CONSTITUTION

Section 1. This Association shall be known as the Beulah Baptist Association.

Section 2. This Association shall be composed of Messengers selected by the several churches connected with the Association. Each church shall be entitled to one Messenger at large and one for every twenty-five members or majority fraction thereof.

Section 3. Any regular organized Baptist church of the same faith may become a member of this Association upon application by a petitionary letter and Messengers as above provided.

Section 4. On the second or last day of the Annual Session, the Association shall from its membership elect by a ballot a Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer whose terms of office shall begin with the adjournment of the body and extend through the next year and through the sessions of next year.

Section 5. The object of this Association shall be: First to promote unity and brotherly love among the churches; second to promote Gospel discipline; to encourage the universal spread of the Gospel and practical religion throughout our bounds and elsewhere.

Section 6. The Moderator shall appoint at each Annual Session of the Association an Executive Committee composed of one member from each church connected with the Association. Each church is expected and is urged to recommend its members on this committee. Resident pastors, heads of the Associational Training Union, Sunday Schools, Woman's Missionary Union, and Brotherhood departments together with the elected officers of the Association shall be ex-officio members of the committee. Their duties shall be: First to inquire into destitution within our bounds; second, to make contact with the ministers of the Gospel of this Association, or other Association, by correspondence and to supply destitution with the Gospel; third, to draw from the treasury such funds as are available for missionary purposes to meet the contract and to exercise general supervision in the promotion of unity and brotherly love among the churches and the universal spread of the Gospel throughout our bounds. They shall report the results of their labors at each annual session of the association.

Section 7. The Moderator shall invite correspondents and visiting ministers and brethren to seats with the body when in session. They shall be entitled to the privilege of aiding the Association with their counsel.

Section 8. This Association shall have the right to withdraw from any church that may be in disorder when the same cannot be restored by Gospel discipline to the unity of faith in the bonds of peace.

Section 9. The Annual Meeting of this Association shall be held at such time and place as may be designated by the body, and by appointment there shall be an introductory sermon preached the first day of the session at 11 o'clock, and a collection taken up for missionary purposes on Sunday or the last day.

Section 10. This Association shall not lord it over God's heritage nor infringe upon any of the internal rights of churches, but shall act only as an advisory body.

Section 11. This Constitution may be amended at any regular session of the Association by two-thirds vote of messengers. Any amendment offered shall be in writing.

RULES OF DECORUM

Article 1. At the first meeting of each session of the Association the Moderator shall call the Messengers to order; the letters from the churches shall be presented and the names of the Messengers read. In case of the absence of the Moderator, the Vice Moderator or Clerk shall call to order.

Article 2. Each day's session of the Association shall be opened with prayer.

Article 3. The Moderator shall preserve order and decide all questions in debate, subject to an appeal of the body; and when he shall speak on any subject in discussion he shall call some member to the chair and in case of a tie shall give the deciding vote.

Article 4. The Moderator shall appoint all committees, subject to approval by the body.

Article 5. The Clerk shall keep a careful record of the proceedings of each meeting, prepare and edit the Minutes for printing. In the absence of the Moderator and the Vice Moderator, he shall call the body together and preside until a Moderator pro tem shall be elected.

Article 6. All members wishing to speak on any subject shall arise and address the Moderator as "Brother," and shall confine themselves strictly to the subject and shall not be allowed to make an unkind allusion to any brother while speaking.

Article 7. No motion shall be debated until seconded and stated by the moderator or read by the clerk.

Article 8. When a motion is under consideration no other motion shall be entertained except to adjourn, lay on the table, to amend, to definitely postpone, refer to committee, or call for the previous question.

Article 9. Any member voting with the majority on any question of debate may move a reconsideration at any time during the session.

Article 10. Visiting brethren of other Associations may speak on any subject, but shall not vote.

Article 11. No brother shall speak more than twice on a subject without the consent of the Association.

Article 12. These Rules of Decorum may be altered or amended at any regular session of the Association by a majority vote of the members of the body.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. We believe in one only true and living God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and that they are one. (See Matt. 28-29).
2. We believe that the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the inspired Word of God and the only rules of faith and practice. (2 Timothy 3:17.)
3. We believe in the election according to the foreknowledge of God through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth. (2 Thes. 3:13.)
4. We believe that the Grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared unto all men, and that nothing prevents the salvation of the vilest sinner but his own voluntary rejection of that Grace. (Isa. 55:1; Rev. 22:17; Acts 17:30.)
5. We believe in the depravity of the human heart, and that the natural state of man is such that he cannot prepare himself for Divine favors without the assisting grace of God, enabling him to act according to the good pleasure of His Divine Will. (Eph. 2:8; Matt. 18:11; John 4:10; 1 Cor. 3:5-7.)
6. We believe in justification of faith, which gives peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. (Rom. 5:1-2.)
7. We believe that the Gospel of Christ is a means of grace to bring sinners to repentance and faith in Jesus Christ, and therefore should be preached to all the world. (John 3:16.)
8. We believe that all those who are regenerated by the Spirit of God are made heirs of God and joint heirs with our Lord Jesus Christ and that they are kept by the power of God through faith until eternal Salvation. (Peter 1:5; Rom. 8:22; Phil. 1:6.)
9. We believe that baptism is the immersion of the whole body in water; that the only proper subjects are described in preceding section, and the only proper administrators are those who have been regularly ordained by the Church of Christ, by the imposition of hands of a presbytery. (Acts 8:36; Rom. 6:4; Read Tim. and Titus.)
10. We believe that the Lord's Supper was instituted by Jesus Christ to be commemorated by His followers and that none but baptized believers have a Spiritual right to partake thereof. Luke 22:18, 19, 20; Cor. 14:25-28.
11. We believe in the resurrection of the righteous and the wicked, and that the wicked shall go away into everlasting punishment, but the righteous into eternal life. (Acts 25:15).

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOLS

No concentrated effort has been made in the Association in the Sunday School Work. What has been accomplished has been done in the individual Churches under the leadership of the pastors and lay membership. More has been done in training than last year. There were seven churches receiving eighty-one awards. The Pastors and Superintendents of these churches are to be commended for this progress. On the other hand, it is disappointing to notice that only four or five Churches held Vacation Bible Schools this summer. Our church at Obitsee was one of this number. We enjoyed the most successful school we have had. Our Pastor led them as principal. He received unusual good assistance from the entire faculty. The average attendance of the school was much larger than we had expected. I am sure that great good could be accomplished if other Pastors would lead their people to foster a school in the coming year. The churches will advance only as they are led.

I trust that in the coming year we will be able to get someone to assume the responsibility of leading this work, who will have the time and ability to spend in it than I have. Then I hope we as a Association will realize the importance of Bible study and training to the people and that we will do more of it.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE 69th ANNUAL SESSION

Of The

BEULAH BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

HELD WITH THE FT. WHITE BAPTIST CHURCH
OCTOBER 6-7, 1948

WEDNESDAY MORNING SESSION, OCTOBER 6

The meeting was opened with a song service led by the Moderator, Rev. J. T. Squires of Lake City gave the Devotional reading and gave an inspiring talk on the scripture used and gave the opening prayer.

The Moderator, Rev. Hugh H. Walters, called the body to order for business.

Due to the resignation of the clerk, the Moderator appointed W. A. Bailey as clerk.

A motion was made by the clerk that the messengers present from the various churches and those that might come in later constitute the organization of the session of this association.

Motion adopted.

The Program as presented by the Program committee adopted as official order of business.

Report of Dr. Leon N. Campbell, President of Florida Baptist Bible Institute was given by and after some comments by him was adopted.

The report of Sunday School work in the association was given by brother Elton McClellan and was adopted.

Rev. John W. Pearce, District Missionary made an interesting talk on his work and asked for full co-operation of the association in his work.

The report of the Brotherhood committee was passed as the Chairman was absent.

The Associational training Union report was made by Rev. J. A. McKeithan. He urged that more training unions be organized and described them as the Church at Work, giving examples of his own Church as an illustration. The report was adopted.

The report of the Brotherhood was passed as the Chairman was absent.

Finance Committee—Bro. R. F. Persons, Bro. J. E. Rouse and Bro. C. F. Johns.

Report on the Baptist Childrens home was given by Mrs. F. A. McColskey. The report was adopted.

Rev. Joe Johnson who was raised in the home and is representing the home over the state gave an outline of the work the home has been doing and is now doing and told of some of their plans for the future work.

At this time Rev. W. T. Newsome brought the annual Service using the latter part of the 2nd Chapter of Ephesians as a base for his remarks. Adjourned for lunch. Benediction by Rev. Newsome.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The session was opened by song service led by the moderator. Rev. Vernon Clyatt gave the devotional. There was no report on Christian Education as the committee was not present, but it was decided by the body if the report was sent in later, it was to be inserted in the minutes by the clerk.

Brother J. Harrison Griffin used the time telling of the work at Stetson university and of their plans and needs of the future. Upon motion it was agreed that this body designate January 30th, 1949 a Stetson Day and a special offering be taken in all the churches to be used in building a Christian Service Center at Stetson.

No committee report on mission. Dr. McGuire of the State Mission Board gave an interesting report of the State Mission work and explained in detail the working of the unified program and urged that the churches do more of their giving through the unified program.

Adjourned until 10:00 A. M. Thursday, October 7.

SESSION FOR THURSDAY, OCTOBER 7, 1948

Session opened with song service led by Rev. W. E. Johnson. Brother Johnson also brought the devotional Service using 7th Chapter 11th to 15th verses of St. Lukes Gospel. Brother John Dicks prayed the opening prayer.

The Session was opened for business by the moderator.

Report of Committee on Temperance and Morals by Bro. H. H. Parrish was read by Brother A. B. Franklin after discussion by Rev. John Dicks and Rev. J. A. McKeithen the report was adopted.

A motion was made by Bro. McKeithen and was adopted that this association go on record as favoring calling an election to vote out the liquid traffic and pledging their efforts for this cause.

The W. M. U. Report by Mrs. H. H. Walters was read by Mr. J. F. Black and was adopted.

The report of Committee on Ministers Retirement Plan was read by Brother A. B. Franklin.

The report was discussed by Rev. John Dicks and Bro. J. E. DuPree. The report was adopted.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS

At this time the election of officers was taken up. Brother Walters, the present Moderator stated that he could not serve any longer and asked the body not to consider his name in the elections. Rev. J. T. Mashburn and Rev. Joe L. Wood were placed before the house for Moderator. Bro. Walters asked the body for time and made a short talk on his work as Moderator and asked the churches and pastors to give their whole hearted support to the incoming Moderator. The election by Ballot—Rev. Mashburn, 25; Rev. Wood, 44. The election of Brother Wood was unanimous. Brother Wood made a short talk asking the Churches and Pastors assistance and prayers for him in his work.

Brother John Dicks was elected Vice Moderator by acclamation.

The resignation of Bro. F. N. Moore as clerk dated March 29 1948 was read and accepted. Bro. W. A. Bailey was elected clerk by acclamation.

Brother R. F. Persons was elected treasurer.

Upon motion by Bro. John Dicks the body gave a rising vote of thanks and appreciation to Brother Walters for his work as Moderator.

The Missionary Sermon was given by Rev. J. E. DuPree of Live Oak. Rev. DuPree, as he usually does, made a great inspirational sermon using as his subject "Love". After the sermon a mission collection was taken amounting to \$29.13.

After prayer by Brother DuPree the body adjourned for lunch.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

The session was opened by song service led by the Moderator. Brother Joe Lee Wood gave the devotional reading using the 116th Psalm. He also prayed the opening prayer.

The report of the nominating committee was read by Rev. W. E. Johnson and adopted.

Brother Joe Lee Wood spoke for the resolutions Committee asking that they be allowed to send their report to the clerk for printing in the minutes. His request was granted.

Brother R. F. Persons gave the treasurer's financial report which was adopted.

Brother Persons made a motion that the association at its next regular meeting take an offering at both days sessions. After some discussions, Brother John Dicks made a motion to postpone the matter until next meeting. His motion was carried.

Rev. E. P. DuBose read the report of the Obituary Committee which was adopted.

There being no farther business before the body, upon motion, it was adjourned to meet with the Hopeful Church, October 1949.

W. M. U. REPORT

This year is the sixtieth anniversary of Woman's Missionary Union

of the Southern Baptist Convention. It is "Our Commemoration Year", a year of praise, thanksgiving and reconsecration. As the children were led to The Promised Land they were led and constrained by their leaders to pause often and praise God and to "remember" what great things God had wrought for them and through them. The word "remember" has thundered down through the years in God's Word. We too, must pause "remember" what God has done and can do through us if we consecrate and dedicate our lives completely to Him.

The theme for this year is "For God and Home and Every Land". W. M. U. Has placed special emphasis upon reading the Bible and family worship this year. How badly these are needed today when there are so many broken homes. To W. M. U. members "home" begins within the family circle and reaches out into homeland. We need more Christian homes. The hymn for the year is "Jesus Shall Reign Where'er the Sun" and the watchword is "That at the name of Jesus every knee should bow" Phil. 2:10. We quote our permanent watchword "Laborers Together With God" 1 Cor. 3:9 for without God is with us our efforts are in vain.

The following churches have a W. M. S.: First Church, Southside, Wellborn, Olustee, Bethlehem, White Springs, and Fort White. Our records for this year are

334 W. M. S. members, 106 tithers, 157 doing community missions, 8 mission study classes with 79 completing the classes and 34 reading a mission book of some kind, 2878 coupons to the Children's Home, 435 subscriptions to the following magazines: Royal Service, The Commission, Southern Baptist Home Missions, and The Baptist Witness. Two W. M. S. discontinued.

The cash gifts were as follows: 7 W. M. S. observed Foreign Mission Season of Prayer in December, offering \$262.95, seven observed Home Mission Season of Prayer in March—offering \$81.82, five observed State Mission Season of Prayer in September—offering \$91.10; Gifts to W. M. U. Training School, \$47.27, gifts to Margaret Fund or the Burney Gift \$5.29, Gifts to Children's Home \$139.97, Gifts to other mission objects \$147.74. Grand total \$875.85.

Our greatest increase this year was with our young people under the fine leadership of Mrs. Clarence Smith of Olustee. W. M. U. is the mother organization to these auxiliaries for young people ages 4 through 25 years. The number of auxiliaries have doubled from 7 to 14. They are as follows, White Springs, 1 R. A. and 1 G. A., Southside 1 R. A. 2 G. A.'s, 1 Sunbeam Band; Olustee 1 R. A., 1 G. A., Fort White 1 Sunbeam Band, First Church 1 Sunbeam Band, 1 Y. W. A. Except for Y. W. A. all goals for the year for increase in auxiliaries were exceeded. There are about 170 young people enrolled in these auxiliaries. The G. A.'s have been working on their forward steps and now have 17 maidens. The R. A.'s have also made advances in the ranks having 11 pages and 1 squire. Paul Beauchamp of White Springs participated in the State R. A. recognition service held in Ocala in March, five other boys and the 2 counselors also the pastor from White Springs attended the R. A. Banquet preceding the service. 7 girls attended the State G. A. Camp held at Silver Lake near Tallahassee and 6 boys attended the R. A. State Camp

at Panama City. A number of these young people were honor campers. The auxiliaries gave \$13.85 to Foreign missions, \$10.43 to Home missions and \$32.10 to other mission objects making a total of \$56.43. Two special meetings were held for the young people. The first a New Year's Eve watchnight Service at Southside with 7 churches represented and 98 enrolled in mission study classes held for each age group. A social hour was held at the close of the classes followed by a song service, message by Rev. John Pierce, our Regional Missionary. The climax of the service was conducted by Rev. Hugh H. Walters from 11:45 to 12:01 o'clock.

Another service was held at White Springs Church in June when Rev. Clay Gibson, a 20-year old Choctaw Indian from Mississippi and a student at Florida Baptist Institute at Lakeland was the guest speaker. Special recognition was given each auxiliary and to those who had made advances in their study. About 130 were there with an offering of \$32.90 taken and given to Rev. Gibson to promote work among his people. Refreshments were served at the close of the service.

Mrs. M. W. F. Miller the W. M. U. Treasurer made the following yearly report: On hand October 1, 1947, \$17.10, monies received this year \$118.10; total amount \$135.20. Disbursements were: \$12 to the Negro Seminary in Nashville, Tennessee, \$32.90 to Rev. Clay Gibson, Choctaw Indian, \$20 for medicine for overseas relief, \$16 our part on the cost of enlarging W. M. U. Headquarters at 1111 Comer Building, Birmingham, Alabama, and \$38.75 for local expenses in the association. Total disbursements \$119.65 making amount on hand October 1, 1948, \$15.55.

The president and the Young People's Leader attended the State Leaders conference held in Orlando last November also the State Convention. The president attended the State W. M. U. Executive Committee Meeting and State W. M. U. Convention in Ocala in March.

We have had 4 executive committee meetings, 1 Methods Clinic held at Fort White in January with Miss Josephine Jones, Executive Secretary of Florida W. M. U. in charge of the meeting, 1 quarterly meeting at Pine Grove Church with Rev. Bill Stroth as the guest speaker, another quarterly meeting was held with the First Church. The annual meeting was held September 21 at Olustee Church. The annual meeting was held September 21 at Olustee Church with most of the W. M. S. represented, Rev. and Mrs. John Pearce of Starke were visitors. The theme for the meeting was Fruit in the Master's Vineyard. Our guest speakers were Miss Pearl Todd, missionary to China for 20 years spoke on "Sowing and Reaping in China"; Miss Josephine Jones spoke on "For a More Abundant Harvest". The following officers were elected to serve for the new year.

President—Mrs. Sanders elected but can't serve; Vice President—Mrs. R. F. Persons; Young People's Leader—Mrs. Clarence Smith; Secretary—Mrs. Dietzman; Treasurer—Mrs. W. F. Miller; Stewardship Chairman—Mrs. J. F. Black; Community Missions Chairman—Mrs. Ralph Hardee; Margaret Fund Chairman—Mrs. D. P. Folsom; Training School Chairman—Mrs. Rouse; Children's Home Chairman—Mrs. E. A. McColley; Mission Study Chairman—Mrs. H. H. Walters.

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

FIELD

The Department of Christian Education is gradually and surely making its way into the hearts of our people. The number of churches observing Christian Education Sunday is increasing; likewise, Christian Home Week, and those giving to the cause of Christian Education. This reflects a growing interest in the overall program of Christian training. Christian Education stems from the home, where the Christian father and mother teach their children to know Jesus, to love him, and to live by his principles." Says Dr. W. S. Allen, our former president.

STETSON GOES FORWARD

Under the aggressive and constructive leadership of our new president, Dr. J. Ollie Edmunds, a long range program is being launched which will greatly strengthen every department of the University. Twenty five new teachers have been added, new courses are being offered, classes are being provided for night students; and in addition, the grounds are being beautified, buildings are being renovated, and plans for the erection of new buildings are being drawn. The first building to be completed under this long range program is the School of Business which will be this rapidly growing department. Many changes are taking place, and the spirit of growth and expansion is being felt everywhere.

STUDENT BODY

The total enrollment for 1948 was 2,752, with a large percentage of

this number being Baptist students. There were more than 100 ministerial students, and an even larger number preparing for some phase of definite Christian service. The Florida Baptist Convention and John B. Stetson University jointly paid the tuition of all ministerial students, and the University gives half tuition to all sons and daughters of Baptist ministers.

RELIGIOUS ACTIVITIES

One has only to visit the campus to sense an awakened interest in things spiritual. The Baptist Student Union is the largest religious group on the campus, and is putting forth every effort to link the students closer to their respective churches. The various organizations of the church, the vesper services, ministerial association, and volunteer band guide in promoting the spiritual welfare of our entire student body.

MEETING A GREAT NEED

We have probably had more inquiries at this office from pastors wanting to know where they can lay hold on a trained educational director, music director, or church secretary. Through the Sacred Music Department of the School of Music and the School of Bible a great number of our choicest young men and women are preparing to enter these fields. There were about 90 enrolled in the Sacred Music Department last year and a two hundred per cent increase is anticipated for this coming year. In a short while, Stetson will be able to furnish trained leaders for our churches.

RELIGIOUS CENTER BUILDING

First, the State Baptist Convention voted unanimously to erect a building in honor of Dr. William Sims Allen, our former president. Second, the State Mission Board and the planning Committee of Stetson approved the plan to erect on the campus a Religious Center Building that would best honor Dr. Allen, and meet one of the greatest needs.

PLAN

The State Mission Board at its annual meeting voted unanimously to recommend to the State Baptist Convention that we set aside Sunday, January 30, as a day when we would take a special offering for the Religious Center Building.

THE CONVENTION WILL KEEP ITS PROMISE

The State Baptist Convention reaffirmed its promise to complete the Million Dollar Campaign. More than 600 churches have contributed to this fund, while many other churches have placed Stetson in their budget. Florida Baptists will keep faith and ere long we will have to our credit \$1,000,000 for buildings and endowment for our Beloved John B. Stetson University.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. That we observe Stetson Sunday as Sunday, January 30.
2. That a special offering be taken for the Religious Center Building on January 30.
3. That the goal be \$100,000.
4. That the quota for each church be fifty cents per member.

REPORT OF TEMPERANCE AND MORALS

(By H. H. PARRISH)

It is with genuine shame and regret we must allege that at no time since 1912 has drinking and drunkenness been as prevalent as they are today. We can go further that the system as a revenue measure is a failure. Every dollar spent in the purchase of strong drink is a dollar wasted. It ought to go into profitable productive channels. It ought to buy bread, sanitation, medicine, hospital care and the like.

We further allege that immorality, prostitution, and crime in a general way are following in the trail of alcohol. Florida's road-houses and road-sides present a problem of immorality that would not prevail if the sale of beer, wine, and whiskey. The task of good citizens to an orderly government and decent society is greater than ever before.

We earnestly call upon God fearing and order loving people of all creeds, faiths and of none to join themselves together in an effort to save our national decency and self respect by re-creating an effective national prohibition law, placing its enforcement in the hands of its
