CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

SECTION ONE

Article 1. This body shall be known as the Beulah Baptist Association.

Article 2. In expressing its conception of Bible doctrine this body shall be guided by the New Hampshire Confession of Faith as revised and adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention in 1925.

Article 3. This Association shall be composed of messengers selected by churches affiliated with this Association and in harmony with its basic statement of faith and practice.

Article 4. The purpose of this Association shall be to promote unity and brotherly love among the churches, and to help the churches through appropriate organizations: to develop their members in the christian faith; to promote the full propagation of the gospel; and to extend their own faith to the ends of the earth through world missions. This Association shall not lord it over God's heritage, nor infringe upon any of the internal rights of churches, but shall act only as an advisory body.

Article 5. The Association shall meet annually at such time and place as shall be agreed upon by the body. An annual Sermon shall be preached the first day and a Doctrinal Sermon the last day of any regular session. A called meeting may be held upon a majority vote of any regular meeting of the Executive Committee, provided that notice shall be given to the churches in writing thirty days prior to the date of any such called meeting stating the purpose of such meeting.

Article 6. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Vice Moderator, a Clerk, and a Treasurer. The Clerk and the Treasurer may request the Moderator to appoint an assistant to aid them in connection with the annual session. The officers shall be elected by nomination from the floor on the second day of the annual session of the Association, shall take office upon the close of the annual session, and shall continue until the close of the next annual session.

Article 7. The Executive Committee of the Association shall be composed of the active pastors of the affiliated churches, one layman from each of such churches who shall be elected by his church, and the presiding officer of each respective department of the Association, namely the Sunday School, the Training Union, the Brotherhood, the Woman's Missionary Union, the Music Ministry, and any departments which shall be hereafter added, together with the Moderator, the Vice Moderator, the Clerk, and the Treasurer. The Field Secretary resident within the district and serving under the Baptist State Convention shall be ex-officio member.

Article 8. Any church which shall be proven to be out of harmony with the basic principles of faith and practice of the Association and which shall persist in failure to respond to efforts at reconciliation shall by three-fourths majority vote be excluded from further affiliation with the Association. It shall not later be returned to affiliation except upon unanimous approval of the Association.

Article 9. This Constitution and By Laws may be amended by two-thirds majority vote at any annual session, provided: 1. that the desired change shall be presented in writing on the first day and decided during the second day of the annual meeting; and 2. that basic changes shall be presented to the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior to the annual session.

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SECTION TWO: BY LAWS

Article 1. Churches desiring affiliation with this body and qualified under Article 3 of the Constitution shall send messengers and a petitionary letter to an annual session. Upon a majority vote of the body they shall become applicant members during the then current annual session. They shall become affiliate members upon unanimous vote at the next succeeding annual session.

Article 2. The Moderator shall preside at the annual and called sessions of the Association, shall preserve order and shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided. The Vice Moderator shall assist the Moderator, shall preside over the Association in the absence of, or at the request of the Moderator. The Clerk shall keep the records of the Association and supervise the printing and the distribution of the minutes. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all associational funds as directed by the Association, and shall make a full report of all transactions to the annual Association.

Article 3. The Executive Committee shall be responsible for filling vacancies until the time for the next election, except that in case of a vacancy in the office of a Moderator the Vice Moderator shall automatically take office and a new Vice Moderator shall then be elected.

Article 4. The Executive Committee shall meet at least once each quarter for the following purposes: 1. to carry out the will of the Association as expressed in its annual or called sessions; 2. to transact all business of the Association ad interim; and, 3. to correlate and coordinate all the associational activities. The Moderator of the Association shall be ex-officio chairman of the Executive Committee and the associational Clerk shall serve as its secretary.

SECTION THREE: RULES OF DECORUM

Article 5. A member wishing to speak on any subject shall rise and address the Moderator. Upon being recognized he shall confine himself to the subject. He shall not be allowed to make an unkind illusion to any member while speaking.

Article 6. No motion shall be debated until seconded and stated by the Moderator or read by the Clerk.

Article 7. When a motion is under consideration no other motion shall be entertained except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend, to postpone indefinitely, or to call for the previous motion.

Article 8. A matter may be reconsidered only upon motion made by a member having voted with the majority thereto.

Article 9. Visiting brethren may speak on any subject upon recognition by the Moderator.

Article 10. No member shall speak more than twice on a subject without the consent of the Moderator, or upon appeal to the body.

Article 11. These Rules of Decorum may be altered or amended at any regular session of the Association by a majority vote of the members present.

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4. Christian Education Report by Rev. Fritz Fountain.

Christian Education Report

A typical student at Baptist Bible Institute would be 32, married, with two or three children, and would have a background as a deacon or other lay leader in a Baptist church.

We have assembled a highly trained, experienced faculty to train this mature student. Classes, chapel exercises, and Field Guidance classes led by denominational leaders from both state and SBC agencies, combine in a deliberate effort to produce graduates who not only can lead the churches, but also who will lead them along paths of denominational loyalty.

Courses parallel those leading to the B.D. in our seminaries. We require three years, or 100 semester hours of satisfactory work, for graduation in pastoral training, sacred music, or religious education. Enrollment for the first semester was 191, a record. Total unduplicating enrollment for both semesters last year was 225.

A new classroom building should be ready for use by 1964; the administration building should be in use by next June.

Professor Thomas S. Roote Jr., joined the faculty in September. He has completed residence work for his Doctor of Religious Education degree from the New Orleans Seminary, and will continue to work on his dissertation while here.

Our budget was \$189,609.05 for 1962-63. Money received last year came from the Cooperative Program, Florida Baptists, \$92,643.17; State Mission Offering, Florida, \$8,400; gifts designated through and by churches, directly or through the State Convention office, \$24,211.50; personal gifts, rentals, tuition fees, book sales, and otherwise, made up the difference.

The recent building and endowment campaign brought cash and pledges for \$175,000.

Further needs include a new cafeteria, and housing both for dormitory students and for student families. We shall have to meet these needs before long.

Several colleges will accept up to two years college credit on Bible major for the three years work done in the Institute.

An anonymous friend has promised \$5,000 if the Institute will match it with \$20,000 for a student loan fund. The Trustees are raising our share, expecting to complete the job by December 31, of this year.

Conclusions: Southern Baptists profit from this vital home mission effort of Florida Baptists. And Florida Baptist churches profit by having good men drawn into the state to attend the Institute, most of whom remain in the general area as pastor or other staff workers.

We thank you for your love and support. We promise to continue, as far as we are able, to merit your continuing cooperation, and to work with you as fellow-laborers for the King.

5. Florida Baptist Foundation Report by Rev. Wilbur Bates.

Florida Baptist Foundation Report

The Florida Baptist Foundation, an agency of the Florida Baptist Convention concerned with the support of all causes fostered and/or supported by the Convention, has had another year of service. During the first nine months of the year, every agency and institution supported by the Convention has been named in wills prepared by the Foundation. In the years to come, money received from these wills will greatly help all these institutions.

The Foundation is concerned with assisting men and women in preparing wills favoring Baptist causes, setting up trust funds, and

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establishing endowments. At this time annuity contracts are not written by the Foundation, but are referred to the Home Mission Board, the Foreign Mission Board, or the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. It is hoped that in the near future it will be possible to enter this field.

The audit of September 30, 1962, shows \$792,204.83 held by the Foundation, compared to \$730,012.21 held at the same time the previous year. None of this money is owned by the Foundation, but it is held as specified by the trust or will covering the particular fund. No part of these funds can be spent except as specified in the agreement.

Partial settlement of one large estate has been received, and final settlement is expected soon. The part received by Baptist causes will amount to more than \$80,000.00.

Professional guidance is available to the Foundation in the field of investments. The Trust Department of the Florida National Bank, Jacksonville, makes suggestions as to investments, which are voted on by the Investment Committee of the Foundation before investments are made. Remarkable progress has been made in the investment field, and earnings are considered good.

The Foundation operates under the direction of fifteen of the best qualified and finest Baptist laymen, and one pastor. These trustees meet annually to receive reports from committees, and determine general policies. An Executive Committee is elected from the trustees, and serves in operational matters. These trustees serve without compensation, and pay their own expenses in connection with all meetings.

Your Secretary expresses appreciation to the Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Florida Baptist Convention, and to all convention employees for their helpful cooperation. He also expresses his appreciation for opportunities to discuss the work of the Foundation in various associational meetings. He has worked with the Sunday School Department, the Training Union Department, the Brotherhood Department, the Woman's Missionary Union, and in Schools of Missions this year in getting across the message of the place of the Foundation in Baptist life.

Help is given in writing wills and establishing trusts. Calls come every week from every part of the state in this connection. Again during the first nine months of this associational year, wills amounting to far more than a million dollars for Baptist causes have been prepared.

6. Stewardship And Cooperative Program Report by Rev. L. L. Parker.

Stewardship And The Cooperative Program Report

The Cooperative Program is the fundamental, effective, indispensable channel for the support of missions here at home, and around the world. It is the basic finance program of Southern Baptist, and demands the continual support of all Southern Baptist churches.

Through the Cooperative Program we achieve the purposes of our denomination and make it possible for every gift, regardless of size, large or small, to go to the support of all our common endeavors.

In the support of the Cooperative Program, the stewardship commission of the Southern Baptist Convention has developed three programs that will continue to be of immeasurable value and help to our churches in the Southern Baptist Convention.

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The Forward Program of Church Finance, now called the Forward Program of Christian Stewardship, is the oldest program, and has served well the churches that have chosen to use it through the years.

Last year the Forward Program of Christian Stewardship was joined by a new Stewardship Development Program, primarily for churches with up to three hundred members, called Growth In Christian Stewardship.

These two programs aid churches in developing giving congregations. More and more churches are finding that when a person gives of his possessions, he will give more of himself to the service of God.

Early in 1964, a third program entitled, Year Round Stewardship Development, will be available for churches to use in keeping Christian Stewardship before the people all through the year.

Therefore, we recommend:

1—That our churches, the churches of the Beulah Baptist Association, focus attention upon world missions by observing October as Cooperative Program month. Through this means, we recommend to the churches of the Association to use Wednesday prayer services as an opportunity to pray for world mission needs.

2—That each church in the Beulah Association put the Cooperative Program in the church budget on the percentage plan.

3—That the Two-Plus Plan be used, by which a church gives at least two per cent more of the total church budget to missions, through the Cooperative Program.

4—And that the churches of this Association select the Stewardship Program best fitting its needs and use that program for its promotional plan. The plans available are: Forward Program of Christian Stewardship; and Growth In Christian Stewardship.

Hospital Report

Baptist hospitals are concrete demonstrations of a Christian response to human need. They came into being as a result of the teaching and example of Jesus, the Great Physician. They are channels of communicating the Gospel to the sick and troubled, and to their anxious families and friends. They are evidence of Baptist concern to experiences of disease, disability and death.

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At this time there are 48 Baptist hospitals located from Miami, Florida, to Yuma, Arizona, and from Kansas City, Missouri, to San Antonio, Texas. Most of these are owned and operated by State Conventions of Southern Baptists. The ownership of some is in the hands of local associations. Southern Baptist Hospital in New Orleans and Baptist Memorial Hospital in Jacksonville are owned by all Southern Baptists and operated in their behalf by a Southern Baptist Convention agency.

During the year covered by this report, the Convention's hospitals operated at near-capacity. The combined total of 800 beds were occupied by 35,953 patients. An average of 97 new patients were admitted each day.

More than 1500 individuals received part-pay care in the two institutions during the year. Cared for without charge by staff physicians, these people were encouraged to pay hospital costs as they were able, and they did so. Still, the net cost of this program amounted to \$429,570. The allocation of \$25,000 from the Convention Cooperative Budget was applied fully to these costs, leaving a balance of over \$400,000 to be supplied from other sources, mainly operating income of the hospital.

On the larger scene, all Baptist hospitals reported charity services totaling in excess of six million dollars during 1962. To meet these needs, all Southern Baptists supplied their hospitals with slightly more than one million dollars. It becomes obvious that Baptists should do more through their Cooperative Program giving or through their Mother's Day Offerings where these are taken.

Baptist Memorial Hospital has received intensive study throughout the year. Chairman Hardy Harrell of the Jacksonville Administrative Committee and Administrator Lawrence R. Payne have led in surveys that indicate the need to proceed with long-range development of the institution into a medical center complex. Whether this should be attempted is under active consideration; confidence has been expressed that doubling present capacity would likely not meet even current needs.

Lest too much emphasis be given to projects and buildings, statistics and dollars, a final word should recall that through their hospitals, Southern Baptists minister to PEOPLE. Hospital personnel are mindful that, along with skill, Christian compassion requires large resources in understanding and faith. This degree of concern for each and every patient and his family makes a very Christian difference.

Regarding our own annual hospital offering on "Mother's Day", Beulah Association gave more last year than ever, totaling \$467.68 with 13 churches participating with a one-fourth increase, our largest year in some time. For the 18 Associations participating the total was \$53,375. Our Association is urged to participate 100 per cent in the next Mother's Day Offering.

Children's Home Report

Our Children's Home continues to render distinct services to the needy families of our state. Assistance was given to 436 children during the year. There were 190 in the Home at Lakeland and Miami. There were 52 on Mother's Aid and four in foster home care. Caseworkers had 740 interviews with children and 439 with parents

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and relatives. They made 31 visits to those receiving Mother's Aid and 15 visits to the homes of those who had been discharged.

Mother's Aid is one of the most satisfactory and successful methods of child care. Under this plan the children remain at home with their mother who is given financial assistance. A Caseworker visits the home at least once each quarter during the year and counsels with the mother and the children.

This type of assistance is dependent upon the cooperation of the parent with the policies of the Home, which require that the children attend and become a part of the local church and its services. They also must attend school when possible.

Some children need more personal attention than is available in group living. These are placed in foster homes that will give them Christian training. All foster homes and children in their care are supervised by workers from Lakeland or the Miami branch.

The children under supervision last year were principally from homes broken by illness, a lack of strength of the parent to carry the responsibility of family life, inability to provide competent support for the family, desertion, and divorce. When rehabilitation can be achieved or the parent becomes well enough to assume family responsibility, they are reunited and supervised as long as the workers think necessary.

The women's organizations, Missionary Circles, Sunday School classes, and Training Unions provide some help by giving spending money, clothing, and other personal needs of the children. This is an excellent way to foster and maintain an interest between the members of our churches and the Home. Interest in a child is as important to those who are giving as to the child himself. It teaches him that others are interested in him and want to help him. Children learn best by personal relationship with Christian adults, and those who give to help him are enriched more than the child.

State, Home, and Foreign Missions Report

State Missions

Your state missions program is seeking, in every area, to maintain a growth pattern in keeping with the increasing needs of our state. Since Florida is the fastest growing state in the Southern Baptist Convention, this becomes an increasingly difficult problem.

Our field of state missions has entered some new fields and moved up in other areas. We are able to say in the spirit of the apostle Paul, "I am become all things to all men, that I may by all means save some."

One of the areas of advancement that needs the attention of us all is the starting of new missions and churches. The New Work Revolving Fund is available to the cooperating churches of Florida as a financial help for such mission endeavors. In 1964, we will seek to start 290 missions, which will help us reach our goal of 1000 new missions during the Baptist Jubilee Advance.

This year a new mission endeavor was begun with the purchase of property on Lake Yale which will be developed into a camping program for Florida Baptists. Through the State Mission program we desire to serve all the churches in Florida, and advance the kingdom of God through Evangelism, Brotherhood, Training Union, Sunday School, Music, Student Work, Woman's Missionary Union, Education, Child Care, Ministry to the Retired, and countless other ways. Your prayers and support of the State Mission program are urgently requested.

Home Missions

Southern Baptist mission forces reported approximately 5,000 missions and churches started in 1962 as a part of the convention's effort to organize 30,000 missions and churches by 1964. A total of 19,117 units have started since 1956.

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Nearly 850 Cubans have been resettled through the efforts of the Southern Baptist Churches as of May, 1963; and thousands have been assisted with food and clothing in Miami.

There are now 738 Southern Baptist ministers serving as chaplains in the military, hospitals, industry, and institutions.

More than 2,100 missionaries now serve with the Home Mission Board. These missionaries reported 48,700 conversions last year. There were also 595 student summer workers who served.

One of the best years of service is reported by the Home Mission Board.

Foreign Missions

Statistical figures can never tell the story of missionary labor; they can only give some idea of the visible evidences which have come about. Let us note some of these evidences of work. There are now 1,685 foreign missionaries in active service as of May, 1963. Southern Baptists now have missionaries under appointment to 53 political entities.

Mission work is carried on through a varying number of institutions on each mission field — churches, schools, hospitals, publication plants and good will centers. The goal of each is evangelism.

The Foreign Mission Board magazine, "The Commission", reported an average circulation of 90,000 last year.

If state, home, and foreign missions is to have the impact upon our world that it should have it will take deep dedication, patience, forbearance and long-suffering.

Woman's Missionary Union Report

The way W.M.U. carried out the theme for the year, "Sharing Christ With The Whole World", was through visitations, prayer for the lost and the missionaries, both home and foreign, and through the giving of tithes and offerings.

Forty-nine W.M.U. members received Cards of Accreditation at a Leadership Course which was held at the First Baptist with Miss Jones and other state workers teaching.

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There were four Associational W.M.U. meetings and one special meeting to elect the 1963-64 officers. Two collections were taken; one was sent to Miss Rita Copeland during her sickness and the other one to help out on the expenses of the GA camp.

The Associational GA was organized in March with 162 girls attending for the week end at Middle Florida Assembly Grounds. Miss Willene Devane from Parkview Church was elected president. At this meeting 31 girls professed Christ as Personal Saviour and 51 rededications. Revs. Ben Borders, Edgar Wilkerson, I. K. Clements, and Harold F. Green were the speakers. Mrs. Ted Jones of Mayo, Mrs. Edgar Wilkerson, and Mrs. Eleanor Lyons taught the GA Manuals. The GA uniform was approved; green pleated skirts and white shirt blouses with the GA sew-on-badge. They have had two regular meetings and presided at the WMU Youth Rally at which meeting Miss Laura Mimbs from Oak Grove and a GA at Westside was elected 1963-64 president. The Pearl Todd YWA was organized and Miss Gloria Dicks of Hopeful was elected president for 1963-64.

Our theme for 1963-64 is "Liberty And Light". With your prayers and cooperation the Lord will magnify the WMU work so that many a lost person will have "Liberty" (freedom from sin), and "Light" (Jesus Christ).

Music Report

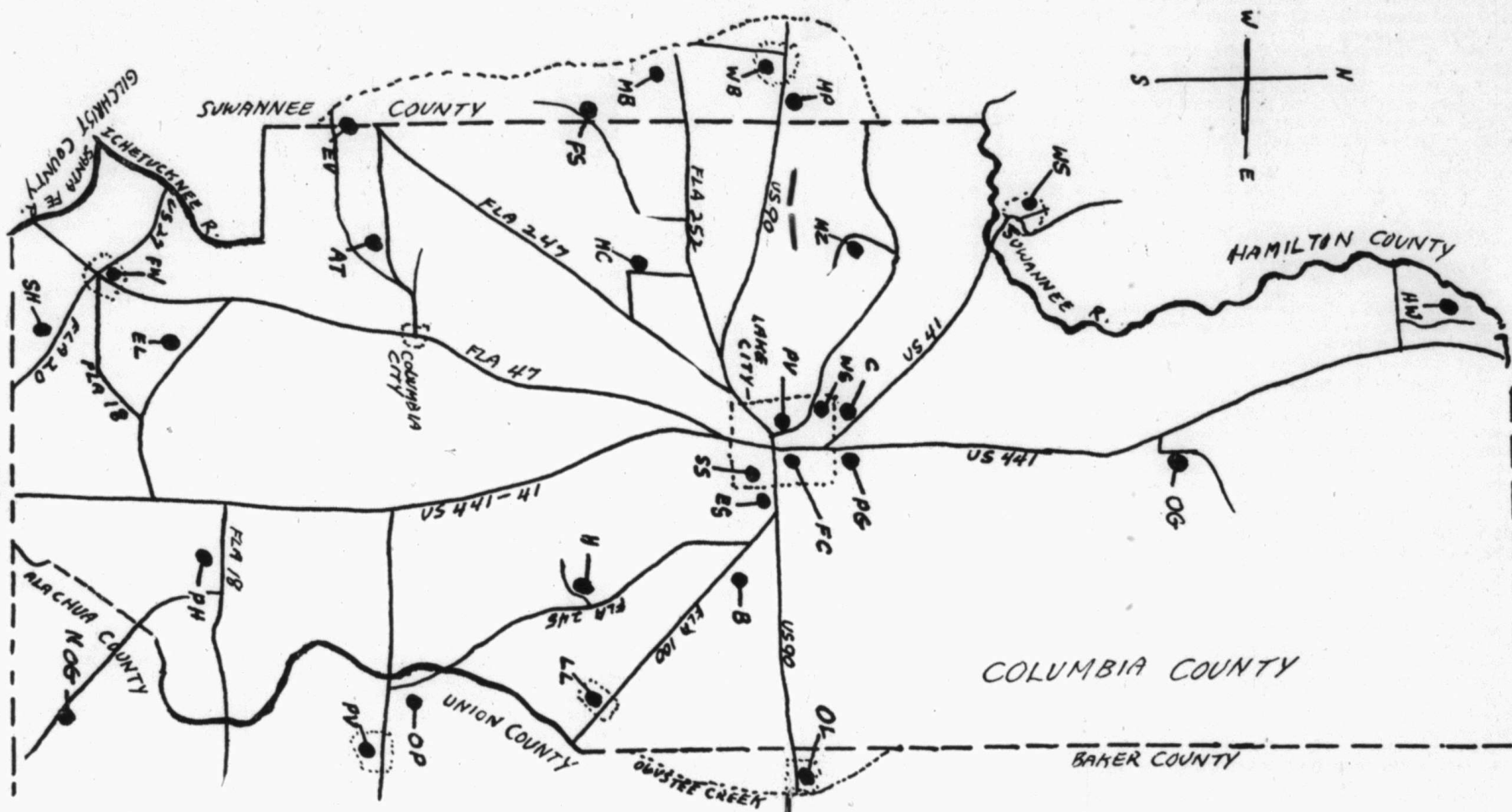
There were some 375 churches in music training out of approximately 1500 churches in the state during 1962-63. Beulah Association held an Associational School of Music at Lake City First Church during the week of August 18, 1963. Approximately 45 persons from ten of the churches in the Association participated in this school. Several churches in the Association held Church Schools of Music during the year. Thirty-four music awards were received in our Association during the past year.

This past year 43 out of 47 Associations, in our state, held Associational Festivals. Two hundred and fifty-five churches participated in the festivals with 602 choral groups, totaling 12,544 choir members, 207 hymn players, 50 song leaders and one instrumental ensemble with seven participating. Our Associational Festival was held at Lake City First Church on January 27, 1963 with one song leader, five hymn players, and six choral groups with a total of 98 choir members. We plan to hold the next festival at Lake City First Church on January 28, 1964.

The 1963 report of the State Festivals is as follows: 322 choral group with 7,229 members, 146 hymn players, 31 song leaders, and one instrumental ensemble with eight members. There were a grand total of 7,414 individuals from 153 churches participating. Our Association participated in the State Festival held at the Lake City First Church and will participate in the State Festival to be held at First Baptist Church in Perry February 14-15, 1964.

Executive Committee Report

In its Bylaws, the Beulah Baptist Association charges its Executive Committee with these responsibilities: (1) To carry out the will of the Association as expressed in its annual session; (2) To transact all business of the Association ad interim; and (3) To correlate and coordinate all the Associational activities. This bylaw also provides that the Executive Committee meet at least once a quarter.

During the 1962-63 year your Executive Committee has sought to carry out these directives. The Committee has met every month. Page Twenty-Two

The place of meetings has varied during the year. Each meeting has been begun with a devotional, including prayer. After the minutes of the previous meeting are read and approved, reports are called for from the elected leaders of every phase of Associational life, as well as reports from special committees that may have been appointed for specific purposes. The Treasurer's report is presented at each meeting. Thus we have sought to keep abreast with and correlate and promote all the Associational activities.

In addition to the routine reports and committee work, there have been some matters of special interest dealt with. These include:

1. In the October, 1962 meeting, a proposal was made to open a Stetson University Extension Center. It was favorably received at this meeting; but at a subsequent meeting it was decided that it would be best not to enter into this program at this time.

2. In the November, 1962 meeting, Bro. C. R. Roberts reported for the committee on the matter of the Mason City School property. This matter continued through several months. The committee was enlarged and authorized to make the Columbia County School Board a bid. This was done; but the bid was not accepted and other disposition was made by the School Board of the property.

3. Upon approval of the Executive Committee in its January meeting a committee was appointed to plan for a Semi-Annual meeting of the Association. The date, April 29, 1963, was set. An interesting program was planned, which included the election of officers for the coming Associational Year, and a masterful address on the Prominent Place of the District Association in Baptist Life was brought by Dr. W. G. Stracenor, Editor of the Florida Baptist Witness. This was a highlight of our Associational year. There were 17 churches represented, with 92 persons present. It is hoped that this Semi-Annual meeting will be continued.

4. Another program that was considered and finally postponed until a later date was an Associational Sunday School Enlargement Campaign. This was to have been a Pastor led Enlargement Campaign. Due to the approach of summer, for this proposal was made at the April meeting, it was almost impossible to get sustained interest in this project, and so in the July meeting the Executive Committee decided that it would be best to postpone this program.

4. Radio and Television Report by Rev. E. W. Wilkerson.

Radio And Television Report

Radio and television have been given to the church of Christ as powerful tools of mass communication — media through which the saving Gospel can be brought into the hearts of great numbers of people over vast areas.

For the first time in the history of the world as we know it, it is possible to reach virtually every person with the Good News of our

Lord Jesus Christ. In our own country there are 49,800,000 television homes (nearly 91 per cent of all homes). There are 51,690,000 radio homes (nearly 94 per cent of all homes).

The Commission had a banner year in 1962, with continued recognition from the radio and television industry in terms of increased time allocations. This applied both to network time and to independent station time.

In the area of radio there was a net gain of 244 stations carrying Southern Baptist programs in 1962 for the greatest annual increase and the highest station total in the Commission's history.

The Commission currently services a total of 1220 radio and television stations weekly (plus 205 Armed Forces Network radio outlets) with a dozen different weekly radio programs and a weekly television series.

The Commission's constant effort is to meet the needs of stations and to provide new and different religious programming. By so doing, Southern Baptists' agency for radio and television is able to get its figurative foot in the door. Following the initial programming in an area, there is often an opportunity to add another program. An evangelistic program such as "The Baptist Hour" is always pushed into the opening, or "La Hora Bautista" for Spanish speaking areas.

An up-to-date accounting of the annual value of the time given Commission-produced Southern Baptist programs throughout the nation shows it comes to the astounding figure of \$3,701,988. This does not include the 93 stations overseas which receive our programs.

5. Publications Report by Rev. O. W. Hall.

Publications Report

"Forasmuch as many have taken in hand to set forth in order a declaration of those things which are most surely believed among us . . . it seemed good to me also . . . to write . . . that thou mightest know the certainty of those things, wherein thou hast been instructed." These excerpts from Luke 1:1-4 set the pattern for the writing of the Gospel that the early Christians might be more perfectly instructed in their faith.

First, the vital importance of our Baptist literature — These same words seem an appropriate background for the work of those who edit and publish Baptist literature that has become vitally important to our Christian living and to our churches and denomination. Not only do these publications seek to instruct us more perfectly in our faith and doctrines, but they become a vital stream of valuable information about the religious and moral trends in our swiftly changing world. These same publications become tools of evangelism, missions and stewardship, both in the churches and in the missions established by them.

Second, our attention is called to the quality of literature — One will not find any denomination's literature surpassing that of Southern Baptists in its quality, attractiveness, doctrinal soundness and ease of understanding.

Third, the increase in publication and circulation — Southern Baptists continue to increase and speed up their publication efforts and the circulation of their periodicals just as rapidly as our constituency will use the publications. For example, during nine months of 1962 (the fiscal year was changed) the Sunday School Board printed and mailed to the users in 50 states and 92 foreign countries 63,003,152 copies of its periodicals, 1,521,149 copies of new books and related items, 151,817,875 reprints of similar old items, and 11,520,615 Baptist bulletins.

The other boards, agencies, and auxiliaries of the Southern Baptist Convention have growing subscriber lists for their particular periodicals such as The Commission (foreign missions journal),

Home Missions Magazine, Brotherhood Journal, Ambassador Life, and all the Woman's Missionary Union publications.

The 28 Baptist state papers, at the 1963 Convention in Kansas City, reported a total circulation of 1,513,194 copies per issue as of January 1, 1963. Thus, of the state papers alone, some 78,000,000 copies were mailed last year.

This report shows increase of our own state paper, The Florida Baptist Witness, as of August 1, 1963, which is going into 65,189 homes in 895 different churches, with 759 of these churches using the budget plan for at least a portion of their membership.

We would like to urge every church which now sends the Witness into only part of its homes to enlarge its subscription list to include every resident family, and every church which does not now have the Witness in its church budget to promptly consider sending the paper into the homes of all its members.

There is no more speedy or economical means toward a better informed, more completely enlisted, more thoroughly generous, more genuinely missionary membership than for a church to send the Baptist Witness to every family in its membership through the simple church budget subscription plan.
