REV. RUSSELL, PASTOR OF BAPTIST CHURCH, RESIGNS AND WILL LEAVE AT END OF WEEK

Last Sunday was the last of the pastorate of the Rev. Robert H. Russell in the local Baptist church. After his sermon in the morning, his services as the public leader ceased.

This announcement is heard with regret by the whole citizenship of Fort Pierce as well as by the membership of the Baptist church. Mr. Russell has been pastor here for one year and has greatly endeared himself to all who know him. His preaching is of a high order and his scholarship unquestioned.

Mr. Russell is a friendly, approachable man, who does his whole duty fearlessly, and who has a fine personal bearing in public and private work.

He states that he "never regretted to leave a place more in his whole life," and went on to say that the people had been more than kind to him and his and that he greatly appreciated the many kindnesses shown.

He plans to leave Friday for the city of Louisville, where he will re-enter Southern Baptist Seminary for work in completing his theses so as to secure his Th. D. degree. All his university work has been finished except the theses, and part of this has been written. The subject of the theses is: "The Use of the Present Perfect Tense in the Greek Papyri of the First Century A. D."

This theme has required much erudition and careful comparison of the old manuscripts, and Mr. Russell is

fitted by training and temperament to make a success of his degree. He hopes to finish and return to Florida by the first of July, and perhaps later take the chair of Biblical instruction in some Baptist college.

Mrs. Russell will probably spend the spring months in Bradentown in this state, while Mr. Russell's mother will go from here to Mississippi.

The News-Tribune greatly regrets to see this good and capable man leave Fort Pierce, and expresses the wish that his career will be marked by all success.

The successor of Rev. Russell has not yet been chosen, so no announcement can be made at this time as to who the next Baptist pastor will be.

BAPTIST ORGANIZER HERE; OPENS DRIVE FOR MILLION

Rev. M. A. Clounts, of Jacksonville, arrived in Fort Pierce last night. Mr. Clounts is here to organize committees of Baptists to put on the drive for the million dollars Florida is assessed for the work of that church. The allotment has not been made for this county as yet and so soon as this is done, **Rev. Robert H. Russell,** of the Fort Pierce Baptist church, will so announce. Mr. Clounts reports that Dade county was allotted the sum of \$50,000, which will be \$40 per capita of the Baptists of that county, or \$8 each per annum until the amount for that county is raised.

The Baptists along the East Coast, covering the ten counties under the direction of Mr. Clounts, feel confident that they will all go over the top and with some to spare.

Rev. Robert H. Russell, who took up the work as pastor of the Baptist church here last Sunday, coming to Belton from Sweet Springs, is a graduate of Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville, Ky., with degrees of Master in Theology and Doctor in Theology from that institution.
