind allusion to any brother while speaking.

Article 8. No motion shall be debated until seconded and stated by the Moderator or read by the Clerk.

Article 9. When a motion is under consideration no other motion shall be entertained except to adjourn, lay on the table, to amend, indefinitely postpone, refer to committee, or call for the previous question.

Article 10. Any member voting with the majority on any question in debate may move a reconsideration at any time during the session.

Article 11. Visiting brethren of other Associations may speak on any subject, but shall not vote.

Article 12. No brother shall speak more than twice on a subject without the consent of the Association.

Article 13. These rules of Decorum may be altered or amended at any regular session of the Association by a majority vote of the members of the body.

**RECORD OF THE FIFTY-NINTH SESSION
OF THE BEULAH BAPTIST ASSOCIATION
WITH THE MT. CARMEL CHURCH,
COLUMBIA COUNTY, FLORIDA,
SEPT. 29 - 30, 1938**

THURSDAY 10:00 A. M.

Devotional was led by Rev. C. L. Clements.

1. Rev. John Dicks, the Moderator, called the Association to order (As the officers were elected at the session a year in advance, there was no election at this time).
2. After brief remarks slips were distributed for enrollment of Messengers. (See Enrollment page.)
3. Visitors were recognized as follows:
Dr. and Mrs. C. M. Brittain, Dr. E. D. Solomon and Dr. W. W. William of Jacksonville; N. D. Law, Mrs. N. D. Law and Rev. A. B. Franklin of Suwannee Association.
4. The Report on Missions—State, Home and Foreign, was read by Rev. W. T. Halstead. Adopted.
5. The report on the Unified Program was read by R. F. Persons. Adopted.
6. By invitation Dr. C. M. Brittain gave an address on Missions that was interesting and instructive.

REPORT ON STATE, HOME, AND FOREIGN MISSIONS

At the heart of all our work for the extension of the Kingdom of Christ is our great Missionary program. For practical convenience in administration this program is divided into State, Home and Foreign Missions.

FOREIGN MISSIONS: The Foreign Mission Board is now called to carry on in the most troublous time in its history. Nations are in commotion. Herein lies the difficulty of the Board and, likewise, its greatest opportunity.

Much of our mission property in China is in the hands of the Japanese military authorities and the Missionaries are not even allowed to visit these properties to ascertain the extent of damages. It will, doubtless, prove enormous. The missionaries, in many cases, have lost their personal effects, clothes, furniture, books, etc. In spite of this they have been faithful to their tasks and their sufferings for Christ's sake may be the open door through which His message will enter the hearts of the heathen people.

Dr. Maddrey, our secretary, has visited this year the mission fields in Africa, and, on his return to America will publish far and wide the need for missionary recruits in this dark land of opportunity. In

all the lands there is a strange mixture of difficulty and challenge, of disappointment and opportunity.

This is indicated by the following figures; number of baptisms, 14,627; total native membership 208,794; contributions by native churches, \$370,638.00; total number of native churches, 1,802; number of self supporting churches, 986.

HOME MISSIONS: The Home Mission program has gone forward gloriously in the past year. We now have 332 Missionaries working in 886 mission stations. The Lord has richly blessed our missionaries in every field. During the past year 23 new missionaries have been added, 22 new mission chapels, and pastor's homes have been built, over a hundred new mission stations opened, more than 34,530 Bibles and portions of the Scriptures have been distributed, and nearly a million tracts have been given out.

Continued progress is reflected in the financial report. Receipts were \$508,454.67, an increase of 14%. \$145,560.37 is the amount paid on the principal of the debt. This is the largest amount paid on the debt in any one year since 1929. The Board has operated the last five years without borrowing a cent for its operating budget.

STATE MISSIONS: No state in the Union offers a greater challenge for missions work than Florida. We have a cosmopolitan population. There are 500,000 white persons in Florida, ten years of age or older, who are unsaved. We are the largest denomination in the state and ours is the largest responsibility.

The State Mission program includes the following departments: Sunday School, Woman's Missionary Union, Baptist Training Union, Baptist Brotherhood, Evangelism, Student Work, Publicity (through the Witness and tracts and other publications), help to Missionary pastors. Administration, Finance and Accounts. Our budget for this year is \$74,115.00, the largest budget for several years. Every cent of the budget will be needed if the most important things in our state program are taken care of.

We have 65 Missionary Pastors this year who are ministering to 79 churches and Mission Stations. We are supporting three full-time Evangelists and one other for about half time. We ought to begin now to prepare for a great effort in Florida during 1939 as our part in the great Southwide Evangelistic Campaign.

It is a comprehensive program for it includes preaching, teaching and healing; state, home and foreign missions; schools, orphanages, hospitals and relief—all the program of Christ is represented, and all the general work of our denomination is included.

It is a unifying program for it enables and requires all our agencies to work together for all our causes, each for all, all for each.

It is an equitable program as the percentage of funds for each agency receives what is determined by its relative budget needs.

Above all, the Cooperative Program is economical as it has now been tried for several years and has been commended everywhere because it has been found to be the most satisfactory way of handling and distributing our mission and benevolent funds ever devised.

In view of the many, many excellent features of the Cooperative Program all agencies, all churches, all organizations and all members should work together for its success and it should be remembered that this program is cooperative in fact as well as in name. Through it as a medium we teach and train those who have been won to Christ, and build Christian institutions that have no other purpose in view than to bless humanity and bring honor to the name of our God.

We need to increase our gifts to God for his work here and beyond the seas that we may receive a new vision of the world lost in ignorance and superstition, and of Christ who came to save the world through the shedding of His own precious blood, and our duty and obligation is to live and spread the Gospel, which is "the power of God unto salvation to everyone that believeth."

Brother McColskey yielded the floor to Prof. Johns, Superintendent of the Home, who gave an interesting account of the way our Orphan children are cared for and expressed appreciation for our support in the past.

Report adopted.

REPORT ON CHILDREN'S HOME

Our Home represents one of our most singular pieces of work. It receives and takes care of the children of our departed brethren, and makes it possible for them to have an opportunity to grow into useful, Christian, manhood and womanhood.

The children admitted to our Home are taught to work. They learn to accept responsibility and to do their part toward their support. A farm, dairy herd, and grove pay dividends toward their keep. It is the practice of the management to teach our children to be self-supporting. They are taught eleven vocations on the campus, and to these are added agriculture, typing, shorthand, bookkeeping, and domestic science in the local high school.

All repairs except those requiring the services of a skilled mechanic are done by the children; repairs to buildings, painting, roofing, and all labor pertaining to the general upkeep of the Home is done by the boys. The girls do the cooking, laundry work, and other chores pertaining to general housework. They do not spend money for labor when the work can be done by the children.

The educational and religious training of the children are two important factors in the work of the Home. The children are sent to the city schools. This gives them the advantage of outside contacts, and us, assurance that they will receive as good instruction as the county provides.

The scriptures are read daily in the dining room. Each Friday night chapel is held for everyone in the Home. This is a time given to discussion of principles of character building, and the religious problems of our children. They attend preaching, Sunday School, and B. T. U. services at the First Baptist Church of Arcadia. More than ninety percent of our children over the age of ten are members of a Baptist church.

The success of a work with children can be measured only in a limited way by the visible results. The real success is too often hidden from our observation; and yet, the results of training and work among our children have produced enough visible results to be most gratifying. They have shown that they can be successful as teachers, as nurses, as beauticians, as printers, as secretaries, and as workers in a number of other fields. Those who have accomplished these things did so only with our help. They, and we, are to be congratulated on their success—but as we think of these, and the others who are in the home, who are receiving our help, we think of the hundred or more who have applied to us for help, and had to be denied. Many of these are deserving cases, and need our assistance, but so long as only nineteen per cent of our Sunday Schools make an offering each month toward their support, and only thirty-two per cent of these not giving each month send an offering during the year, and so long as forty-nine per cent do not give anything toward the help of our children, they will have to be left where they are.

It would be such a blessing to our children if it were possible to enlist a few more of our Sunday Schools. This would enable them to increase their number, which is now one hundred and fifty-two. Without building any additional dormitories or having to meet any heavy expense by reason of the increase. They have the facilities for caring for one hundred and seventy-five children on the campus.

Let us lend our support to this most worthy cause of remembering the Master said, "Whosoever shall receive one of such children in my name, receiveth me; and whosoever shall receive me, receiveth not me, but him that sent me."

The W. M. U. of the South is celebrating their Golden Jubilee this year. The first W. M. U. was organized in Richmond, Va., in 1888, with a small band of members. Since then our W. M. U. membership in the Southern Baptist Convention territory has grown to 297,594, with Florida having a membership of 13,184.

Through the efforts of the W. M. U. members the Sunbeam, G. A., the R. A. and Y. W. A. have been organized in our churches over the South.

In our Association we have 2 Sunbeams, 2 G. A.'s. and 1 Y. W. A. organization that are functioning.

We have 23 Churches in our Association in which we have 6 organized W. M. U's. In the name, the powerful name, the inspiring name of our God we will set up our banners; united in the purpose for which they stand, we will be true and courageous, devoted and purposeful, thereby we will draw others—the women and young people of all of our Churches to join with us in making Jesus Christ known to the ends of the earth.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The Church of Christ was the founder, and promoter of education in the United States.

Education, private and public was initiated by the Church and carried forward by organized religion.

Our task in facing the education problem in today's world is two fold; the first is that of diagnosis and the second is that of prescription.

Let us remind you of four characteristics of this present day world. 1st it is a world whose foundations have been ruthlessly torn away. There is a widespread sense which finds expression in the writings and utterances of many serious thinkers. Christian and non-Christian that we stand today at one of the major turning points in history. An epoch in the life of mankind is drawing to a close, and we are on the threshold of a new age. The relative stability that existed before the world war is gone.

2nd it is a world in which the elementary forces of life are contending for the mastery. The forces arrayed against each other today might well suggest the battle of Armageddon.

3rd it is a world that is shot through and through with secularism. Secularism is the organization of life apart from God.

4th. It is a world in which there is much uncertainty as to the real purpose and proper direction of life. The education provided for today's world must deal with a world that is in great confusion.

The Prescription for Education that is needed:

1st the education of today must first of all seek to tell the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth.

Today's world calls for an education that helps people in capacity, in sympathy and in purpose to be citizens of God's universe.

2nd. Today's world needs an education that helps people to see and appreciate the deep and rich meaning of life. The incarnation, the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ our Divine Lord have created for people possibilities that could never have been dreamed of otherwise.

3rd. All that has been said so far in trying to describe the education that is needed brings us around to this final suggestion that it is education that is centered and grounded in the risen and ever living Christ.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE

There is nothing more evident in the study of intemperance than that liquor, and its attendant evils are constantly increasing where legal sales are permitted. We have a great increase in murders, in highway accidents and deaths from drunkenness since the repeal of the 18th amendment.

They said give us repeal and we will have no more saloons and the bootlegger will be put out of business, but now we have far more saloons than ever, and bootleggers seem to be doing about as much business as ever.

It is reasonable to estimate that the consumption of liquor in all of our legally wet territory has been doubled as a result of repeal, but some of our States and many Counties in most of the other States are legally dry.

We are informed that 13 counties in Florida are legally dry, and at least four of our State Institutions of higher learning are in dry Counties. If prohibition is good for our college students, it is good for our children at home, and for all of our people.

There are said to be about 400,000 saloons and liquor taverns and over a million bar maids employed in these dens of vice.

The argument that we need the liquor revenue is dispelled when we count the cost over, and above, as over \$30.00 annually for every citizen of our country.

It is certainly the duty of every Christian to abstain from indulgence and to work for the suppression of the traffic, for liquor is the enemy of all that is good and true, and is bringing death and great financial losses to many.

It is said by competent observers that three out of every ten

young people who form the habit of drinking become drunkards.

Liquor causes more deaths than all wars—the curse of every land.

May parents, teachers, and ministers be unfiring in teaching this generation, and working by precept and example to the end that all may be informed.
