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Sieg, George H. (1846-1910) was born in Americus, Georgia the son of Francis Freelinghuysen and Mary Ann Parks Sieg. He served as pastor of First Baptist Church, Geneva, Florida. Sieg married Martha Pearre Mulkey Sieg (1845-1874) and they had three children. He married Khadra Ann Mercer Sieg (1858-1920) (m. 1977) and they had eight children.

GEO. H. SIEG PASSES OVER THE DARK RIVER

Aged Veteran Has Answered Roll Call.

Peaceful Rest Comes Af- ter Long Illness--Fu- neral To-Day.

George H. Sieg, esteemed citizen and
Confederate veteran, answered yester-
day the final summons and crossed over
the river to "rest beneath the shade
of the trees" with the valiant hosts of
gray heroes gone before. The end
came peacefully yesterday evening
after a long illness.

For several days this good man had
been sinking slowly and the an-
nouncement of his death, therefore,
occasioned no surprise.

Mr. Sieg is survived by his wife,
several sons and daughters and
grandchildren, nearly all of whom
were at the bedside when came the
summons that called him from his
labors upon earth to the bright re-
wards that surely awaits him in a
higher realm.

Mr. Sieg was a native of Americus,
and with the exception of a residence
of a year in Florida, all of his long
and useful career has been spent here.
He was born 66 years ago at the old
family homestead which still stands
out Lee street.

His long life was devoted to agricul-
tural pursuits, and in this, as in other
matters, he excelled.

Mr. Sieg served the Confederacy
throughout the four years of fratrici-
dal strife as a gallant member of
Cutts' Artillery. Since the organiza-
tion of Camp Sumter, he has been a
most useful member and for twenty
years or longer he served the camp
as chaplain.

The funeral service will be held
at 3 o'clock this afternoon from the
First Baptist church, of which the
deceased was for many years a con-
sistent member. The Confederate vet-
erans will take part therein.

The six sons of the deceased will
serve as pall bearers, while the hon-
orary pall bearers will be Messrs.
W. T. Lane, C. C. Hawkins, J. W. L.
Daniel, W. M. Tullis, T. F. Gatewood,
Dr. W. S. Prather, Lawson Speer and
Samuel Murray.

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
