CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

SECTION ONE

Article 1. This body shall be known as the Beulah Baptist Association.

Article 2. In expressing its conception of Bible doctrine this body shall be guided by the New Hampshire Confession of Faith as revised and adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention in 1925.

Article 3. This Association shall be composed of messengers selected by churches affiliated with this Association and in harmony with its basic statement of faith and practice.

Article 4. The purpose of this Association shall be to promote unity and brotherly love among the churches, and to help the churches through appropriate organizations: to develop their members in the christian faith; to promote the full propagation of the gospel; and to extend their own faith to the ends of the earth through world missions. This Association shall not lord it over God's heritage, nor infringe upon any of the internal rights of churches, but shall act only as an advisory body.

Article 5. The Association shall meet annually at such time and place as shall be agreed upon by the body. An annual Sermon shall be preached the first day and a Doctrinal Sermon the last day of any regular session. A called meeting may be held upon a majority vote of any regular meeting of the Executive Committee, provided that notice shall be given to the churches in writing thirty days prior to the date of any such called meeting stating the purpose of such meeting.

Article 6. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Vice Moderator, a Clerk, and a Treasurer. The Clerk and the Treasurer may request the Moderator to appoint an assistant to aid them in connection with the annual session. The officers shall be elected by nomination from the floor on the second day of the annual session of the Association, shall take office upon the close of the annual session, and shall continue until the close of the next annual session.

Article 7. The Executive Committee of the Association shall be composed of the active pastors of the affiliated churches, one layman from each of such churches who shall be elected by his church, and the presiding officer of each respective department of the Association, namely the Sunday School, the Training Union, the Brotherhood, the Woman's Missionary Union, the Music Ministry, and any departments which shall be hereafter added, together with the Moderator, the Vice Moderator, the Clerk, and the Treasurer. The Field Secretary resident within the district and serving under the Baptist State Convention shall be ex-officio member.

Article 8. Any church which shall be proven to be out of harmony with the basic principles of faith and practice of the Association and which shall persist in failure to respond to efforts at reconciliation shall by three-fourths majority vote be excluded from further affiliation with the Association. It shall not later be returned to affiliation except upon unanimous approval of the Association.

Article 9. This Constitution and By Laws may be amended by two-thirds majority vote at any annual session, provided: 1. that the desired change shall be presented in writing on the first day and decided during the second day of the annual meeting; and 2. that basic changes shall be presented to the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior to the annual session.

SECTION TWO: BY LAWS

Article 1. Churches desiring affiliation with this body and qualified under Article 3 of the Constitution shall send messengers and a petitionary letter to an annual session. Upon a majority vote of the body they shall become applicant members during the then current annual session. They shall become affiliate members upon unanimous vote at the next succeeding annual session.

Article 2. The Moderator shall preside at the annual and called sessions of the Association, shall preserve order and shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided. The Vice Moderator shall assist the Moderator, shall preside over the Association in the absence of, or at the request of the Moderator. The Clerk shall keep the records of the Association and supervise the printing and the distribution of the minutes. The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all associational funds as directed by the Association, and shall make a full report of all transactions to the annual Association.

Article 3. The Executive Committee shall be responsible for filling vacancies until the time for the next election, except that in case of a vacancy in the office of a Moderator the Vice Moderator shall automatically take office and a new Vice Moderator shall then be elected.

Article 4. The Executive Committee shall meet at least once each quarter for the following purposes: 1. to carry out the will of the Association as expressed in its annual or called sessions; 2. to transact all business of the Association ad interim; and, 3. to correlate and coordinate all the associational activities. The Moderator of the Association shall be ex-officio chairman of the Executive Committee and the associational Clerk shall serve as its secretary.

SECTION THREE: RULES OF DECORUM

Article 5. A member wishing to speak on any subject shall rise and address the Moderator. Upon being recognized he shall confine himself to the subject. He shall not be allowed to make an unkind allusion to any member while speaking.

Article 6. No motion shall be debated until seconded and stated by the Moderator or read by the Clerk.

Article 7. When a motion is under consideration no other motion shall be entertained except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend, to postpone indefinitely, or to call for the previous motion.

Article 8. A matter may be reconsidered only upon motion made by a member having voted with the majority thereto.

Article 9. Visiting brethren may speak on any subject upon recognition by the Moderator.

Article 10. No member shall speak more than twice on a subject without the consent of the Moderator, or upon appeal to the body.

Article 11. These Rules of Decorum may be altered or amended at any regular session of the Association by a majority vote of the members present.

Training Union Report

The Training Union Program in our association is now past history, and your associational director has found the program going on in a very good manner. Twenty churches were visited during the year and without exception the training unions were conducted according to the general procedures. In most cases unions were graded, however, in the smaller churches it has been the custom to group comparative ages making up strong unions instead of many weak ones.

Music Ministry Report

The objective of the Church Music Department of the Florida Baptist Convention is to assist churches and associations in establishing, conducting, enlarging, and improving the music program in the churches. This program includes assisting the church in performing its functions of worship, proclamation, education, and ministry; leading persons to participate in hymn singing; training persons to lead, sing, and play music; teaching music and hymnody; and providing and interpreting information regarding the work of the church and the denomination.

This past year the associational music ministry organization showed 42 out of 47 associations held Associational Festivals. 260 churches participated in the festivals with 617 choral groups, totaling 12,865 choir members — 159 hymn players — 36 song leaders — 6 instrumental ensembles with a total of 39 participants. (Our Associational Festival was held at First Baptist Church, Lake City, on January 26, 1964. We are planning to have a festival during January 1965.)

There will be 11 State Music Festivals in 1965. The 1964 report of the State Festivals is as follows: There were 283 choral groups with 6,376 members — 86 hymn players — 14 song leaders — 2 instrumental ensembles with 12 participants. A grand total of individuals participating in the State Festivals was 6,488. There were 152 churches participating and 385 certificates of award issued.

Two southwide music conferences were held during 1964. Approximately 500 from Florida attended along with more than 3,000 others throughout the south at Ridgecrest the week of June 25-July

1. More than 1200 attended Music Week at Glorieta July 16-22. Dates for 1965 are: Ridgecrest — July 1-7; Glorieta — July 15-21, 1965.

The associational music organization and the State Music Department wish to thank each church and its music leaders for a very fine year and wish for you another good year for "more and better music by more and better musicians, singing with grace in their hearts to the Lord".

Report of Field Secretary

District Four consists of four Associations; Beulah, Harmony, Lafayette and Suwannee; 95 Churches and 3 Missions. This is a revision of District Four as was previously arranged.

Your present Field Secretary began his work May 1, 1964 and moved on the Field June 15. He and his family are making their home in Lake City.

During these five months your Field Secretary has traveled 14,103 miles on the job, preached 68 sermons, visited 170 churches and missions, preached two revivals, taught in one Associational Sunday School Training School, attended Ridgecrest Church Programming Week, attended State Sunday School planning clinic, attended School of the Prophets and in addition attended various conferences and meetings, Associational, church and individual.

The most significant advance the District has made is the establishment of a District Missions office in Lake City. The purpose of this office is to better provide for the needs of the local church; to help the local church accomplish the task of World Missions more effectively; to make the Field Secretary and materials of all the agencies more accessible to the local church; to help unify the work that we may work together more effectively in helping each other.

Thank you for giving me the privilege of working with you. Thank you for the wonderful spirit that you have manifested toward your Field Secretary and his work. My desire is to be of service to you, to all of the churches of this district as we work together for the advancement of God's Kingdom, here at home and around the world.

Pray for me. Pray for all of our work. Let us pray for each other. There is a big job to be done and by God's Grace we would like to do our best.

Report Of The Executive Committee - 1964

In its constitution and bylaws the Beulah Baptist Association set up its Executive Committee to be composed of "the active pastors of the affiliated churches, one layman from each of such churches who shall be elected by his church, and the presiding officer of each respective department of the Association." The Association instructed its Executive Committee thus: "The Executive Committee shall meet at least once each quarter for the following purposes: 1. To carry out the will of the Association as expressed in its annual or called sessions; 2. To transact all business of the association ad interim; and 3. To correlate and coordinate all the associational activities."

In discharging these duties the Executive Committee met monthly during the past associational year. The place of meetings was set for churches in the Lake City area, in order that the Pastor's Conference, held on the same night preceding the Executive Committee, could meet and the distance would not be too great to get to the meeting of the Committee.

Each meeting was begun with a devotional period led by the host pastor or someone from the host church. Reports were heard from all phases of the work in our Association. The treasurer presented his report. These meetings were times of searching and inspiration and Christian fellowship. Attendance has been generally good. ALL of the churches need to be represented at these monthly meetings. They are not closed meetings and visitors are always welcome.

In addition to routine matters here are some of the interesting matters dealt with by your Executive Committee:

1. The question of sponsoring the Baptist Hour was constantly before the Committee. During the year individuals and Churches who were definitely interested in continuing the broadcast made special gifts, over and above their regular contributions to keep it on the air. We must reach a decision about this at this session.

2. At the November, 1963 meeting, Bro. Bob Galbraith of the office in Jacksonville, met with us to discuss the Sunday School Witnessing Campaign. The Executive Committee voted to enter into this effort and urged the Church to support it.

3. The highlight of February's meeting was a digest of associational reports compiled and presented by Bro. John Dicks. It was an enlightening and somewhat alarming presentation. We were shown that we were not doing much for the Lord in many areas.

Bro. LaVaughn Griffin was elected as Chairman of Evangelism for the Association succeeding Bro. Edgar Wilkerson, who resigned.

4. Bro. C. R. Roberts, Chairman of our Missions Committee of the Association, presented a report stating that a new Field Secretary had been called. He is the Rev. Ellis Turner, former pastor of the First Baptist Church, Monticello, Florida.

5. The Semi-Annual Meeting of the Association was the feature of the April meeting. Bro. Ellis Turner was our speaker. It was a miserable, rainy night, and we were disappointed by the small attendance.

6. In the July meeting the Executive Committee voted to pay the rent for the office of the Field Secretary. The office, to be located in Lake City, will be of great value to our association in that all sorts of promotional and devotional materials will be made available to the churches right here in our own area. The budget committee is recommending to this session that this office continue to be supported by our Association.

7. At the August meeting the committee instructed the clerk to write the Sheriff and County Judge urging them to carry out the recommendations of the Grand Jury regarding the sale of intoxicants on Sunday and Sunday hunting.

We are grateful for the fine group of laymen and pastors that comprise our Executive Committee. We invite any interested persons to drop in and visit with us. We meet on the fourth Monday night of each month.

A Report On The Florida Baptist Children's Home

The breakup of homes and the desertion of children has become altogether too common in our society. The sense of responsibility, if indeed many of our people have been taught any, has fled, and hundreds of children are deserted by one or both parents with little or no remorse for what they have done. The number of applications to our Children's Home during the spring and summer, indicate a turn for the worse in family relationships.

The Children's Home has four caseworkers, each of whom has graduated from an accredited school of social work. It is their business to counsel with children and parents, and in every case where good family life can be maintained, to keep them together. Their success is shown by the fact that 94 applications were withdrawn and 55 children were returned to their families or near relatives. 75 children were admitted to the Homes in Lakeland and Miami for a total of 188 in residential care and 64 assisted through the Mother's Aid program. 1,094 counseling sessions were held with children and 682 with relatives.

It is the right of every child to have his own home. It is the responsibility of every parent to care for his child to the best of his ability. In fact, when children are admitted to the Home, parents are asked to pay toward support of their children if at all possible. When parents are unable to care for their children, it becomes the privilege of an institution such as ours, to help. Many excellent men and women have spent some time or have been reared in our Children's Home. Those who are so unfortunate as to need the help because of the breakup of their own home, should be given assistance if possible.

If the members of our churches would give 2 cents a week for child care, we could double the number we are now helping, and who knows but that some of those children might be ours.

We trust you will place the poster for the Thanksgiving offering in a prominent place in your church so that those who wish to help in the care of our children, may be prepared when the offering is taken.

I move the adoption of this written report Bro. Moderator.

4. Baptist Foundation Report, L. L. Parker, Old Poyvidence. Report adopted.

Report Of The Florida Baptist Foundation

The Florida Baptist Foundation is an agency of the Florida Baptist Convention, concerned with the support of all causes supported by the convention. It has had another good year of service.

Again, every agency and institution supported by the Convention has been named in Wills prepared by the Foundation, and again this total amount goes over a Million Dollars.

The Foundation is concerned with assisting in the preparation of Wills favoring Baptist causes, and setting up trusts and establishing endowments. The Foundation works in two fields: First, it seeks to acquaint our Baptist People with the advantages of Wills, Trusts, and Direct Gifts. Second, it invests the funds coming to it with regard to safety, and return on investment.

The Audit of September 30, 1963 shows \$863,825.68 held by the Foundation in various funds. The Foundation owns none of this money, but holds it in Trust for the various institutions favored in Wills, or by gifts. All of this money must be handled as specified in the Will or Agreement.

The trust department of one of Florida's largest banks is Custodian of a large part of our investments, and makes recommendations concerning investments to our Investment Committee of the Trustees. The Investment Committee reviews the recommendations

in the light of other information and makes the final decision on investments.

The Trustees of the Foundation are elected by the Convention. At present we have thirteen outstanding businessmen and two pastors. The Trustees meet annually to receive reports from Committees, and determine general policies, or can be called at any time as necessary.

The Executive Committee, which is the Investment Committee, serves in operational matters, and meets quite regularly. The Trustees serve without compensation, and pay their own expenses in connection with all meetings.

At present the Foundation has been assigned the job of raising \$1,500,000 for Stetson University, and \$500,000 for the Baptist Bible Institute. The Stetson money will be matched by the Ford Foundation, and again by the Trustees of Stetson, making a total of \$4,500,000 for Stetson University. Good progress has been shown.

It is suggested that each church share its responsibility in this effort by placing the Christian Education Campaign in its budget to the amount of \$2.00 per resident member per year for three years. We can reach the total goal in this manner. Many churches have already responded, and it is hoped that every church will have a part.

Serving with the Executive Secretary of the Foundation are: Dr. James A. Sawyer, Pastor First Baptist Church, Cocoa, Chairman of the Church Committee, and Cecil B. Carroll, Jacksonville, Chairman of the Laymans Committee, and Regional Chairman have been selected by these chairmen.

If the Foundation can be of service in any of the ways listed above, feel free to call on it.

5. Radio and Television Commission Report. Rev. Paul Day, Southside.
—With a recommendation concerning the Baptist Hour Program.

1964 Annual Report Of The Radio And Television Commission Of The Southern Baptist Convention, Dr. Paul M. Stevens, Director

"Growth" is the key word in any conversation concerning Southern Baptists' Radio and Television Commission. Annual expansion in all areas of endeavor is now accepted as a characteristic of this agency.

Thus, breaking ground for a new and functional headquarters building in Fort Worth in June proved a highlight of 1964 for the Commission and for all Southern Baptists. The structure will be dedicated during the 1965 Convention to be held in Dallas, with completion expected the following October.

The high quality of radio and television programming carried on by the Commission has resulted in increased acceptance of Southern Baptist programs, with a net gain of 73 stations for the first six months of 1964. The agency now services with its programs an all-time high of 1450 radio and television stations each week.

The commercial value of air time given Southern Baptists by U.S. stations is expected to reach close to an estimated \$4 million this year. And this doesn't include 121 overseas stations which broadcast the denomination's programs.

This year sees an increase of more than 60 per cent in the time allocation made to the Commission and hence to Southern Baptists by the three major networks, NBC, CBS and ABC.

High point of the network year was the presentation by the National Broadcasting Co. of "Walk Beside Me," color film on the life and ministry of the Apostle Paul. It was the first hour-length special of this type ever presented on TV by Southern Baptists.

Close to 100 stations carried the program at prime time to a potential audience of millions.

Another such special film is currently in production by NBC and the Commission tracing archaeologically the beginnings of the Bible and Christianity. It will be shown in the spring of '65.

Still on the subject of television, 13 new films will be launched on "The Answer" series in January. Nine are dramatic, dealing with a variety of contemporary problems with solutions in Christ, and four are documentaries detailing facets of Southern Baptist mission work. Televangelism, the project which combines church visitation, television viewing and personal witnessing, will be continued for the seventh year as a beneficial use of TV.

Of the 13 programs produced and distributed by the Commission, "The Baptist Hour" is the oldest and is on the largest number of stations — 522. "Master-Control", a variety program of interviews, music and gospel, is on 299. "The Answer" on television is aired by an average of 193 throughout the year.

Other programs and the number of stations are: "Patterns" — 170; "International Sunday School Lesson" — 89; "La Hora Bautista" — 63; "Moments of Meditation" — 30; "Momentos de Meditacion" — 25; "Control*Central" — 41; "Music To Remember" — 46 monaural, 39 stereo; "Voice of Hope" (Chinese) — 15; "Voice of Peace" (Russian) — 4; "The Living Water" (Navajo) — 4.

New radio programs planned for production during 1964 schedule include: "Threshold," a program of youth counseling; "Night Light," 1½ minute inspirational spots to be used between midnight and 6:00 a.m.; and "Youth Speaks To You," a quarter hour program by high school students to high school students, five days a week.

New television programs to begin this year are: "Jot," a children's program; "Journey To Adventure," 15 minute Bible land films; "The Secret Place," a children's program; "A.D.," variety format; and a series of one-minute gospel capsules on film.

Dr. Herschel H. Hobbs has continued to grow in popularity as the radio preacher of "The Baptist Hour." His expository, Scripture-centered messages have established this broadcast anew as the flagship of Southern Baptist Programming.

In addition to preaching the Good News of Jesus Christ in so many varied ways, the Commission also continues to fulfill other vital functions of audience building, counseling by mail, and technical assistance to pastors and missionaries.

It is recommended that we place the Baptist Hour in our regular budget and ask churches to support the total Associational budget.

American Bible Society Report

The American Bible Society has approved as its slogan, "God's Word For A New Age". This program of advance received the approval of the representatives from fifty-five denominations in this country that supports the society.

The major aim for this slogan, "God's Word For A New Age", will be the increase of complete Bibles distributed around the world annually to 150,000,000 copies by 1966. This will be more than three times the number being distributed now.

In 1963, the society distributed Bibles in more than 120 different countries written in 300 languages, besides portions of scripture and new testaments numbering into millions around the world. We are told that there are 1000 tongues or languages that have no Bible translation into their language.

One of the great problems of increasing Bible knowledge is that we have millions of people in our world that cannot read. In order to solve this problem the society is sending into these places inexpensive phonographs with Bible recordings that have proven to be very successful in giving people the word of God.

May we remember that God has said that His world would not return into Him void, therefore, we should rejoice that we have a part in this great work through our cooperative program.

Therefore we recommend that our churches support the society.

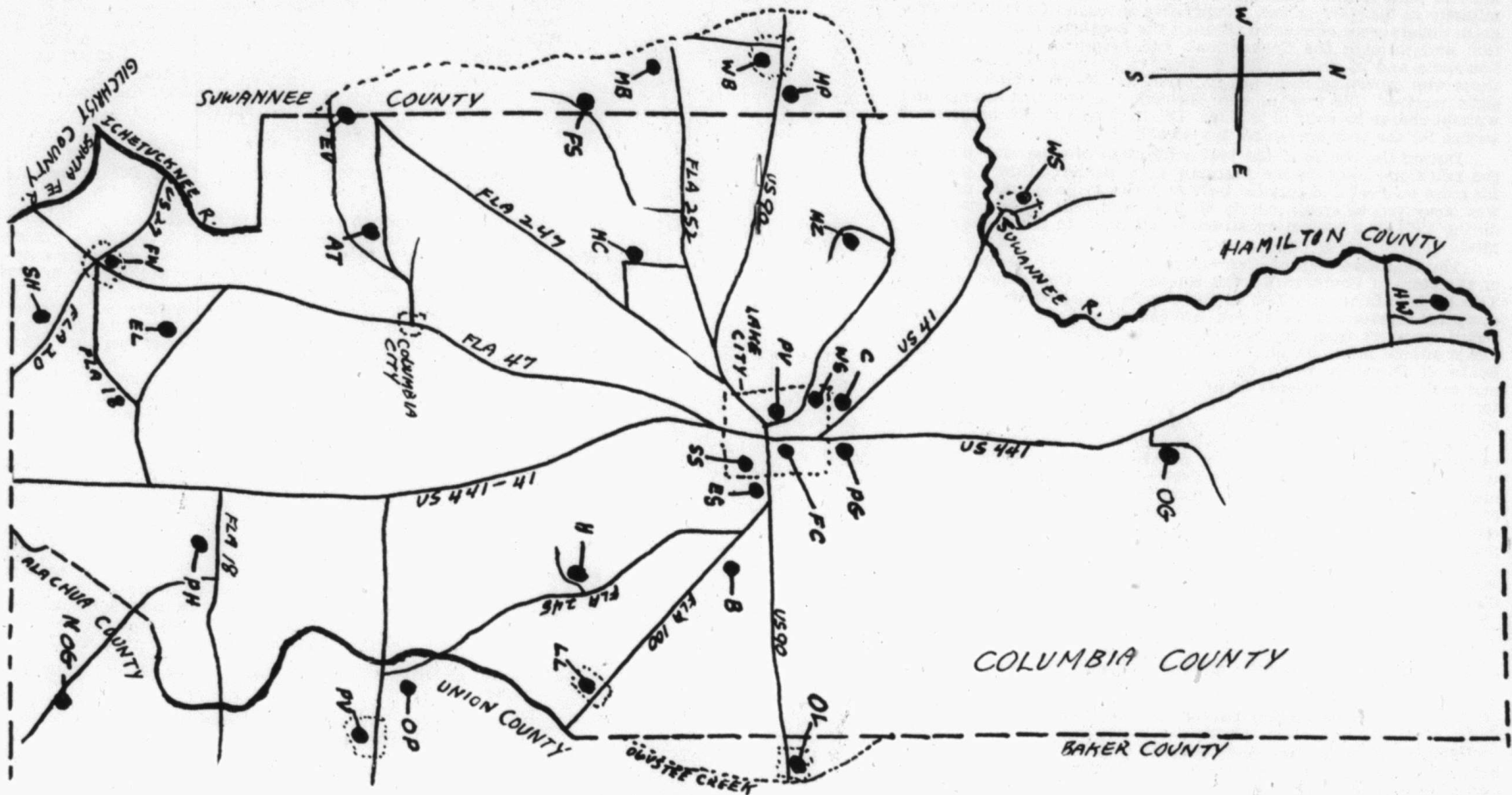

Hospital Report

Southern Baptists now have 51 hospitals. In a definition of purpose endorsed by Baptist hospitals it is stated that "a Baptist hospital functions as an instrument of God's grace in the enriching and prolonging of human life within the scope of Divine Providence".

Within the year covered by this report more than a half-million individuals have been cared for in Baptist hospitals. Many of these could pay only a portion of the cost of their care. These have been ministered to "in Jesus' name" and in the name of Southern Baptists with competence, skill, and dignity. The cost of their care has been borne only fractionally by support from the denomination; the remainder has had to be provided from other sources, including special offerings such as the Mothers Day offering in Northeast Florida for the Jacksonville Baptist Hospital.

Because the Southern Baptist Convention operates two hospitals directly, every Southern Baptist participates in some measure in the life and work of these institutions whether there is a Baptist hospital ministry in his state or not. Twenty-five thousand Cooperative Program dollars were channeled through the Southern Baptist Convention and through the Convention's two hospitals, New Orleans, Louisiana and in Jacksonville, Florida, to the service of caring for those who otherwise could not be cared for. Eleven hundred forty-eight received this type of care through the two institutions and without charge by staff physicians. The total cost of this program of service for the year amounted to \$463,478.

During the course of the year realization of expansion plans in the two Convention-owned hospitals drew nearer. Under pressure for more medical and surgical beds in Jacksonville, a crash program was conceived to create nearly 90 new such beds to be completed during 1964 in a temporary structure attached to the present hospital.

The Southern Baptist Convention elects the 40-member Board of Directors of Southern Baptist Hospitals, the Convention agency. This is the number specified by the charter under which the agency operates. Eighteen of the 40 men are elected as local Administrative Board members from the New Orleans and Jacksonville areas. Between annual meetings, an Executive Committee elected by the full Board of Directors meets quarterly to handle corporate business and make policy decisions. Southern Baptists can well be grateful for the two service institutions through which they extend a compassionate hand and heart in the care of the sick and troubled.

Over the next several years both Convention hospitals will be under the added strain of creating new facilities, expanding old services, and yet maintaining a consistently high quality of patient care under sometimes adverse circumstances. Especially during this period of growth and development, hospital personnel along with the responsible Board of Directors solicits the continued and earnest prayers of Southern Baptists everywhere. With God's help, and the prayerful intercession of Southern Baptists, lives that are being prolonged shall be more helpfully enriched through the experiences of illness and suffering, interpreted in the light of the Gospel.

1964 Annual State Missions Report

Often our executive secretary-treasurer, Dr. John Maguire, speaks of Florida as a "Mission Field". Truer words were never spoken! With our expanding population in the Sunshine State the need is ever greater. With the passing of each year more churches are needed, more missions, etc.

The strength of our work is dependent upon the continued and the increased response of our churches in cooperative giving. The hearts of men may be touched by God, but they will never be able to go unless we supply the means for going. All missions wait on our giving. It is hoped that every church in the Beulah Baptist Association will increase its giving through the Cooperative Program in the coming year. This can be done with consistent monthly giving rather than single contributions at one time in the year. Keep the missions needs before your church and send mission monies into the state office at regular intervals throughout the year.

The one single major project demanding our attention at the present is the Lake Yale Assembly. The GA Camp is under construction with the RA Camp soon to follow. Both of these camps may be in use by 1965. Recently the State Board voted to proceed with the assembly program at Lake Yale. The first expenditure will be approximately \$500,000. When this entire assembly is completed the capacity will be for 1,000 people.

The Convention has also voted to begin a junior college program and plans are now being made by the Education Committee of the Convention to bring a definite report to the Convention when it meets in Tampa next month.

Home Missions Report

It has been stated, "As go the homes, goes the nation". It should be just as true, "As goes America, goes the world". This means it is imperative that America be thoroughly Christian. God has given Southern Baptists the Home Mission Board to aid the churches in this prime objective.

This past year, Dr. Courts Redford, who has served our Home Mission Board so faithfully, retired. He did not leave without saying to Southern Baptists, "This is Home Missions' most urgent hour. The entire world looks to America for Christian leadership, but America cannot give what she does not continue to have."

Fourteen programs of work were adopted by the Board at its midyear meeting, becoming effective January 1, 1965. They are church extension, associational administration services, pioneer missions, language missions, church loans, chaplaincy, metropolitan missions, urban-rural missions, Jewish work, mission center work, National Baptists, evangelism, survey and special studies, and special mission ministries.

We are glad to report that through the Home Mission enterprise 2,299 missionaries serve in every state, Cuba, Panama, and Puerto Rico. An average of 30 missionaries was appointed each month last year. Critical personnel needs exist in mission center and Spanish-language work.

There were 46,226 professions of faith reported by the missionary force. This was a decrease from the 48,700 reported the previous year and reflected a like percentage decrease within the Convention, which reported 355,325 baptisms.

More than \$6½ million came from Southern Baptists for home missions through the Cooperative Program, the Annie Armstrong Offering, and from other sources of income. This amounted to about 62 cents for each Southern Baptist, a nickel per month.

New work and the pioneer areas received increasing support as the older and stronger states took additional financial responsibility. Two-thirds of the more than \$4 million spent by the Missions Division went to the newer states. Also most of the \$6½ million loaned 479 churches in 1963 went to pioneer areas.

The Church Extension program is receiving increased emphasis in preparation for its role as the major vehicle to continue the 30,000 movement. The 30,000 movement, in its climatic year in 1964, reported by January 1 that 5,884 churches and 16,016 missions had been started.

Six hundred and forty-five student summer missionaries served ten weeks in every state and Panama during the twentieth year of the ministry. Seven hundred and fifty Southern Baptist Chaplains presently serve in the military or with hospitals, industry, and other institutions.

The Latin American Refugee Resettlement ministry aided churches to resettle 450 persons, bringing to 1,100 the number assisted by Southern Baptists.

Mission opportunities in Puerto Rico were studied, and the Board voted to support mission work on a limited basis in 1964. The new executive secretary for this work is Florida's own Milton Leach who served ten years in the Spanish work of the Miami area.

Cuba and Panama work has been interrupted by the political situation, Redford reported in May. Most of the churches in Cuba continue to function; seminary enrollment is larger; and though two missionaries were forced to leave during the year, others remain at work. In Panama the work was temporarily interrupted but all workers are back on the field. Track distribution has been curtailed in Cuba and has become largely a state mission function of our Convention territory.

Language instruction for missionaries has been emphasized by the Board in sending missionaries to study in Italy, Brazil, and special schools in the United States. A language instruction center was established for Spanish in San Antonio.

Educating Church Members In Missions, a plan to confront every Southern Baptist with the mission story, has been developed and stressed by the Division of Education and Promotion. This plan shows the church has a year-round emphasis can be given to Mission education, so the church member will have a conception that will lead to a commitment to missions, in both activities and in money.

The stake of home missions must be strengthened if the cords of foreign missions are to be lengthened and firmly established. This can best be done by giving whole-hearted support to our Home Mission Board and its work. This is God's way of blessing His people as He uses them to bless the world. The Lord is the same and the pattern is the same as to Abraham our father of faith. God says to us as to Him, "I will bless thee, . . . thou shalt be a blessing". (Gen. 12:2).

Cooperative Program And Stewardship Report

Missions depend on the reaction of the individual Christian to the responsibility he has been given in the Bible. God made some pronouncements in the Old Testament, and Jesus built on these in the New Testament. One of the fundamental pronouncements of the Old Testament had to do with possessions. The tithe, or one-tenth of all a man had, was required of him. It is the same today. God has made it very clear that everyone is expected to tithe.

For a good many years now, we have been using the slogan, "Every Baptist a Tither", but this is somewhat general. Even though every Baptist tithing is our goal, we are not moving too rapidly toward its accomplishment. In Florida, according to best reports, we have 16.3 per cent of our Baptist Church members tithing. This adds up to 89,558 people. This is a very small number when we think of the 543,676 church members in our state.

At the May 8 meeting of the State Board of Missions, a goal was approved to seek to add 50,000 new tithers to this number during the period April 1, 1965 to March 31, 1966. This will be in cooperation with Southern Baptist efforts to add 2,000,000 new tithers during this same period. This represents a 10 per cent increase in tithers for Florida Baptists.

The response of churches in the Beulah Association to this tithing campaign is important. We are suggesting a goal of 10 per cent based on the church membership listed in the 1963 Florida Baptist Annual. This would be 530 for the association.

We urge you . . . "Begin To Tithe In '65". The Cooperative Program depends on your stewardship.

Annuity Board Report

Every pastor, church and denominational employee is eligible for the new group term Life Benefit Plan being offered by the Annuity Board, regardless of whether they are a member of one of the Board's retirement plans. The Board is currently in a campaign to enlist the 3,000 members needed to put the Life Benefit Plan into effect, and hopes to have it in operation by October 1 of this year.

The new Plan provides low cost life protection to members while in active service, during disability or in actual age retirement. Cost is only 1 per cent of the annual salary basis, with minimum basis of participation set at \$4,000 and maximum at \$12,000. Minimum payments will be \$3.34 a month and maximum payments, \$10.00. Car expense, housing and utility allowance, etc., may be added to the cash salary to allow the member to pay on a larger amount. All participation is on even thousands, and the cost remains the same every year unless the member's salary increases and he wants to increase payments accordingly.

The widow or beneficiary of a member 45 or under will receive 2½ times his salary basis of participation in the event of his death. Thus the widow of a man 44 years of age who was paying on a \$12,000 salary basis would receive \$30,000. If death was accidental her benefit would be twice this, or \$60,000. After the member passes 45, benefits are scaled downward by 1/10th of a per cent each year as he gets older. At age 65, the member who joined during the first year of eligibility and paid at least 10 years continuously prior to retire-

ment will have a paid up benefit of \$1,000, or an amount equal to total contributions, if less than \$1,000. In case of total and presumably permanent disability, the members payments are waived, but his coverage continues.

Christian Education Report

Christian education is not a privilege; it is a responsibility. This is one of the many areas in which we will lose our privilege if we do not shoulder the responsibility. To speak positively of Christian education is not to speak disparagingly of secular education. It is just as easy for secular education to take place on the Christian college campus as it is for Christian education to take place on a secular campus. Formal Christian education takes place any time we find a

Christian teacher imparting knowledge to a Christian student. This mission of the church reaches its greatest height on the Christian college campus. In the State of Florida we have two campuses which have been dedicated to the proposition of Christian education. The following report deals with these two instruments for the propagation of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

It has been well said that Christian education means "Education with a plus!" This means that the content and process are presented and interpreted in the light of the Christian Religion. Not only as it concerned with the physical, mental, and social development of the young, but is vitally concerned with their spiritual development. Huge sums of money invested in our institutions of higher learning can be justified only in light of the contribution they make to this development and in the service they render the Kingdom of God and Baptists.

Southern Baptists now operate 73 schools: 6 seminaries and a joint operation with National Baptists of another seminary, 37 senior colleges, 17 junior colleges, 7 academies, and 5 Bible schools. Only 3 of the colleges old enough to be accredited lack full recognition.

Qualified teachers for the schools continue to be a major problem. The sciences, English, and economics are areas critically short of Ph. D's while there is a great oversupply of teachers of religion.

Enrollment And Support — Enrollments of students have reached a record high for 1963-64 of 83,589 students compared to 80,987 in 1962-63.

Graduates from 73 schools from September, 1962, to August, 1963, totaled 11,083 compared to 10,922 the preceding year.

Stetson University, the oldest university in Florida, is located at Deland. During the 1963-64 term, there were 1,820 students enrolled (including Stetson Law School at St. Petersburg). 526 of these were Baptists. 129 students were committed to some church-related vocation; 43 were ministerial students, 16 mission volunteers, 42 are studying to be Ministers of Education, and 28 to be Ministers of Music.

Baptist Bible Institute at Graceville offers special training for students in church-related vocations for students who do not qualify for college training. The total enrollment for the 1963-64 session was 232. These came from 18 states, and one foreign country. 169 of these are students for the ministry, 39 students preparing to be Ministers of Education, and 11 to be Ministers of Music.

Baptist Literature and Florida Baptist Witness Report

To be uninformed is bad, to be misinformed is worse. The work of the churches is often greatly handicapped both by lack of information and by misinformation among the membership. Today's average Baptist is provided with some kind of information all right, but too many times the information comes from sources which are critical of and frequently openly opposed to our Baptist work. Too often it comes from sources which are not trustworthy.

Thus the wide use of our own Southern Baptist publications — ably edited, attractively printed and reasonably priced — is more imperative than ever. Here our own people are given sound doctrine, accurate information and proven promotional plans.

The Baptist state papers, of which there are 28, reported to the Southern Baptist Convention in Atlantic City this year a total circulation per issue of 1,521,958 copies as of January 1, 1964. While this Page Thirty

is still an increase over the previous year, the rate of increase has slowed down perceptibly.

Our own state paper, the Florida Baptist Witness, has also experienced this slow-down in the rate of growth. As of August 1, 1964, the paper is going to 65,643 subscribers each week. The church budget plan is being used by 758 churches for at least a part of their membership, while 135 churches have club of subscribers. The number of churches sending the paper to every resident family is slowly but surely increasing, although there are still 460 churches affiliated with the Florida Baptist Convention which are making no effort to keep their members informed through the use of their very own Baptist state paper.

Churchs which now send the Witness to only a portion of their membership are urged to increase their subscription lists to include every resident family, and churches which do not now have the Witness in the church budget to prayerfully and promptly consider sending the paper to all resident families.

United Christian Action Report

Materially: Florida is growing. Presently hundreds of thousands of new residents are moving into our fair state. Huge military expansion programs, space programs, etc., add to Florida's great and rapid growth. There seems to be no end in sight for Florida's future in terms of material wealth.

Spiritually: There seems to be an epidemic of sin sickness in gigantic proportions in our fair state. True, we are building more churches but in comparison to other and opposite forces of evil we are rapidly losing out on every front. Rather than advance Christian forces are apparently in retreat. Consider these obvious and frightening facts:

1—The evil and greed of those who traffic in alcohol spread the moral decline in Florida. In the last year Florida has issued 1000 new alcohol drink licenses. Even considering the tax from such sales Florida pays twenty times this amount of revenue for such traffic.

2—The evil and greed of those who traffic in gambling join forces with alcohol in the flood of moral and spiritual decline. Florida has 6 horse tracks, 6 Jai Alai Frontons, along with many other "winked" at places of gambling of various forms. Over \$400 millions a year is poured into these legalized gambling traps alone.

3—Obscene literature of every type joins these two pale horsemen in riding rough shod over the Christian forces in the Sunshine State. The festering decay of this filth is finding root in the fertile soil of our children.

4—The sickening aspect of all of this is that many leaders of our state and communities across our fair state are parroting the propaganda line put out by the alcohol-gambling-obscenity promoters. They use the old line argument that it is better to "control" evil than otherwise. In short, we are selling our souls for a mess of pottage called tax income.

What Can We Do?

- 1—Tell those in authority (local, state, etc.) that you want action now! Tell them you want action on the administrative level (that is,

enforce the laws already on the books) and legislative level (that is, make more and stiffer laws pertaining to the traffic of alcohol, etc.).

2—Let the people know where you stand, where your church and civic club stands.

3—Use available tools to weed out evil in our state: Vote, purchasing power and example. Use these three often and consistently.

What Is United Christian Action, Inc?

It is a statewide service organization concerned with the morals of our state supported by various church and civic groups over the state including the Florida Baptist Convention and many various Baptist Churches. The program is three-fold: Education-Legislation-Rehabilitation through documented leaflets, books and an eight page publication called alert. The only church in this area that has this organization in its budget is Parkview Baptist Church. It is hoped that more churches will follow this example even though part of the State Missions Offering as well as the Cooperative Program goes to the support of this work. Headquarters is in Lakeland, Florida with Jack Epps as director and Dr. Edgar Copper, Orlando, Florida, as the president.
