CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This Association shall be known as the Beulah Baptist Association.

Section 2. This Association shall be composed of Messengers selected by the several churches connected with the Association. Each church shall be entitled to one Messenger at large and one for every twenty-five members or majority fraction thereof.

Section 3. Any regular organized Baptist church of the same faith may become a member of this Association upon application by a petitionary letter and Messengers as above provided.

Section 4. On the second or last day of the Annual Session, the Association shall from its membership elect by ballot a Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer whose terms of office shall begin with the adjournment of the body and extend through the next year and through the sessions of next year.

Section 5. The object of this Association shall be: First, to promote unity and brotherly love among the churches; second to promote Gospel discipline, to encourage the universal spread of the Gospel and practical religion throughout our bounds and elsewhere.

Section 6. The Moderator shall appoint at each Annual Session of the Association an Executive Committee composed of one member from each church connected with the Association. Each church is expected and is urged to recommend its members on this committee. Resident pastors, heads of the Associational Training Union, Sunday School, Woman's Missionary Union, and Brotherhood departments together with the elected officers of the Association shall be ex-officio members of the committee. Their duties shall be: First to inquire into destitution within our bounds; second to make contact with the Ministers of the Gospel of this Association, or other Associations, by correspondence with us to supply destitution with the Gospel; third, to draw from the treasury for such funds as are available for missionary purposes to meet their contract and to exercise general supervision in the promotion of unity and brotherly love among the churches and the universal spread of the Gospel throughout our bounds. They shall report the results of their labors at each annual session of the association.

Section 7. The Moderator shall invite correspondence and visiting ministers and brethren to seats with the body when in session. They shall be entitled to the privilege of aiding the Association with their counsel.

Section 8. This Association shall have the right to withdraw from any church that may be in disorder when the same cannot be restored by Gospel discipline to the unity of faith in the bonds of peace.

Section 9. The Annual Meeting of this Association shall be held at such time and place as may be designated by the body; and by appointment there shall be an introductory sermon preached the first day of the session at 11 o'clock, and a collection taken up for missionary purposes on Sunday or the last day.

Section 10. This Association shall not lord it over God's heritage nor infringe upon any of the internal rights of churches, but shall act only as an advisory body.

Section 11. This Constitution may be amended at any regular session of the Association by a two-thirds vote of messengers. Any amendment offered shall be in writing.

RULES OF DECORUM

Article 1. At the first meeting of each session of the Association the Moderator shall call the Messengers to order; the letters from the churches shall be presented and the names of the Messengers enrolled. In case of the absence of the Moderator, the Vice Moderator or Clerk shall call to order.

Article 2. Each day's session of the Association shall be opened with prayer.

Article 3. The Moderator shall preserve order and decide all questions in debate, subject to an appeal of the body; and when he shall speak on any subject in discussion he shall call some member to the chair, and in case of a tie, shall give the deciding vote.

Article 4. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to approval by the body.

Article 5. The Clerk shall keep a careful record of the proceedings of each meeting, prepare and edit the Minutes for printing. In the absence of the Moderator and the Vice Moderator, he shall call the body together and preside until a Moderator pro tem shall be elected.

Article 6. All members wishing to speak on any subject shall rise and address the Moderator as "Brother," and shall confine themselves strictly to the subject and shall not be allowed to make an unkind allusion to any brother while speaking.

Article 7. No motion shall be debated until seconded and stated by the moderator or read by the clerk.

Article 8. When a motion is under consideration no other motion shall be entertained except to adjourn, lay on the table, to amend, indefinitely postpone, refer to committee, or call for the previous question.

Article 9. A member voting with the majority on any question in debate may move a reconsideration at any time during the session.

Article 10. Visiting brethren of other Associations may speak on any subjects, but shall not vote.

Article 11. No brother shall speak more than twice on a subject without the consent of the Association.

Article 12. These Rules of Decorum may be altered or amended at any regular session of the Association by a majority vote of the members of the body.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

7. We believe that the Gospel of Christ is a means of grace to bring sinners to repentance and faith in Jesus Christ, and therefore should be preached to all the world. (John 3:16.)
8. We believe that all those who are regenerated by the Spirit of God are made heirs of God and joint heirs with our Lord Jesus Christ and that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto eternal Salvation. (Peter 1:5; Rom. 8:22; Phil. 1-6.)
9. We believe that baptism is the immersion of the whole body in water; that the only proper subjects are described in the preceding section, and the only proper administrators are those who have been regularly ordained by a Church of Christ, by the imposition of hands of a presbytery. (Acts 8:36; Rom. 6:4; Read Tim. and Titus.)
10. We believe that the Lord's Supper was instituted by Jesus Christ to be commemorated by His followers and that none but baptized believers have a Spiritual right to partake thereof. (Luke 22:18, 19, 20; Cor. 14:26-28.)
11. We believe in the resurrection of the righteous and the wicked, and that the wicked shall go away into everlasting punishment, but the righteous into eternal life. (Acts 25:15.)

PROCEEDINGS OF THE SIXTY-FOURTH SESSION OF THE BEULAH BAPTIST ASSOCIATION HELD WITH THE OLUSTEE CHURCH

1. The meeting was called to order September 30, 1943, by the Moderator, Rev. S. F. Young.
2. The Devotional Service was led by Bro. Austin McElroy, of Harmony Association.
3. Roll Call of Churches by Clerk and Enrollment of Messengers.
4. Recognition of visitors by Moderator as follows:
Dr. E. D. Solomon, J. Harrison Griffin, O. K. Radford, Rev. Dewey Mann, Rev. O. G. Owens and Rev. Austin McElroy and these young men from Lake City Naval Air Base: Hubert W. Burke, Parlabs, N. Mexico; Carl T. Rose, Houston, Texas; and Arthur L. Peltier, 207, W. Harrison St., Danville, Ill.
5. Dr. Halstead gave the report of the Executive Committee which was adopted.
6. The report of the committee on Christian Education and Literature was read by the chairman, Dr. W. T. Halstead, and after a brief talk by Dr. Ed Solomon, the report was adopted.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION AND LITERATURE

The future of America depends upon the instruction our children receive in the schools. The state has complete control of elementary education and almost complete control of high school education. It follows then that every Christian citizen and Baptist has a vital interest in the public school system of the state.

In the realm of higher education there is being fought a battle which involves the perpetuation of our Christian Faith. The only institutions upon which we can rely for the perpetuation of the Christian Faith in the realm of Higher Education are those which are under the control of Christian bodies and are obedient to their will. Stetson University is the only hope that Florida Baptists have for the realization of this ideal. It seeks and deserves the support of all the Baptists of the state. Just now it needs your prayers, your faith, your children and your encouragement. Friends of the University have launched a campaign throughout the state to secure donations for the purpose of a complete paint job for the buildings of the University.

Some one has defined education as "The Integration of Personality." To integrate personality is to make it whole and complete. Surely that worthy goal can not be reached without the cultural and guiding influence of our Christian Colleges, our Sunday

Schools and our state paper, the Florida Baptist Witness, and the other Christian literature available through our Sunday School Board and our Baptist Book Store.

The people in a democracy must educate or perish. Baptists are nothing if not a great democracy of believers. By the same token they must educate or suffer the inevitably fatal consequences.

7. Bro. C. R. Roberts, chairman of the committee on the Brotherhood Work, made the report and moved that it be adopted. Dr. J. Harrison Griffin, State Brotherhood worker, made an earnest appeal to the churches for more organized Brotherhood work, after which the report was adopted.

REPORT OF BROTHERHOOD

The Brotherhood is one way of fellowship, or get together among our men. But greatest of all it's the way of enlistment of man power in the Church. While the war has and is yet drawing from our ranks, away from church and home our men into service for the protection of freedom for which we enjoy today. Organized man power is doing a great job on the far-flung battlefields today, of holding up the Stars and Stripes. May we at home do no less job in a Spiritual way by enlisting our man power to hold up the Blood Stained banner of Jesus Christ, that we may keep the Spiritual fires ablaze, for the Glory of God and salvation of man. Therefore we recommend that each Church during the next year enlist all of its man power by organizing a Brotherhood to help promote the cause of our Christ.

8. The Children's Home report was made by Bro. John Dicks. He moved that it be adopted. He gave his time to Dr. Ed Solomon, who spoke in behalf of Supt. Johns, who could not be present. Bro. Solomon gave a very interesting and detailed account of the work. Bro. C. R. Roberts also spoke of produce that had been given to the Children's Home by the association and this report was adopted.

REPORT ON FINANCING THE CHILDREN'S HOME

The Mission effort in our churches depends in a large measure upon the amount of financial support we give to Kingdom causes. Much is said in the Old and the New Testaments about supporting the work with our substance. And direct obligation is placed on us as

well as an opportunity, to relieve suffering and want among the poor. Hearing the word brings comfort and peace to our souls but this is not enough, for we must follow the impulses which the Word brings and supply the physical needs of those in distress. This is the best way of furnishing a substantial support to the gospel, for we are reminded by James that we are to be doers of the Word and not hearers only.

Supporting our Children's Home is an important part of our denominational work. The opportunity for helping our children and bringing hope and vision to them anew reaches into every Baptist home and church in this state. Many of our Sunday Schools give their wholehearted support to this cause. This is evidenced by the fact that twenty-five per cent of our schools giving each month, provide forty-one per cent of the operating income. Other schools give on occasions and for special causes which is helpful. These schools, however, are losing the splendid opportunity of helping children and the blessing that comes to those who are mindful of the poor.

The second largest part of the income at the Home is from the Co-operative Program. Nine per cent of program receipts is allotted to the Home. This part of these funds amounts to twenty-five per cent of the total income. This is a sizable amount and still it shows us that it is impossible, for Florida Baptist to care for their children through this means alone, and clearly shows the necessity of making special offerings for the care of our children.

The third largest source of income is from the churches. Eighteen per cent of the total receipts comes from those churches who make offerings on special days or for a definite purpose; and from the churches that have adopted the Unified Budget plan for financing their work. The gifts from this source are usually liberal as only eight per cent of our churches make offerings requesting that the church and not the Sunday School be credited with the gift.

Individuals have always had a keen interest in our work and from this source comes thirteen per cent of the total gifts to the Home. Some have set up trusts and others make regular offerings to the support of children. Some of the finest gifts we have received for our work have come from persons who were not Baptists.

9. Dr. Halstead offered a motion that the executive committee of the association look after gathering the produce for the home this year. The motion was adopted.

2. The report on Home, State and Foreign Missions was read by Mrs. W. F. Miller, who moved the adoption of the report which was deferred.

REPORT ON STATE, HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS

State Missions include all the missionary, Benevolent and Educational work engaged in by the denominations in a cooperative way in our State, it means the efforts being made by Florida Baptists through the different agencies such as Pastors, Churches, Women Missionary Societies, Sunday School, Baptist Training Unions, Brotherhood and Religious Literature.

HOME MISSIONS

The remarkable achievement of Missions through our Home Mission Board, proves that the best way our Baptist people can aid the cause, is by giving of their money through the cooperative program. We are all rejoicing in knowing that for the first time since 1920, we are out of debt and now have over 400 workers on all fields, also have a city mission department of which Dr. Solomon F. Davis is superintendent. They are working out a program, when carried into effect, will reestablish the country church as potent factor in denominational life, also our city churches have a greater work in helping our weaker churches.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

Europe and the Near East in the throes of world conflict have, for the time being, closed their doors to our missionaries. However, from messages that come from those unhappy lands we learn that the native Christians are proving to be "steadfast, unmovable and abounding in the work of the Lord." The Board hasn't been unmindful of the suffering people in war-stricken countries. Between January 1, 1942, and April 5, 1943, the Baptists of the South have given through the Foreign Mission Board, \$887,802.66 to our World Emergency Relief program. Too the Woman's Missionary Unions of the South are helping through their generous cooperations realize some of the hopes and prayers of these missionaries, outstanding among

the gifts, was the Lottie Moon Christmas offering of \$558,672.63. By this we see "The field is the world," the missionaries are the workers, Southern Baptists are the home base of supplies, supporting by their gifts, their prayers and their personal service, the great undertaking of world evangelization.

3. Bro. H. H. Walters gave the report on the United Program and moved its adoption. In the absence of Dr. H. C. Bolton, who was to have spoken to these reports, Bro. Dewey Mann, one of our field workers, gave a splendid account of our mission work, and challenged us to do still more in the future. Then this report and that read by Mrs. W. F. Miller, on Home, State and Foreign Missions, was adopted.

REPORT ON COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

The Unified Program has, for the past several years, been the favored plan of Southern Baptists in promoting all their Missionary and Benevolent enterprises. It has proven its merits beyond all question and today it offers our churches the best possible way to carry out the great commission of our Lord when He said "Go into all the world and make disciples of all nations."

The Unified Program is primarily a method, a spiritual, a concrete, a cooperative, an economical and business-like and democratic way of presenting and sustaining our Kingdom's cause.

We may well ask ourselves just how does this plan work. The local church treasurer, after retaining the money for local expenses and benevolence, sends the Cooperative Program funds properly marked to the State Secretary-treasurer. The secretary takes out a small portion for his office expenses, and then he divides the balance into state and south-wide funds. He distributes the state portion to the state cause as follows: of each dollar in this state fund, State Missions, 40 per cent; Florida Baptist Children's Home, 8 per cent; Stetson University, 8 per cent; Rogers Building, 3 per cent; Student Aid, 1 per cent; S. L. Hospital, 8 per cent; S. B. Convention Bonds, 3.2 per cent; Relief and Annuity Board, 3.9 per cent; Christian Education, 5.21 per cent; Home Mission, 8.59 per cent; Foreign Mission, 18.4 per cent.

4. The committee report on the Ministers' Retirement Plan was read by Bro. Elton McClellan, after a talk by Dr. E. D. Solomon, outlining the plan, the report was adopted.

REPORT OF MINISTERS' RETIREMENT PLAN

The Minister's Retirement Plan is a means whereby aged or disabled ministers or their widows may be taken care of in their days greatest need.

The plan has to be participated in by the church and the pastor. Then the Convention adds an additional amount which provides a fund from which benefits are paid.

Since some of our noble pastors are hesitant to present the Retirement Plan to the church for fear that some will feel that he is attempting to increase his salary, it becomes the duty of each lay member to see that his church participates in the Retirement Plan.

Participation does not necessarily mean that credit goes to any particular pastor, but rather the church contribution goes into the State Reserve Fund out of which the members of the Plan receive a part of their benefits when they retire, because of old age at 65 or because of disability before 65.

Only seventy-one per cent of the pastors of the State of Florida hold certificates of membership.

Let it be the aim of the Beulah Association that every church cooperate in the Minister's Retirement Plan and every Baptist pastor becomes a member.

5. Bro. J. B. Benefield read the report on Temperance and Morals and moved its adoption, and made a short talk, after which Dr. E. D. Solomon told us how we could combat alcoholic beverages. The report was adopted.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE AND MORALS

Much has been spoken, much has been written about this virtue, and how we need to emphasize the growing tendency of Society to disregard it and plunge into an orgy of intemperance. As we look back into the years and see all the sorrow caused by the evil drug Beer, Wine and Liquor, we have learned to call it an enemy.

Because in the last few years in spite of the continuous effort of people devoted to the cause of temperance, we seem to have lost lots of ground.

Our people, our young men and even our young ladies are being caught in the whirlpool of sin, is it because we are not fighting hard enough? or is it because we don't see the evil that is going on about us and do not know about the danger that is before our young Christians every day? Can we wonder at our town being so unfit

for our young people when there are so many beer joints and stores and places of this kind?

Is this picture painted too dark? Is this a true statement of the conditions of today? Look around about you and see if this is not true. We condemn the young people who are being led away by these conditions. We are sending them to the penal institutions. We are loud in our denunciations of them in their acts committed while under the influence of intoxicants, but what are we doing to remove the peril from them? What is our responsibility?

Brethren and Sisters let us throw our full weight of the influence and powers that we have, our votes, all of our civic endeavors, our plea and our prayers into a united effort to remove from society those joints, stores and recreations places and other places that are throwing around our people these sinful influences.

Let us bring to those who have authority to cease licensing these all the pressure that we can to stop the sales of intoxicants.

There are six churches without any Sunday School. What a tragedy that the young people of these communities should be denied the privilege of having God's Word taught them. The Psalmist sang "Thy word is a lamp unto my feet and a light upon my path." Surely there was never a greater need for this light than at the present time.

There are only a few study courses held during the past year. With the churches so sorely in need of trained workers and leaders, we trust that something can be done to greatly increase the number of study courses.

We believe that if our church members as a body, and parents in particular, could come to a realization of the fact that, due to changed economic conditions, the Sunday School must take over, to a large extent, the religious training that was formerly given in the

home, then the Sunday School would get the wholehearted support of every one, and cease to be a "problem child."

We also believe that if our leaders and teachers could realize the importance of this work and their responsibility, they would re-dedicate their lives to the Master and this part of his program.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

The W. M. U.'s contribute three per cent of our total income through the sponsorship of children. They purchase the clothing for a particular child and are given credit for their purchases. Sponsoring does not make a difference among our children. Everyone is treated alike and each child has the same quality of clothing and similar amounts.

The W. M. U. organizations also give coupons which are deemed for cash. The income from this source is used in repairing the kitchen equipment and buying such things as we need to replace. Our Christian women never lose an opportunity to keep the needs of the Home before our people. We are grateful for their help and support.

The finances of the Home are in fine condition, but this does not relieve anyone of his duty and obligation to support the cause of the Master. If thirty-three percent of our churches and Sunday Schools give fifty-nine per cent of the operating funds, we could almost double the amount of work we are doing by doubling the number of Sunday schools who give regularly to the work. This is a goal worthy of our best efforts. If we are to reap the full benefit of God's promises to us, we must help those who are in need. Jesus in His teachings on the last judgment told of a number of things that the redeemed had done for the people about them and then He added, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me." Christian helpfulness my brethren, is embedded in the Hearts of Christianity, and if we are to be like Him we must render service to His children.
