Earl A. Sapp 1931 - 2012 Obituary



Earl A. Sapp (1931-2012) was a native of Leon County. He graduated from Florida State University and Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary. Sapp served as pastor of First Baptist Church, St. Marks, Aucilla Baptist Church, Lamont Baptist Church and Parkway Baptist Church, Tallahassee. Sapp taught Philosophy of Religion and Psychology at Tallahassee Community College for 26 years. Sapp and his wife Elna had one son.

Earl A. Sapp died February 11, 2012 in Tallahassee. Visitation is 11:00 am, February 16, 2012, and the service will start at noon, at Abbey Funeral Home.

A native of Leon County, Earl graduated from Leon High School and received his Bachelor of Arts and Master of Science from Florida State University. He received a Master of Divinity from Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary in Wake Forest, North Carolina.

While attending Florida State University, Earl was pastor of several local churches including First Baptist Church of St. Marks, Aucilla Baptist Church and Lamont Baptist Church. He and his wife, Elna, were instrumental in beginning a Mission from Immanuel Baptist church which later became Parkway Baptist Church.

Mr. Sapp began teaching at Tallahassee Community College in 1969 and taught Philosophy of Religion and Psychology for 26 years, before retiring in 1995. He loved his work and said that "working with young people keeps one young." He was a life-long member of Phi Mu Alpha Fraternity and sang with the University Singers, while at FSU.

Earl was an avid fisherman, spending many weekends at his home on the Wakulla River. He also raised beautiful Bonsai trees and shared them with many of his friends. He was honored as "Golden Poet of the Year" in 1990, by the World Poet Organization for his poem "Caretakers".

Earl was known for his sweet nature and great sense of humor. He was loved by many and will be missed by all of his family and friends.

He is survived by his wife of 59 years, Elna W. Sapp; one brother, Bryan G. Sapp and his wife, Elise; three brothers-in-law, Edward T. Ward and his wife, Mary; Bobby J. Ward and his wife, Betty; and Tony B. Ward and his wife, Helen; many loving neighbors; and special family friends Susanne Wood, Roger and Nell Hewitt, Ken McCullough, and Edward and Evelyn Borschel.

He was preceded in death by his son, E. Allen Sapp, Jr.

PARKWAY BAPTIST CHURCH

Tallahassee

The Mission's Committee of the Immanuel Baptist Church in Tallahassee, Florida found, under the leadership of the Holy spirit, a great need for a church in the Indian Head Acres area. On December 9, 1953 the church voted to sponsor this effort. In January of 1955 the church called Earl Sapp as part-time pastor of the mission. Meetings were first held in private homes, then in a block building on Lafayette St. In 1954 the present church property was acquired in the amount of 2.42 acres.

August of 1955, Bro. Warren Rush was called as permanent, full-time pastor. As the church grew, the basement of the Masonic Lodge, next door was rented for Sunday School classes. The Mission was constituted into a church and named Parkway Baptist Church on November 5, 1956, with 129 charter members. November 5, 1961 was the ground breaking for the educational facility and temporary auditorium. In 1962 the current auditorium was completed with seating capacity of 1000 including the balcony.
