He was an insurance salesman before he became a part-time pastor serving several small communities in northern Florida.

MR. RITTENHOUSE attended the New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary and served as pastor on weekends at Ray's Chapel near Cantonment in north Florida. He graduated in 1955.

He was a former moderator of the Miami Baptist Association in 1972 and former president of the Florida Baptist Pastors' Conference. He also was a trustee of Baptist Hospital.

He is survived by his wife, Frances J.; two sons, Ralph C. Jr. and Raymond H.; two daughters, Mrs. Frances Eileen Meister and Mrs. Mary Agnes Maddox; three sisters, Mrs. Jean Albury, Joan and Wilma Rittenhouse; and 10 grandchildren.

Olympia Baptists Call New Pastor

Members of the Miami Baptist Association might think something was amiss if they held their sessions without a Rittenhouse in the house.

For many years this family has supplied a number of active ministers in this area.

When the **Rev. William Rittenhouse, Jr.** resigned as pastor of Southside Baptist Church after many years' service to become pastor of Sylvan Hills Baptist in Atlanta, Ga., some months ago it left the association without a **Rittenhouse** on the roster.

This situation was soon remedied, however, when his uncle, the **Rev. Ralph Rittenhouse**, formerly pastor of a church near Tallahassee, took over as supply pastor at Southside. Last Sunday he was called as permanent pastor of Olympia Baptist, 3600 SW

97th St., and will assume his new duties tomorrow, succeeding the **Rev. Luther Key**.

Lt. James C. **Rittenhouse** (j.g.), brother of the **Rev. William Rittenhouse**, served as chaplain with the Third Marine Aircraft Wing at Opa-locka, for some time. He was transferred to California a short time ago.

The **Rev. William Rittenhouse, Sr.**, a chaplain in England during World War II, frequently visited his sons in Miami and occupied the pulpit at Southside church on a number of occasions. He is now pastor of the Baptist Church at Hopeful, Ga.

HISTORY OF THE FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH OF SOPCHOPPY

This Church became the Mt. Beasor Missionary Baptist Church in 1873 when 80 members withdrew from the Mt. Beasor Primitive Church which was constituted in 1853. The first church building was erected on a site in West Sopchoppy in 1873 and remained there until 1906 when Mr. John C. Hodge gave a lot in the present City of Sopchoppy and a second church building was constructed. The site was moved to the present City of Sopchoppy because of a shift in the community growth. The building erected in 1906 remained until the present building was constructed in 1967. The church went by the name of Mt. Beasor Baptist Church until 1942 when it was changed to the First Baptist Church of Sopchoppy. In 1964, the first gifts were made to a building fund for the present church building on this third site. In 1965, the church voted to build, and on December 17, 1967, the first service were held in the new building. However, Sunday School and Church Training were not held in the new building until February 11, 1968, when every part of the building was completed. The present building was dedicated on February 25, 1968. The new educational wing was completed the first part of 1982 and was dedicated on March 21, 1982.
