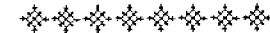

CONSTITUTION

1. This body shall be known as the Alachua Baptist Association of Florida.
2. It shall be composed of messengers from Southern Baptist Churches of the same faith and gospel order, voluntarily banded together for missionary, educational and benevolent service.

3. The officers of this Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer. The Moderator and Vice-Moderator shall be nominated from the floor and elected by ballot, and by a majority vote, on the first day of the Annual Meeting; but the Association may, by a unanimous vote, instruct the Clerk to cast the ballot of the body as a whole. Officers elected shall assume office at the close of the Annual Session which elects them. No person elected Moderator shall hold office for a longer period than two consecutive years, not counting an unexpired term. The Association in annual session, shall elect or approve all departmental heads for the ensuing year.

4. Each Church shall be entitled to two messengers, and shall be entitled to one additional messenger to every twenty-five additional members over the first fifty, provided no church may have more than ten messengers. These duly elected messengers who are present shall constitute the Association in annual session.

5. The Executive Committee of this Association shall be composed of the following: the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Superintendent of the Associational Sunday School, Director of the Associational Training Union, President of the Associational Woman's Missionary Union, President of the Associational Brotherhood, Director of the Associational Music Department, the President of the Youth Organization, together with all pastors who hold membership within the Association and one other member from each cooperating Church.

6. This Association shall meet annually at such time and place as may be agreed upon by the Body. When necessary, the time and/or place of any meeting may be set or changed by the Executive Committee.

7. The Association shall recognize the independence of Churches and shall not in any wise seek to exercise jurisdiction over them, yet shall have power to drop from its connection any Church found to be unorthodox in faith or practice.

8. Churches may be admitted into this Body by petitionary letter provided they shall have been found orthodox and of a cooperative spirit. Each Church, before being admitted, must make application through the Moderator or the Executive Committee at least three months before the annual or semi-annual Associational meeting, provided however, that the Association may waive the three months period by three-fourths vote of the members present. The Church making petition shall set forth in writing their doctrinal belief and willingness to conform to the rules and regulations by which the Association is governed. Upon reception, the Moderator shall, for the Association extend to the messengers the hand of fellowship.

9. Any Church shall be at liberty to discontinue its connection with the Association if desired, by giving proper notice of such intention. If any Church fails to be represented in annual meetings for three years in succession, it may be dropped from active membership.

10. The Association in annual or semi-annual session, may alter or amend this constitution by a three-fourth vote of members present and voting.

BY-LAWS

1. All sessions of this Body shall be opened and closed reverently in duly approved form.

2. The Moderator shall preside over the deliberations of this Association, keep order, present for discussion and vote all motions properly ordered, and perform all other duties usually appertaining to this office. He shall not vote except in the case of a tie. The Vice-Moderator shall preside in the absence of the Moderator or when asked by the Moderator to preside.

3. Robert's Rules of Order shall be recognized as authority in all matters of parliamentary procedure.

4. It shall be the duty of the Clerk of the Association to keep a fair and correct record of the proceedings, prepare the manuscript for the press, have minutes printed, and distribute them to the churches as early as possible after the annual meetings and shall keep a complete file of minutes for use of the Association.

5. The Treasurer, who also may be Clerk, shall keep an accurate record of all moneys received and disbursed, shall pay out money only upon instruction from the Body and shall make an itemized report of all receipts and disbursements to the Association in annual session. If requested, the Treasurer shall make a monthly statement to the Executive Committee.

6. The Executive Committee, which is the Association ad interim, shall have general supervision of all work initiated and fostered by the Association. It shall meet monthly to plan for the promotion of all phases of the work, the time and place of meeting to be set by the Executive Committee. It shall use its best efforts to stimulate the spirituality and activities of the Churches and shall report its work to the Association in annual session.

7. The Vice-Moderator shall be program Chairman for all Annual Sessions of the Association. Upon a vacancy occurring in the office of Moderator, the Vice-Moderator shall assume all duties of the Moderator. The Executive Committee shall then select another person to be the Vice-Moderator. It shall also select persons for any other vacancies that may arise.

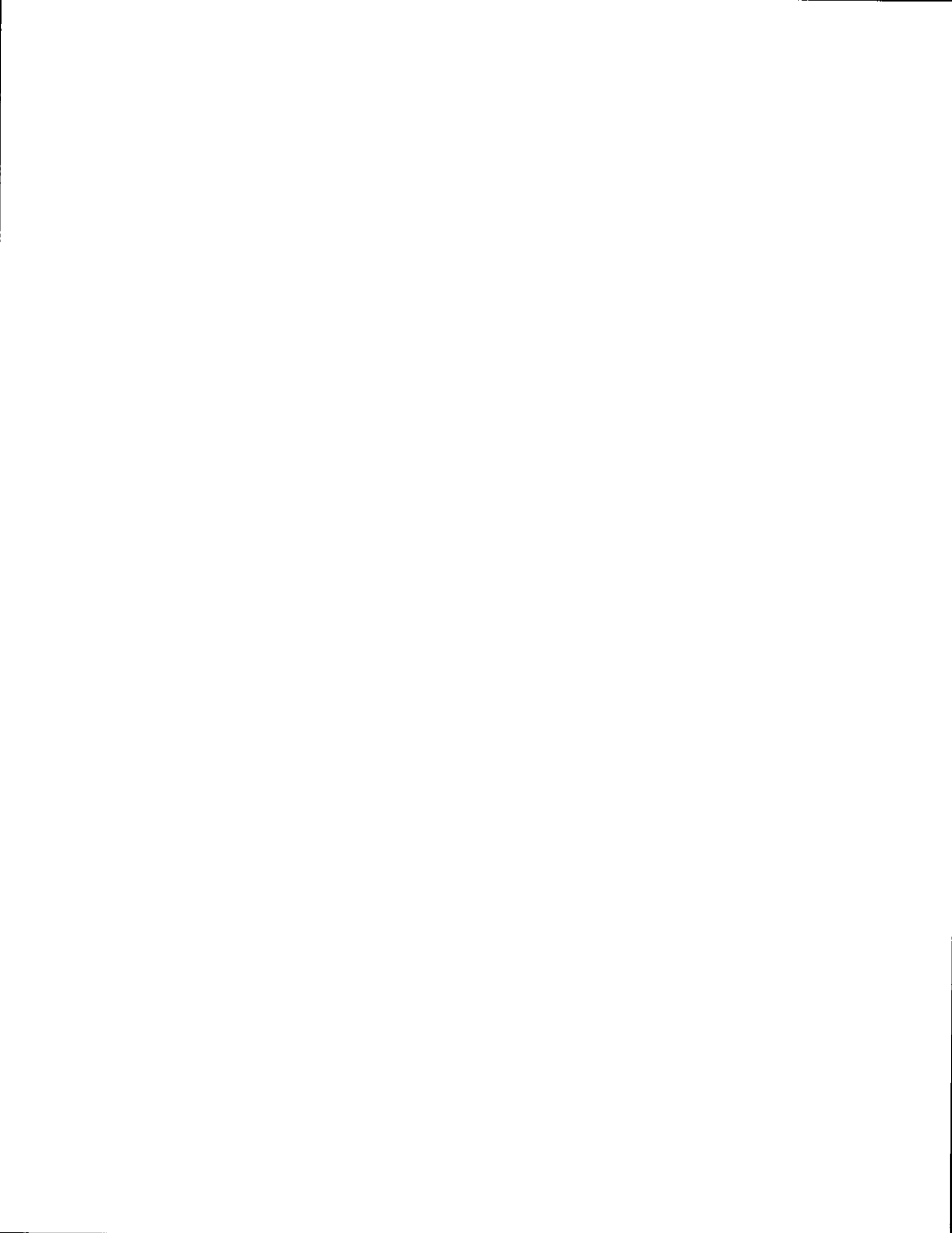

In Florida we have Stetson and Baptist Bible Institute, both doing a good work.

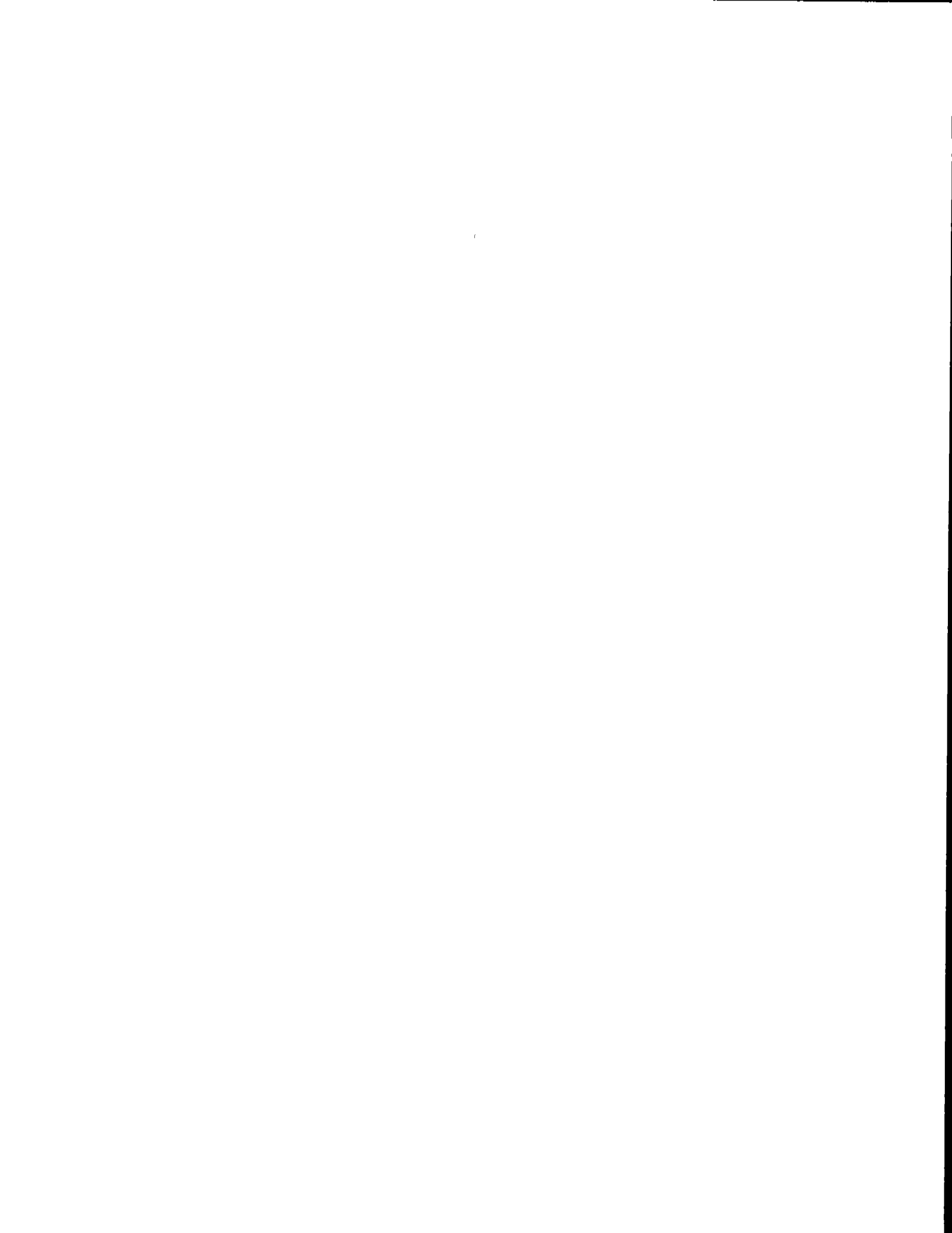

EVANGELISM COMMITTEE REPORT

This Associational Year of 1968-1969 has been the Year of the Crusade of the Americas Revival. We are indeed grateful to our Heavenly Father for the received people and the salvation of many souls during the Crusade of the Americas Revival.

The Alachua Baptist Association had twenty-one of the thirty churches and one mission to participate in this great effort of Evangelism. The result of this Crusade in our Association was 85 Baptisms and 388 Rededications along with 12 who dedicated themselves for Full-time Christian Service.

The past Associational Year there were 290 Baptisms and 368 by letter and otherwise, making a total of 658 additions to our churches in this Association. As com-



pared to last year's report, there was a gain of 52 Baptisms and a loss of 12 by letter and otherwise. The number of baptisms in our Association this past year represents a ratio of one baptism for every 24 members.

Our Chairman of Evangelism is truly grateful for the Associational Steering Committee, to every pastor and church for their effort in the program of Evangelism.

REPORT OF H. CLYDE HARLESS, FIELD SECRETARY DISTRICT 7 OF THE FLORIDA BAPTIST CONVENTION

During the church year of 1968 and 1969 two churches have been added to district 7, namely the Fort King Baptist Church of Ocala and Inglis Baptist Church of Inglis, and five missions have been started. These missions are: Ozello Baptist Mission sponsored by the Homosassa Baptist Church, Springhill Mission of the Masaryktown Baptist Church, Westside Chapel of Hebron Baptist Church, Beverly Hills Chapel of Dunellon First Church and Hillcrest Mission of Eustis First Church. This makes a total of nineteen missions in all. At the present time there are fourteen churches sponsoring missions in the district.

This past year every church gave to World Missions through the Cooperative Program. This is as it ought to be. We should never slow down in giving to World Missions but we need to think more about the Home base or the Association as it is called. There are many places in Marion, Alachua, and Lake County Associations where many more missions could be started.

As your missionary I traveled 32,380 miles in the district. I distributed 12,500 tracts and pieces of literature. Many of these went to the Migrant Camps in Lake County. I have mailed over 6,000 letters and Newsletters this year. I held 1,346 conferences, of these 104 were with committees and groups, 1,242 were with individuals. I distributed 995 Bibles and portions of Bibles, delivered 221 sermons and addresses and assisted in 6 ordination services, conducted three Evangelistic meetings and one Stewardship Revival. I assisted several churches in securing loans for Mission Buildings and Pastoral Aid.

All in all this has been a busy year but a good year. I have seen 35 additions to the churches where I have had the pleasure of preaching. Let me say, "Hats off to the past, but coats off to the future." As we continue working together in the Vineyard of our Lord, we can all see much more to be done for His cause. Please pray for me as your Missionary and call on me when I can be of service to you.

ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

OBJECTIVE

The Objective of the Annuity Board is to support the Convention in its objective of the proclamation of the gospel by (1) assisting the churches, the Convention agencies, and other general Baptist bodies in planning for retirement income for their ministers, other full-time workers and dependents that they may be relieved of anxiety of old-age insecurity; (2) receiving and managing funds in the nature of dues, perquisites, gifts, legacies, trust arrangements, gift annuities either designated or undesignated, whole or in part for the purpose of providing retirement income for ministers, and other full-time church and Convention workers; and (3) serving the churches and the Convention and its agencies as counselor and, if necessary and desirable, as trustee or agent of any annuity fund, group hospital, or insurance plans.

FUND MANAGEMENT

1. Act as trustee of the funds committed to its keeping through the various retirement plans, keeping always in mind that these funds are not its own but belong to the various conventions, boards, agencies, and institutions, and to the thousands of men and women in whose names they are committed.

2. Conduct an investment service consistent with the best business standards and the highest ideals of Christian stewardship.

3. Maintain a balanced portfolio of investments designed to provide both maximum safety and reasonable returns.

4. Plan for long-term and short-term investments consistent with the availability of funds and the needs of the agencies using the service.

STUDY RESEARCH

1. Study the needs of the churches and the Convention for retirement plans for their workers, seeking always to keep abreast of the times in its administration of the funds in order to provide for basic retirement needs.

2. Develop and test retirement plans consistent with accepted Southern Baptist practices and in cooperation with the participating conventions, boards, agencies, institutions, and individuals, being clear at all times as to the involvements and



effects of any plan presented for adoption.

3. Develop the best possible procedures for securing the highest possible participation of all those eligible for retirement plans.

INFORMATION

1. Conduct a limited literature service including a publication (THE YEARS AHEAD) the purpose and content of these publications to be expressly related to the objectives of the Annuity Board.

2. Maintain a correspondence service to provide, as possible, sympathetic and completely informative answers to persons seeking information concerning retirement plans.

FIELD SERVICES

1. Provide, in cooperation with the state conventions, a staff to give direct assistance to the churches and their workers seeking information on retirement plans.

2. Provide staff, as available at national assemblies, conventions, and conferences to advise with the churches and their workers seeking information on retirement plans.

Under discussion of the third point Burgher made these remarks:

"There are two points I would like to make clear. FIRST, all men are lost without Christ. THIS MEANS ALL! The Hindu, the Moslem, the Shinto, the Animist, the Humanist, the Athiest, the Communist, the Jew. Nor can any civic organization bring salvation. This should cause our missionary emphasis to catch fire, for only in Christ is there hope!

SECOND, we members of the body of Christ must give a positive witness by PRACTICING SEPARATION FROM THE THINGS OF THE WORLD. I give to you, my best friends in all the world, my deepest apology for having been associated with an organization that does give some hope for a better life after death to any of its members by a special funeral service; and this hope is extended without the name of Jesus Christ! This is completely false! This organization is said not to be a religion, but when you speak hopefully of life after death it becomes a religion! I separated myself from this group last year and found forgiveness from God.

I have had hope only in Christ since I was born again as a young boy, but my life has not given the strong witness of the spirit because of the lack of separation. Our

church has a new sign on Highway 41 that carries this Crusade theme... CHRIST THE ONLY HOPE. In my heart there is a new and wonderful feeling as I proclaim this truth without any equivocation or mental reservation.

A district governor of Rotary International discussed this question with me earlier this month. He made the statement that God was still loving and kind; he was just and merciful, and it is difficult for us to understand such an exclusive position. But from the rear seat in the car his wife quoted from the Bible the answer: "All things are delivered to me of my Father; and no man knoweth who the Son is, but the Father and who the Father is, but the Son, and he to whom the Son will reveal him," Luke 10:22.

With an emphasis on fewer officers and a minimum of organization to get the work done, the new plans have been accepted in varying degrees of enthusiasm. In our Association some churches have enlisted women who have never been in a WMU organization and other churches have reported losses in the previous enrollment. We plan to help all of the women in our churches to find a place to serve the Lord through a WMU organization this coming year.

The annual session of Florida Woman's Union was held in the First Baptist Church in Tallahassee, February 18-19. This was the 75th anniversary meeting, and recognition was given to churches achieving anniversary goals. The following churches were

presented certificates:

First Baptist Bushnell Ruby
First Baptist Webster Jade

There were six persons from our Association present at this meeting.

In line with the decision of Florida Baptists to assist in the Crusade of the Americas plans in Ohio, our WMU provided assistance in Buffalo, N.Y. and in Cleveland, Ohio areas. We gave \$25.00 toward the expenses of the Cleveland area work, and one of our members assisted in this work. Almost \$5,000.00 was invested by Florida WMU. in these two projects. This amount came from individual churches, Associations, individuals, and the budget of Florida WMU.

Our WMU also gave \$25.00 toward the education of an inmate of Sumter Correctional Institute, who plans to become an Institutional Chaplain when he is released.

Attendance at the Quarterly meetings has been better than usual this past year. The Spring Meeting at Homosassa Church, when Miss Carolyn Weatherford was the speaker, was the highlight of our year with 89 in attendance.

HISTORY OF FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH OF HERNANDO BEACH

PHILIPPIANS 2:16 "HOLDING FORTH THE WORD OF LIFE"

On April 19, 1966 at 7:00 P.M. the church which is now known as the First Baptist Church of Hernando Beach was organized. There were twenty-two charter members. The chairman, Rev. J.H. Palmer, stated the object of this meeting was to organize a Baptist Church and to align ourselves with the Alachua Association and The Southern Baptist Convention.

The Presbytry consisted of Rev. C.A. Rogers (Pastor of Pleasant Hill Baptist Church) Rev. Clark Segrest (member of Fort Dale Baptist Church, and former Pastor of that church), two deacons, Lee Smith and Frank Johnson of Pleasant Hill Baptist Church. For one and one half years we met for worship in a small office building on Highway 19. Rev. E.M. Fleming of Brooksville was called as our pastor. On October 9, 1966 during his pastorate the present Sunday School building was erected. This is being used for worship and Sunday School.

After much negotiation regarding land for the church, on April 19, 1967 the church was presented with a deed to nearly two and half acres by Mr. William B. Douglass, Vice-President of The Turner Corporation. On December 18, 1967 the ground breaking was held. This consisted of an old plow with rope attached literally linking all members together by faith and pulling together as a unit to the Glory of God. The plow was handled by Rev. Fleming and the chairman of Deacons. The Bible verse used was taken from Luke 9:62 "And Jesus said unto him, no man having put his hand to the plow and looking back is fit for the Kingdom of God."

The first concrete block of the new building was laid June 20, 1967 by Mr. Henry Huggins and Mr. W.N. Waters. The first service was held October 8, 1967.

The Dedication was held March 10, 1968 with Rev. Clyde Harless as the guest

speaker. Due to his severe illness, Rev. Fleming could not be present, he tendered his resignation as of March 10, 1968.

Rev. J.E. White, a native of Florida, was called in May 1968. The church has grown steadily under his pastorate with a membership now of seventy. Several improvements have been added this year, one of which is air-conditioning throughout the building.

FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH OF HOMOSASSA

HOMOSASSA, FLORIDA

HISTORY

On October 15, 1945, Reverend J.W. Wooten and Reverend O.H. Reynolds came to Homosassa from Laughman, Florida. They erected a large tent and revival services were held each night for three weeks, followed by regular weekly services.

On December 2, 1945, the Hebron Baptist Church in Oak Grove, extended an offer to sponsor a Mission under their watchcare. A committee of five men was appointed by the Mission to locate property for the construction of a church building. A financial committee was appointed to raise money for the building program.

On January 6, 1946, the First Baptist Church of Homosassa was formally organized, with Reverend O.H. Reynolds as Pastor.

The first revival meeting following organization was held June 1, 1946.

On May 18, 1947, dedication services were held for the newly constructed church building with laying of the corner stone and sealing of the Holy Bible. Services were conducted by Reverend J.W. Wooten and the sermon was delivered by Reverend H.O. Reynolds.

The first Vacation Bible School was held July 18, 1960.

The Church adopted By-Laws on August 8, 1962.

On October 10, 1962, Mr. and Mrs. John W. Martin of Houston, Texas, deeded eighteen lots in Homosassa Springs as a gift to the Church. The Church accepted this gift with gratitude and appreciation.

On May 9, 1963, the Church exchanged its original site for a more suitable location. In August 1964, with Reverend Glen Stephens as Pastor, a planning committee was appointed to secure plans for the construction of a new and larger building. During this planning period, Reverend Stephens resigned and Reverend David Elmore was called as Pastor, on May 15, 1965.

On October 17, 1965, dedication services for the newly constructed church building were held. The completion of the educational building followed immediately.

In 1967, the Church purchased an adjoining lot to the church property to provide for parking area and building additional Sunday School rooms to meet the needs of a growing Church in a growing community.

On January 6, 1969, the First Baptist Church of Homosassa established a Mission at Ozeello. The first Mission services were held January 26, 1969, in the Civic Building. Three acres of property were purchased as a building site for the construction of the Ozeello Baptist Mission.

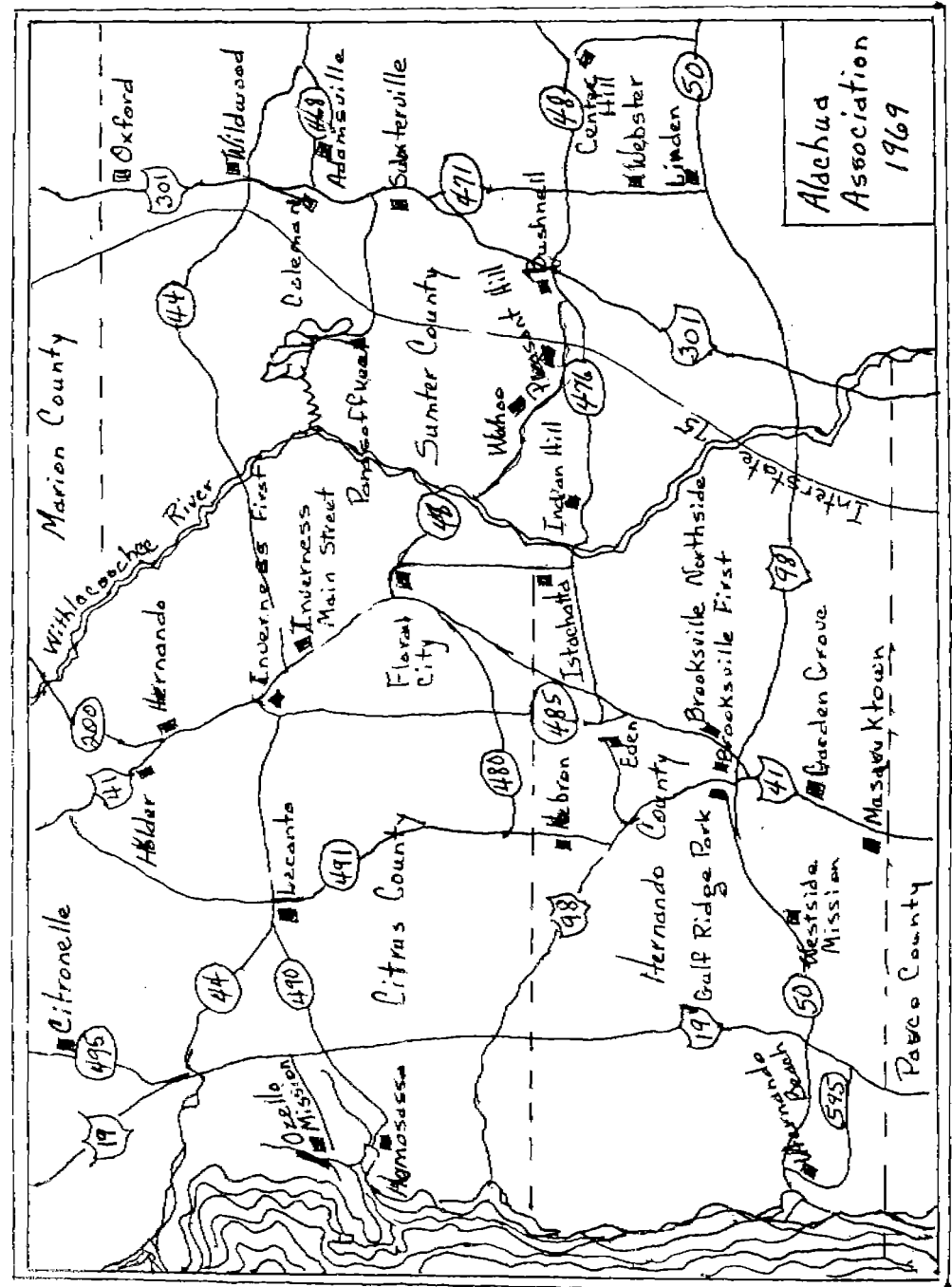

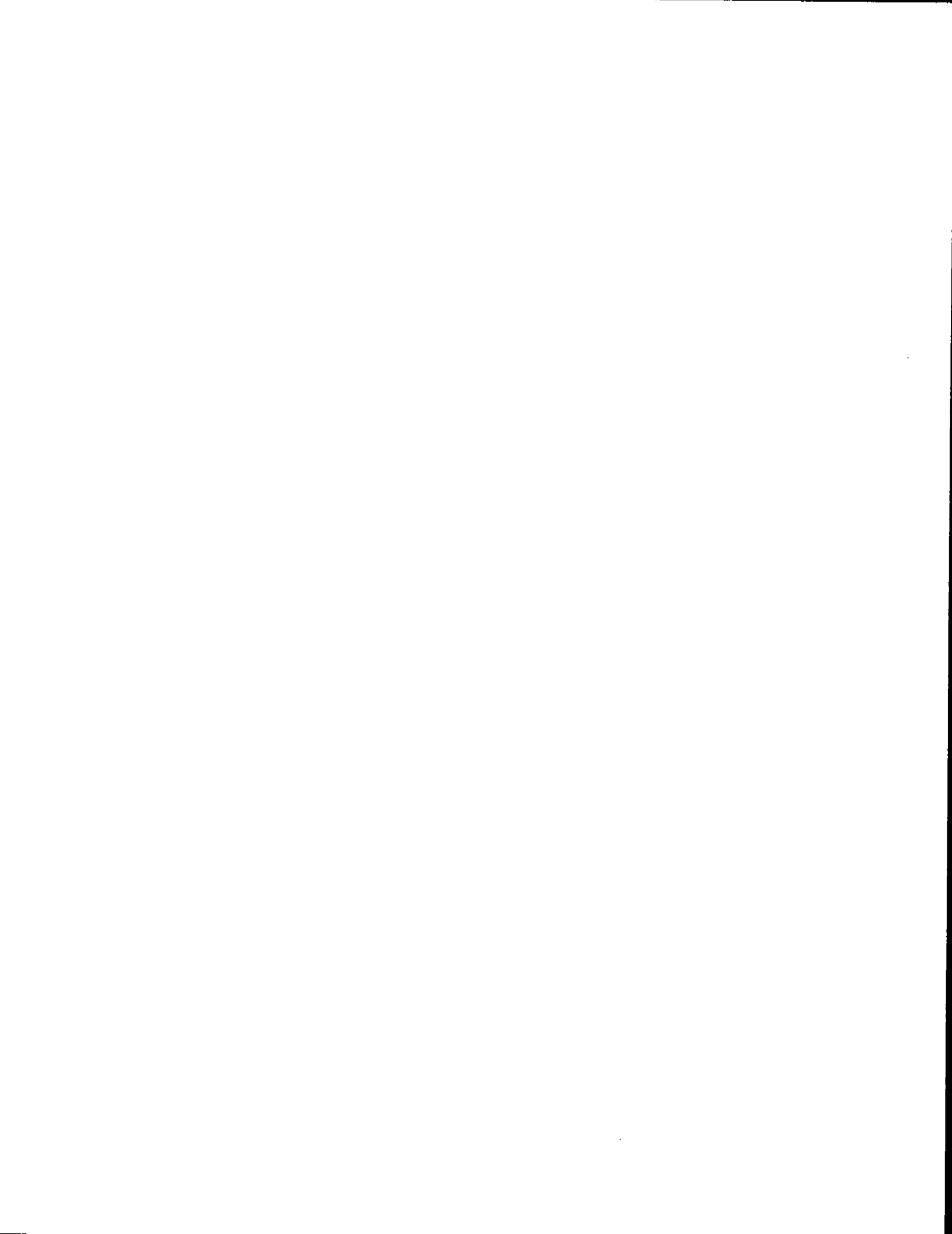
