MINUTES.

SATURDAY, October 18, 1890.

The Thirteenth Annual Session of the St. Johns River Baptist Association convened with Evergreen Baptist church Octo-

ber 18, 1890.

The introductory sermon was preached by Elder M. L. Dyess. After an intermission of one hour, the body reassembled in the church house, and, after prayer by J. M. Fraser, was called to order by S. E. Timmons, Moderator.

Have we done all we could to help them, even in the way of encouragement. Let our ministers and brothers remember that we are about our Master's business when we are careful to neglect nothing that tends to advance the cause of religion. We earnestly appeal to all societies, and also to those that have disbanded, to re-organize, and be prepared at the next meeting of our Association to send in an annual report that it may be embodied in our minutes, to the end that each individual society shall receive due credit for its work, and the results of their labors presented in a systematized ROBERT L. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

In this age of progress, nothing short of the Gospel itself is probably more vital in importance than education. Necessity seems to be laid upon church and State to educate the masses. Infidelity is rife in every department of social and political life. Hence, preparation must be made to meet the demand for cultured intellect. Sanctified learning should be the motto If you would have a blessing rather than a curse, let the religion of Christ oppose the assaults of satanic forces against Christianity, whether from Rome or elsewhere. Through Christ only may we conquer. The nearer we come to the pattern of His teaching and His image, the grander will be our success. First of all, then, we would urge attention to the study of the Bible. He who knows the most of it, is best qualified for correct living and efficient teaching. Its simplicity stamps its divinity, and proves the goodness and the grace of God. The purity of Bible doctrines makes an appeal to the inner conciousness of man that Jesus spoke as no other had done, or could do. The wonderful preservation of Scriptural integrity, as to the original tongues, shows the wonderful work of God and His mercy to fallen man. Let us cherish in all our churches Bible reading statedly, publicly, and privately. O, brethren, feed upon the "green pastures" therein presented for the family as well as the great con gregation. Train your children to read and to study it much. We recommend the patronage of the parents represented in this Association, John BaStetson University, at DeLand, and our own denominational schools when they are accessible. We also invite your attention to the fact that many disregard the importance of having their children taught by religious teachers. Some employ men of bad habits, such as drinking and profanity; others send their children to convent schools, where principles are taught opposed to our idea of God's truth, and find too late that they have departed from the faith delivered unto the saints.

We likwise ask the brethren to exercise special supervision over the books and periodicals handled by their children. Remember that danger lurks in that class of literature styled fiction. Some may reply that "a tale, or story, with a good moral is harmless." We think it better not to wade through so much trash to gather so little, when the damage may exceed the profit. We recommend the *Florida Baptist Witness* and the American Baptist Publication Society, and the Southern Baptist Convention Publications. May the Head of the church preserve His people, whom He has led through the ages past unto eternal life, is our prayer for his name sake.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee on Temperance beg leave to report the following:

The cause of temperance is of very great importance to every one, whether godly or ungodly. Its injurious effects are produced upon the body and mind of the godly and unholy alike. Its destructive effects upon the morality of the country are seen and felt by all. But, alas! its power is so insiduous that the erudite as well as the unlettered are deceived by its subtlety. It causes not only the loss of character and reputation and the dissipation of property, not only the agony of fathers, mothers and children, but it will also send its convicts to eternal nights and dispair. We fail to find the reason why any Christian should fail or refuse to do all in his or her power to suppress the traffic, and persuade all to refrain from its use as a beverage. Three years ago we were greatly encouraged in the manly way-our people voted the curse from amongst us. But legislation being insufficient, we are again imposed upon by the few, the result of which has inaugurated the sale of ardent spirits in our county again. However, this defeat should not permit our zeal to relax, but should serve to strengthen us for a greater conflict in the future. We recommend that every Baptist exert his influence for the suppression of this ungodly traffic. The Scripture is explicit and emphatic on this subject, and, therefore, none can plead ignorance, nor present any feasible excuse whatever to justify them in partaking of this poisonous nuisance. We would recommend that Christians everywhere would specially consider the young, and urge them to abstain from its deadly effects. We urge that temperance be observed in our schools, both common and Sapbath-schools; that it may be observed at home and at the church, ever remembering that God hears the prayers of his J. M. FRASER, people. Chairman

REPORT ON DECEASED MINISTERS AND DEACONS.

Your committee have to report that the Lord of the harvest, in His good pleasure, has summoned from their labors to enter upon their reward during the past associational year, our beloved Brethren in the Lord and colaborer in His vineyard, Eld H. Talbird, of the second Baptist church of Green Cove Springs; Deacon Eli Geiger, of Evergreen church; Deacon Elijah Wall, of Paron church, and Deacon Cannon, of Peniel church.

Bro. Talbird was ordained to the ministry in 1836 in the State of Alabama. During his ministry he baptized 2,300 converts on a profession of their faith in Jesus. He passed to his reward October 16, 1890, to receive his crown richly starred with the work of his ministry.

Bro. Eli Geiger was ordained deacon of his church the third Sunday in September, 1868, and served his Master with fervor and zeal until bid to cease his toil and come to the home prepared for the faithful from the foundation of the world.

Deacon Elijah Wall, after sixty years' faithful service, twentyseven years in his Master's service in the State of South Carolina, and for the past thirty three years deacon of Paron church, ripe in years, went to meet the heroes of the cross who had, during his long life, preceded him to their reward.

Deacon P. A. Cannon, of Peniel church, died August 7, 1890; a loss not only to his church, but to the cause of Christ.

These Brethren were all old in years and service. They performed faithfully the duties the Master placed upon them while on earth, and, while we feel our churches are weaker by their loss, the glorious memory of the long Christian lives is an inheritance for their kindred and their churches, and an inspiration to us all to not weary in well doing.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY-SCHOOLS.

Your Committee on Sabbath schools beg leave to submit the following:

Iesus Christ, our dear Saviour, while here on earth, called the children to Him and taught them how to become heirs of His kingdom. This example alone should suffice to enlist all Christian parents in the training of their own, and their neighbors' children, for the spiritual kingdom. But, brethren, this is not all which should induce us to train up our children for the Lord. The precepts and examples bearing directly upon this subject are supplemented by the declaration of the Saviour and the Prophet that our Heavenly Father has ordained that our children should be a pillar of strength in His cause, and this promise is being fulfilled. While here Jesus received children into His arms, He still receives them into His kingdom, fills their little hearts with His love, and sends them into the world to bear the sweet message of peace. In many instances the heart of the sinful parents, that has rejected the most powerful preaching of God's ministers, is unlocked by his own little child, and the rays of divine love permitted to shine in and warm up to life the immortal spirit so long dead in tresspass and sin. And in some cases the bar-room which had resisted the social and moral influences of the community, and could not be effectually closed by the strong arm of the law of our land, has quietly submitted to the plea of a dear little child, and ceased its work of destruction and death. Now, brethren and sisters, since God honors and uses little children as instruments in the advancement of His cause, it becomes us to use our united efforts in preparing them for this glorious work. The Sabbath-school offers superior advantages for teaching and training our children for God's service; it occupies a pleasant-position between the Christian homes and invites and receives the children of the non-professor, and with gentle forbearance and Christian love imparts the Gospel truths to the youthful mind, which, with God's blessings, will make them wise unto salvation. We, therefore, recommend that Sabbath-schools be organized in the several churches, and even in communities where none exist at the present time.

REPORT OF MISSIONARY BOARD.

In the beginning of the year the Board employed Elders D. W. Glisson and H. M. King as missionaries on the east side of St. John's river for the sum of \$1.50 per day, of actual service, and traveling expenses paid. The outlook was very encouraging, which stimulated the Board to greater zeal in helping to furnish the destitute places in the bounds of our association with the pure Gospel; and after prayerful consideration, the Missionary Board employed more laborers in the Master's vineyard. It employed C. A. Koger and D. L. Kendrick; C. A. Koger's mission being also the east side of St. John's river, while Bro. Kendrick's time was spent in the cause on the west side, in the vicinity of Bostwick. Our missionaries need and require the cooperation and prayers of the people, as does your Missionary Board also, that their work may be, as it should be, directed by the Holy Spi it. RULES OF DECORUM.

At the first meeting of each annual session of the Association, the Moderator of the previous session shall call the delegates to order, and after singing and prayer, he shall declare the Association ready for business. The first business in order, after delegates have enrolled their names, shall be the election of a Moderator and Clerk, and in case of the absence of the Moderator the delegates present shall select a Moderator pro tem., who shall proceed as aforesaid.

2. Each meeting of the Association shall be opened and closed with singing and prayer.

3. The Moderator shall preserve order and decide all questions in debate, subject to an appeal to the body, and when speaking on any subject, shall call some member to the chair, and, in case of a tie, give the casting vote.

4. The Chairman of all committees shall be appointed by the Moderator, and each committee shall be filled by nominations made by the Chairman, subject to the vote of the body.

5. The Clerk shall keep a commplete record of the proceedings of each meeting, and in the absence of the Moderator, shall call the Association to order, and preside until a Moderator protem, is elected.

6. No business shall be transacted without a quorum, which shall consist of a majority of the registered members.

7. All members wishing to speak shall rise and respectfully address the Moderator, and confine themselves strictly to the subject, and not speak more than twice upon the same subject without asking leave of the chair, and no unkind allusions shall be made while speaking.

8. No motion shall be debated until seconded, nor voted upon until stated by the Moderator or read by the Clerk.

9. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received except to adjourn, lay on the table, to amend, indefinitely postpone, refer to a committee or otherwise, or call for the previous question.

10. Any member voting in the majority may move a reconsideration at any time during the session.

11. The Rules of Decorum may be amended at any annual session of the Association, by a majority vote of the members present.

12. Rules not specially provided for shall be governed by parliamentary usages.
