Donald Hugh and Jo Nell Redmon served as missionaries for over 33 years in Costa Rica. The Redmons married in 1956 and they had three children. Donald was born in Panama City, FL and served as a teacher and pastor in Florida before attending and graduating from Mississippi College and New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary. Jo Nell was born in Pontotoc, MS and graduated from Mississippi College. The Redmons retired from mission work in 1998 and returned to Panama City.

Jo Nell Redmon, age 79 of Panama City, FL passed away Monday, February 01, 2016 at Community Health & Rehab Center. Jo was born October 5, 1936 in Pontotoc, MS to Freddie and Christine (Herndon) Eubanks and moved to Panama City in 1956. Jo is a graduate of Mississippi College, Class of '79 where she majored in the Spanish language. She was an appointed missionary with the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention and served her Lord for over 33 years in Costa Rica. She was united in marriage on July 8, 1956 to her husband, Donald Hugh Redmon, Sr. who resides in Panama City.
