CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

SECTION ONE

Article 1. This body shall be known as the Beulah Baptist Association.

Article 2. In expressing its conception of Bible doctrine this body shall be guided by the New Hampshire Confession of Faith as revised and adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention in 1925.

Article 3. This Association shall be composed of messengers selected by churches affiliated with this Association and in harmony with its basic statement of faith and practice.

Article 4. The purpose of this Association shall be to promote unity and brotherly love among the churches, and to help the churches through appropriate organizations: to develop their members in the christian faith; to promote the full propagation of the gospel; and to extend their own faith to the ends of the earth through world missions. This Association shall not lord it over God's heritage, nor infringe upon any of the internal rights of churches, but shall act only as an advisory body.

Article 5. The Association shall meet annually at such time and place as shall be agreed upon by the body. An annual Sermon shall be preached the first day and a doctrinal sermon the last day of any regular session. A called meeting may be held upon a majority vote of any regular meeting of the Executive Committee, provided that notice shall be given to the churches in writing thirty days prior to the date of any such called meeting stating the purpose of such meeting.

Article 6. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Vice Moderator, a Clerk, and a Treasurer. The Clerk and the Treasurer may request the Moderator to appoint an assistant to aid them in connection with the annual session. The officers shall be elected by nomination from the floor on the second day of the annual session of the Association, shall take office upon the close of the annual session, and shall continue until the close of the next annual session.

Article 7. The Executive Committee of the Association shall be composed of the active pastors of the affiliated churches, one layman from each of such churches who shall be elected by his church, and the presiding officer of each respective department of the Association, namely the Sunday School, the Training Union, the Brotherhood, the Woman's Missionary Union, the Music Ministry, and any departments which shall be hereafter added, together with the Moderator, the Vice Moderator, the Clerk, and the Treasurer. The Field Secretary resident within the district and serving under the Baptist State Convention shall be ex-officio member.

Article 8. Any church which shall be proven to be out of harmony with the basic principles of faith and practice of the Association and which shall persist in failure to respond to efforts at reconciliation shall by three-fourths majority vote be excluded from further affiliation with the Association. It shall not later be returned to affiliation except upon unanimous approval of the Association.

Article 9. This Constitution and By Laws may be amended by two-thirds majority vote at any annual session, provided: 1. that the desired change shall be presented in writing on the first day and decided during the second day of the annual meeting; and 2. that basic changes shall be presented to the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior to the annual session.

SECTION TWO: BY LAWS

Article 1. Churches desiring affiliation with this body and qualified under Article 3 of the Constitution shall send messengers and a petitionary letter to an annual session. Upon a majority vote of the body they shall become applicant members during the then current annual session. They shall become affiliate members upon unanimous vote at the next succeeding annual session.

Article 2. The Moderator shall preside at the annual and called sessions of the Association, shall preserve order and shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided. The Vice Moderator shall assist the Moderator, shall preside over the Association in the absence of, or at the request of the Moderator. The Clerk shall keep the records of the Association and supervise the printing and the distribution of the minutes. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all associational funds as directed by the Association, and shall make a full report of all transactions to the annual Association.

Article 3. The Executive Committee shall be responsible for filling vacancies until the time for the next election, except that in case of a vacancy in the office of Moderator the Vice Moderator shall automatically take office and a new Vice Moderator shall then be elected.

Article 4. The Executive Committee shall meet at least once each quarter for the following purposes: 1. to carry out the will of the Association as expressed in its annual or called sessions; 2. to transact all business of the Association ad interim; and, 3. to correlate and coordinate all the associational activities. The Moderator of the Association shall be ex-officio chairman of the Executive Committee and the associational Clerk shall serve as its secretary.

SECTION THREE: RULES OF DECORUM

Article 5. A member wishing to speak on any subject shall rise and address the Moderator. Upon being recognized he shall confine himself to the subject. He shall not be allowed to make an unkind allusion to any member while speaking.

Article 6. No motion shall be debated until seconded and stated by the Moderator or read by the Clerk.

Article 7. When a motion is under consideration no other motion shall be entertained except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend, to postpone indefinitely, or to call for the previous motion.

Article 8. A matter may be reconsidered only upon motion made by a member having voted with the majority thereto.

Article 9. Visiting brethren may speak on any subject upon recognition by the Moderator.

Article 10. No member shall speak more than twice on a subject without the consent of the Moderator, or upon appeal to the body.

Article 11. These Rules of Decorum may be altered or amended at any regular session of the Association by a majority vote of the members present.

FIRST DAY—TUESDAY MORNING SESSION

1. The Moderator, Rev. C. R. Roberts, called the Eighty-Third Annual Session of the Beulah Baptist Association to order promptly at 9:30 A.M., Tuesday, October 10, 1961. Associational Music Director Pasco Weeks of Lulu was placed in charge of all music for the annual session and opened the meeting with congregational singing, with Mrs. Waldo E. Wood at the piano.

The Beulah Baptist Association, composed of twenty-seven churches as represented by messengers so appointed, is a body of voluntarily cooperating Baptists and is affiliated with the Florida Baptist Convention and with the Southern Baptist Convention.

In the absence of Rev. R. W. Calhoun as the assigned speaker the Moderator appointed Rev. Edgar W. Wilkinson, who brought the devotional message and led in prayer.

2. Moderator Roberts led the body into its organization as follows:

(1) On motion it was agreed that all who knew themselves to be messengers appointed by their cooperating churches and who should later present themselves should constitute the body for the eighty-third annual session.

(2) The Moderator called for a report from a previously appointed committee whose responsibility was to investigate the readiness of the Eastside Church to become affiliated with the Association. The committee composed of Rev. Waldo E. Wood, Rev. Edgar W. Wilkinson, and Rev. Paul Mikell reported they had met with a group of Eastside members at a prior time and had found them in order both as to doctrine and practice and that the church was needed in its community. They suggested a hearty welcome into the body. On motion the vote was unanimous in favor.

Moderator Roberts called up the Pastor, Rev. John Dicks, and the messengers of Eastside Church in attendance and extended to them on behalf of the Beulah Baptist Association the hand of welcome fellowship. The messengers were then seated as participating members of the Association.

(3) The program for the annual session as reported by Chairman John Dicks was accepted as the order for the business and procedure of the eighty-third annual session.

(4) New Pastors were recognized as follows:

4. "The Association At Work" was the theme of the organiza-tional reports, which were presented and adopted as follows:

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK

Sunday Schools have proven to be the greatest single church method of put-ting into practice the scriptural command, "Gather the people together, men and women and children, and the stranger that is within thy gates, that they may hear, and that they may learn and fear the Lord your God, and observe to do all the words of this law"—Duet. 31:12.

Denominational leadership and services rendered to the churches in the Sun-day School field help raise the work of Southern Baptist Sunday Schools to the highest level of efficiency and effectiveness known today.

In the field of education through study courses our denomination has helped churches in Beulah Association to secure during the past year awards for 582 studies of which 110 were in Category 17. However only 3 churches had Sunday School awards in Category 17. There are no Standard schools, departments or classes — a situation we must change! We had ten Vacation Bible Schools re-ported.

These figures compare with 100,000 awards over Florida, 30,000 of them in Sunday School work, 105 Standard schools, 1,500 Standard departments and class-es, and one Standard Association.

We urge that our Associational officers be selected by June 1 hereafter so they can plan for the summer assemblies and for the Planning Meeting in early September; that we work for a 10 per cent enrollment increase, a V.B.S. in every church and likewise a Standard Sunday School and the observance of Bible Study Week in January and Preparation Week in September; and that each Sunday School cooperate in observing all special days suggested by our Convention.

TRAINING UNION REPORT

Progress in our Association for the past year cannot be measured by the number of meetings held, or the number of members present, but only by the actual work which has been done through the individual churches and their Training Programs. If the Associational effort has helped, its workers are grate-ful, as all workers through their individual interests and efforts have assisted in every way possible.

In summing up the activities of the past year, we find that practically all phases of the Associational program were carried out, such as Training Programs, Study Courses, "M" Night, Youth Week, Youth Night, and participation in region-al activities.

"M" Night was a grand success last year, let's make this year bigger and bet-ter. This night is the highlight of the year, and on next December 4, Monday, at 7:30 p.m., led by the Rev. E. L. Mixon at Parkview Church we hope to exceed 500 in attendance. Will you be there to be counted?

Every church with a Training Union and every church member a Training Union member, too. Let this be our goal for the year 1961-1962.

MUSIC REPORT

Progress was made in our Associational Music work during the year just passed. Four hymn sings were held at quarterly Association meetings, with an average attendance of 73.

During December several Carol Sings were held. Another is scheduled for Dec. 17 in Parkview Church.

Beulah was one of 42 Associations holding Music Festivals. Ours was in Lake City February 19, with four churches participating. Another is scheduled for Jan-uary 28 in First Baptist, Lake City. There were ten state conducted Music Festi-vals attended by 6,993 persons from 140 churches including three Beulah Associ-ation Churches. Let us participate at Madison March 2-3.

Our State Music Camps at Panama City under direction of our State Secre-tary of Music, W. G. Stroup, deserve our best cooperation and attendance. They will be held August 6-12 and August 13-19, 1962.

Mr. Stroup and Associate W. H. Mikell, represented us at Ridgecrest last summer among 500 from Florida.

(5) The Woman's Missionary Union: Mrs. O. L. Carver. Mrs. Carver presented a skit in costume showing our money at work around the world and dramatically made appeal to the conscience of all Christian minds on world needs for Christ. She followed this with a dramatic presentation of the W.M.U. organized work in Beu-lah Association and the need for fuller participation, securing com-mitments toward enlisting all the churches.

5. Committee Chairman John Dicks presented for the second time, first in annual session last year, a proposal for constitutional change regarding preaching, as follows: "that Article 5 be amended to continue with the following: 'and an annual sermon shall be preached the first day and a doctrinal sermon the last day of any regular session'." It was adopted.

6. Director Pasco Weeks led the congregation in singing: "To The Work".

7. Moderator Roberts presented the Report of the Executive Committee for the year's activities, and it was adopted for printing without reading.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Your Executive Committee held meetings each month during the year with an average attendance of nineteen from a fair representation of the churches. However, much better work could be done, if there was a more nearly complete number of churches represented at each meeting. Some of our churches are not represented at all in most of the meetings.

Reports from the Associational organizations were heard regularly, although some reports were few and far between! Our Field Secretary attended more than half of the meetings.

Among activities promoted by your Executive Committee were:

1. Your Associational and Denominational Calendar of Activities.
2. The Middle Florida Baptist Assembly, its buildings and finances, and its first general week, a Royal Ambassador Camp.
3. Denominational meetings and special offerings, such as offerings for the Children's Home, the Hospital Charity Program, and meetings like the State Con-vention, the State Evangelistic Conference, and various sectional meetings of sev-eral types, and in addition the Billy Graham meetings.
4. Heard some outside speakers and programs, such as a team from the Bap-tist Hospital, a speaker from the Sunday School Department, and others.
5. Carried out all instructions of the annual Association placed on the Com-mittee.
6. Worked with the Field Secretary in promoting Vacation Bible Schools and in using a summer worker where needed.
7. Cooperated with the United Christian Action program toward a better control of problems related to the sale and use of alcoholic beverages.
8. Prepared for the annual Associational meeting now in session.

8. Miscellaneous Business brought two requests, as follows:

(1) Pastor Harold F. Green requested night sessions for the benefit of laymen and others who cannot attend day sessions. The request was referred to the Committee on Recommendations.

(2) The Clerk, Waldo E. Wood, commended churches which sent in Associational Letters early and reminded the body of the importance thereto with reference to getting the Minutes printed before the fall rush to prevent a sixty-day delay.

(3) Pastor Edgar W. Wilkinson asked that the Committee on Recommendations consider and bring suggestions as to the use of the property belonging to the Association. By unanimous consent his request was so ordered.

9. The Association entered into worship services with the following program:

Director Weeks led in singing the hymns so essential to worship. Special music was rendered by the White Springs robed choir.

Rev. Claude E. Bailey, Pastor at White Springs, read the Bible from Galatians 1:1-12 and brought the doctrinal sermon on the subject, "The Unchangeable Gospel". He showed that the Gospel gives the unending assurance that through faith in the unchanging Christ men have positive protection for eternity.

10. Rev. Dewey Waldron, Phillippi Church, brought the closing prayer and offered thanksgiving for the noon day lunch.

11. The Association adjourned for lunch, which was luxuriously and beautifully served by the host church in The Woman's Club Building.

FIRST DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION

12. Director Pasco Weeks led in congregational singing and Rev. Edward S. Summersill of Bethlehem Church, brought the devotional.

13. Rev. Harold F. Green, of Parkview Church, Pastor, brought the Report on Evangelism which was adopted. His report was pinpointed to make March 11-25, 1962 the date for the Simultaneous Evangelistic Crusade for all churches which can participate, and the amendment was adopted.

REPORT ON EVANGELISM

President Kennedy said in a message on the State of the Union, "Before my term shall end we shall have to test anew whether a nation, governed and organized as ours, can endure". We Christians know the answer, but what do we do about it?

Last year we reported only 258 for baptism and 229 other additions. Over against this we lost 266 by death and removal, giving us an average increase of only 8 per church. And it took 22 people a whole year to get each addition! However, for some of our churches, this was their greatest year for soul winning.

We recommend:

1. That we respond with resurging interest in evangelism.
2. That we participate annually in the "Baptist Jubilee Revivals", setting the date for 1962 as March 11-25, urging 80 per cent participation and each church having one other revival each year.
3. That we give special emphasis in all revivals to "personal, face-to-face, heart-to-heart soul winning".
4. That we urge all churches to make full use of materials provided through our denomination for evangelism.
5. That our Association have an Evangelism Clinic in cooperation with our State Secretary of Evangelism, with 75 per cent of churches having 3 present.
6. That we have an Evangelism Committee composed of Associational heads, with the Chairman of Evangelism as its chairman, sending the Chairman to Home Missions Week at Ridgecrest.
7. That we stress every church having baptisms each year, and 75 per cent of the churches having an Evangelism Council to sustain perennial evangelism.

REPORT OF FIELD SECRETARY

Our Field Secretary, Paul McCullers, of Gainesville, serving the churches of our area under the sponsorship of the Florida Baptist Convention, reports:

"We Southern Baptists have a tremendous responsibility. For this Christ has committed to us great resources, because of which it is a great calamity if we fail in our responsibility.

In Beulah Association we may need to check up. We have only one mission, and need at least one other. Thirty per cent of our members are non-resident. Fifty per cent are not active in church work. Over three-fourth of our churches give to world missions through the Cooperative Program only once a year, while every church could give at least once each quarter, but preferably once a month. Our Annuity Board interprets a cooperating church as one that gives to world missions at least four times a year. By this standard only twenty per cent of Beulah churches are on a minimum standard of denominational cooperation.

All these deficiencies can be remedied simply by following the Bible teachings and commands. With members tithing through their churches and the churches tithing or more through the denomination our churches could soon reach the ideal of 50 per cent of church income going to world missions.

Southern Baptists actually hold the pivotal position in America for world missions, yet we stand very close to the bottom in our response. We have the strength numerically, financially, and spiritually to lead out in obedience to The Great Commission. We need to take seriously the imperative of Jesus, "Go".

As a personal report, your Field Secretary has during the past year given all of his time in the Lord's work, travelled nearly 30,000 miles, attended 32 Pastors' conferences, 95 Association meetings, 11 State meetings, 1,789 committee meetings and personal conferences, 33 prayer meetings, 2 dedication services, 141 other services and have made over 300 visits in homes and hospitals; have taught 14 classes, have conducted 6 revivals including stewardship campaigns, had 310 responses in rededications, 5 for baptism, 2 joining by letter, 99 tithers and 1 volunteer for special service, brought 206 sermons and addresses, given 4,200 tracts, written 731 letters, led in adopting 5 church budgets, arranged 233 pastor contacts, helped in 6 ordination services, 5 evangelism clinics, 2 church organizations, attended 5 special weeks at Ridgecrest, and conducted 4 field surveys.

18. The period for Miscellaneous Business brought no response.

19. The Brotherhood Report was further delayed and postponed.

20. Clifton G. Davis of Lake City rendered the Report on The Annuity Board through Rev. John Dicks. It was brought over from the next day's schedule, and was adopted.

REPORT ON THE ANNUITY BOARD

The official name of the Relief and Annuity Board is now "The Annuity Board Of The Southern Baptist Convention", as of March, 1961. Organized under the authority of the Southern Baptist Convention in 1918, the Annuity Board provides a channel through which we seek to care for the needs of pastors, pastors' widows, and other church and denominational workers in retirement or disability.

Though started prior to Social Security, the Annuity Board does not interfere with government or other agencies, but provides for those not able to qualify for them or else the additional help so needed in this age of costs above retire-

ment benefits.

Rev. Phil Maxwell, 1105 Sarasota Dr., Tallahassee, is our Florida representative for the Annuity Board and desires that every pastor and church use the Annuity Board in providing for their full time employees and pastors.

Though several churches in Beulah Association are participating in the Annuity Board plan, we urge all of them to participate for the sake of the added benefit to our total Christian cause. Over 14,000 are!

Over 2,000 churches were added last year to the Annuity Board in 22 states. There are nearly 23,000 members. Nearly \$3 million in benefits were paid out last year.

REPORT OF FLORIDA BAPTIST RETIREMENT CENTERS

The first unit of Florida Baptist Retirement Centers was opened March 6, 1961 at Vero Beach. The Vero Beach Center is located on property given by Mr. and Mrs. Buckingham and is composed of one motel unit, a duplex cottage, and a two story house. There are ten single rooms, two efficiency apartments, a dining room, a kitchen, a lobby, and offices. These are all in the original property. Since March 6, two other duplex cottages have been built. Several other units are soon to be added.

Living now in the Center are retired ministers, missionaries, and laymen, and their wives, plus widows of former pastors. They are all wonderful people.

The Retirement Centers are supported through the Cooperative Program, direct contributions, wills, and direct payments of residents. We are endeavoring to operate at a cost less than that of other centers.

Estimating that of 600,000 people over 65 in Florida some 50,000 are Baptist, we can see the serious need facing us in filling the needs of our Baptist senior citizens. We must furnish them provision, fellowship, and security in partial return for their long years of faithful service to our denomination. As they have made service to us their major concern, we must show them our love in their "golden years". We can give nothing less than a sufficient financial backing through direct contributions and through wills.

REPORT ON HOSPITALS

"Life's Great Hours"

Someone has observed that there are four great hours in every person's life: birth, marriage, illness, and death. Each of these hours is singularly marked by great spiritual qualities. For multitudes of people today three of these great hours are spent in hospitals.

Last year 34,108 persons were served by Baptist hospitals in Florida, one of which is our Southern Baptist Memorial Hospital located in Jacksonville. The Miami Baptist Hospital is locally owned. Besides those served in bed there were over 10,000 people served in the out-patient clinics. One other Southern Baptist owned hospital is located in New Orleans. Many others are owned by State Conventions and smaller Baptist bodies. We rejoice through these hospital ministries through which our witness for Christ is expanded to those passing through so important hours of their life.

Our Baptist hospitals have a well balanced service to their patients which touches the body, the mind, and the soul. They are fully accredited by National Accrediting Agency, assuring the highest quality of service, while they consider the spiritual service their highest objective. Their students in nursing and medicine, together with all their employees, are so instructed. Over \$370,000 was spent on charity patients because of this spiritual emphasis.

Many individuals served in our Jacksonville hospital report splendid treatment. This hospital will eventually have 600 beds to help heal humanity's hurts.

Thus through hospital work Baptists continue to enlarge their witness to a God of love and compassion through a channel which comes close to the hearts of humanity suffering from the ravages of sin in both body and soul. May we increase our compassion through a greater support of this wonderful work.

22. Rev. L. L. Parker of Old Providence Church brought the Report on Denominational Press. The report which was adopted included a recommendation that a representative be selected to serve as promotion man between the Florida Baptist Witness and the churches.

REPORT ON THE DENOMINATIONAL PRESS

The Bible commands Christians to grow in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. Without studying the Scriptures it is almost impossible to obey the command. The Bible is our most important Christian literature.

As we thus grow we will have a desire also to grow in knowledge of His kingdom's advances. To this end we need to make the very best use of all our Baptist literature to keep our people informed.

In addition to Sunday School and Training Union publications which are

sound in doctrine and provided by our Sunday School Board, other agencies of our denomination have expanding subscriber lists for such magazines as The Commission, Home Missions, The Brotherhood Journal, Ambassador Life, Royal Service and all the W.M.U. publications.

We have twenty-eight papers published by state Baptist conventions, including our own Florida Baptist Witness. As of September 1 the Witness was going to 59,671 homes involving 810 churches, 711 of which use the budget plan and 99 the club plan. Each year more churches send the Witness to all their resident members. Yet 447 churches fail to take advantage of the useful information found in the Witness.

We urge every church to send the Witness to every family in its membership. The budget plan costs only \$1.20 per year. This can be paid in installments of 10 cents monthly for each family on the list. The plan allows additions and deletions of names at any time.

A campaign is on to raise the Witness subscription list to 70,000 by 1964 as part of our Baptist Jubilee Advance. Our Association is being asked to elect a Witness promotion man who would serve both the Witness and the churches for the advantage of this campaign. This I heartily recommend.

24. The Report on the American Bible Society was not presented because of the absence of its author, Pat R. Wimberly.

25. Rev. Harold F. Green of Parkview read the report prepared by Rev. Alva Horton, President, on The Middle Florida Baptist Assembly. It was adopted after some discussion, especially by those attending its first week of activity, namely the Royal Ambassador Camp. Rev. Waldo E. Wood had served as Camp Director, and Rev. C. R. Roberts as Camp Pastor.

REPORT ON MIDDLE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSEMBLY

Rev. Alva Horton, President of the Middle Florida Assembly, reports:

"Improvements have been made on the Assembly during the year as follows:

1. A good road built into the grounds; 2. Four more acres of land deeded to the grounds on the south side; 3. Three buildings finished and equipped for operation; 4. Enough concrete blocks donated to build two more dormitory type buildings.

"Several churches used the Assembly this year for the first time. One Association held its Executive Committee meeting there. The Assembly conducted its first general affair as a Royal Ambassador Camp August 7-12. Sixty-four boys nine through sixteen years of age attended, plus fifteen staff and personnel. Not one of these boys had ever attended a Christian camp before. Rev. Waldo E. Wood, of Lake City, was director of the camp.

"We have approximately \$800.00 balance in the Assembly Treasury as of Oct. 1, 1961.

"A School of the Prophets will be held at the Assembly Oct. 26-27, 1961.

"I feel no greater investment can be made at any place at this time than in the future of our youth. Thanks for your cooperation."

May we add that of the 64 boys attending the R. A. Camp, 50 responded to the closing dedication service: three professions of faith, two of which were from the Sheriffs Boys Ranch; sixteen surrendered to Christian service; and thirty-one rededicated themselves to Christ.

Willian, for twenty-five years Sunday School Secretary of Florida Baptists, said he considered no greater service he ever rendered than through the educational and inspirational work of summer assemblies. In the Middle Florida Baptist Assembly we have one of our best means for lifting the vision of the youth in Central North Florida, and thus hastening of the development of our churches toward their full activity for the Lord.

28. The first day's session was adjourned, and Rev. W. H. Gray led in the closing prayer.

SECOND DAY—MORNING SESSION

Lulu Baptist Church, Lulu, Wednesday, October 11

29. Moderator C. R. Roberts called on Associational Music Director Pasco Weeks promptly at 9:30 A.M. to open the second day's session with congregational singing. The devotional message was brought by Rev. O. W. Hall, Pastor at Shiloh Church. He used 2 Cor. 2:14-17 and the subject, "Who Is Sufficient For These Things?"

30. The Moderator introduced members of the visiting team of speakers representing denominational life, namely: Rev. J. C. Fleming, Rev. Thomas Tobey, Rev. Earl Tharp, T. M. Johns, and Dr. John Maguire.

31. Rev. G. Elmer Noble, Pastor of Mt. Carmel Church, read the Report on Stewardship and the Cooperative Program.

REPORT ON STEWARDSHIP AND THE COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

For thirty-six years since 1925 Southern Baptists have channeled most of their missions money through a budget form called The Cooperative Program. Thus instead of each cause standing by itself alone and making its own appeal, the entire world missions program is promoted as a whole throughout the year. This has been one of the primary factors in the rapid growth of Southern Baptist life toward the winning of a whole world to Christ.

Through the lack of understanding evident even in Beulah Association the value of The Cooperative Program is not so clearly seen. As a result our missionary giving is weak and spasmodic, rather than regular and strong, as The Great Commission would have us to do. If all our leaders would become thoroughly informed on our missionary work and on the Cooperative Program as a channel of financing it, and if they would so teach it to our church membership, maintaining a strong emphasis on it throughout the year, undoubtedly our people would give it their loyal and prayerful support.

A deep conviction on world missions is the best incentive toward faithful tithing. Therefore, if we are to do our best in our stewardship of money, we must provide that incentive.

We, therefore, recommend:

1. That the Association will work out a plan by which earnest effort will be made to lead all our churches in a thorough understanding of our missionary work.

2. That we will promote as fully as possible The Forward Program of Finances for the fullest possible support of world missions.

3. That each church will use the budget method of cooperation with world missions, raising the amount by 2 per cent each year.

During the past year our churches report gifts to world missions through the Cooperative Program in the amount of \$11,300.00.

32. Rev. Carson Brittain, Pastor First Church, Lake City, read the Report on State, Home, and Foreign Missions.

REPORT ON STATE, HOME, AND FOREIGN MISSIONS

That "the field is the world" is borne out by Scripture and by the Christian conscience in viewing world needs, Dr. W. O. Carver says that any Christian studying Acts 1 and The Great Commission cannot escape a feeling of necessity to "get the next man and the next unto the ends of the earth". This is missions, whether it is near by or far away.

State Missions to us is our work through the channels of the Florida Baptist Convention in such fields as Sunday School, Training Union, W.M.U., Brotherhood, Music, Students, and Evangelism. Giving emphasis and unity to these through our denominational servants, through cooperation in our churches, and through local missionary projects in State Missions. Last year 46 new missions and 26 new churches were established. State Missions promotes these same causes through our institutions, through summer camps and assemblies and through The Florida Baptist Witness.

State Missions means world missions through our Cooperative Program, through which we gave last year nearly 9 per cent of our total gifts. This should increase by 2 per cent each year and not less than 10 per cent in any case by our churches.

With the unprecedented growth expected in Florida in the next few years, Florida will become indeed, as already, a mission field.

Home Missions and Foreign Missions go hand in hand with all missions. America must be Christian, if the world is to be a Christian neighborhood. Our Home Mission Board and our Foreign Mission Board are linked together in a common task. With 2,035 and some 1,500 missionaries respectively, these boards are our servants around the world. The Division of Evangelism alone brought us 7,221 professions of faith last year, while Home Board workers reported 51,463, or 25 per missionary! Yet this is not commensurate, even the results in our churches, with the rapidly increasing population.

Our new Home Mission territories in the fringe areas and in Hawaii and Alaska have thrown vastly increased opportunities and responsibilities upon us, yet we are not touching the hem in sending needed missionaries.

World missions is as necessary and as important as winning "the next man". The command, "Go ye into all the world" means just that. Yet we have over 700 unfilled urgent requests for additional foreign missionaries. We entered last year only three new countries, bringing our all time total to only 45 of the world's great countries — only 45 since 1845!

In other countries the national pastors, teachers, nurses, doctors, and others

working cooperatively with our own missionaries and agencies in schools, hospitals, and other work, are doing heroic achievements in evangelism, education, and medicine. Figures too numerous to remember show that some of us are taking seriously the command, "Ye shall be witnesses unto me... unto the uttermost". But too many of us are not in on the witnessing. May we take personal the words of our Lord, "even so send I you".

35. Rev. Wilbur H. Bates, Pastor at Providence Village, brought the Report on Temperance and Morals.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE AND MORALS

"We'll get your children" is the motto of the beer and liquor traffic. And with our churches so woefully unconcerned that motto is becoming more realistic every day. News items daily reveal this grim fact. Court rooms become crowded with juvenile and adult cases in crime related to drink. News writers even appeal to adults to do something about it. Bars and other sales agencies become increasingly indifferent to ages of clients.

Could such shocking increases toward moral corruption be laid at the door of parents, Sunday School workers, and other adult leaders? Could adult indifference and moral decline be responsible? Law enforcement officers, no matter how strict or active, cannot cope with it without strong support from responsible persons.

Instead of alcoholism being considered a "disease" the name given it by such great leaders as Billy Sunday and Gypsy Smith as "SIN" should awaken us to the realization that our churches must take the lead with a full and strong proclamation of the Gospel of Christ.

United Christian Action, our Florida organization for the dries, should not only get our full cooperation in every way, but should be used locally to wage a successful war against the nefarious business of alcohol and its attendant evils. Director Jack Eppes, a Baptist, expresses his grateful appreciation for every indication of support given to United Christian Action, and urges churches and individuals to include that work in their regular giving plans.

36. Rev. W. H. Gray, Pastor at Elim Church, gave the Report on Christian Education.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Christian Education is needed today as never before. We are competing on all sides with a better trained world. Education must be Christian, if the world's greatest need is met.

Our Baptist schools are better prepared to cope with the deeper, spiritual needs of the world than government schools. We believe, therefore, that students would do well to look carefully into the possibilities of our Baptist schools, especially our colleges and seminaries, before selecting their educational institutions.

Southern Baptists now operate 71 schools, colleges, and seminaries, enrolling last year 65,338 pupils, besides 6,462 specials, totalling 71,800 students. This was an increase of over 4,000 over the previous year. On these schools we spent last year \$14,881,000, besides over \$9 million received from special sources.

In Florida we have two Baptist schools, Stetson University and Baptist Bible Institute. Stetson enrolled last year 2,529 students, and the Institute 187. We have 47 ministerial students in Stetson, besides 27 music and mission volunteers. Baptist Bible Institute is primarily for students who lack enough public school training to attend college or who cannot attend college for other reasons. Both of our Baptist schools need more help financially and in enrollment from Baptist families. We believe Florida could well afford more Baptist schools, including one or more Baptist Junior colleges.

Southern Baptists own six seminaries now with nearly 6,000 students. These students train in missionary service, music, education, secretarial and in preaching, in addition to less essential types of work. From our seminaries we get most of our missionaries, since few of them are appointed without seminary training.

We have at present only one Southern Baptist nurses' training school, though another one is being planned for our Jacksonville Baptist Hospital. Some of the other State Conventions have training schools for nurses.

Many thousands of our own Baptist students get their training in State schools. Fortunately in most of them is associated a Baptist Student Center which helps much in the spiritual needs of our young people in college.

37. Rev. J. C. Fleming, Pensacola, spoke on Christian Education, especially emphasizing Baptist Bible Institute, which he attended, saying that without the training he received there he would have a "nobody who knows nothing". It was a stirring message on training for the ministry.

REPORT ON BAPTIST BIBLE INSTITUTE

The Baptist Bible Institute is owned and controlled by the Florida Baptist Convention for the purpose of providing training in Christian activities for students who are not in position to attend regular colleges or seminaries. Most such institutions limit closely attendance on the part of non-college students. Students may enroll in the Institute without even a high school diploma.

The Bible Institute provides studies that parallels seminary training apart from language studies. Its faculty ranks with that of seminary and college faculties, being required to have the earned doctorate or be working toward it upon becoming employed by the Institute. We now have a faculty of twelve, including three administrators.

Of our budget of \$155,055.00 the Florida Baptist Convention through the Cooperative Program provided the past year \$72,627.00. With enrollment rapidly increasing, the need is urgent that our churches include Baptist Bible Institute in their own budgets, as officially agreed by the State Convention, for not less than \$20,000.00. Endowment is small and should be substantially increased.

With more students we need more apartments and class rooms. We need now a woman's building, twenty-five apartments, a music building, and an educational building. We propose presently to raise \$100,000.00 each for buildings and for endowment.

Baptist Bible Institute has a place in world missions, providing training and leadership development for men and women who know God's call to world mission tasks. Students come to us from 16 states and from outside the U. S.

Pray for us, and support us as we work for your world-wide interests in the Lord.

40. The time for worship brought the theme "Missions" to the minds of congregation in the congregational singing by Director Weeks, the prayer by Rev. A. Jay Wimberly, and the Missionary Sermon by Pastor L. Paul Day Sr., of Southside Church, Lake City, on the subject, "Christ As Head Of The Church".

41. The closing prayer brought the morning session to adjournment for lunch.

SECOND DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION

(During the noon hour, just at adjournment, a message came to the Clerk, Rev. Waldo E. Wood, telling of the sudden death at 11:30 of his oldest brother, Charles L. Wood, of Sandersville, Ga. Rev. Wood had been reared mostly by his brother since their father's death when Rev. Wood was a boy. Arrangements were made for him to turn over all things concerning the Clerk's office to others, since nothing could be done about his brother's funeral until his arrival, at best near midnight, no other close relative being available. Notes on the afternoon session were taken by Rev. Carson Brittain.)

42. Director Pasco Weeks led in congregational singing, and Rev. Homer S. Morgan brought the devotional from Matt. 4:18-22, especially verse 19, emphasizing the primacy of personal soul winning.

43. The Report on the Florida Baptist Children's Home was brought by Rev. Edgar W. Wilkinson.

REPORT ON FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

The Florida Baptist Children's Home received 430 applications for admission during the past year. Seventy-eight of these were accepted in the two homes, Lakeland and Miami. Those found actually needing assistance otherwise were referred to other agencies by necessity.

Because of the many applications the Home has increased their case workers to four. These workers do all in their power to help children and parents or other relatives to work out their problems to the best interest of all concerned.

Placing all children from the same family together in one cottage is working out well, and eliminates many adjustment problems. They feel more like they are together as a family.

There is still great need for financial assistance from our churches. This is seen in the large number of applicants who had to be turned to other agencies. The Thanksgiving offering should not be ignored by those who do not have the Home in their church budget, for the Cooperative Program does not supply nearly all the financial need. This matter should be called to the attention of the entire congregation and otherwise promoted among the church members. Even five cents per month per church member would supply enough to meet all the operating expenses of our Children's Home. This is less than the price of a soft drink a day.

Dr. T. M. Johns, Superintendent of the above Home, spoke to the report. He emphasized especially the change in the child care picture from dealing with full orphans to that of having almost none, but rather children from broken homes. The report was adopted.

44. Rev. Thomas Tobey of Ocala spoke on The Annity Board of the S.B.C., following up a report which had been brought Tuesday by Rev. John Dicks (20).

45 F. H. Anderson of Lake City read the Report on the Baptist Foundation plan. Rev. Earl Tharp of Tampa was introduced to speak to the report which was adopted.

REPORT ON BAPTIST FOUNDATION

Baptists have a unique method of providing permanent as well as immediate finances for any agency or cause which may be held dear in their minds and hearts. Such a method is involved in our Baptist Foundation.

The Baptist Foundation is a plan by which our members may look beyond their current tithe to their church to lay up for future needs relating to any object of their desire. Emphasis is laid, of course, on church and denominational causes, and in particular on institutions and world missions. These, including the Christian mind, belong to a world of freedom to which the Gospel leads, and in which the Christian has a right to invest.

The business of the Florida Baptist Foundation, as well as the Southern Baptist Foundation is to emphasize these inherent principles of Baptist life and to seek to strengthen and support the forces leading to an ever wider acceptance thereof. By encouraging our people to commit their substance to these causes through tithing during their life time and by will or bequest to serve after their earthly stewardship has passed, the Foundation provides a continuing investment after life here has ended.

The Foundation helps our people to plan well their estate before it is too late, before unworthy or unnecessary interests lay claim to that which should continue in honoring the great Giver of gifts. By using competent and experienced legal advisors the Foundation helps to plan wills and bequests so as to guarantee the safest and surest use of funds regardless of changes brought about by time and circumstances.

Our Baptist Foundation is interested in all the causes worthy of our Baptist life, including Florida Stetson University, Baptist Bible Institute, Florida Normal and Industrial College, The Baptist Children's Home, and all Convention causes.

If you have funds or property to leave to any worthy cause, get in touch with the Baptist Foundation. It costs you nothing.

47. On motion by Carson Brittain and seconded by John Dicks a love offering was taken for Brother Waldo E. Wood in appreciation of faithful service, same to be over and above his salary as Clerk. The offering amounted to \$60.00 (and was handed to Rev. Wood as he and his wife passed through Lake City from Gainesville enroute to his brother's funeral. This is your Clerk's grateful acknowledgment and humble appreciation for so kindly and generous consideration, especially at a time of so great sorrow).

48. Rev. Paul Mikell presented the Report on Radio and Television. The report was adopted.

REPORT ON RADIO AND TELEVISION

Fantastic advances have been made in the field of communications through radio and television. Men may stop transportation activities, but communication cannot be stopped, not since we have satellites.

With radio and television we can thus get the Gospel to areas and peoples where all other methods fail. Russia and China are among the countries thus exposed to communications by air.

The Radio and Television Commission are doing a full time job in communicating the Gospel to every area of the world. But we Baptists are not doing everything we can. With all our means of spreading the Gospel we are not keeping up even with the increase in population, much less giving the Gospel to ones we already know.

However, through radio and television we are proclaiming the Gospel through 1,100 stations to some 50 million listeners each week. We now have "The Baptist

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Hour", "Master Control", "The Answer", "The Spanish Baptist Hour", "Chapel Upstairs", and "International Sunday School Lessons" on many of the best radio and television stations around the world. Response through letters and otherwise is outstanding as multitudes testify to the effectiveness of these programs.

We need to pledge ourselves to give our Radio and Television Commission our best possible support to give the mightiest testimony in all history to the world's waiting multitudes who are doomed without the saving power of Christ.
