(LEO B. ROBERTS) is a native Floridian. Born in Pensacola where he spent his childhood and early manhood. He received his elementary and high school training in the public schools of Escambia County. He is a graduate of Stetson University with an A.B. degree, and of Southern Baptist Seminary with a Th.M. degree.

In addition to serving churches in the Pensacola Bay Association during his early ministry he served as a Chaplain during World War II for three and a half years. Upon returning to the pastorate he served the First Baptist Church, Haines City, and Delaney Street Baptist Church, Orlando.

On March 1, 1959, Roberts began his service as Field Secretary of Florida Baptist Convention in District 9. This position he held until he came to his present assignment January 1, 1963. He is currently General Director of the Florida Baptist Retirement Center, Vero Beach.

## WALNUT HILL BAPTIST CHURCH

In 1915 Southern States Lumber Company constructed a one-room school building near the present Walnut Hill Station east of the Frisco Railroad. Arranged for classroom work and preaching services, Baptists and Methodists met there together for almost five years. On June 13, 1920, under the leadership of Rev. J.H. McAnally and Rev. J.T. Fillingim, Walnut Hill Baptist Church was organized.

Charter members were Mr. and Mrs. J.H. Brown, Mr. and Mrs. J.J. Deaux, Mr. and Mrs. W.O. Cohron, and Mr. and Mrs. W.A. Brown. Mr. W.A. Brown was elected clerk and deacon, and Rev. McAnally was called as pastor, receiving \$60 annual salary. The church was received into Pensacola Bay Baptist Association October 12, 1920.

The first building was constructed in 1925 on land donated by Mr. and Mrs. W.A. Brown. Located on the north side of the highway, it stood until 1992. Construction on the present sanctuary was completed in 1954, and the adjacent pastorium (today a youth building) was built in 1958. A brick pastorium was completed in 1976, and a fellowship building was constructed in 1986.

(ALL) Some of the pastors who have served the church are J.T. Fillingim, H.W. McNair, A.J. Noblett, C.O. Stewart, Leo Roberts, Holly Secrist, LaDon Hall, Cary Hanks, Jr., Roy Chewning, Jesse Wood (Interim), and James Boyd (Interim).

The church owns twenty-one acres of land, including the cemetery with 641 gravesites. A special offering to maintain the cemetery is received each year at Homecoming, which is observed the first Sunday in August.

## Leo Roberts Dies

Leo B. Roberts, 72, died March 14 in Lakeland.

A graduate of Stetson University, DeLand and Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville, he attended chaplaincy schools while on active duty and in the Army reserve.

Roberts was pastor of First Church, Haines City for four years and of Delaney Street Church, Orlando for seven years. He was also active in denominational work, serving as a member of Florida State Board of Missions; field secretary, district nine; and general director, Florida Baptist Retirement Center, Vero Beach at the time of his retirement in 1968.

Funeral services were held March 16 at Southside Church, Lakeland with Pastor Phillip E. Lykes officiating. Burial was in Pensacola.

Survivors include his widow, Edith, Lakeland; daughter, Mrs. John (Betty) Hill, Austin, Tex.; and son, Douglas, Orlando.

"According to the Pleasant Grove Baptist Church Centennial Year 1869-1969 historical document, Bro. Leo B. Roberts, was licensed to preach by that church, August 16, 1925.

"There is no record of Bro Leo preaching at Union Hill, however, the Shiver family girls remember him preaching there, and they remember him preaching his first sermon at Union Hill.

"In addition to that, some of the Shiver sisters remember his lovely wife, Edith Bell Roberts, because she wore big, beautiful, large brim hats, and they remember her beautiful smile. They remember seeing her many, many times at the church.

"No church records are available for those years because they were burned with the church when it was destroyed by fire in September 1943.

"Brother Leo Roberts must have been pastor of Union Hill Baptist Church, because the Myrtle Grove Baptist Church has this to say about him in their 1930-1980 Bicentennial Celebration historical document: 'On May 11, 1930, the church voted to call Reverend Leo Roberts as pastor, however, Brother Roberts asked that the call be withheld until he could call a conference with his church, Union Hill. On June 13, 1930, the church again voted to call Reverend Roberts as pastor.'

"The church goes on to say that 'Reverend Leo Roberts served as pastor for three years, leaving the church in December 1932. During his pastorate here, he saw the church membership grow to 71 while the Sunday School enrollment reached 127 and the B.Y.P.U. enrollment rose to 52.'

"Reverend Leo Roberts served the remaining portion of his ministry in Cedar Key, Florida. The Leo Roberts family had a son and a daughter. Brother Leo was one of the sons of R.L. Roberts of Pleasant Grove, who was one of the brothers to my father, and he was one of my double first cousins.

"We leave this subject with this thought: Reverend Leo Roberts was Myrtle Grove Baptist Church's first pastor. He served two and a half years, from June 1930 to December 1932."

*History of Union Hill Baptist Church by Tyrus Roberts*

Rev. Leo B. Roberts, son of Robert Lee Roberts and Theodosia Frances Jones Roberts, was born August 2, 1904. He died March 14, 1976 and is buried in Pleasant Grove Baptist Church Cemetery, southwest Escambia County, Florida.

Edith M. Bell Roberts was born May 1, 1908. She died June 4, 1998 and is buried in Pleasant Grove Baptist Church Cemetery, southwest Escambia County, Florida.

LAKELAND - Rev. Leo B. Roberts, a native of Pensacola, died Sunday at Lakeland Hospital. Rev. Roberts was a retired Baptist minister and had served churches in Florida and Kentucky. He served as an Army Chaplain during World War II in England, France and Germany. Rev. Roberts was a field secretary of South Florida Shiloh and Ridge Association from 1957 to 1963. At the time of his retirement in 1968, he was director of the Florida Baptist Retirement Center in Vero Beach, Fla.. Survivors include his widow, Edith Roberts of Lakeland; one son, Douglas Roberts of Orlando; one daughter, Betty Hill of Austin, Texas; one sister, Vera O'Brien of Seminole, Ala., one brother, Rev. Ernest Roberts of Pensacola; and four grandchildren. Gentry Morrison Southside of Lakeland is in charge of arrangements.

#### ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS REPORT

Associational Missions continues to make progress. All phases of our work, Sunday School, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union, and Brotherhood have made splendid progress this year. This means Kingdom advancement throughout our entire associational program.

We have now three missions in the South Florida Association. All of them have been organized during the associational year. Each of them has a full program of work and doing a splendid job. They are: Memorial Baptist Mission, Lakeland, sponsored by Calvary Baptist Church, Oak Park Baptist Mission, Fort Meade, sponsored by First Church, and Wildwood Baptist Mission, Bartow, sponsored by Wildwood Baptist Church. We are indeed grateful for these missions and the fine work they are doing.

The Parkview Baptist Church, formerly Parkview Baptist Mission, sponsored by Central Avenue Baptist Church, Lakeland, was constituted a regular cooperating Southern Baptist Church early in the year. This fine church is doing a great work and has made application for affiliation with the South Florida Baptist Association. May the Lord continue to bless this the youngest of our churches.

In a recent survey made for the Home Mission Board to determine how many more churches and missions are needed in our association, we found that there are several places where we need to begin a new work. If we meet the need of our ever increasing population we must accept the responsibility, as individual churches and as an association of churches, of establishing missions, preaching stations, and branch Sunday Schools, to reach the people with the Gospel and enlist the unenlisted Christians.

The Associational Missions Committee and your Field Secretary would encourage each church to accept the responsibility in helping to provide the necessary finances to acquire property and build buildings in these areas where new work should be started. In acquiring property and building buildings to start a new work some help may be obtained from the New Work Revolving Fund of the Florida Baptist Convention, but this Fund is somewhat limited. Therefore, we must as individual churches and as an association accept the responsibility of providing the necessary facilities to meet the needs within our association.

"Lift up your eyes upon the fields; for they are white already to harvest." (John 4:35.) "The harvest truly is great, but the laborers are few; pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he would send forth labourers into his harvest." (Luke 10:2.)

#### REPORT OF RELIEF AND ANNUITY BOARD

In an all-out effort to enlist more people in the retirement plans, last year the Relief and Annuity Board launched a new program of regional promotion. Field representatives employed cooperatively by the Board and the various state conventions are now serving in 14 Southern Baptist states. They are able to bring the Board's retirement program directly to the individual through personal conferences.

Today there are nearly 16,000 Southern Baptist pastors and denominational workers actively enrolled in all the retirement plans of the Board. During 1956 alone, the membership increased by 1,885.

Last year, the Relief and Annuity Board paid out in benefits a total of \$1,946,654.83. Of this amount \$1,626,211.59 was in annuity benefits received by 3,174 retired ministers and denominational workers, widows and those who are disabled. The remaining \$320,443.24 went to the 1,474 aged preachers and widows on the relief rolls.

The Relief and Annuity Board is constantly seeking an answer to the problem of relief funds. The money that the Board is holding in trust for those who are members of the retirement plans to meet their future annuity payments cannot be used for current relief funds.

To meet these needs, the Board can only use the funds designated as "relief." In 1956 this consisted of \$186,000.00 from the Cooperative Program and \$143,000.00 from gifts and special offerings.

As long as these aged servants of God need the help of the Relief Department, the Board will seek in very possible way to supply that help. The long-range answer to the needs of relief is to prevent those needs from occurring. As pastors and denominational workers are enlisted in retirement plans, the annuity rolls will increase and the relief rolls will decrease.

In the light of the above, the Board is projecting the goals of enlisting new members and enrolling churches for the purpose of securing funds for its Plan, keeping its members active, enlisting Seminary Students and making every member conscious of the Plan. This should be the goal of every Association.

Here are found the mills of the Neal Lumber and Manufacturing Company, the Midway Lumber Company and associated industries, which manufacture construction materials of all kinds from cigar box wood to brick. The Midway Company annually exports millions of feet of hardwood to England. ## FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH, PORT ORANGE, FLORIDA

The First Baptist Church of Port Orange began regular services with an organized Sunday School in the old public school building the first Sunday in December, 1924, under the leadership of Rev. J. W. Littleton as pastor and Mr. R. L. Wilson as Sunday School superintendent. Interest and progress advanced to a desire for a regular organized church.

On June 28, 1925, a council composed of the pastor, Rev. J. W. Littleton; Rev. H. F. Loomis, moderator; Rev. A. L. Abercrombie and Deacon R. L. Wilson met in the old public school building with charter members—Mr. and Mrs. C. Lindsey, Mr. and Mrs. Simmonds, Mrs. T. J. Sparkman and Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Wilson—and organized the present church. Services were held there for some time and then moved to the Methodist Church, where services had been discontinued by that Christian body. The appreciation still remains in the hearts of the Baptists for the generous aid of these Christian people at this critical time. When

the Methodist Church reorganized for services the Baptists were forced to rent the Osborne Hall and moved to it. Many attempts were made from year to year to secure a location and erect a building, but no progress was made because of the high prices of land.

In 1929 the church through subscriptions and borrowing funds purchased the present location. In 1931 the church built the present main building. Early in 1932 the church began services in the new building.

Rev. Littleton pastored the church through these trying years, baptized many and added many to the fold, bringing the group to a large number and a well organized church. He resigned in 1935, leaving behind faithful service for the Lord.

Rev. M. E. Brantley became pastor in 1935 and had a successful year in which many members were added to the roll and many improvements made to the building.

Rev. L. B. Roberts was called to the pastorate in 1936 and served the church for almost two years. During his pastorate an addition consisting of six spacious Sunday School rooms was added to the building.

The church continued to grow during this time.

Rev. H. A. Kramer, the present pastor, was called on August 17 of this year and has made a fine start in the work.—First Baptist Church Historical Committee.
