## Chipley Church Re-activated

CHIPLEY, FLORIDA—“Chipley Community Church, Forest Avenue and West Blvd., will live again,” according to Rev. Buford Trammell of Cullman, Ala., pastor. “But we will call it the Chipley Community Mission.”

Reorganization and first services will be April 25. Sunday school will begin at 9:45 a.m., with preaching services at 11:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m.

Rev. William E. (Bill) Roberts of Wauchula, Fla., will direct the music, with Mrs. Roberts playing the piano. Coy Cole, Jr., of Fairbanks, Alaska, will be educational director. All are students at Baptist Bible Institute, Graceville.

“Mrs. Minnie McBroom, a pioneer church worker in Chipley and DeFuniak Springs, had the building constructed back when people came in wagons”, Mr. Trammell said, “and her Christian witness lingers on.”

Mrs. McBroom set the property aside “to be used only for the Lord,” in her will. She died this year at 77.

Seabron Francis McBroom, gave the land, and he and Mrs. McBroom a piano for the mission.

Workers are repairing the old building, getting it ready for the April 25 opening.

Mr. Trammell singled out Mayhall Construction Company and real estate developer Bill Flanagan of Cullman, Ala., who gave sheetrock and windows. Northside Baptist Church, Cullman, gave 26 hymnals.

Poplar Springs Baptist Church of Chipley gave theater-type seats, formerly used in the high school, to seat 65 persons.

The First Baptist Church of Chipley gave enough literature to start services, Mr. Trammell said.

CHIPLEY — Chipley Community Mission located on the corner of Forrest Ave. and West Blvd., "no longer exists," states Rev. Buford Trammell of 210 S. 6th Street, Chipley, Fla., pastor.

"The mission held its first service April 25 and has already experienced growing pain," Rev. Trammell said.

The charter members voted to constitute into a church, May 19, during a business meeting.

The new congregation will be Westside Baptist Church.

Coy Cole, Jr., serving as temporary moderator, presented the church covenant, articles of faith, and a statement of policy to cooperate with the Southern Baptist Convention. All were adopted by vote of the church members.

The members also voted to call Rev. Trammell as pastor.

Services will remain the same. Sunday school for all age groups will begin at 9:45 a.m., morning service at 11:00 a.m., evening service at 6:30 p.m. and Wednesday prayer service at 7:00 p.m.

"I believe I have the distinction of serving the smallest church in Florida that has three full time staff members," Rev. Trammell said.

Serving with him will be Mr. Cole as minister of educa-

tion and Rev. William E. (Bill) Roberts as music director.

"All are Baptist Bible Institute students and all are serving without pay in order to get the church started and to meet a vital spiritual need in the community," Mr. Trammell said.
