## CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This Association shall be known as the Beulah Baptist Association.

Section 2. This Association shall be composed of Messengers selected by the several churches connected with the Association. Each church shall be entitled to one Messenger at large and one for every twenty-five members or majority fraction thereof.

Section 3. Any regular organized baptist church of the same faith may become a member of this Association upon application by a petitionary letter and Messengers as above provided.

Section 4. On the second or last day of the Annual Session, the Association shall from its membership elect by ballot a Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer whose terms of office shall begin with the adjournment of the body and extend through the next year and through the sessions of next year.

Section 5. The object of this Association shall be: First, to promote unity and brotherly love among the churches; second to promote Gospel discipline; to encourage the universal spread of the Gospel and practical religion throughout our bounds and elsewhere.

Section 6. The Moderator shall appoint at each Annual Session of the Association an Executive Committee composed of one member from each church connected with the Association. Each church is expected and is urged to recommend its members on this committee. Resident pastors, heads of the Associational Training Union, Sunday School, Woman's Missionary Union, and Brotherhood departments together with the elected officers of the Association shall be ex-officio members of the committee. Their duties shall be: First to inquire into destitution within our bounds; second to make contact with the Ministers of the Gospel of this Association, or other Associations, by correspondence with us to supply destitution with the Gospel; third, to draw from the treasury for such funds as are available for missionary purposes to meet their contract and to exercise general supervision in the promotion of unity and brotherly love among the churches and the universal spread of the Gospel throughout our bounds. They shall report the results of their labors at each annual session of the association.

Section 7. The Moderator shall invite correspondence and visiting ministers and brethren to seats with the body when in session. They shall be entitled to the privilege of aiding the Association with their counsel.

Section 8. This Association shall have the right to withdraw from any church that may be in disorder when the same cannot be restored by Gospel discipline to the unity of faith in the bonds of peace.

Section 9. The Annual Meeting of this Association shall be held at such time and place as may be designated by the body; and by appointment there shall be an introductory sermon preached the first day of the session at 11 o'clock, and a collection taken up for missionary purposes on Sunday or the last day.

Section 10. This Association shall not lord it over God's heritage nor infringe upon any of the internal rights of churches, but shall act only as an advisory body.

Section 11. This Constitution may be amended at any regular session of the Association by a two-thirds vote of messengers. Any amendment offered shall be in writing.



## RULES OF DECORUM

Article 1. At the first meeting of each session of the Association the Moderator shall call the Messengers to order; the letters from the churches shall be presented and the names of the Messengers enrolled. In case of the absence of the Moderator, the Vice Moderator or Clerk shall call to order.

Article 2. Each day's session of the Association shall be opened with prayer.

Article 3. The Moderator shall preserve order and decide all questions in debate, subject to an appeal to the body; and when he shall speak on any subject in discussion he shall call some member to the chair, and in case of a tie, shall give the deciding vote.

Article 4. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to approval by the body.

Article 5. The Clerk shall keep a careful record of the proceedings of each meeting, prepare and edit the Minutes for printing. In the absence of the Moderator and the Vice Moderator, he shall call the body together and preside until a Moderator pro tem shall be elected.

Article 6. All members wishing to speak on any subject shall rise and address the Moderator as "Brother," and shall confine themselves strictly to the subject and shall not be allowed to make an unkind allusion to any brother while speaking.

Article 7. No motion shall be debated until seconded and stated by the moderator or read by the clerk.

Article 8. When a motion is under consideration no other motion shall be entertained except to adjourn, lay on the table, to amend, indefinitely postpone, refer to committee, or call for the previous question.

Article 9. Any member voting with the majority on any question in debate may move a reconsideration at any time during the session.

Article 10. Visiting brethren of other Associations may speak on any subject, but shall not vote.

Article 11. No brother shall speak more than twice on a subject without the consent of the Association.

Article 12. These Rules of Decorum may be altered or amended at any regular session of the Association by a majority vote of the members of the body.

## ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. We believe in one only true and living God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and that these are one. (See Matt. 28:19).

2. We believe that the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the inspired Word of God and the only rules of faith and practice. (2 Timothy 3:17).

3. We believe in the election according to the foreknowledge of God, through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth. (2 Thes. 3:13).

4. We believe that the Grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared unto all men, and that nothing prevents the salvation of the vilest sinner but his own voluntary rejection of that Grace. (Isa. 55:1; Rev. 22:17; Acts 17:30).

5. We believe in the depravity of the human heart, and that the natural state of man is such that he cannot prepare himself for divine favors without the assisting grace of God, enabling him to act according to the good pleasure of His Divine Will. (Eph. 2:6; Matt. 18:11; John 4:10; 1 Cor. 3:5-7).

6. We believe in justification of faith, which gives peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. (Rom. 5:1-2).

7. We believe that the Gospel of Christ is a means of grace to bring sinners to repentance and faith in Jesus Christ, and therefore should be preached to all the world. (John 3:16).

8. We believe that all those who are regenerated by the Spirit of God are made heirs of God and joint heirs with our Lord Jesus Christ and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto eternal Salvation. (Peter 1:5; Rom. 8:28; Phil. 1:6).

9. We believe that baptism is the immersion of the whole body in water; that the only proper subjects are described in the preceding section, and the only proper administrators are those who have been regularly ordained by a Church of Christ, by the imposition of hands of a presbytery. (Acts 8:36; Rom. 6:4; Read Tim. and Titus)

10. We believe that the Lord's Supper was instituted by Jesus Christ to commemorate by His followers and that none but baptised believers have a Spiritual right to partake thereof. (Luke 22:18, 19, 20; Cor. 14:26-28).

11. We believe in the resurrection of the righteous and the wicked, and that the wicked shall go away into everlasting punishment, but the righteous into eternal life. (Acts 25:15.)

## PROCEEDINGS OF THE SIXTY-THIRD SESSION OF THE BEULAH BAPTIST ASSOCIATION HELD WITH OLD PROVIDENCE CHURCH

SEPTEMBER 30 and OCTOBER 1, 1942

1. The Association was called to order by the Moderator, Brother S. F. Young.
2. Devotional services were led by Bro. Owens.
3. Enrollment of Messengers and receipt of church letters by the clerk.
4. Recognition of visitors as follows: Dr. Bolton, secretary State Mission Board; Bro. T. M. Johns, Supt. Children's Home. Bro. McElray of Harmony Association, Bro. Tom Hilman, Suwannee Association.
5. Report of State, Home and Foreign Missions made by committee chairman, Rev. John Dicks. Adoption of report deferred.

### REPORT ON STATE, HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS

#### STATE MISSIONS

Our State Mission work is carried on by several departments. First, we have Dr. C. H. Bolton as our Executive Secretary and Treasurer, then we have the following departments, viz: Sunday School Department with Dr. W. W. Willian as secretary; Training Union Department, with Dr. O. K. Radford as secretary; Brotherhood Department with Dr. J. Harrison Griffin as Secretary, Missionary Union with Miss Louise Smith as Executive Secretary, and Women's College, Tallahassee, Florida, with Mr. Salim Landry, Student Union work carried on by Miss Billie Ruth Currin at the Women's College, Tallahassee, Florida, with Mr. Salin Landry, Jr., secretary of the work. In Addition to these departments we have the department of Evangelism headed by Dr. T. O. Reese, who has been laboring in this field for ten years.

We now have two field secretaries employed by the State Mission Board, Rev. T. H. Farr and Rev. Dewey Mann.

These departments all have functioned very efficiently in their respective fields thus giving aid and help to our churches by encouraging and helping them to promote a well rounded program of service.

In addition to these departments we have our Florida Baptist Institutions, viz: The Florida Children's Home, Stetson University and Florida Baptist Witness.



All of this work is to be maintained by our contributions; therefore it is essential for all of our people to cooperate in making of all these things a success and at the same time patronize all of these agencies and avail ourselves with the help they offer. These agencies are designed to meet the denominational needs of our people in the most economical way and should be regarded as agencies to serve and not to be served.

#### HOME MISSIONS

Home Missions has made progress during the past Convention year as 31 Missionaries have been added to our force, 64 Mission Stations opened and 13 new churches organized. About 10,000 people have been added to the churches by these home mission workers. The people administered to by this board consists largely of foreign nationalities, such as Mexicans, Spanish, Jews Italians, Cubans and Chinese. Also the under-privileged throughout the heavy industrial centers, and other neglected areas. The negroes and Indians are preached to by our home missionaries and much good is being done. At the same time the debt of the Home Mission Board is being rapidly reduced and is expected to be out of debt by the close of 1943.

All of our churches should be eager to support this Home Mission work as it is so broad in its ministries, giving the gospel to so many different tongues and nationalities with a field of operation not only covering our Southern Baptist territory, but reaching out to Central America and the nearby islands of the sea, thus reaching to a number of different races and nationalities which is a work that, no doubt, will produce fruit in foreign lands in the days to come. As we strengthen the cause of Christ at home in the time of war we shall be doing a work that will prepare us for the foreign mission cause when peace shall come to the nations.

#### FOREIGN MISSIONS

The foreign mission board has recently passed through some of the most trying days of its history, with the world engaged in the most devastating war of all time. Many of our mission fields have turned into battle fields; not only has our work suffered but many of our missionaries have suffered and have been made prisoners of our enemies and work has been abandoned. In spite of the hindrances caused by war there are many encouraging things in the foreign mission outlook. First, the financial conditions of the board is very much improved and it looks as though the foreign mission board will be out of debt by the end of 1943. Second, this year other mission fields have been opened with very promising results, viz: Colombia in South America and the Hawaiian Islands. The mission work in Africa has also been strengthened; sixty missionaries are under appointment in the dark continent. The conditions brought about by the war has not hindered the work in this field. Also glowing reports come to us from the mission fields of South America, so let us thank God and take courage for the bright spots

in the present with our work, and let us pray that the awful struggles of war will, like Paul's infirmities, turn out for the furtherance of the gospel, that through the sufferings caused by the war prepare the world for the gospel and prepare us to be ready to give the gospel to all nations when the present struggle is over.

#### REPORT ON COOPERATION PROGRAM

The Unified Program has, for the past several years, been the favored plan of Southern Baptists in promoting all their Missionary and Benevolent enterprises. It has proven its merit beyond all question and today it offers our churches the best possible way to carry out the great commission of our Lord when He said, "Go into all the world and make disciples of all nations."

Each phase of our work, State Missions, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, etc., will receive special emphasis in reports to the Association and will not be reviewed in this report. The Unified Program is primarily a method, a spiritual, a concrete, a cooperative, an equitable, economical and business-like, and democratic way of presenting and sustaining our Kingdom Causes.

### REPORT OF FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

At the present time there are 117 children in the home, all of them being the school age with the exception of six, these children go to high schools and go to church and Sunday School at the First Baptist church. There has been spent approximately \$16,000 for remodeling the different buildings at the home this year and enough funds on hand to do other remodeling as soon as the material is available.

As to the routine of work in the home, a good deal of it is done by the boys and girls in the home. This makes a big saving that would possibly have to go for hired help otherwise, thus spreading out the dollar that comes into the home to its limit.

One of the best, and greatest things that the Beulah Association can do is to enroll every church as a giver to the home.

Therefore, we recommend that every church practice giving regularly to this worthy cause. Make an offering each week or at last once a month.

And with the fine leadership of Brother and Sister Johns, let us support them with our prayers.

### SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT FOR ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR ENDING SEPTEMBER 30, 1942

In times like we are undergoing at the present, we find our needs numerous and various, but one of our greatest needs, I think, is to keep the religious life of our people at a high ebb.

We are thus trying to do this in our association by affording to the Baptist of the Association and other Sunday Schools for the purpose of having the Bible taught. An organization for Bible study for all who will attend.

Many times we may grow despondent over the conditions that exist and results that we see, but we must, as Paul said, "Press on to the Prize of the Mark of the High Calling which is Christ

Jesus." Surely we will be doing just that if we promote the Sunday School work in Beulah Association.

We see a great need for leaders in our various churches throughout the Association, and truly this need has grown from the lack of the proper interest in Sunday Schools, B. Y. P. U., and other organizations of our churches and them functioning properly. Surely we as Beulah Baptists must and will do something about this.

At the present there are approximately five churches without any Sunday School, three study courses held this year. We sincerely hope that in the future all churches may report having Sunday Schools and Study Classes.

Since the demand for leaders in this and other associations is so great, and the need for Bible scholars are steadily increasing, let us work with zeal and faith in the coming year so as to be able to say at the close of another associational year, "We've done our best," and thus having said let our work and reports then prove ourselves.

22. After devotional services by Bro. Farr, the election of officers was taken up. Bro. S. F. Young was unanimously elected Moderator. W. A. Bailey was unanimously elected Clerk. Mrs. Miller was unanimously elected Treasurer.

23. In the absence of Bro. C. M. Ray, Chairman of Committee on Christian Education and Literature, was read by the Moderator, and after discussion by Bro. Farr was adopted.

### REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION AND LITERATURE

In the past year the schools, colleges and universities of the country have made vital adjustments in their programs. Many young men have had to go into the armed service. Since this war is a war unlike any other war in all history, in that it is a war of highly trained technicians of all kinds, the government has developed various plans by which young men can stay in college to receive needed training for a larger service after graduation as specialists in various fields. The great majority of our Baptist colleges have adjusted to these various types of services plans and are thus enabled to keep many young men as students up to graduation, and thus make direct contributions to the All-Out War Effort. Southern Baptist can have pride in the work their colleges are doing in this area.

We have several reasons for hope and encouragement in the field of Christian Education. The records for the past year show great progress in the number of students attending Baptist schools and colleges, in the fine quality of work being done, and in the increasing interest which Baptists are showing in the work of these schools. Our Baptist people are beginning to see the vital and necessary place which their schools and colleges have in denominational life and in the plans for the reconstruction of the world after World War Two.

Never in all history has there been such a real need for Christian leadership—the kind which only Christian colleges can develop—as we have now and will have in the next few years. Without the leadership we cannot go forward. These leaders will come primarily from Christian colleges. We must win the peace. Education along realistic and creative lines is basis to that task. Herein lie the challenges of Peace On Earth And Good Will Among Men.

In the days following the present world crisis and emergency, regardless of the terms of peace, "The reorganization of society after the mind of Christ." will be the supreme need of the world in the immediate future. We dare not let the lights go out today or tomorrow in the Christian College, the lighthouse of civilization.

The schools are making honest and unselfish efforts to meet the stirring challenges of the hour. In this spirit they "Carry On." The education commission is doing the best work since its founding. We appeal to Southern Baptists all to give every help and encouragement to these Baptist Schools. We recommend:

1. That pastors and laymen throughout the convention territory cooperate with their school executives in discovering the best type of students and using their influence in getting them to attend our Baptist schools.
2. That pastors and deacons consider the present unlimited opportunity and obligation for training active Christian leaders, for the future in our Baptist Schools.
3. That ways and means, commensurate with the ever increasing financial needs, be worked out in cooperation with our Baptist schools, guaranteeing their usefulness and multiplying their Christian Education Service.

24. A report of the B. T. U. work in this association was made by Bro. James McKethan and after discussion by Bro. James McKethan, was adopted. He also asked the Association to approve of the election of the officials which was done. Names will be found in Associational Directory.

## REPORT ON MINISTERS' RETIREMENT PLAN

The Relief and Annuity Board has entered upon the twenty-fifth year of its life, and work, and is planning to celebrate its Silver Anniversary next May when the Southern Baptist Convention meets in Memphis, Tennessee.

During the twenty-four years which ended with the last meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention in San Antonio, the Board has made a great record of service and growth. It has prospered in a financial way to a remarkable degree. Its assets grew from a little over \$100,000 at the end of its first year of operation to approximately five and one-half million dollars by the end of 1941.

Its income during the year 1941 was \$1,147,678.84, while its Annuity and Relief benefits amounted to more than one-half million dollars.

The board is serving through its relief department over 10,000 ministers, missionaries, denominational workers and widows of ministers. Two thousand five hundred of these are already receiving benefits from the board and the other 7,500 persons are to receive benefits in the years to come.

A goodly number of Southern Baptist pastors, together with their churches are participating in the Ministers Retirement Plan.

We cannot give the many angles to this plan in a short written report, although we do recommend to all pastors and churches to participate in the worthy cause for young men will grow old if they live long enough and very few of them make any provisions for old age.

1. Resolved that we deplore the prevalence of the sale of liquor at and near the military camps where so many of our young men have been called for training in the defense of our country and we fervently beseech and earnestly insist that the President of the United States be called upon to use his powers to stop the sale of all intoxicating liquor and beer for the duration in the interest of a speedy war victory.

2. That we commend the cooperative program as the wisest and the best method of sharing in the promotion of Christ's Kingdom to the end of the earth.

3. That we recommend to the churches that they continue to promote the Hundred Thousand Club work and, if possible, increase efforts in its behalf in order that our denomination may be free of debt in 1943.

4. That we recommend the adoption by the churches of the Budget plan for putting the Florida Baptist Witness in every Baptist home.

5. That the committee, W. T. Halstead, W. H. Harvey and Wallace Bailey, be requested to prepare suitable resolutions concerning the loss by death of Treasurer E. A. McColskey, for publication in the minutes.

6. That we call our people to pray without ceasing for the end of war and the blessings of peace for the whole world.

7. That we charge the Executive Committee with the task of collecting and forwarding a truck load, or truck loads, of produce to the Children's Home once each month.

8. That every Sunday School be challenged to give an offering to the Children's Home once each month.

9. That we express by a rising vote our unbounded appreciation for the fine fellowship; the unsurpassed hospitality and the splendid entertainment extended by the Old Providence Church for the Sixty-third session of the Association.
