### CONSTITUTION and BYLAWS

SECTION ONE

Article 1. This body shall be known as the Beulah Eaptist Association.

Article 2. In expressing its conception of Bible doctrine this body shall be guided by the New Hampshire Confession of Faith as revised and adopted by the Southern Bartist Convention in 1925.

Article 3. This Association shall be composed of messengers selected by churches affiliated with this Association and in harmony with its basic statement of faith and practice.

Article 4. The purpose of this Association shall be to promote unity and brotherly love among the churches, and to help the churches through appropriate organizations: to develop their members in the christian faith; to promote the full propagation of the gospel; and to extend their own faith to the ends of the earth through world missions. This Association shall not lord it over God's heritage, nor infringe upon any of the internal rights of churches, but shall act only as an advisory body.

Article 5. The Association shall meet annually at such time and place as shall be agreed upon by the body. A called meeting may be held upon a majority vote of any regular meeting of the Executive Committee, provided that notice shall be given to the churches in writing thirty days prior to the date of any such called meeting stating the purpose of such meeting.

Article 6. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator a Vice Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer. The Clerk and the Treasurer may request the Moderator to appoint an assistant to aid them in connection with the annual session. The officers shall be elected by nomination from the floor on the second day of the annual session of the Association, shall take office upon the close of the annual session, and shall continue until the close of the next annual session.

Article 7. The Executive Committee of the Association shall be composed of the active pastors of the affiliated churches, one layman from each of such churches who shall be elected by his church, and the presiding officer of each respective department of the Association, namely the Sunday School, the Training Union, the Protherhood, the Woman's Missionery Union, the Music Ministry, and any departments which shall be hereafter added, together with the Moderator, the Vice Moderator, the Clerk and the Treasurer. The Field Secretary resident within the district and serving under the Eaptist State Convention shall be ex-officio member.

Article 8. Any church which shall be proven to be out of harmony with the basic principles of faith and practice of the Association which shall persist in failure to respond to efforts at reconciliation shall by three-fourths majority vote be excluded from further affiliation with the Association. It shall not later be returned to affiliation except upon unanimous approval of the Association.

Article 9. This Constitution and By Laws may be amended by two-thirds majority vote at any annual session, provided: 1. that the desired change shall be presented in writing on the first day and decided during the second day of the annual meeting; and 2. that basic changes shall be presented to the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior to the annual session.

### SECTION TWO: BY LAWS

Article 1. Churches desiring affiliation with this body and qualified under Article III of the Constitution shall send messengers and a petitionary letter to an annual session. Upon a majority vote of the body they shall become applicant members during the then current annual session. They shall become affiliate members upon unanimous vote at the next succeeding annual session.

Article 2. The Moderator shall preside at the annual and called sessions of the Association, shall preserve order and shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided. The Vice Moderator shall assist the Moderator, shall preside over the Association in the absence of, or at the request of the Moderator. The Clerk shall keep the records of the Association and supervise the printing and the distribution of the minutes. The Treasurer shall receive and distructed all associational funds as directed by the Association, and shall make a full report of all transactions to the annual Association.

Article 3. The Executive Committee shall be responsible for filling vacancies until the time for the next election, except that in case of a vacancy in the office of Moderator the Vice Moderator shall automatically take office and a new Vice Moderator shall then be elected.

Article 4. The Executive Committee shall meet at least once each quarter for the following purposes: 1. to carry out the will of the Association as expressed in its annual or called sessions; 2. to transact all business of the Association ad interim; and, 3. to correlate and coordinate all the associational activities. The Moderator of the Association shall be ex-officio chairman of the Executive Committee and the associational Clerk shall serve as its secretary.

### SECTION THREE: RULES OF DECORUM

Article 5. A member wishing to speak on any subject shall rise and address the Moderator. Upon being recognized he shall confine himself to the subject. He shall not be allowed to make an unkind illusion to any member while speaking.

Article 6. No motion shall be debated until seconded and stated by the Moderator or read by the Clerk.

Article 7. When a motion is under consideration no other motion shall be entertained except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend, to postpone indefinitely, or to call for the previous motion.

Article 8. A matter may be reconsidered only upon motion made by a member having voted with the majority thereto.

Article 9. Visiting brethren may speak on any subject upon recognition by the Moderator.

Article 10. No member shall speak more than twice on a subject without the consent of the Moderator, or upon appeal to the body.

Article 11. These Rules of Decorum may be altered or amended at any regular session of the Association by a majority vote of the members present.

EIGHTY-SECOND ANNUAL SESSION of the BEULAH BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

held with

MT. CARMEL BAPTIST CHURCH, OCTOBER 12, 1960

and with the

OLUSTEE BAPTIST CHURCH, OCTOBER 13, 1960

### FIRST DAY, MORNING SESSION

- 1. The Eighty-Second Annual Session of the Beulah Baptist Association of Florida, an organization cooperating with the Florida Eaptist Convention and the Southern Eaptist Convention, was called to order by acting Moderator Carson Brittain at 9:45 A.M., Wednesday October 12, 1960 in the Mt. Carmel Eaptist Church near Lake City. Rev. Brittain was acting under appointment of the Executive Committee of the Association because of prior knowledge of the absence of both Moderator and Vice Moderator.
- 2. Congregational singing was conducted by Associational Music Director Pasco Weeks of Lulu.
- 3. The devotional message was brought by Rev. W. H. Gray, Pastor of Elim Church, from Exekiel, third chapter. Brother Gray closed his message with a fervent prayer for the sessions of the Association.
- 4. Organization. The Association was formally organized in the following manner:
- (1) On motion it was agreed unanimously that those knowing themselves to be messengers from their cooperating churches should serve as the body of the Beulah Baptist Association in this eightysecond annual session.

(2) The program for the two day session was presented for the Program Committee by Rev. G. Elmer Noble and adopted, allowing for any necessary changes.

(3) New Pastors were introduced and welcomed as follows: Rev. W. H. Gray, Pastor of Elim Church, Rev. F. A. Picker, Pastor of White Springs First Church and Rev. Dewey Waldron. Pastor of Phillippi Church.

(4) Visitors are welcomed, including a team of speakers representing the Florida Baptist Convention as follows: Rev. W. G. Stracener, Editor Florida Baptist Witness, Rev. J. Perry Carter, Secretary of Retirement Centers, a new feature in the Florida Baptist Convention activities. Rev. E. C. Abernathy of Tampa and Rev. Kelly Blanton of Ft. Lauderdale, pastors.

(5) Committees were confirmed as follows:

a. The Budget Committee--Robert L. Turner, Harry Baumgarner, James A. Shillings, Rev. Clifford G. Priest, Mrs. O. L. Carver, Pasco Weeks.

b. Program Committee -- Rev. Carson Brittain, Rev. G. Elmer Noble, James A. Shillings

c. Nominating Committee -- Rev. John Dicks, Rev. C. R. Roberts, Rev. Paul Mikell

- d. Resolutions Committee--Rev. F. A. Picker, Rev. Homer S. Morgan, Rev. Pat R. Wimberly, Jr.
  e. Time and Place Committee--Rev. G. Elmer Noble, Pasco Weeks, Rev. W. H. Gray
  f. Petitionary Letters Committee--Rev. C. R. Roberts, Rev. Dewey Waldron, Mrs. O. L. Carver.
- 5. The report on State, Home and Foreign Missions was given by Rev. G. Elmer Noble, Pastor at Mt. Carmel, and adopted.
- The report on Stewardship and the Cooperative Program was given by Rev. Carson Brittain, Pastor First Baptist, Lake City, and adopted.
- 7. Rev. E. C. Abernathy of Tampa addressed the body in behalf of the Florida Baptist Convention.
- 8. The report on Christian Education was given by Rev. Homer S. Morgan, Pastor of Mt. Pleasant Church. Rev. Carson Brittain requested permission to include a report of Baptist Bible Institute of Graceville as presented by him. By unanimous consent it was included and the report was adopted.
- 9. Rev. Kelly Blanton of Ft. Lauderdale addressed the body on behalf of the Florida Baptist Convention. Rev. Blanton gave special emphasis to the importance and place of Stetson University as an extraordinary educational institution among colleges and universities of America.
- 10. Miscellaneous Business involved only a request of Acting Moderator Carson Brittain for another person to serve in his necessary absence for the afternoon session, and Rev. John Dicks was elected.
  - 11. Visitors who had come in since the opening were introduced
- 12. State Convention Music Secretary W. G.Strour of Jacksonville was recognized and by request spoke briefly.
- 13. Acting Moderator Brittain announced the results of the Association-sponsored revival conducted by the E. J. Daniels Evangelistic Party September 15 -October 9 in Lake City. The revival, conducted in a large tabernacle type tent by the Rev. E. J. Daniels, preacher, Rev. Lowell Leistner, singer, Rev. Joe Webb, singer and director of personal work, Mrs. Joe Webb, organist and signer, resulted in 436 decisions for dedication or conversion, 945 pledges to tithe and 117 youth pledges to personal purity. There were 241 professions involving forty different churches of several denominations as preference. Expenses of the Revival were heartily paid in the amount totalling slightly over \$6,000.00. Attendance averaged between 2,000 and 2,500 daily, with 3,000 attending on Sunday night. The closing night was the largest in every way and resulted in some ninety professions. Neither football games mor storms kept the crowds away, necessitating the use of many police and patrol officers to direct the traffic. Several denominations cooperated with the Baptist sponsored revival, receiving many additions along with the Baptist churches. It was said by many to be the greatest event of any kind that had ever come to Columbia County.
- 14. Host Pastor G. Elmer Noble announced plans for the noon lunch, to be served by the Mt. Carmel Church.
  - 15. Worship. The worship period included congregational singing

led by Director Pasco Weeks, scripture reading from Ephesians, third chapter, By Rev. C. R. Roberts. a solo by State Music Secretery W. G. Stroup accompanied by Mrs. Albert W. Whitehead and the Doctrinal Sermon by Rev. John Dicks.Pastor Dicks used as his text John 3:14 and John 3:16 and preached on the subject, "Amazing Love".

16. Carson Brittain led the closing prayer and grace for the lunch hour.

### FIRST DAY -- AFTERNOON SESSION

- 17. After a sumptuous lunch by the host church the afternoon session began with congregational singing led by Director Pasco Weeks.
- 18. Rev. L. L. Parker, Pastor of Old Providence Church, led the devotional message and the opening prayer.
- 19. Rev. C. R. Roberts, Pastor Pine Grove Church, gave the report on the Florida Baptist Children's Home, and it was adopted. Mrs. L. M. Lloyd presented an illuminated chart on the Associational W.M.U., emphasizing especially the service to be rendered to dependent children.

(Clerk's note: It was learned later that the above presentation by Mrs. Lloyd was her W. M. U. report, which was also later adopted)

- 20. Rev. J. Perry Carter, Secretary of the Baptist retirement Centers, brought a message on the plans now in preliminary development for retired personnel among Baptist Workers. There was no report presented on Retirement Centers, but the Clerk was authorized to prepare a report for use in the Minutes.
- 21. The report on Baptist Publications and Literature was presented by Rev. Wilbur H. Bates, Pastor, Olustee, and adopted. Rev. W. G. Sttacener, Editor of the Florida Baptist Witness, brought an address, emphasizing particularly the danger to our basic freedoms in our present day life, and showing the value of our Baptist Press in keeping the issues before our Baptist people as well as other matters for preserving the effectiveness of our Denomination in a world witness for Christ.
- 22. James Shillings' report on Radio and Television was read by the Clerk and adopted.
- 23. In the absence of Rev. Albert W. Whitehead, the Clerk explained that Rev. Whitehead, Pastor at Ft. White, had prepared a report on Baptist Foundation, but that it had been accidentally destroyed. The Clerk was asked to prepare such report.
  - 24. Music Director Pasco Weeks led in congregational singing.
  - 25. Miscellaneous business
- (1) A petitionary letter for affiliation with the Beulah Baptist Association was presented by Pastor John Dicks for the newly organized Eastside Eaptist Church of Lake City. As per the constitutional regulations, the letter was approved for consideration at the next annual session of the Association.
- (2) By request of the Clerk and by unanimous consent it was agreed to remove the name of the Hopewell Church to the bottom of the list for the purpose of facility of printing in the Minutes, since it is an inactive church.

- 26. Field Secretary Paul McCullers brought his report which was adopted.
- 27. The Clerk presented the Report of the Executive Committee. It was adopted. The report showed that the Executive Committee had voted to memorialize the State Convention to preserve the opportunity for suggestions from the Associations as to nominees for the State Board of Missions. The Clerk explained that a suggestion for constitutional change had been otherwise presented in the Florida Baptist Witness, which action made it possible for our messengers to debate the matter without formal memorial.
- 28. Treasurer Robert Turner presented the report on Finances which was adopted.
- 29. On motion by request the report on the budget Committee was postponed until Thursday afternoon in order that the Committee may adjust the report.
- 30. Field Secretary Paul McCullers requested time to speak briefly on the meeting planned for October 27, for ministers, at the Middle Florida Assembly, and announced that instead the regular Directors' Meeting would be held.
- 31. A vote of thanks by rising was given the Mt. Carmel Church for its hospitality for the day, including the noon meal.
- 32. The first day's session was adjourned, closing with prayer by Pastor W. H. Gray.

### SECOND DAY--MORNING SESSION--OLUSTEE CHURCH

- 33. The second day's session of the Beulah Baptist Association began at 9:45 A.M. with Acting Moderator Carson Brittain in the chair. Congregational singing was led by Music Director Pasco Weeks.
- 34. Devotions and prayer were conducted by Pastor Wilbur H. Bates using Psalm 1.
- 35. Treasurer Robert Turner presented the report of the Budget Committee. (see report elsewhere) The report was adopted, amended to read that each organization be assigned an amount by the Treasurer each month on the basis of percentage of the funds available. The Moderator stated that 71% per resident member from the churches would take care of the budget.
- 36. The Sunday School report was read by the Clerk and adopted. The new Associational Sunday School Superintendent, James Shillings was introduced.
- 37. The Training Union report prepared by Clifford G. Priest was read by the Clerk and adopted.
- 38. No Brotherhood report was available. Rev. Paul Mikell, Vice-President, spoke briefly and announced the new Brotherhood President Harry Baumgarner.
- 39. The Music Report was presented by Director Pasco Weeks and adopted.
  - 40. Music Director Pasco Weeks led congregational singing.

- 41. Miscellaneous Business. Miscellaneous business involved the matter of authority to provide for preaching at the annual sessions of the Association. Pastor John Dicks reminded the body that no such authority was provided by the Constitution. On motion it was agreed to request the Program Committee to make such arrangements for the next annual session, and that a committee be appointed to arrange for the necessary constitutional change to provide for preaching annually. John Dicks, Fritz Fountain and Wilbur H. Bates were appointed as said committee on constitutional change.
- 42. The report on American Bible Society was presented by Robert Turner and adopted.
- 43. Pastor Pat R. Wimberly, Jr., led the Association in the service on Memorials. The service included congregational singing, reading of Scripture from Revelation 14 and 21, reading of the names of the deceased and a prayer of memory and thanksgiving for the lives of those gone on to be with the Lord.
- 44. The Hospital Report was presented in pamphlet form as prepared by the Baptist Memorial Hospital of Jacksonville and read in part by the Moderator, after distribution to the Messengers. It was adopted.
- 45. Worship Service. Acting Moderator Carson Brittain asked Rev. John Dicks to take the chair in order that the Moderator may bring the Missionary message. Congregational sniging was led by Music Director Pasco Weeks. Scripture was read From Ephesians 3 by Rev. Paul Mikell, Robert Turner sang, The Son of God Goes Forth to War", accompanied by Mrs. A. W. Whitehead, and Pastor Brittain preached on Eph. 3:11 on the subject, "The Eternal Purpose". Portions of Isaiah were used.
  - 46. The body was adjourned for lunch with prayer by Rev. W. H. Gray

### SECOND BAY -- AFTERNOON SESSION

- 47. The afternoon session began with congregational singing led by Pasco Weeks.
- 48. A devotional message was brought by Pastor F. A. Picker, White Springs, on Exodus 14, closing with prayer.
- 49. Chairman of Evangelism Waldo E. Wood brought the report on Evangelism which was adopted. On motion the Executive committee is hereby requested to plan for a Simultaneous Evangelistic Crusade for 1961 in keeping with plans being generally followed throughout the Convention.
- 50. The report on Temperance and Morals was presented by Pastor Paul Mikell and adopted.
- 51. Mrs. L. R. Sanders of First Church, Lake City, explained the poster display of the W.M.U. showing the status of W.M.U.work in the churches. The Clerk explained that the W.M.U. President was absent because of attendance at W.M.U. Leadership Conference. The report was presented in writing by her was adopted.
  - 52. Pasco Weeks led the body in congregational singing.

. Miscellaneous Business.

(1) On motion it was agreed to present a photograph and an article sent to the Florida Baptist Witness pertaining to the fiftyyear unbroken record of attendance of Rev. John Dicks upon the annual sessions of the Beulah Baptist Association.

(2) By unanimous consent the Clerk was authorized to compile a roster of annual sermon preachers, which information has not here-tofore for some time been included in the historical table.

(3) On motion the elected leaders of Associational bodies were placed on the permanent Budget and Finance Committee.

54. Election of Officers

(1) Moderator. Rev. G. Elmer Noble was nominated but requested that his name be withdrawn. Rev. C. R. Roberts was then nominated, and by acclimation the nominations were closed. On motion the Clerk cast the unanimous ballot of the Beulah Baptist Association for Rev. C. R. Roberts, as Moderator.

(2) Vice Moderator. Rev. F. A. Picker was nominated and the nominations were closed. On motion the Clerk cast the unanimous ballot of the body for Rev. F. A. Picker as Vice-Moderator of Beulah

Baptist Association.

(3) Clerk. Rev. Waldo E. Wood was unanimously re-elected Clerk of Beulah Baptist Association, the ballow being cast for him by the Moderator.

- (4) Treasurer. Mr. Lawrence Larson, a book-keeper, member of Parkview Baptist Church, was unanimously elected Treasurer, ballot being cast by the Clerk for the Beulah Baptist Association.
  - 55. Reports of Committees.
- (1) Rev. G. Elmer Noble presented the report on Time, Place and Preacher. The time: October 10 and 11, 1961; the place: first day, Tuesday, First Baptist Church, White Springs; second day, Wednesday, Lulu Baptist Church. The Missionary sermon: Rev. C. R. Roberts; alternate, Rev. Fritz Fountain. The Doctrinal sermon: Rev. F. A. Picker; alternate, Rev. Pat R. Wimberly, Jr. Committee: G. Elmer Noble, W. H. Gray, Pasco Weeks.
- (2) The report on Nominations was presented by Rev. John Dicks. These involved the leaders of Associational Organizations. (See Associational Directory). The report was adopted.
- 56. The report on Resolutions was presented by Rev. F. A. Picker and adopted by a rising vote, expressing grateful appreciation to both host churches and to all who contributed to the 1960 session.
- 57. On motion the Executive Committee is asked to work out whatever plans may be feasible pertaining to the Simultaneous Evangelistic Crusade for 1961.
- 58. Acting Moderator Carson Brittain called up the new officers and installed them into office, accompanied by the retiring officers
- 59. Final adjournment was brought into action as Carson Brittain closed the eighty-second annual session of the Beulah Baptist Association. The new and old officers stood in line while the messengers filed by for a fellowship of handshaking and prayerful wishes.

### AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY REPORT 1960

The Bible is the Book for everyone. This is the deep conviction of the American Bible Society and of all who recognize their stewardship of the Word of God. If the people of the world are to know our Saviour, they must have this Book of Books in their own language, for it speaks to their hearts as no other language can. Sadly, in most countries, they cannot afford the cost of printing the Scriptures, much less the cost of translating them.

The Bible is the essential tool of missions and evangelism. It is itself a mission-ary, for it can go where the missionary cannot go, and it can stay after he must leave, to continue to speak to the hearts of men. As a partner of Southern Baptists, the Amer-ican Bible Society serves every form of our mission work, helping translate, publish and distribute the Scriptures.

the last year, the Society donated more than one million Scripture volumes for distribution to the armed services and to patients in Veteran's hospitals. 1960 marked the approach of the 125th anniversary of Society distribution of Scriptures in various forms for use by the blind. Presently, through the efforts of the American Bible So-

forms for use by the blind. Presently, through the efforts of the American Bible Society, some part of the Bible is available in 1,151 languages, the entire Bible is available in 219 languages. Through the Society, Scriptures were distributed in strategic areas bordering the Iron Curtain, and in Africa, Latin America, Japan, Korea, India, and to many Ohinese who now live outside Red China.

During 1959, 175 million Scripture volumes were distributed by the American Bible Society. In cooperation with other Bible Societies, 27 million volumes were distributed. Even at this rate, our distribution is falling behind the number of people without the Bible who learn to read every year. You can help to speed up the work of the Society in reaching untold millions of lost persons the world over by making the American Bible Society a part of your church budget for the coming year.

### BROTHERHOOD REPORT

Like the W.M.U. serves the women and girls of the churches for purposes of missionary education and soul winning enlistment, so the Brotherhood serves the men and boys. It is a plan for enlisting more men and boys in the total work of the churches, with the end in mind of better promoting and supporting the work of evangelism at home and throughout the nations.

throughout the nations.

Brotherhoods in the churches are assisted by Associational Brotherhood organization in much the same manner as Associational Sunday School and Training Union organizations function. By participating in a larger fellowship local Brotherhoods are encouraged, inspired and led into a stronger work. In many instances the Associational organization works to start Brotherhood work in churches which do not have it. The Associational organization can often point out worthy projects for cooperative participation by the church Brotherhoods which would otherwise be overlooked.

The State and Southern Conventions provide leadership for promoting the Brotherhood work over larger areas and for furnishing materials, literature and leadership, as well as for coordinating the work in attaining some standard of efficiency, State and Convention-wide conferences, clinics and assemblies provide larger inspiration and incentive. Brotherhood work, though much younger than W. M. U., has developed to become one of the major agencies of Christian culture and enlistment in many of our churches and in

our denomination.

Our Associational organization has held regular meetings during the year, but there is much to be done to bring it up to the attainment for which our good church men are capable within this Association.

### REPORT OF THE FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME, YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 1960

This report is for a nine months period. It was necessary to change the date of the fiscal year to accommodate the auditors who check the books of our Home and other agencies of the Convention. The fiscal year will close on June 30 hereafter and the audit and reports will be for a period of 12 months.

Applications for admission to the Home has been unusually heavy during the past year. This was due in part to the growth of the State and also to the inability of some state agencies to help in the care of children who were not eligible for state assistance. These turned to the Children's Home for aid, which was given in every possible

ance. These turned to the Children's Home for ald, which was given in every possible case. If the children could not be admitted, they were referred to other agencies which seemed best equipped to meet their needs. Every application was given careful attention that third octage was opened at the South Florida Branch of the Florida Baptist Children's Home in December 1959. We now have three attactive buildings on the Miami campus and approximately seven and one-half acres of land.

Assistance was given to 354 children from 160 familes for the period beginning October 1, 1959 and ending June 30, 1960. 183 were in the Children's Homes at Miami and Lakeland, 2 were in foster home care, 26 on Nother's Aid, and 12 were assisted in the homes of relatives for a total of 223 under supervision. 161 applicants were given help through counseling and referral to other agencies.

We wish to point out the need for your participation in the special Thanksgiving offerings for the Home. It shares in the cooperative program but it does not get enough

offerings for the Home. It shares in the cooperative program but it does not get enough from this source to meet expenses. It is important that each church have a special part in our work with dependent children. We earnestly desire your cooperation in Thanksgiving offering for our Home.

### REPORT ON BAPTIST BIBLE INSTITUTE

The Baptist Bible Institute of Graceville, owned and operated by the Florida Baptist Convention, is a school planned particularly to seet the need of God-called leaders who cannot qualify for Seminary degrees. Even without a high school diploma students who

are properly recommended may enroll. Thus any person who can study may better prepare himself for partial or full time service in the work of Christ.

The Institute provides a full three-year study of curriculum similar to work done on the non-language degree of Bachelor of Divinity.

Enrollment in September 1960 was 159, of which 76 were first year students. Students come from several states and countries.

The faculty ranks along with our seminaries in qualifications and degrees. It is the feeling of the administration that the greater need of the students the greater

should the faculty be prepared to meet that need.

The Bible Institute is a wital part of the Southern Baptist life. It is supported through the Cooperative Program, through special gifts from churches and individuals and in a minor way through student fees. The need for church and special contributions is real and great, since only one-third of the cost comes through the Cooperative Program. Since the school worthly fits into the world mission plan of Baptist work, it is imperative that the school shall have more buildings, equipment and faculty in order that it may minister to a larger student body.

### REPORT ON DENOMINATIONAL PRESS OR BAPTIST LITERATURE

The various printing and publishing agencies of our Convention are established as a means of providing convenient access to the best sources of study and information and for distribution of important findings throughout our Baptist world regarding all phases of life and service. Being the best that can be provided, such agencies are worthy of utmost confidence. With the Bible as the main publication, our literature is the best to be found. All of it leads to the fullest possible reading and study of the

Last year our Sunday School Board alone published over 97 million copies of periodicals, over 4 million books, over 65 million bulletins and 16 million tracts. They issue quarterly, monthly and weekly periodicals for every need in the churches and in the

In addition to the Sunday School Board, other agencies publish various periodicals. Both mission boards and the W.M.U. issue appropriate mission periodicals to keep Baptists abreast of the spread of the Gospel. Twenty eight State papers issued on a weekly basis sent out over 72 million copies. The Florida Baptist Witness, with 57,442 subscriptions, is in the budget of 779 churches. Fet 449 churches are yet to enter the budget plan of subscriptions, thus failing to take advantage of the great aid of the Witness in their growth and service.

The Church Budget Plan of subscription to the Witness calls for only log per month per church family, or \$1.20 per year-less than the cost of a daily news paper a month. The Witness is vitally important to the continued growth, solidarity and cooperative work of our people and to a people desiring to be properly informed.

### REPORT ON EVANGELISM

Nothing short of a total enlistment of all people as listeners to the Gospel and of all Christians as dispensers of the Gospel can satisfy the command of Christ to evan-

Yet only about five of every hundred Christians are known to do the work of soul-Tet only about five of every hundred Christians are known to do the work of soul-winning. Our biggest job first is the enlistment, training and equipping of our church members for winning the lost. With such an army it will not be impossible for the whole world to be given the opportunity of hearing the Gospel in one or two generations. In the Beulah Association last year 189 people were won and baptized, a ratio of one baptism to every fourteen resident members. The simultaneous effort the year before brought a larger number, showing the truth of Paul's statement, "We are laborers to-gether with God".

gether with God".

Two years ago the Association passed a motion which resulted in bringing Evangelist E.J.Daniels and his party to Lake City in what has been said to be the greatest single undertaking ever accomplished in Columbia County in the field of evangelism. Though the meeting ran over into the new fiscal year, we have the results of that meeting, results which affected 40 churches of several denominations which worked along with our Eaptist churches in the revival. There were 436 decisions, of which 24 were professions. In addition 117 youth pledged personal purity of life and 945 pledged to tithe.

Several of our churches attained unusually high ratios of baptisms: Phillippi and Mt. Carmel, 1 to 7; Pine Grove, 1 to 6; while Wellborn had one baptism to each five resident members. We regret that only 17 of our churches recorded baptisms.

We urge that we make 1961 a year of simultaneous effort, and that we request the Executive Committee to arrange for a simultaneous campaign.

### REPORT ON BAPTIST FOUNDATION

There are two foundations open to use by any Southern Baptist, or any other person desiring to contribute to the personnent work of Southern Baptist. They are the Baptist Foundation of the Florida Baptist Convention, and the Southern Baptist Foundation.

These foundations are for the purpose of providing a medium through which any person may will or contribute to the causes promoted through these two conventions, and therefore to the work of winning the world to Christ.

As a rule contributions to the Foundation come by means of a will. A person desiring to continue his support to the Baptist cause after his death may contact either of the foundations for assistance in making his will, or in providing for immediate contributions. It is important to contact the Foundation first, in order that the will may be so written as to provide for adjustments, in case any particular cause named in the will should cease to exist as an object needing financial support or should become ex-

A person's will may be made simply to the Foundation, to be used for the general welfare of the Denomination, or through the main budget arrangement. Or it may be made to a particular cause, or to several named causes—provided that the will shall be so worded as to give the Foundation opportunity to turn it to other causes in case such causes should no longer in the future exist.

The Baptist Foundation is bound to use contributions of cash or wills in the exact manner and for the exact purpose stated by the donor. They may be designated to be expended in whole, or they may be designated to be put to interest for the use of interest

only.

Putting one's resources through the Baptist Foundation is the surest and most permanent way of guaranteeing support for Baptist work for an unlimited time ahead-for generations to come. No finer way of showing one's concern in the work of Christ in a lasting manner can be found.

### REPORT ON SOUTHERN BAPTIST HOSPITALS

Southern Baptist Hospitals have a two-fold objective. The first is to provide the very best hospital care for those who need the services of the hospital. The second is to provide this care with Christian concern and compassion for the individual who is sick. This second objective means that the hospital seeks to provide help as well as medical or surgical care. The individual that comes to the hospital sick in body and in soul receives care for the body and care for his or her spiritual need. The hospital

in soil receives care for the cody and care for his or her spiritual nestate inspiral seeks to discharge the patient enriched in spirit.

Our hospitals proceed along four lines of endeavor in their total program. The first is routine hospital care. Our Eaptist hospitals seek to provide the very best of regular hospital care at a reasonable cost. In comparison with others we seem to be

The second endeavor is education. Our Hospitals conduct the Mather School of Nursing at New Orleans, schools of Medical Technology and X-Ray Technique, Intern and Resident Medical Training, and Clinical Pastoral Education.

The third endeavor is providing hospital care for those who are unable to pay for such care. This is done through the Out-Patient Clinic. Last year 4,763 patients were examined and treated in the Out-Patient Clinic. 647 of these were hospitalized at a cost of \$166,982.79. Each of us has an opportunity to help by giving to the Mothers' Day Hospital Offering taken in our churches each year.

The fourth effort is the capital program. This is a continuing program of building, repairing, equipping and %eeping the hospital and equipment up to date in the field of hospitals and care for the sick. Each of us can have a small part here. Last year the Southern Baptist Convention made available to the Hospital Commission \$50,000.00 for this purpose. Each of us who gave through the Cooperative Program had a part. E. L. Mixon.

### MUSIC REPORT

The Associational year 1959-60, began with a fully organized Music Department. The music officers met on November 3, at Parkview Baptist Church, in a music planning conference.

### RADIO AND TELEVISION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT TO BEULAH ASSOCIATION

The Radio and Television Commission is a missionary service organization of the Southern Baptist Convention. It preaches the Good News of Christ almost daily somewhere reaching individuals who might otherwise never hear the message of Christ, Mission work by radio and television is the only means of witnessing to these areas of the world

by radio and television is the only means of witnessing to these areas of the world which are closed to our present mission methods.

Five radio programs are now being produced of which the "Baptist Hour" and the "International Sunday School Lesson" are most familiar. Preparation of "The Answer "series for television continues to be a highly successful method of reaching the unchurched and frequently uninterested viewer. A new series of 13 films for use in 1961 is our-rently being produced, which brings to 52 the films available to television stations. Southern Baptist pastors can now obtain "The Beam", monthly magazine of the Commission, upon request without cost, and a budget plan of 50¢ a year is available to churches which have 25 or more subscribers.

### REPORT OF RELIEF AND ANNUITY BOARD

The Relief and Annuity Board was organized under the authority of the Southern Eaptist Convention May 16, 1918 meeting in Hot Springs, Ark. It has grown to be one of the greatest agencies of the Southern Eaptist Convention. All pastors are eligible to participate, if the church or churches they serve will pay an amount equal to 10% of the pastor's salary, or if the pastor and church pay 5% each. The plan provides for the widow of the deceased pastor to be the beneficiary, if she is left.

Other plans of the Annuity Board provide for denominational workers, such as Seminary professors, field workers, etc., to participate, as well as full time employees of the churches and of denominational agencies.

There are fourteen workers employed by the Annuity Board serving in 17 States to

There are fourteen workers employed by the Annuity Board serving in 17 States to promote this work, thus urging the churches to assume payments necessary for their pastors to participate.

Members of the various annuity plans as of January 1, 1960 were 20,749, a 10% increase over 1959. There were 12,166 churches cooperating, an increase of 996. In 1959 the Board paid out \$2,267,456.55 to annuity members who had come to the age of retirement or were disabled. Relief payments were made in the amount of \$310,303.21. These were servants of the Lord for which no annuity had been provided by their churches, each receiving about \$60.00 per quarter. Relief funds come only from special contributions made by the churches for that purpose, and therefore depends entirely on the amounts received. All churches are urged to make at least one offering each year for this purpose, to make it possible for these old worthy but dependent servants of the Lord to receive some small amount, that they may know Baptists have not forgotten their services through better years gone by.

### REPORT ON FLORIDA BAPTIST RETIREMENT CENTERS

Florida Baptist Retirement Centers is the newest department of the far reaching program of missions and evangelizes among Florida Baptists. The first unit of this new work is being established at Vero Beach, Florida on a beautiful twenty-three acre piece

work is being established at Vero Beach, Florida on a beautiful twenty-three acre piece of land adjoining the municipal country club. It was the homestead property of Mr. and Mrs. Walter S. Buckingham of that city and members of the First Eaptist Church and includes the beautiful two-story house which has been their home.

The contract for the building program has been let and the work was begun in September. The first building consists of rooms for single residents, a lounge, a dining room, kitchen and offices. All rooms are spacious and equipped with private bath and ample closet space. Duplex cottages and cottages of other designs also are being erected for couples such as man and wife, two women or two men. It is expected that we will be ready for "open house" and to accept residents about the first of the year. The question is often asked, "Who is eligible for residency?" And sometimes there is the impression that the Centers are only for retired ministers and their wives. But we are seeking to provide for retired missionaries, retired ministers and their wives and

the impression that the Centers are only for retired ministers and their wives. But we are seeking to provide for retired missionaries, retired ministers and their wives and retired lay-workers in the churches. They will be recommended by their churches and pastors in relation to their victorious living, their interests in the Lord's work and their ability to help maintain a warm spiritual atmosphere in the Center fellowship.

The building program presents a number of memorial opportunities such as the construction cost of a single room, \$3,500.00; furnishing a room or an office, \$500.00. Other projects are: the construction cost of the lounge and dining room, kitchen and dining room furniture, lounge furniture and the heating plant though we do not know, right now, what the cost of these projects will be. ### REPORT TO BEULAH ASSOCIATION ON STATE, HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS

Truly we Southern Baptists can be proud of the fact that we are known as a Missionary people. According to Dr. Courts Redford, Executive Secretary of the Home Mission Board, we are supporting 2,192 missionaries and through their work a total of 44,649 professed faith in Christ in 1959. The Annie Armstrong offering and the Co-operative Program provided around \$4,151,389,58 for home mission work. Of this amount the Beulah Association gave \$11,591.00 through the Co-operative Program.

The Home Mission work is active in all states and is divided into seven programs as outlined by Dr. Courts Redford as (quote) "Evangelism, church loans, chaplaincy, pioneer and associational missions, city missions, national Baptists, and language group missions." At the end of 1599, 74 City Mission Programs were in operation. Gradually the larger cities are coming into the program and Seattle, Washington is now the fourth major city to join the Southern Baptist "BIG CHITES" program and contributed \$100,000 for Church Sites. These programs cover juvenile rehabilitation, Jewish work and 45 mission center programs.

mission center programs.

Southern Eaptists joined six other North American Baptist bodies in 1959, making it a year of evangelism. Especially emphasized was personal soul-winning, and Christian

Home Missionaries are among the following language groups and the deaf. Migrants in the United States were especially served. Other Home Mission labors are carried on in Oubs, Panama, Canal Zone, and among the San Elas Islands.

The work of the chaplaincy is also growing. During 1959 the Chaplains Commission endorsed 171 military chaplains. There are 419 Southern Eaptist Chaplains on active duty in the Armed Services and 660 in the Reserve. This ministry reports 13,193 beptisms. The Howe Mission program depends on personnel, but God is providing consecrated

men and women as the need comes. The total number of Foreign Missionaries is 1407 and the appointment goal for 1960 is 150. A total of 2,000 missionaries are expected to be under appointment by the close of the Baptist Jubilee Advance in the year 1964.
The present missionaries serve in 44 countries and world evangelization is the ul-

timate goal. Mission work is being carried on through churches, schools, hospitals, publication plants, Good Mill Centers. National pastors number 2,193. There are 3,269 churches and 6,332 chapels and mission points. All these report Sunday School enroliment of 340,346. There were 28,228 baptisms in 1959. Church members number 427,204.

### REPORT ON STEWARDSHIP AND THE COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

As a plan for handling the funds of Southern Baptists the Cooperative Program is now thirty five years old. In that length of time Southern Baptists have poured a total of \$483,354,000.00 into the cooperative activities of State and Convention wide agencies. In 1959 gifts of \$47,000,000.00 were divided proportionately between State and

Southern Convention causes. The newly established Stewardship Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention has committed itself to the Cooperative Program as our best means of cooperative and voluncommitted itself to the Cooperative Program as our best means or cooperative and voluntary support of world-mission activities—evangelism at home and abroad. It is the purpose of the Stewardship Commission to seek to develop a scriptural attitude and response to the Bible plan of financing Kingdom work, to assist denominational agencies in raising funds and to assist in providing endowment and capital needs. One means of such purposes will be the vigorous promotion of the Forward Program of Church Finance. we anticipate phenominal growth in all our Baptist work and in our spirit of a world mission task.

We rejoice that every church in Beulah Association reports gifts to the Cooperative Program during the past fiscal year, with a total of \$11,591.31 reported in the church

Churches are stewards of money received from their members and are obligated to use sound business methods in handling it, just as are their members responsible under God for the use of their own means. 2. That the churches in clude the Cooperative Program in their budget on a percentage basis, increasing 2% each year. 3. That the Cooperative Program be a preferred item, paying it first. 4. That the Cooperative Program be carefully studied for its best support.

Secretary C. F. Barry reports continued improvement of all phases of the Sunday School program throughout the state. Although all reports are not in, he estimates the following: approximately 1400 Sunday Schools; an enrolment gain of about 20,000; bringing out total enrolment to 408,000; Church Study Course Awards 100,000; Sunday School Category 17 Awards 21,000; Vacation Bible Schools 1,050; Standard Sunday Schools 125; Standard Classes and Departments 1,550; Total Standard Units 1,700; Alachua, Seminole, and Shiloh Associations attained recognition as Standard Associations.

### REPORT ON TEMPERANCE AND MORALS

Florida's "High Cost" of "Low Living" is reflected in the report of the interdenominational organization, United Christian Action. Their report shows that Florida drank 80 million gallons of alcoholic beverage last year, or 42 gallons per drinker. This cost \$135.00 per drinker, or \$66.00 per Florida citizen. Liquor claims 1,400,000 drinkers in our state, of whom 110,000 are alcoholics and 400,000 problem drinkers.

Gambling and indecent literature add greatly to the crippling of minds and souls of cambling and indecent literature and greatly to the cripping of minds and souls of our citizens. There are twenty six legalized race tracks or gaming places, unnumerable outlets of filthy publications and great numbers of hidden moonshine stills. On these sources of corruption nearly one billion dollars is spent annually, six times as much as is spent on all religious and welfare activities, thus leaving way for multitudes of lost souls to go down under a debauchery that staggers the imagination.

What can be done? We must fight. Fight to win wet counties, to reduce zoning priv-

What can be done? We must fight. Fight to win wet counties, to reduce zoning privileges favoring liquor, to reduce drunk driving, We must study. Study courses and abundant printed materials are available to supplement Bible study to educate our people against fleshly evils. United Christian Action and denominational and other agencies are ready to help with materials for study. When has been done by United Christian Action in furnishing technical assistance, educational opportunities and personal leadership in the right for a sane and sober citizenship, We must give. Our agencies must

have our support.

In this day of wholesale compromise, loosening of church discipline, absence of home discipline and training and a general letting down of moral standards, there is much to be deplored in the way of drunkness, murder, rape, thieving, robbery, lying, prostitu-

tion and corruption.

In the face of God's wrath which must finally be displayed against sin it is al-ready late for Baptists to use their combined influence through the preaching of conse-crated pastors, vigorous church activities and denominational agencies to bring up a generation in the fear and admonition of the Lord.
