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CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This Association shall be known as the Beulah Baptist Association.

Section 2. This Association shall be composed of Messengers selected by the several Churches connected with the Association. Each Church shall be entitled to one Messenger at large and one for every twenty-five members or majority fraction thereof.

Section 3. Any regular organized Baptist Church of the same faith may become a member of this Association upon application by a petitionary letter and Messengers as above provided.

Section 4. On the second or last day of the Annual Session, the Association shall from its membership elect by ballot a Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer whose terms of office shall begin with the adjournment of the body and extend through the next year and through the sessions of the next year.

Section 5. The object of this Association shall be: First, to promote unity and brotherly love among the Churches; second to promote Gospel discipline; to encourage the universal spread of the Gospel and practical religion throughout our bounds and elsewhere.

Section 6. The Moderator shall appoint at each Annual Session of the Association an Executive Committee composed of one member from each Church connected with the Association. Each Church is expected and is urged to recommend its members on this committee. Resident pastors, Heads of the Associational Training Union, Sunday School, Woman's Missionary Union, and Brotherhood departments together with the Elected Officers of the Association shall be ex-officio members of the Committee. Their duties shall be: First, to inquire into destitution within our bounds; second to make contracts with the Ministers of the Gospel of this Association, or other Associations in correspondence with us to supply such destitution with the Gospel; third, to draw from the treasury for such funds as are available for missionary purposes to meet their contracts, and to exercise general supervision in the promotion of unity and brotherly love among the Churches and the universal spread of the Gospel throughout our bounds. They shall report the results of their labors at each annual session of the Association.

Section 7. The Moderator shall invite correspondence and visiting ministers and brethren to seats with the body when in session. They shall be entitled to the privilege of aiding the Association with their counsel.

Section 8. This Association shall have the right to withdraw from any church that may be in disorder when the same cannot be restored by Gospel discipline to the unity of faith in the bonds of peace.

Section 9. The Annual Meeting of this Association shall be held at such time and place as may be designated by the body; and by appointment there shall be an introductory sermon preached the first day of the session at 11 o'clock, and a collection taken up for missionary purposes on Sunday or the last day.

Section 10. This Association shall not lord it over God's heritage nor infringe upon any of the internal rights of churches, but shall act only as an advisory body.

Section 11. This Constitution may be amended at any regular session of the Association by a two-thirds vote of all messengers. Any amendment offered shall be in writing.

RULES OF DECORUM

Article 1. At the first meeting of each session of the Association, the Moderator shall call the Messengers to order; the letters from the churches shall be presented and the names of the Messengers enrolled. In case of absence of the Moderator, the Vice Moderator or the Clerk shall call to order.

Article 2. Each day's session of the Association shall be opened with prayer.

Article 3. The Moderator shall preserve order and decide all questions in debate, subject to an appeal to the body; and when he shall speak on any subject in discussion he shall call some member to the chair, and in case of a tie, shall give the deciding vote.

Article 4. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to approval by the body.

Article 5. The Clerk shall keep a careful record of the proceedings of each meeting, prepare and edit the Minutes for printing. In the absence of the Moderator and the Vice Moderator, he shall call the body together and preside until a Moderator pro tem shall be elected.

Article 6. All members wishing to speak on any subject shall rise and address the Moderator as "Brother," and shall confine themselves strictly to the subject and shall not be allowed to make an unkind allusion to any brother while speaking.

Article 7. No motion shall be debated until seconded and stated by the Moderator or read by the Clerk.

Article 8. When a motion is under consideration no other motion shall be entertained except to adjourn, lay on the table, to amend, indefinitely postpone, refer to committee, or call for the previous question.

Article 9. Any member voting with the majority on any question in debate may move a reconsideration at any time during the session.

Article 10. Visiting brethren of other Associations may speak on any subject, but shall not vote.

Article 11. No brother shall speak more than twice on a subject without the consent of the Association.

Article 12. These Rules of Decorum may be altered or amended at any regular session of the Association by a majority vote of the members of the body.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. We believe in one only true and living God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and that these are one. (See Matt. 28:19).

2. We believe that the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the inspired Word of God and the only rules of faith and practice. (2 Timothy 3:17).

3. We believe in election according to the foreknowledge of God, through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth. (2nd Thes. 3:13).

4. We believe that the Grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared unto all men, and that nothing prevents the salvation of the vilest sinner but his own voluntary rejection of that Grace. (Isa. 55:1; Rev. 22:17; Acts 17:30).

5. We believe in the depravity of the human heart, and that the natural state of man is such that he cannot prepare himself for divine favors without the assisting grace of God, enabling him to act according to the good pleasure of His Divine Will. (Eph. 2:6; Matt. 18:11; John 4:10; First Cor. 3:5-7).

6. We believe in justification by faith, which gives peace with God, through our Lord Jesus Christ. (Romans 5:1-2).

7. We believe that the Gospel of Christ is a means of grace to bring sinners to repentance and faith in Jesus Christ, and therefore should be preached to all the world. (John 3:16).

8. We believe that all those who are regenerated by the Spirit of God are made heirs of God and joint heirs with our Lord Jesus Christ and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto eternal Salvation. (Peter 1:5; Rom. 8:28; Phi. 1:6).

9. We believe that baptism is the immersion of the whole body in water; that the only proper subjects are described in the preceding section, and the only proper administrators are those who have been regularly ordained by a Church of Christ, by the imposition of hands of a presbytery. (Acts 8:36; Rom. 6:4; Read Timothy and Titus).

10. We believe that the Lord's Supper was instituted by Jesus Christ to be commemorated by His followers and that none but baptized believers have a Spiritual right to partake thereof. (Luke 22:18, 19, 20; Cor. 14:26-28).

11. We believe in the resurrection of the righteous and the wicked, and that the wicked shall go away into everlasting punishment, but the righteous into eternal life. (Acts 25:15).

PROCEEDINGS OF THE SIXTY-SECOND SESSION OF THE BEULAH BAPTIST ASSOCIATION HELD WITH THE NEW OAK GROVE CHURCH

OCTOBER 1st and 2nd, 1941

Wednesday, October 1, 10:00 o'clock, devotional services by W. T. Halstead.

1. Meeting called to order by Moderator, Rev. S. F. Young. W. A. Bailey, Clerk, recived Church Letter and enrolled Messengers.

2. Visitors were recognized as follows: Dr. H. C. Bolten, Secretary State Mission Board; Dr. E. D. Solomon, Editor Baptist Witness; Rev. Ridenour, Field Worker State Mission Board; Bro. T. M. Johns, Superintendent Children's Home; Rev. J. Harrison Griffin, Brotherhood Secretary; Rev. Waldo Wood of Jacksonville; Bro. McElroy of Harmony Association; Bro. S. M. Smith of Lafayette Association.

3. A motion by W. T. Halstead that the enrolled Messengers and others that might be enrolled later constitute a body for business was adopted.

4. The Moderator appointed the Finance Committee as follows: Mrs. E. A. McColskey, Rev. C. L. Clements and C. L. Smith.

5. A letter was received from South Side Church of Lake City asking for membership in this Association. A motion by Dr. Halstead that the rules be waived and that their request be granted without reference to a committee was adopted. The Moderator was asked to welcome them into this Association.

6. A motion by Rev. Clements for adoption of a program was accepted.

7. Report of Executive Committee by C. R. Roberts. Report was adopted except that part dealing with transfer of real estate in Mason City; this to be brought up later.

8. Report of Cooperative Program by W. W. Tyre. Adoption of report was deferred.

REPORT ON CO-OPERATION PROGRAM

The Cooperative Program continues to grow with Southern Baptists. There are certain reasons responsible for this. They are as follows:

1. The Cooperative Program is spiritual. All the causes included in the program are found in the great commission, and all causes found in the great commission are included in the program.

2. The Cooperative Program is comprehensive and inspiring. It joins all the members and agencies in one concerted effort to promote all the causes dear to the heart of our Lord. It saves us from littleness and lopsidedness.

3. The Cooperative Program is concrete. Every cause included is

a concrete cause. They are: State Missions, Home Missions, Christian Education, Orphanages, Hospitals, Ministerial Relief, Etc. Let us always remember this: that we do not give to the program, but THROUGH the program, to be concrete causes themselves.

4. The Cooperative Program is equitable. The funds are distributed to the causes according to their relative needs. All share alike; all are benefitted alike, or all suffer in the same proportion. The State Conventions determine the ratio of dimension between State and South-wide causes, fifty-fifty being considered ideal. The States determine the percentage of distribution to State causes, and the Southern Baptist Convention determines the distribution to Southwide causes.

5. The Cooperative Program is democratic and Baptist.

6. The Cooperative Program is economical and businesslike. Rather than promote each separately, it seeks to promote all together and proportionately.

7. The Cooperative Program is successful and glorious. It enables every church, large or small; every person, rich or poor, to have a part in all cooperative work of its denomination in all the world. Thank God for such a plan.

RECOMMENDATIONS: For the sake of the churches and the people, and for the adequate and systematic support of the cause included in our Cooperative Program, we recommend the following:

1. That the fires of evangelism be kept burning brightly all the year.
2. That we stress continuously christian stewardship with the tithe as the minimum standard of christian giving.
3. That the every-member canvass be put on in every church during November and December, unless for special reason, some other time seems better.
4. That a reasonable distribution of funds be observed between local support and denominational causes (50-50 being considered ideal.)
5. That each church help in the realization of a debtless denomination by 1945, either by providing for it in the budget or by a special effort in January and February.
6. That all denominational funds be remitted promptly and properly marked each month to the State Secretary and Treasurer.

REPORT ON STATE, HOME, AND FOREIGN MISSIONS

STATE MISSIONS

The program of State Missions for the year has been one of the best in the history of Florida Baptists and the outlook is most encouraging.

The W. M. U., under the leadership of Miss Louise Smith, is doing an excellent piece of work. In addition to their regular program, the

W. M. U. is making a special effort to reach its goal in gifts to the Centennial offering at once.

The Sunday School Department, under the direction of Dr. W. W. Willian, and the Training Work, headed by Mr. O. K. Radford, are doing work which is equal, if not superior, to anything done in the Southland.

Brotherhood work, led by Dr. J. Harrison Griffin, and the program of Evangelism led by Dr. T. O. Reese, have risen to new heights of achievement. The Student work, led by Mr. Sabin Landry and his colleague, Miss Billie Ruth Currin, promises more and more to conserve the religious interests and spiritual assets of our students.

Assistance to the churches for pastoral support has been continued and has been as large as available funds would permit.

During the year Dr. C. M. Brittain, who had labored long and faithfully, resigned the position of Secretary-Treasurer, and under the leadership of God, Florida Baptists were led to Dr. C. H. Bolton to fill the vacancy.

HOME MISSIONS

The ninety-sixth annual report of the Home Mission Board reveals marked progress in every field, as shown by the following summary:

Total receipts \$560,168.09; number of Missionaries 391; number of churches and Mission stations 915; new Mission stations opened 71; number of professions of faith 5,375.

According to Dr. Roland Q. Leavell, soul winning has reached a new high. Home Mission workers report 4,932 conversions and 2,468 baptisms.

At this time of Defense Emergency, the Home Mission Board has been called on to take the message of Christ and Southern Baptists into the military camps within our territory. We have made only a beginning, but it is hoped that an effective program of work can be set up.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

Despite the threat of war, the Foreign Mission Board is able to report one of the best years in its long history of ninety-six years. The churches have an increase of 18,542 by baptism.

A glance at the several fields where our Missionaries are at work reveals the following:

Unprecedented opportunities knock at our doors in Africa. The work in Nigeria expands and overflows. In China opportunities and dangers have both increased. In Japan the door is almost totally closed. Our workers in Europe and in the Near East have been caught in war or in the immediate threat of war. South America continues to be the most fruitful field in the world.

Your State Mission Board, your Home Mission Board, and your Foreign Mission Board, face opportunities and threats today which challenge us to prayer, great faith and great giving.

10. Report on W. M. U. work was given by Mrs. A. R. Wise and after a short talk by her, the report was adopted.

REPORT ON W. M. U. WORK

The annual W. M. U. Associational meeting was held on September 27th at the Lake City First Church. It was characterized by deep spirituality, a large and representative attendance, and a hopeful and forward look.

As in the past, we continue to place emphasis on Mission Study, Prayer, Stewardship, and Enlistment. The effort to gather in a large Centennial offering has been before the W. M. U.'s of the South during this year. The Florida W. M. U. is trying to reach its goal for this offering at once.

During the past year we have had 6 Woman's Missionary Societies, with a membership of 200; 1 Y. W. A., with 20 members; 2 G. A.'s having 25 members. The R. A.'s have 2 chapters and 18 members, and one Sunbeam Band reports 40 members. New societies were organized at Hopeful, Olustee and Watertown. On the whole, it has been a good year in our Association.

We believe that W. M. U. work merits the support of the pastors and the churches. At the present time, there are 16 churches without and W. M. U. organization. W. M. U. strengthens the work in the local church and supports every phase of the organized work of our denomination. The hope of the future is largely in the young people which the W. M. U. seeks to train in the several Auxiliary organizations. Fields, white unto the harvest, call for workers, but these workers must be trained. New fields will open and greater gifts must be made for sending the Gospel into enlarged fields. Stewardship training as carried out by the W. M. U. is, in part, the answer to this call for greater and larger giving.

The W. M. U. of the Beulah Association challenges you all to join with us in a worthy program of Training, Stewardship, Mission Study, Consecration, Cooperation, and Prayer, that the Kingdom of our Lord may come and His Will be done.

12. Dr. H. C. Bolton gave at this time an unusually interesting, instructive and inspirational talk covering the Mission Work after which the Mission Reports were adopted.

13. Report on Christian Education and Literature was given by Rev. S. F. Young, who spoke to the report.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION AND LITERATURE

In trying times we do well to remember that all early efforts at education in the American Colonies, and in the United States, were deeply rooted in religious motives and christian principles. This was true even of the first State Public Schools, and of the State Colleges and Universities. These facts are basic to all constructive planning for Christian Education today, and for the future. With the world aflame now and in titanic struggle over primarily secular issues, Christian Education and Christian schools face the acid test of their intrinsic integrity. With us, the heroic traditions of Christian Education from the pioneer days of the Founding Fathers, even to this good hour, are a priceless heritage. Ours is the challenge to "Carry On" this part of the Kingdom work in worthy fashion.

In the years ahead the endowment funds in hand will surely yield sharply reduced income in keeping our Baptist schools and colleges running. There will likely be some enrollment classes. Already operating budgets in most of the schools are far too small.

This being true, as Baptists, we must act quickly in making added funds, in large amounts available to the schools and colleges which we foster. Is this task in line with the Gospel Message? In the language of Woodrow Wilson, the most scholarly statesman who ever sat in the White House, and an alumnus of a christian college, "the Christian College is the Lighthouse of Civilization."

In the days following the present world crisis and emergency, regardless of the terms of peace, "the reorganization of society after the mind of Christ" will be the supreme need of the world in the immediate future. We dare not let the lights go out today or tomorrow in the Christian College—the Lighthouse of Civilization.

Above all else, remember, reverently, the interest of Christian Education in your fervent effectual prayers, and consider the major role of the Christian Home in carrying the basic work of Christian Education.

Dr. E. D. Solomon also spoke to the report and especially urged our people to read our state paper. Report was adopted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK

The Baptist Churches of the Beulah Association are working to the task of sending our children to Sunday School, and are thereby cooperating in the organizing of Sunday Schools in churches where we don't already have one. We have found some churches in the Association very eager and anxious to have a good Sunday School in their churches and find a very few who think it impossible to have a Sunday School in their church. The main cause of this condition is the lack of leadership, the lack of trained workers, and the lack of men and women with a knowledge of the Sunday School program. We find a great need for men and women who will dedicate and concentrate their lives into this part of the church program and apply themselves to the task of teaching the Word of God in all churches in the Association. There are fine churches in the Association that do not yet have Sunday Schools, which shows us there is still work to be done in these churches. We have in the past year been able to organize fine Sunday Schools in the Beulah Association, namely: Olustee, Wellborn, Mt. Pleasant, Hopeful and Evergreen. These were organized into classes, all using the "Six Point Record System," except Evergreen, which we expect to put in the "Six Point Record System" in the near future. It is a pleasure for me to report that these Sunday Schools are growing and doing a fine job of teaching the Word of God, and I am sure these churches are going to (if they haven't already) experience a spiritual growth from this teaching. We see a great need for more training schools and recommend that each church make a special effort to have a Sunday School Study and Training Course taught, and we pray God's blessings upon the work in the Beulah Association.

28. A report on temperance and morals was presented by Rev. John Dicks, and was adopted.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE AND MORALS

The use of alcohol in our country is on the increase. According to a report made by the Secret Service Commission to the Southern Baptist Convention, the drink bill for 1940 was \$4,500,000,000, or approximately \$32.00 for every man, woman and child in the United States. With this enormous drink bill, accidental deaths have increased four percent. Our records show that about 25 percent of our highway accidents are traceable to liquor, and this means that about 8,000 people lost their lives last year because of drinking. Besides this, 500,000 people were injured in these accidents and that these accidents cost in money and property about one billion dollars.

The F. B. I. reported in 1932 that arrests for drunkardness, per 100,000 population, was 831 persons. In 1939 this had increased to 1513, almost double in seven years. In this same survey, since 1932, drinking

among women has increased 300 percent. This survey also shows, according to hospital records, that insanity caused by drinking has increased 300 percent.

With the increase in drinking, crime has increased. In 1940, reliable reports show that there was committed 1,517,026 serious crimes in this country. With these and many other facts before us, is proof that strong drink is one of the mostly and destructive forcaste mortality and law observance, personal efficiency, both mentally and physically; also to our economic life. Therefore, we believe that the spiritual and religious forces of this country should be engaged in a mighty crusade against the liquor business, especially when we face tthe fact that our national existence, as well as cur democracy and religious freedom is all threatened. We believe as a national defense measure, that liquor should be outlawed. Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the Beulah Association go on record as being opposed to the sale or use of intoxicating liquors of any kind, and that we will use our influence to prohibit its sale and use.

REPORT ON MINISTER'S RETIREMENT PLAN

The Minister's Retirement was inaugurated in Florida on July 1, 1939, and is the effort of the Denomination to provide a deserved and needed income for our preachers in old age or, when overtaken by physical disability they are no longer able to continue preaching as regular pastors.

There are many details of the Plan which cannot be recited here but the general plan is to provide for the preacher, after he reaches the age of 65 or becomes disabled otnerwise before reaching that age, an income equal to one-half of his average income over the last 25 years of his active ministry.

This income, or annuity, is to be provided by the preacher paying a sum equal to 3 percent of his salary, his churches paying a liké sum of 3 percent, and the Denomination paying a sum equal to 2 percent of his salary.

We cannot give the many angles to this plan in a short written report. It embodies the best thought and planning of the Relief and Annuity Board and the best thought of our State leaders. It was long in coming. It is probcably the only plan that will be offered in our life time for the blessing of the last days of the men in the ministry who for any reason must retire from active service.

We recommend it heartily to the pastors and churches. Every pastor ought to become a member and every church ought to feel that it is a high privilege to cooperate in this worthy ministry. To do less for the preacher who can no longer carry on, is to be un-christian, thoughtlessly so, perhaps, but un-christian nevertheless.

Resolved, Third: That we recommend that our churches support our Baptist institutes in Florida, consisting of the Baptist Children's Home at Arcadia, and Stetson University at DeLand, Florida.

Resolved, Fourth: That this Association go down on record as being in favor of the construction of a chapel at our State penitentiary in which to worship, and that our Moderator appoint a committee to convey to the Governor of Florida and other State officials as may have authority over this matter, of our attitude as a religious body.

Resolved, Fifth: That we recommend to our churches that they take a more active participation in the work of the Hundred Thousand Club, looking to a debtless denomination in 1945.

Resolved, Sixth: That we recommend that the Florida Baptist Witness be placed in our church budgets, and that it be given as wide circulation as possible among our people.

Resolved, Seventh: That we extend our deepest gratitude to the New Oak Grove Church and community for their fine and unstinted hospitality in entertaining us.
